Methodology

- A series of online surveys conducted among the approximately 7000 current members of the Canada 20/20 panel.
- Anyone interested in participating in these surveys can join the Canada 20/20 panel by going to Canada2020.com and completing the enrolment survey. However, our base sample was recruited through a series of invitations emailed by Rogers Publishing and Canadians recruited through Innovative's telephone surveys. Our core analysis is based on those who respond to email invitations.
- On a typical week we received approximately 4,100 responses eligible for inclusion in our analysis. After weighting a sample of this size the aggregated results are considered accurate to within ±1.5 percentage points, 19 times out of 20, of what they would have been had a representative cross-section of Canadians eligible to vote been polled.
- The margin of error will be larger within each sub-grouping of the sample








Conservative Party fails to budge perceptions






Harper less scary in most groups after campaign




Public generally satisfied with outcome of the 11 election

Generally speaking, how satisfied are you with the outcome of the election...?














Net Better Expectations



3 in 10 say government has performed worse than expected


Considering the performance of the FEDERAL government since it was elected last month, would you say it has performed...?





Almost 4 in 5 had heard about the appointment⁹ of the new federal Cabinet Ministers


Have you read, seen or heard anything recently about the <u>new federal Cabinet Ministers</u> <u>appointed by Prime Minister Stephen Harper?</u>

Did what you read, saw or heard about the <u>new federal Cabinet Ministers</u> leave you feeling more or less favourable towards the new Conservative federal government?






Conservatives still seen as better on ethics in government – but have dropped 5 points


Which FEDERAL party you think would do a much better job or a somewhat better job of dealing with ...



Do you support or oppose each of these policies....




Over half support cutting GST






Almost half oppose rolling back Liberal tax cuts

... Rolling back the tax cuts in the last Liberal budget and replacing them with new tax cuts like the 2% reduction in the GST.






Not even 2 in 5 support giving the Supreme Court final say over same sex marriage

... Giving the Supreme Court the final say over Parliament on the same sex marriage issue.






A majority oppose holding a free vote on same sex marriage

... Holding a free vote on the same sex marriage issue.






A majority oppose canceling the current child 29 care deal

... Cancel the current child care deal with the provinces and replace it with a direct \$1,200 per child payment to families.






Half oppose Quebec playing a larger role

... Allowing Quebec to play a role in international institutions, such as UNESCO.






A majority oppose withdrawing Canada's support for Kyoto

... Withdrawing Canada's support for the Kyoto agreement and introduce a Clean Air act to legislate reduction of polluting gases.








Almost 3 in 5 oppose participating in the Missile Defence program

... Participating in the US Ballistic Missile Defence program.






Canadians split on using personal money to buy health services

Canadians conflict on private role in health care


Do you agree or disagree with the following...?

It would be wrong to allow a separate, privately funded health care system in Canada because it would allow a two-tier health care system where the rich get better care than the rest.


It is wrong to allow companies to make a profit providing publicly funded health care services.



The Big Picture

- The Conservatives are at the top of their game with a firm grasp of about 85% of their vote in their universe. However they still face a challenge in gaining new ground as 80% of the voters outside the Conservative universe see them as too extreme.
- The Liberals are at the bottom of their game only holding 60% of their vote which they need to retain and grow
- After their first two weeks in office the Conservatives are experiencing significant negative momentum but so far it has not made a significant impact on their vote.
- The Tory mandate is based primarily on a desire for more ethical government, which took a hit with the appointment of the new Cabinet.
- However the Tories have a number of strong issues to which they turn to and "switch the channel"
- In terms of the Liberal leadership, there is a struggle as the most popular candidates have already declined to run. However the Liberal stance on a number of key issues such as missile defence and same sex marriage could provide a popular ready-made platform if they succeed in attracting a marketable leader.
- At this point there are opportunities for both Canada's main choices for government.
 The question is which party will capitalize off of their political opportunities.
