



Decided provincial vote intent is consistent across both data sources.



Attention based engagement

Attention based engagement is measured as an index of respondents' answers to 7 questions. These questions ask whether voters have "seen, read, or heard" about each of the 3 major party leaders in the last few days, and how familiar they consider themselves with each of the 4 party leaders (including Green party leader, Mike Schreiner). This is a measure of how engaged respondents are with the facts and events of the political campaign.

The scale is split into 4 categories equal distances apart.






Combined vote by attention: low engagement voters <u>unlikely to vote, Liberal lead grows along with engagement</u>

Combined vote by attention-based engagement




Emotional engagement

Emotional engagement is measured as an index of respondents' answers to 2 questions. They are asked whether they strongly agree, somewhat agree, neither agree nor disagree, somewhat disagree, or strongly disagree with each of the following statements:

- It doesn't matter who we vote for, all the parties end up doing the same things.
- Things could go very badly for Ontario if we choose the wrong party to form government.

Their answers are combined into a single scale, and the scale is split into 4 categories equal distances apart.






Combined vote by emotional engagement: Liberal lead shrinks as emotional engagement grows

Combined vote by emotion-based engagement














Voter Conflict Segments





The Liberal Road Forward

- 1. The Liberals are well positioned to hold onto a minority government.
 - They have the biggest voter pool and the strongest party brand.
 - Their leader has the most favourables a core advantage in strong leadership.
 - Despite 10 years in power and all the scandals that come with it, there is no passion in any desire for change.
- 2. The Liberals need to rally the center and left vote. That vote is looking for the 2003 Liberals creating greenbelts and rebuilding public services. They need to be those Liberals.
- **3.** They need to stop only meeting and start doing. They are the government. They don't need to promise. They can just do.
- 4. They should make their promises before the writ and focus the election on the Tory threat. This will mobilize their base, rally potential NDP voters and limit potential Tory defections.













Liberal identifiers vote choice by viewership





NDP Identifiers vote choice by viewership






Combined vote debate effect among unaligned: PC and ⁴⁰ Liberals benefit among those who watch, while NDP does not


Unaligned identifiers vote choice by viewership

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



Liberal vote change by Cluster: Liberals gained or


held steady with every group





PC vote change by Cluster: Hudak lost close to 10 ⁴⁴















Pulling It All Together

- 1. The Liberal edge on brand loyalty is hard to overcome.
- 2. The Liberals executed the better the campaign while each of the Tories and the NDP made a key strategic error that played into the Liberal campaign plan.
- 3. The NDP plan was half right they did add new people to their base, but the new recruits simply replaced core supporters lost to the Liberals.
- 4. The Tories must reach out beyond the Conservative party loyalists. They didn't even rally all the conservative value clusters. There is much broader support for conservative attitudes and policies than there is for the PC party today.
- 5. The government's fiscal challenge creates both NDP and Conservative opportunities to rebuild.





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
