

## Public Opinion Research Canada This Month: Ontario Focus

### Vote, Leadership and Political Landscape

Field Dates: May7th to May 9th, 2018 Sample Size: n=915

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### Methodology

- These are the findings of an Innovative Research Group (INNOVATIVE) poll conducted from May 7<sup>th</sup> to May 9<sup>th</sup>, 2018 with tracking drawn for our monthly omnibus.
- This online survey of 915 adult Ontarians is drawn from a larger monthly omnibus survey of 1,990 adult Canadians using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Survey Sampling International (SSI), a leading provider of online sample. The Ontario results shown are weighted to n=915 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.
- The Canada 20/20 Panel is recruited from a wide variety of sources to reflect the age, gender, region and language characteristics of the country as a whole. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample.
- INNOVATIVE provides each panellist with a unique URL via an email invitation so that only invited panel members are able to complete the survey, and panel members can only complete a particular survey once.
- This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability based sample, a margin of error can not be calculated. The Marketing Research and Intelligence Association prohibits statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates with regard to most online panels.

**Note**: Graphs and tables may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.




### May CTM Ontario Weights: Age, gender, and region

Results for Ontario are weighted by age, gender, and region to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data; in order to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample. 










### Satisficing by 2<sup>nd</sup> Choice: 30% of voters considering NDP, but most of those voters are still making up their minds

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














Based on respondents' vote choice, second choice, and their likelihood to switch to their second choice]




























Did you happen to watch the leader's debate yourself? [asked of those who RSH; n=427]




## Who Won the Debate? Among those who watched, Horwath was the clear winner



In your opinion, which leader did the best in that debate?


