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2015 Election Polling Wave 2: Campaign Dynamics





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Key Findings



Public opinion is stable

- Over the last month of the summer very little changed in how the public views this election. We still see a tight 3-way race with the NDP (down 2 points) in front and the Liberals (up 1 point) trailing only slightly. When we look at the what underlies people's choices not much has changed:
 - Respondent's second choices are stable. Conservatives continue to be the second choice of just 8% of respondents, while the Liberals are the second choice of 22% (unchanged) and the NDP 21% (down 2 points)
 - 62% say that is time for a change, stable from 63% a month ago.
 - On leadership, Harper's image (-21 net favourability, up 3 points) and Mulcair's (+26 net, up 1 point) are stable. Trudeau has improved from +1 to +14 net favourability.
 - There is little change on leadership attributes, where voters are split on who has the best plan and stands for what they believe in. Harper (25%, down 2) and Mulcair (27%, down 2) continue to lead Trudeau (15%, up 2) on competence. Harper (38%, up 1) is still by far the most likely to be seen as "Too Negative".
- The major news event that we might have expected to shift public opinion was the Duffy trial On the one hand we do see that people were paying attention (50% following it closely) and reacting negatively (34% say they are much less likely to vote Conservative). However almost all of the negative reaction is among those who identify with the opposition parties. Unaligned voters react negatively as well, but are also paying much less attention to the issue



The Conservatives tread water but may have potential to grow

- Although the Conservatives have the smallest pool of voters are currently voting or considering them (30%, compared to 35% for Liberals and 39% for the NDP) they may potential for growth among Time-for-a-Change Tories (TfC Tories), those who are looking for a change but still believe the Tories are the best option to form a government.
- Currently only 35% of TfC Tories are voting Conservative, making it a group where they have considerable room to grow, given that these voters already believe they are the best option to form a government.
- On the emerging issue of a recession, many more of these TfC Tory voters vastly prefer the Conservatives (47%) then choose the Liberals (24%) or NDP (20%).
- In the public debate, despite the shadow of the Duffy treal, Time for a Change Tories have been responding very favourably (50% favourable, just 21%) unfavourable to what they have read, seen, or heard from the Conservatives so far.



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NDP campaign relatively low profile in August but continues to enjoy the largest potential pool of support

- There has been little change in opinion about the NDP and that may be because people are paying them less attention.
- Of the three major parties fewer people say they have read, seen, or heard something about the NDP (41%) than say the same about the Liberals (52%) or the Conservatives (60%).
- As a result we see that their vote choice (down 2 points), leader favourables (up 1 point on net), leader attributes (3 of 5 moved 1 point or less), and party image (4 of 6 moved 1 point or less) are all very static
- This may represent a vulnerability for the NDP as the Liberals inch ahead on areas like "protecting the middle class" and Mulcair remains only softly defined for many voters.
- However, the NDP continue to enjoy the largest voter poll with 39% actively considering the NDP compared to 35% for the Liberals and just 30% of the Conservatives.



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Where there is change, the Liberals are inching forwards at NDP expense

- There are small but consistent signs that if anything is really changing it is to the Liberals benefit. First and foremost the race has tightened slightly in their favour. In addition:
 - Justin Trudeau's favourability ratings are up from net +1 to a net +14. This comes from both an increase who those who see him favourably (44% from 37%) and a decrease in those who see him unfavourably (29% from 35%)
 - More people have read, seen, or heard something about the Liberals (52%) than the NDP (41%). Those who have are left feeling more favourable (39%) more than less so (23%)
 - Trudeau has closed what was previously a 7 point gap with Mulcair on who represents positive change (24% a piece, from 27% Mulcair and 20% Trudeau in the last wave)
 - The Liberals have also closed the gap with the NDP on which party is best at protecting the middle class. 28% now choose the Liberals (up 5 points) while 27% say NDP (down 5 points).
- Trudeau benefitted from a solid debate performance. Although more voters picked May (26%) and Harper (22%) as the winner, Trudeau (18%) did better than Mulcair (13%) in the battle for progressive voters. Trudeau was also the pick of 17% of unaligned voters, second to May (31%) but again much higher than Mulcair (10%).
- Perhaps most importantly, Trudeau significantly outperformed expectations in the debate. 44% said he did better than they expected, with just 15% saying worse. This compares to 20% better and 22% worse for Mulcair and 14% to 19% worse for Harper.


Methodology

- These are the findings of an Innovative Research Group (INNOVATIVE) poll conducted from August 24th to August 26th, 2015. In the following slides we will refer to data from this poll as "Wave 2 (August)".
- This online survey of 3,274 Canadians was conducted using both INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national panel (n=1,297) and additional sample provided by Survey Sampling International (n=1,977).
- "Wave 1 (July)" refers to tracking data from INNOVATIVE's last online poll conducted from July 24th to July 30th, 2015 (n=2,833 with n=1,780 from the Canada 20/20 national panel and n=1,053 from Survey Sampling International).
- The Canada 20/20 Panel is recruited from a wide variety of sources to reflect the age, gender, region and language characteristics of the country as a whole.
- The sample is then weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data and also by party identification for the major parties as estimated in Innovative's telephone research from the last two months.
- Because the sample included oversamples in some smaller provinces, the total weighted sample size was reduced to 2,000.
- INNOVATIVE provides each panellist with a unique URL via an email invitation so that only invited panel members are able to complete the survey and panel members can only complete a particular survey once.
- Since online surveys are not random probability based samples, a margin of error can not be calculated. The Marketing Research and Intelligence Association prohibits statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates with regard to most online panels.

Note: Graphs and tables may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.




Party ID: Conservatives have strongest ID in ROC, Liberals and NDP strongest in Quebec












Second Choice by Combined Vote: among Liberal voters, over half (52%) would choose NDP as 2nd choice




Battleground Segments: Rest of Canada



Battleground Segments: Quebec































And what did you read, see, or hear about Stephen Harper and the federal Conservative Party?


























Mike Duffy Trial interest: 50% of Canadians have been following it, but Unaligned are paying less attention
















Expectations are biased by the voters' party ID

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




