Methodology

- The online survey was conducted among current members of INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 panel from April 13th after the end of the debate to April 17th, 2011.
- The Canada 20/20 Panel is recruited from a wide variety of sources to be representative of the known distribution of Canadians by age, gender, region and language.
- Results are weighted according to Census data to ensure that the sample is representative of the age, gender, region and language breakdown of the Canadian population to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample.
- Each panellist is provided with a unique URL in their invitation so that only invited panel members are able to complete any specific survey. Each URL can only be used to complete one survey.
- The weighted total sample included 1897 responses eligible for inclusion in our analysis including 438 in Quebec. An unweighted probability sample of 1897 would have an estimated margin of error of ±2.25 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.
- The margin of error will be larger within each sub-grouping of the sample.




The Horserace

If a Federal election were held today, which party would you vote for? In that case, which party do you lean toward slightly?








Best Prime Minister by Region (Wave 3)
















Dealing with the Parti Quebecois
