Vote and Leadership

Field Dates: May 23rd to May 29th, 2018

Sample Size: n=600; MoE ±4.0%

Methodology

- This survey was conducted by telephone among 611 randomly-selected Ontario residents who are Canadian citizens, 18 years of age and older, from May 23rd to May 29th, 2018.
 - [LEADERSHIP November 2017: questions in leadership section were added to survey with calling beginning on November 13th and ending November 17th, 2017.]
- Only one respondent per household was eligible to complete this survey. The final sample includes both landline and cell phone respondents, so that individuals who don't have a landline are represented.
- The sample has been weighted (n=600) by age, gender and region using the latest available Census data to reflect the actual demographic composition of the population.
- This survey is compared with previous studies since April 2000. Prior to April 2003, approximately 650 Ontario adult citizens were randomly selected. Since April 2003, approximately 600 adults are surveyed.
- The margin of error for a sample of n=600 is approximately <u>+</u>4.0 (before April 2003: approximately <u>+</u>3.84)
- For tracking data, results are always weighted based on the most recent available census data.
- In the analysis, **net** impression or satisfaction refers to the two "positive" measures (i.e. "excellent" and "good") minus the two "negative" measures ("fair" or "poor") to create a single number. If there is a neutral measure ("made no difference"), it is not included in the calculation.

Note: Graphs and tables may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.




Ontario Weights: Age, gender, and region

Results for Ontario are weighted by age, gender, and region to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data; in order to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported below.


Provincial Vote: NDP (29%) has marginal lead over PCs (27%); Liberals a distant third (17%)









Provincial Vote Tracking: Surge in NDP support, PCs down, and Liberals hit lowest point in tracking

March 10, 2018: Doug Ford named Ontario PC leader






Combined Vote: Liberal support is down 10 points from five years ago, while NDP support is up 10 points




Provincial Decided Vote: NDP hold marginal lead over PCs among decided voters






Provincial Decided Vote Tracking: Surge in NDP support among decided voters; Liberals at lowest point in tracking








Never Vote: Anti-PC (19%) and anti-Liberal (20%) sentiment ¹⁵ much stronger than anti-NDP (9%)




Never Vote: Marginal decline in "never vote Liberal" and marginal increase in anti-PC; NDP have held steady



Thinking about politics in Ontario, generally speaking, do you usually think of yourself as a....[PARTY ID] [asked of all respondents, n=600]
















Andrea Horwath Tracking: Horwath's favourability continues²⁴ to grow, with highest ever *very favourable*




Doug Ford: Strongly unfavourable view more than 3x strongly favourable; fewer than 7-in-10 PC partisans favourable











Ford/PC Leader Tracking: Doug Ford's favourability lower than any PC party leader since 2009








Kathleen Wynne Tracking: Kathleen Wynne's net favourability is now back to where it was almost one year ago






Campaign Awareness: 1-in-3 (34%) have been following election "closely"




Firmness of Vote: An almost even split on whether or not they have made up their minds or want to hear more



Comparing Online and Telephone



Online Survey Methodology

- This section compares the results of a telephone survey of 600 Ontarians conducted between May 23rd and May 29th, 2018 with the findings of a special Innovative Research Group (INNOVATIVE) online poll conducted from May 27th (immediately following the final debate) to May 29th, 2018.
- This online survey of 958 adult Ontarians was conducted on INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Léger, a leading provider of online sample. The sample is weighted to n=800 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.
- The panels are recruited from a wide variety of sources to reflect the age, gender, region and language characteristics of the country as a whole. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample.
- INNOVATIVE provides each panellist with a unique URL via an email invitation so that only invited panel members are able to complete the survey, and panel members can only complete a particular survey once.
- This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability based sample, a margin of error can not be calculated. The Marketing Research and Intelligence Association prohibits statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates with regard to most online panels.
- **NOTE:** References to May 2018 Wave 1 refer to our online May 2018 Canada this Month survey in field from May 7th to May 9th, with a weighted sample of n=915 respondents. References to May 2018 Wave 2 refer to our first special online poll in field from May 9th to May 12th, with a weighted sample of n=1,500 respondents. References to May 2018 Wave 3 refer to our online poll from May 18th to May 23rd with a weighted sample of n=1,050. The current wave of results is referred to as May 2018 Wave 4.




Online Combined Vote Tracking: NDP now have an edge over PCs, while Liberal vote continues to decline
