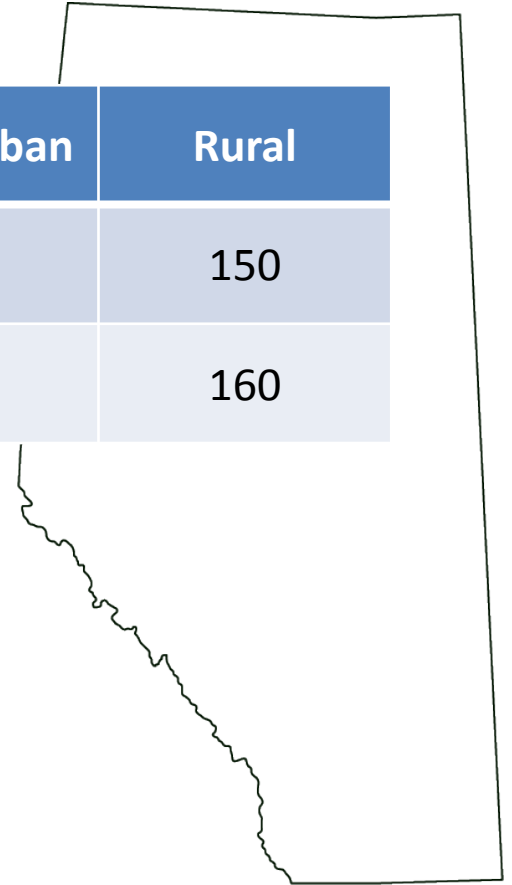
Methodology:

- This survey was conducted by telephone among 646 randomly-selected Alberta residents, 18 years or older, between October 25th and November 1st, 2016.
- Only one respondent per household was eligible to complete this survey.
- The sample has been weighted by age, gender and region using the latest available Statistics Canada Census data to reflect the actual demographic composition of the population.
- After weighting a sample of this size, the aggregated results are considered accurate to within $\pm 4.0\%$, 19 times out of 20.
- The margin of error will be larger within each sub-grouping of the sample.

Note: *Graphs and tables may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.*

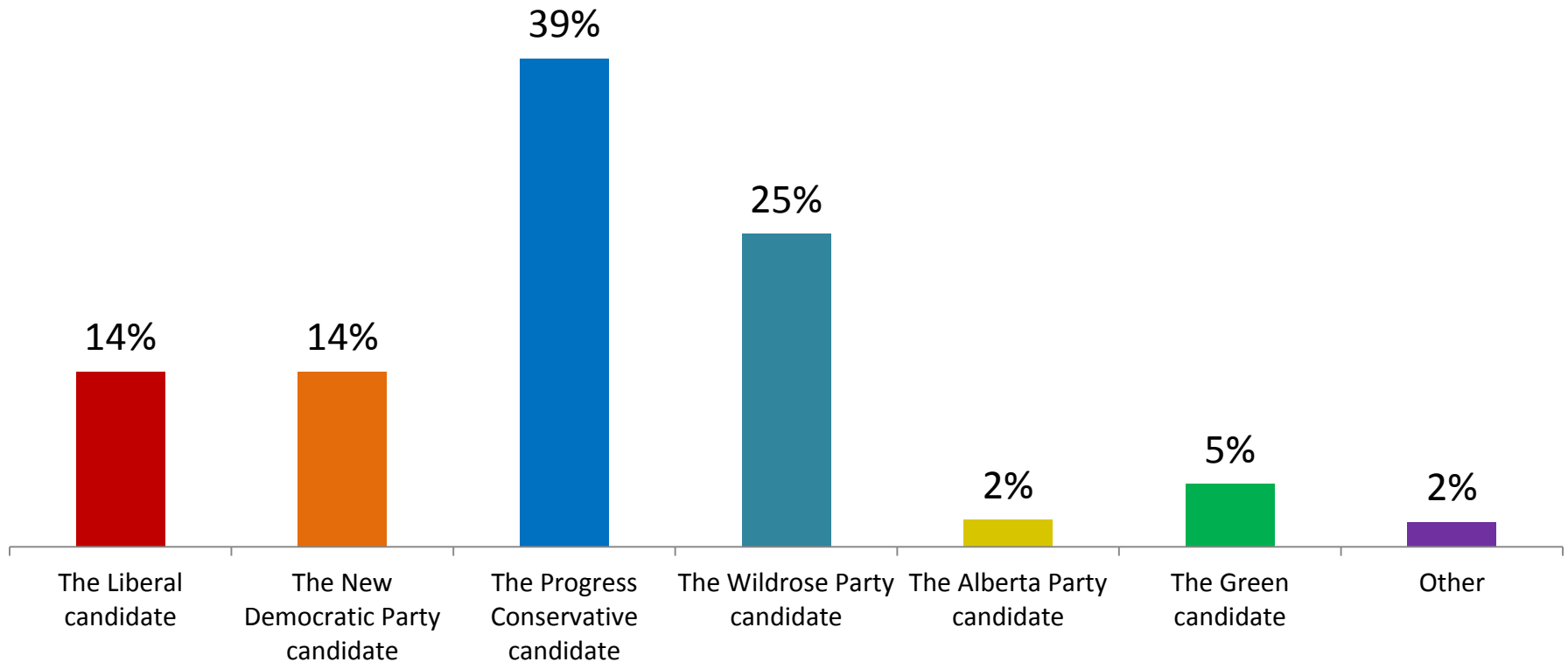
Regional sample sizes

Decided provincial vote: 39% would vote for PC; Wildrose (25%) in second with NDP (14%) returning to historic levels

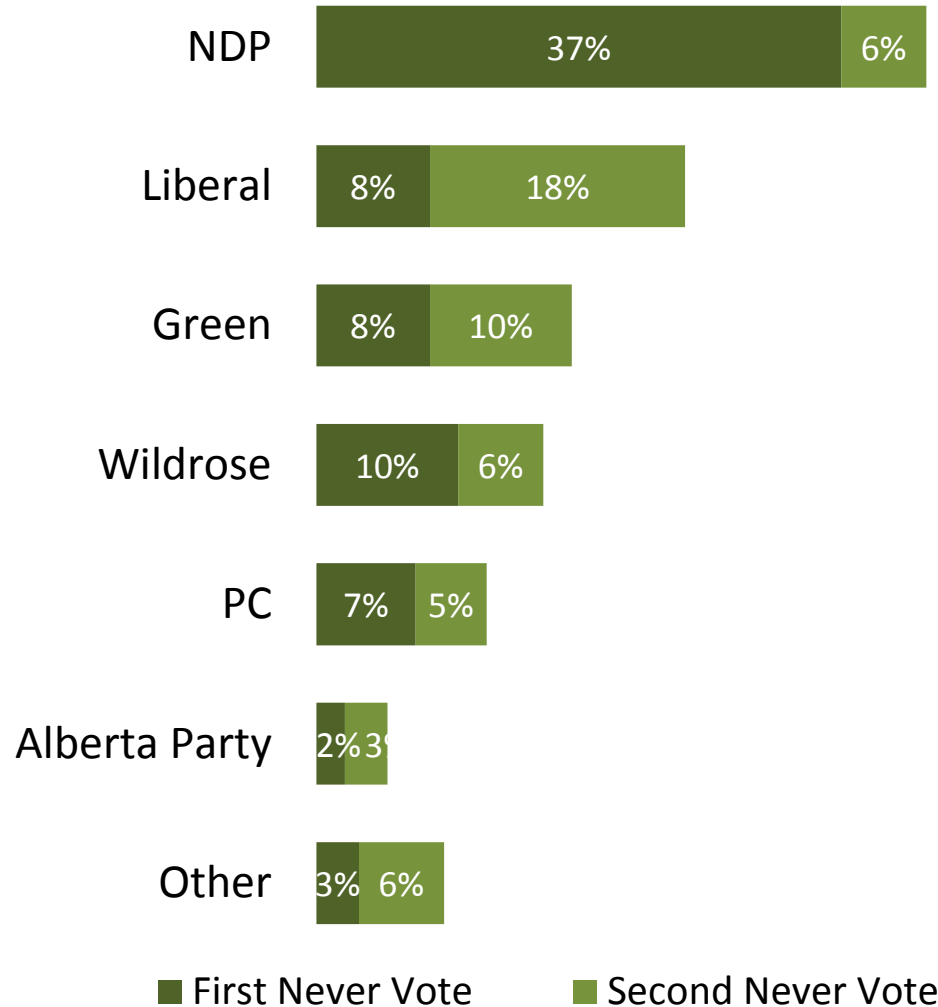


Don't Know/ Would Not Vote/Refused = 15%

Q Is there an Alberta party you would never vote for? Is there another Alberta party you would never vote for?

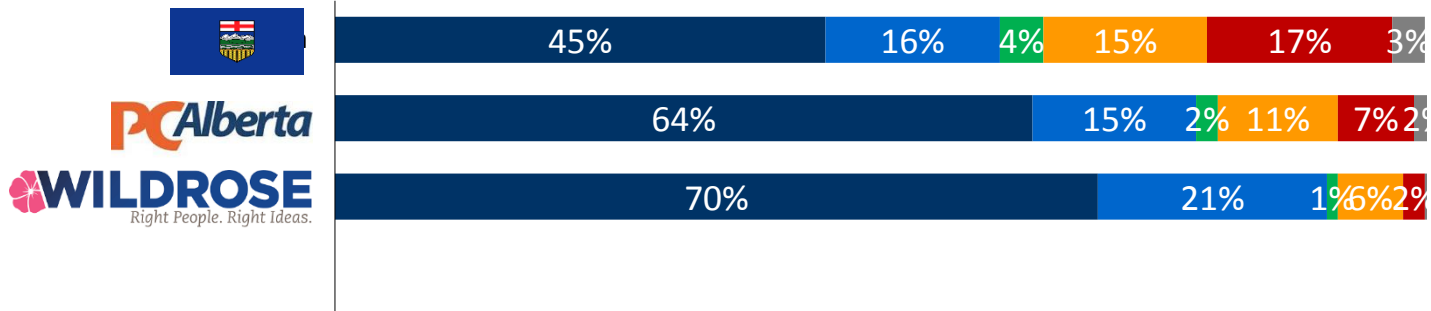

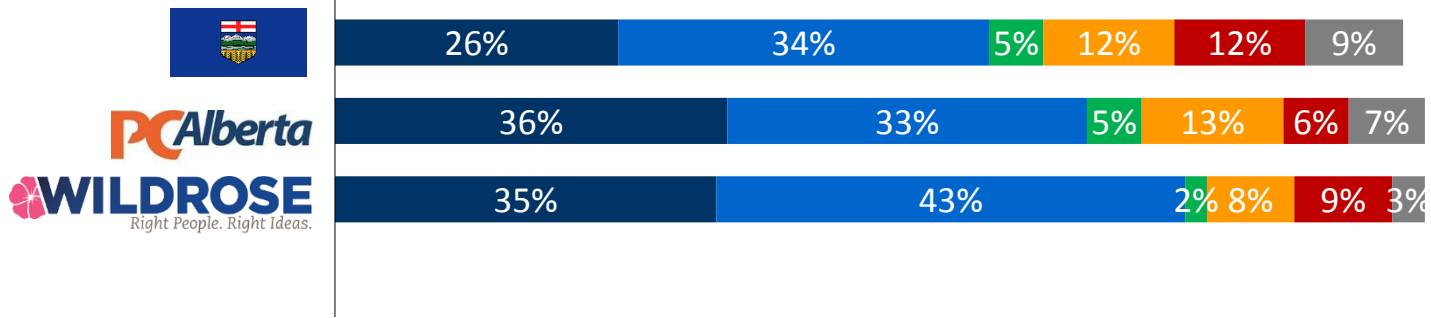
PC and Wildrose supporters committed to the defeat of the NDP and agree uniting their parties is a good way to do it

The most important thing in the next Alberta election is to defeat the NDP.



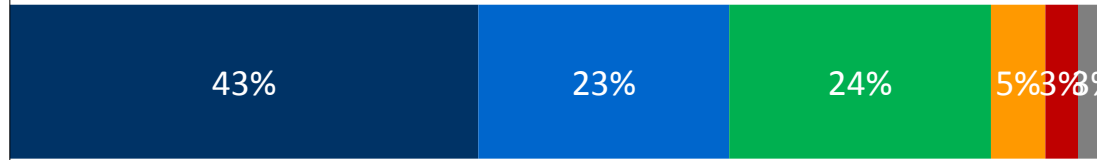
The best way to defeat the NDP in the next Alberta election is for the PC Party and Wildrose to come together in a single party.

Q If the Wildrose Party and the PC party find a way to come together into a single Conservative party, how likely are you to vote for that “unite the right” party?






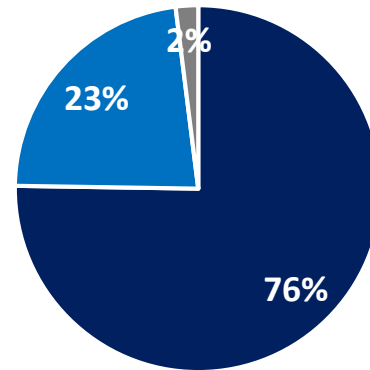
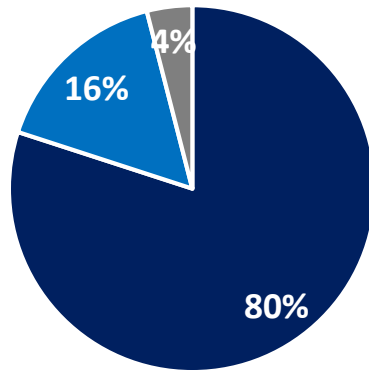
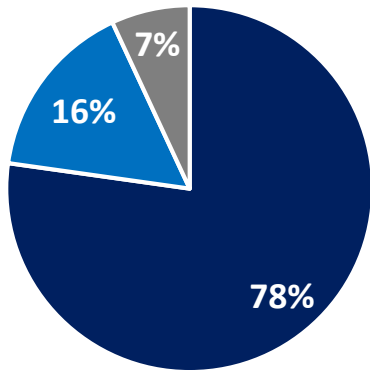
