

### Canada 20/20 Methodology

- Primary data source is the Maclean's Election Surveys run on Innovative Research Group's Canada 20/20 panel.
- 6800 Canadians
- Completes run from 4,000 to 5,000 a wave
- Data weighted by age, region and gender
- Primary advantage allows us to track the movement of specific people and build causal models
- While panels can have conditioning and attrition effects, our numbers have tracked very closely to the average of the two daily tracking surveys.

### Canadian Values Study Methodology

- For the BC state of mind slides, we have used results from our fall Canadian Values study, conducted for the National Post and the Dominion Institute.
- Telephone survey of 815 randomly selected Canadians conducted between September 22 and 24, 3005.
- Margin of error +/- 3.43 %, 19 times out of 20.
- Data weighted by age, region and gender.




### Quebec and BC more likely to say government <sup>6</sup> should redistribute wealth

Is the main role of government to (ROTATE) create equal opportunity so everyone can compete on their own OR to redistribute wealth so that the poor have more than on their own?




# Quebec and BC more 'progressive' on social issues

Sexual relations between two adults of the same sex are morally wrong.




# BC feels more aggrieved than Quebec on treatment by Ottawa

Does the federal government treat your province better, worse or about the same as other provinces?









#### Election Day Results vs. Wave 1 Results\* (Dec 2 – Dec 12)












Did what you read, saw or heard leave you feeling more or less likely to vote Conservative?

Did what you read, saw or heard leave you feeling more or less likely to vote Liberal?


















# Harper edges ahead of Martin and Layton as candidate that stands for what voters believe









# Current Tory surge reminiscent of Liberals in last Ontario Election ...







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
# Conservative performing above expectations on almost all issues [National]


## NDP performing above expectations on some others, behind on others [ROC]




Which of the federal parties is closest to you on your most important issue? (Wave 6)








## Will growing expectation of Tory victory drive bandwagon or strategic voting?


#### Strategic voting

- Soft New Democrats still think Harper is 'scary'
- Last week soft New Democrats did not see Conservatives as likely to win – a key requirement for strategic voting
- This week they likely will.
- However, Tory lead well beyond the margin at which strategic voting can swing the election




### Stephen Harper: Still scary, especially in BC

Agree/disagree: Stephen Harper scares me




# Conservative party retains extreme image with majorities across Canada

### **Summary**

#### Odds are against a Liberal win

- Voters have been PERSUADED to change their minds in a positive way on Harper and a negative way on Martin
- The key issues that have been PRIMED crime and ethics favour the Conservatives over the Liberals
- Strategic voting not enough to close gap
- Liberals need Conservative mistakes

#### Odds favour a closer race

Increasing perceived likelihood of Conservative win will trigger some strategic voting

To win a majority, Tories need breakthrough in two out of three tough regions

Quebec, GTA and Atlantic
