#### Federal Politics in the time of COVID-19

The COVID-19 outbreak has set off a series of changes in the Canadian political landscape. Federally, approval of the government's handling of the pandemic has been rising, which has translated to the highest government satisfaction that we've seen in years. Trudeau is also gaining favourability with Canadians, while Scheer is seeing a decline in his reputation at a near equal rate.

Today, INNOVATIVE is releasing results from our May 2020 Canada This Month survey. This online survey was in field from May 1<sup>st</sup> to May 5<sup>th</sup> with a weighted sample size of 1,500 and oversamples in every province. Detailed methodology is provided in the appendix.


This report covers key results on how Canadians are rating the Federal government's handling of COVID-19 and the impacts that is having for government satisfaction and vote choice.

Federal government approval on handling of COVID-19 is on the rise over the past few months

### **COVID-19 Handling:** 6-in-10 (59%) approve of the federal government's handling of the outbreak


Now thinking about the federal government, do you approve or disapprove of the way the federal government has handled the outbreak of COVID-19?

Now thinking about the federal government, do you approve or disapprove of the way the federal government has handled the outbreak of COVID-19? [asked of all respondents; n=1500]






### **COVID-19 Handling Tracking:** the Province's have consistently run slightly ahead of the Federal government

**% who approve** of government's handling of COVID-19 outbreak: Federal Vs. Provincial [asked of all respondents; n=1500]




#### General government satisfaction has risen to its highest level since October 2016

# **Federal Satisfaction:** 6-in-10 (60%) are satisfied with the federal government performance, only 1-in-3 (34%) say they are dissatisfied


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Generally speaking, how satisfied are you with the performance of the FEDERAL government in Canada? Would you say you are...? [asked of all respondents; n=1500]

With 2-in-3 having read, seen, or heard something about Trudeau or the Federal government, half say it left a positive impact





Have you read, seen or heard anything about Canada's Prime Minister and the Federal government in the last few days? [asked of all respondents; n=1500]


















### Value Clusters: Business Liberals (27%) and Core Left (22%) are largest <sup>17</sup> value groups; only 10% are Populist Conservatives

**Value clusters**: Clusters are based on 4 basic values: equal opportunity versus redistribution; trust in the profit system; whether spending should be based on ability to afford or public need; and whether government should listen to experts or common sense.









# **Time for Change Tracking:** Time for a change sentiment has decreased <sup>21</sup> significantly since October, agreement down from 55% to 42%


Do you agree or disagree with the following statements? - It is time for a change in government here in Canada [asked of all respondents; n=1500]

Do you agree or disagree with the following statements? - The Liberals may have their problems but they are still the best party to form government [asked of all respondents; n=1500]






### **Time for Change Segmentation:** Less than 1-in-10 (8%) feel that the Liberals are the best party, but it's time for a change



#### **Impact on Justin Trudeau:** Nearly half (45%) say that Trudeau's response has left them with a better impression of him







# **Leader Favourables:** A plurality have a favourable impression of Trudeau; a majority (53%) have an unfavourable impression of Scheer








#### Leader favourability by Economic Gap: Among all groups, more see Trudeau favourably than unfavourably



#### The Liberal Party continues to lead in Federal vote


Innovative reports on vote intention in two ways.

When we ask people who they would vote for if an election were held today, and who they lean towards if they are unsure, we call those results **Combined vote**. This accounts for the views of everyone in the population including decided voters, undecided voters, and non-voters.

When we look at the results among *only* decided voters, we call that <u>Decided vote</u>. These results most tell us what the election results would be like if the survey results matched the election exactly.

# **Federal Combined Vote:** Over a third (35%) would vote Liberal, 1-in-4 <sup>34</sup> (24%) for CPC, and 1-in-10 would vote for NDP or are Undecided (11%)


If a federal election were held today, which party would you vote for? In that case, which party do you lean toward slightly? [Vote + Lean] [asked of all respondents; n=1500]


### **Federal Vote Tracking:** No major shifts month-to-month; Liberals (35%) hold 11-point lead over CPC (24%) with NDP in distant third


If a federal election were held today, which party would you vote for? In that case, which party do you lean toward slightly? [Vote + Lean] [asked of all respondents; n=1500]


If a federal election were held today, which party would you vote for? In that case, which party do you lean toward slightly? [DECIDED] [decided voters only; n=1287]

























### Methodology

### Survey Methodology

### These are the results of an online survey conducted between May 1<sup>st</sup> and May 5<sup>th</sup>, 2020.

**Method:** This online survey was conducted using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Lucid, a leading provider of online sample. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample.

**Sample Size:** n=2,699 Canadian citizens, 18 years or older. The results are weighted to n=1,500 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.

#### Field Dates: May 1st and May 5th, 2020.

**Weighting:** Results for Canada are weighted by age, gender, and region to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data; in order to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported in the table.

**Margin of Error:** This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability based sample, a margin of error cannot be calculated. Statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates do not apply to most online panels.

**Note**: Graphs may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.
