

#### Shifting Gears in the Fight Against COVID-19

As the new case counts begin to decline in Canada, the immediate challenge facing the federal government will shift from health to economic recovery.

Given this, INNOVATIVE is releasing results that shed light on three core questions:

- I. Where do things stand for governments and in terms of personal finances?
- II. Compared to before the COVID-19 outbreak, have views on economic policy changed?
- III. So where does that leave government?

Results of this release come from INNOVATIVE's latest survey conducted between May 15<sup>th</sup> and May 19<sup>th</sup> with a weighted sample size of 1,000 Canadian residents. Detailed methodology is provided in the appendix.

#### I. Where do things stand — for governments?

Canadians are rallying around their governments. Approval of government's handling of the outbreak has been high for most Canadians since the early days of the outbreak and has remained that way as restrictions begin to ease.

#### **Government Approval Tracking:** Over half approve of provincial, federal, and municipal handling of COVID-19 since the early days of the outbreak

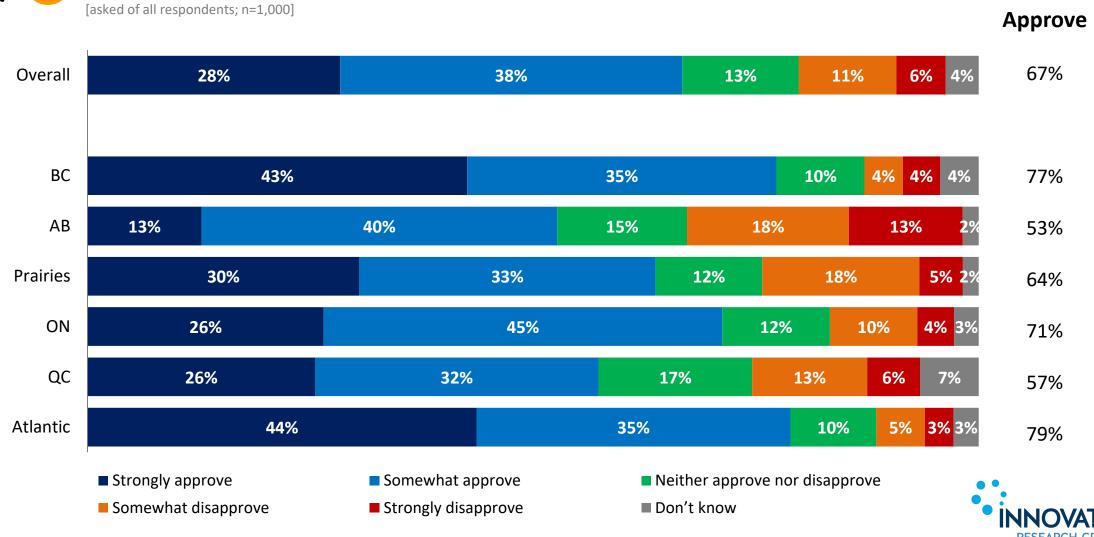

Do you approve or disapprove of the way the [PROV] Government has handled the outbreak of COVID-19? BY Region

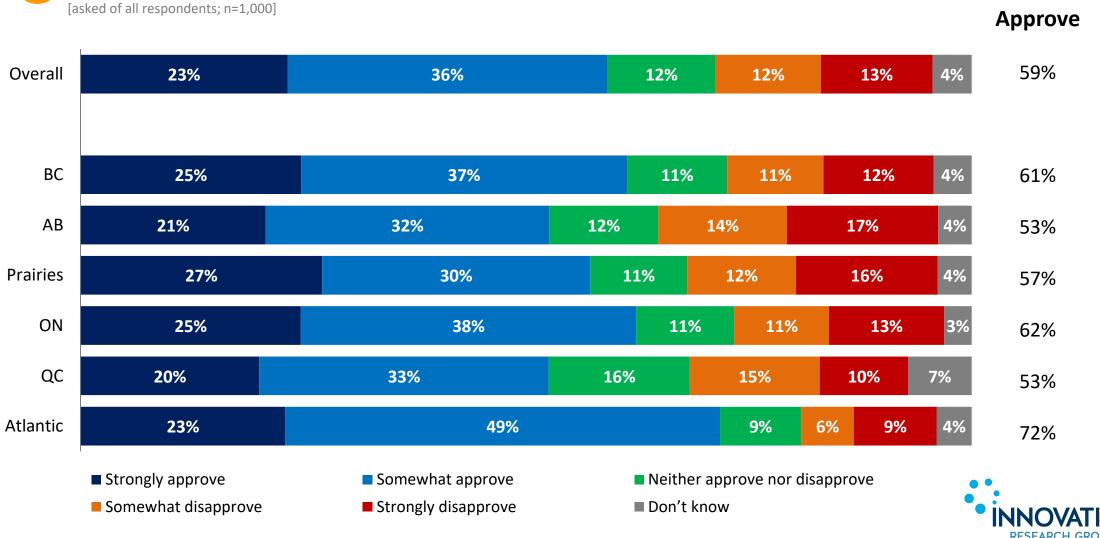


### **Federal Government Approval:** Approval of the federal government's response is highest in BC, Ontario, and Atlantic Canada

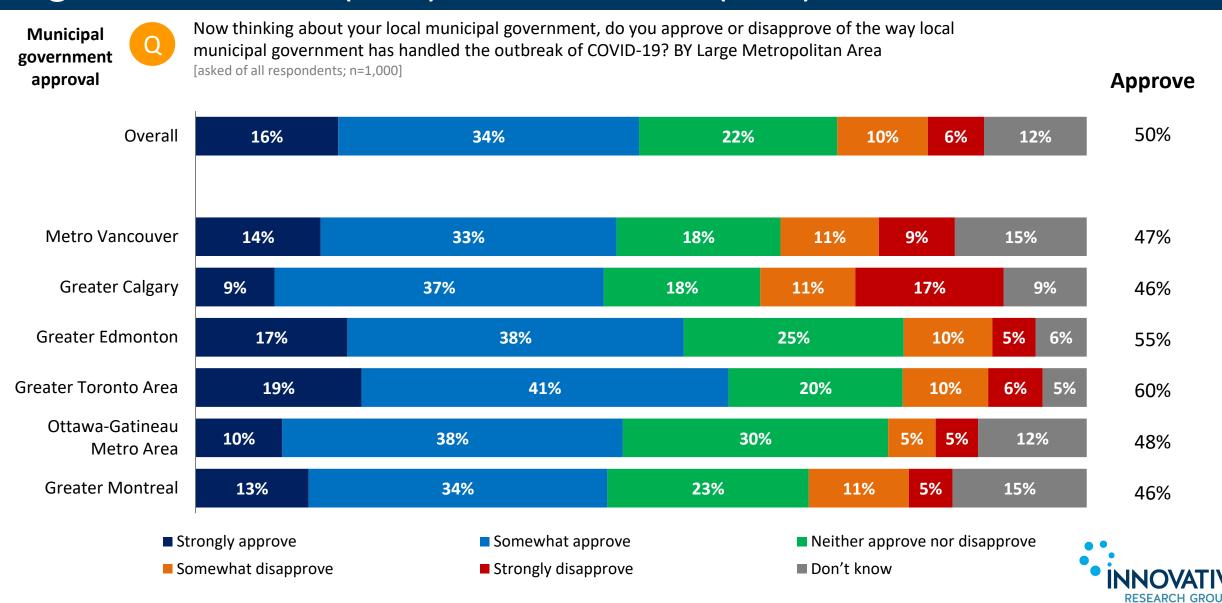

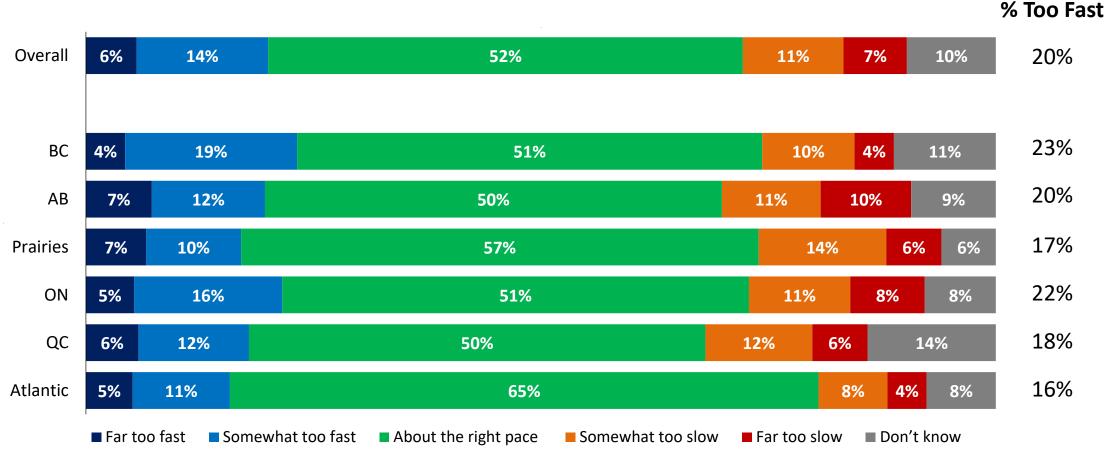
### Municipal Government Approval: Approval for municipal handling is highest in the GTA (60%) and Edmonton (55%)

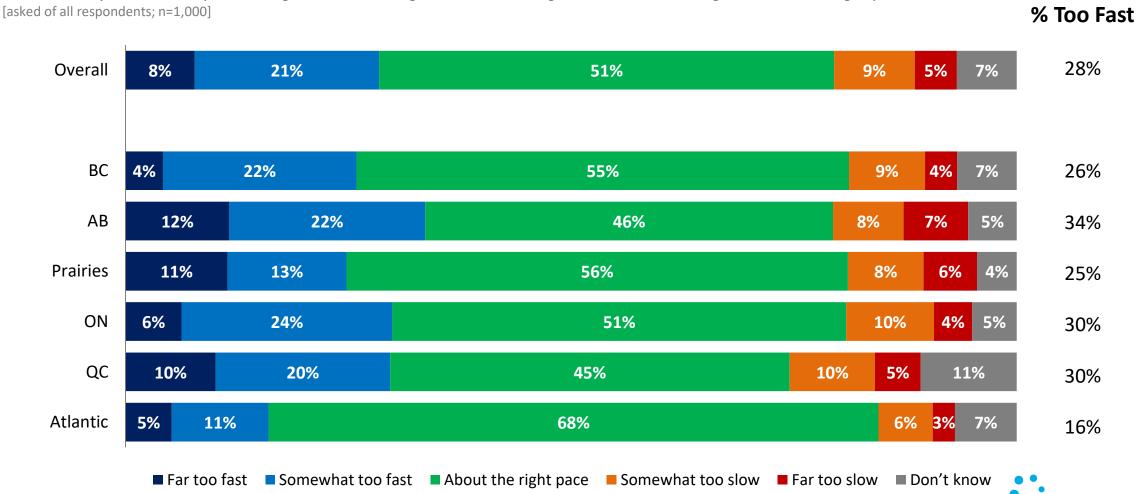




## **Easing Restrictions | Provincial:** Most Canadians feel their provincial gov'ts have found the right balance when it comes to easing restrictions

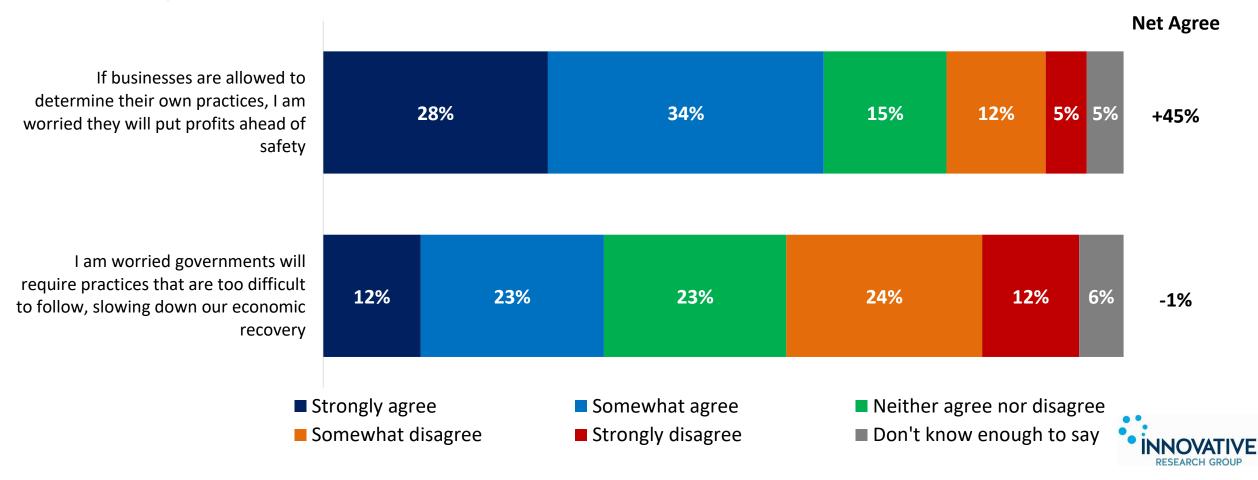


### Health and Safety Practices: Over 3-in-5 (63%) agree they're worried about businesses putting profits ahead of safety

When it comes to deciding on what health and safety practices businesses will need to follow, do you agree or disagree with each of the following statements?



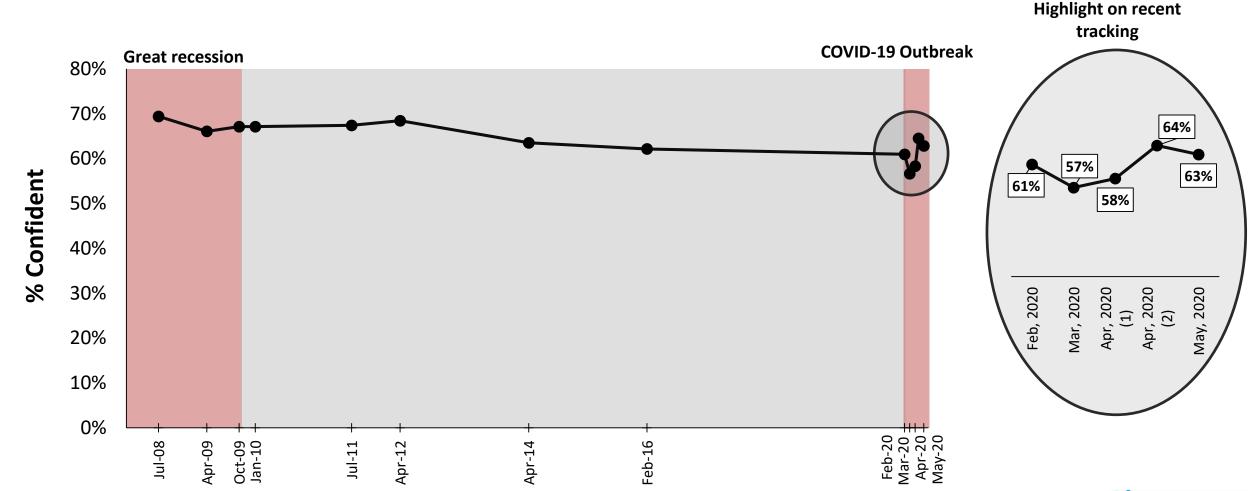
## I. Where do things stand — in terms of personal finance?

Canadians' sense of personal financial confidence has bounced back after an initial dip at the start of the outbreak. As Canadians look ahead, longer term economic worries are starting to grow.

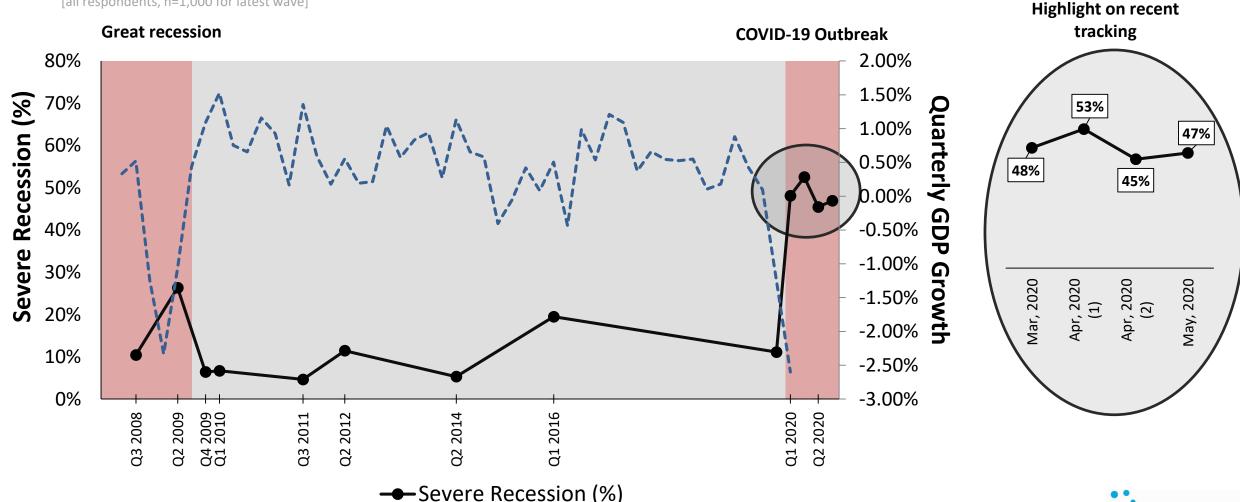




#### Concerns about a severe recession jumped at the outset of the COVID-19 outbreak to a level nearly twice what we saw in 2009

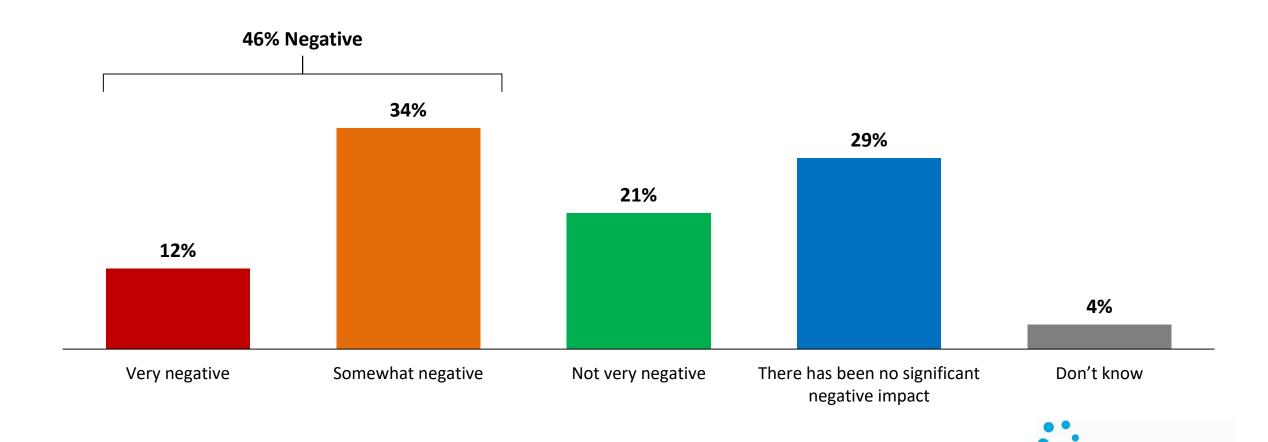




#### **Financial Impact:** Close to half (46%) say they have experienced a negative financial impact



How big of a negative financial impact has the COVID-19 outbreak had on your household finances? [asked of all respondents; n=1,000]



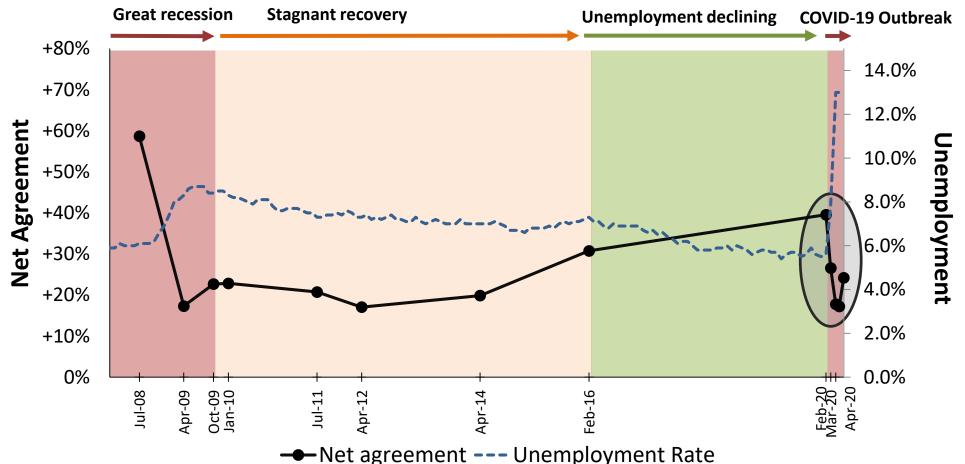
### After a long recovery following the 2008/9 Recession, confidence in finding a new job dropped drastically in the wake of COVID-19

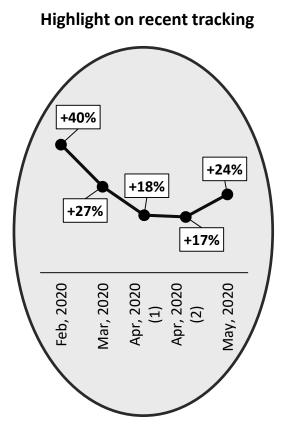


Net agreement: I feel confident that I could get another job somewhere else if I wanted to

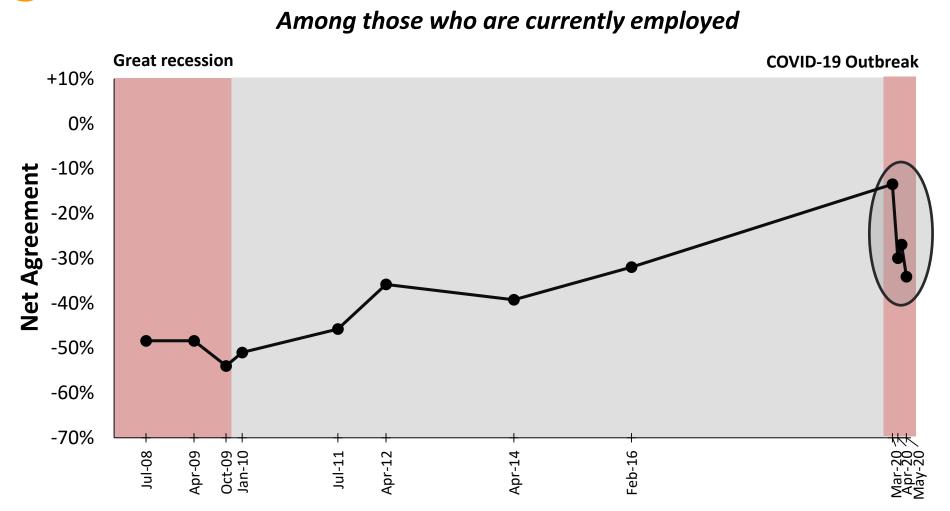


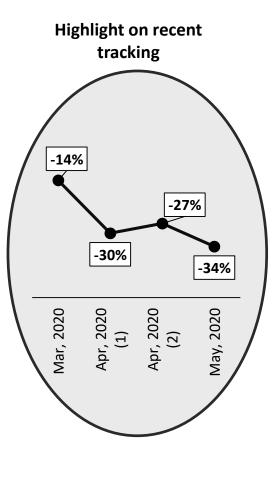
#### At the outset of the COVID-19 outbreak Canadians' concern about the health of their employer jumped, but has since dropped back down

## Those who are temporarily laid off due to COVID-19 are less optimistic about the job market and their employer than the employed



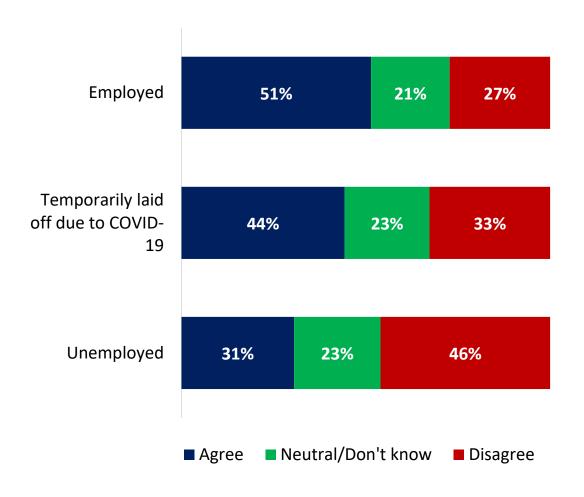

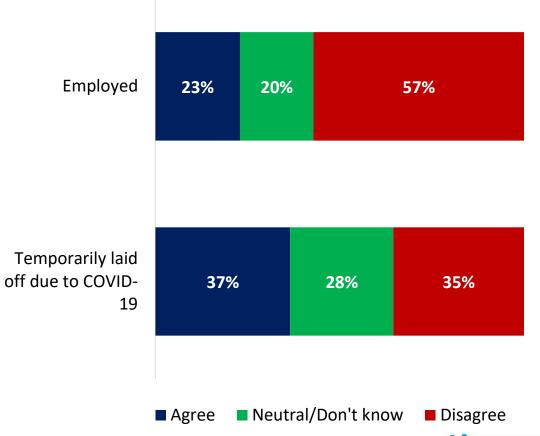

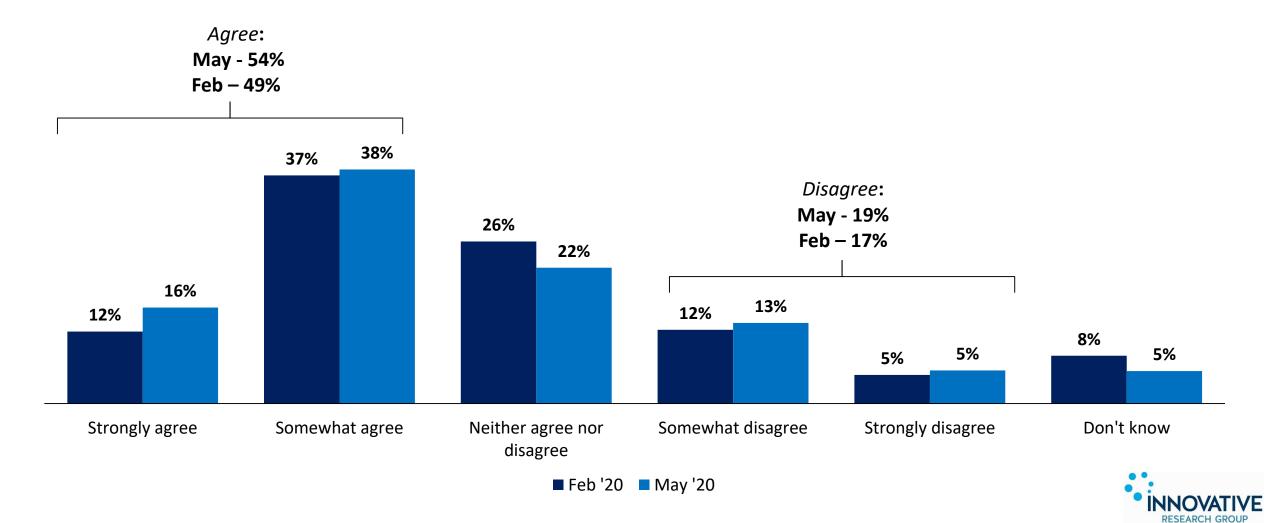

#### **Free Enterprise:** Majority (54%) feel that free enterprise economic system works well, up 5 points since February

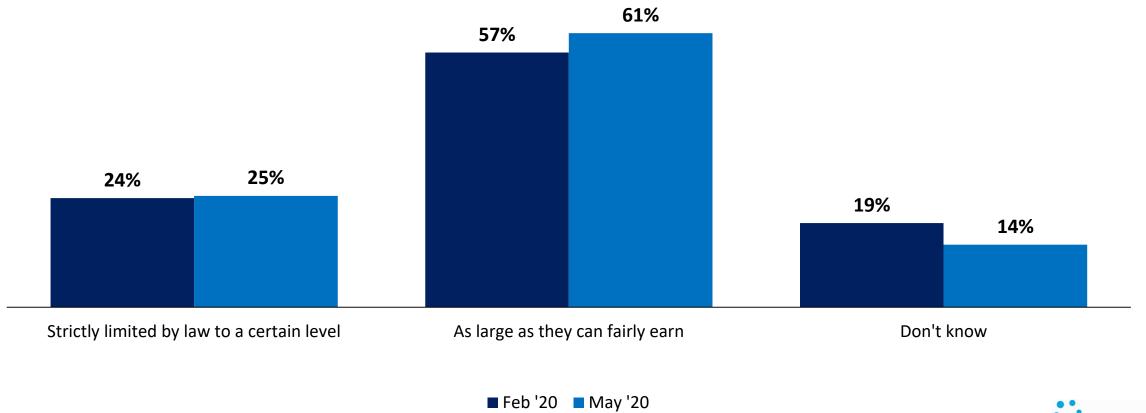


Do you agree or disagree with the following statements about the economy? On the whole, our free enterprise economic system works pretty well. [asked of all respondents; n=1,000]

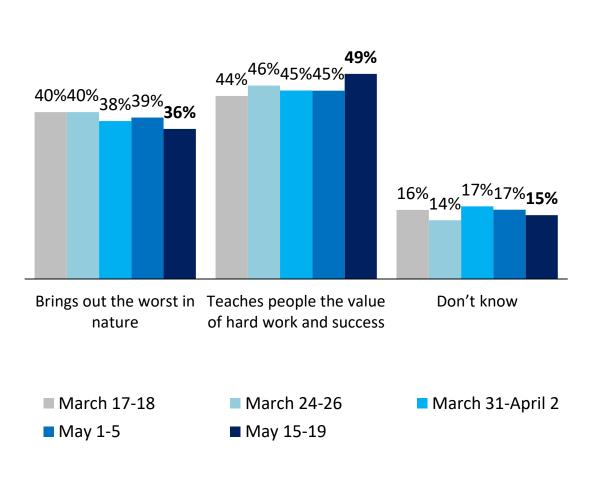




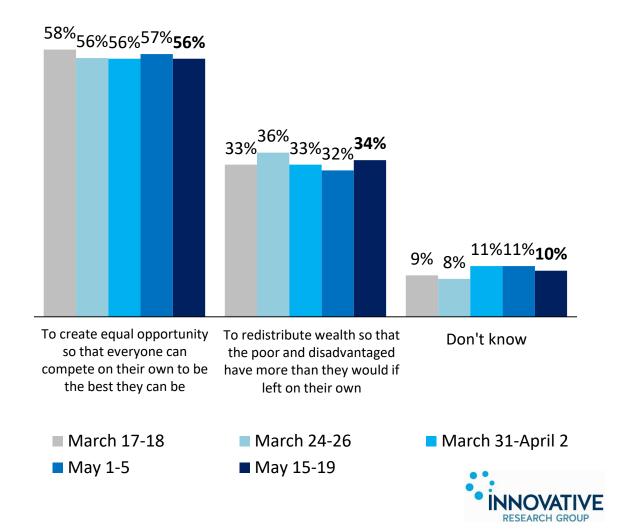
#### Key Values on equal opportunity vs redistribute wealth and whether profit teaches the value of hard work or bring out the worst are stable



Which one of the following statements comes closest to your view? The profit system ...







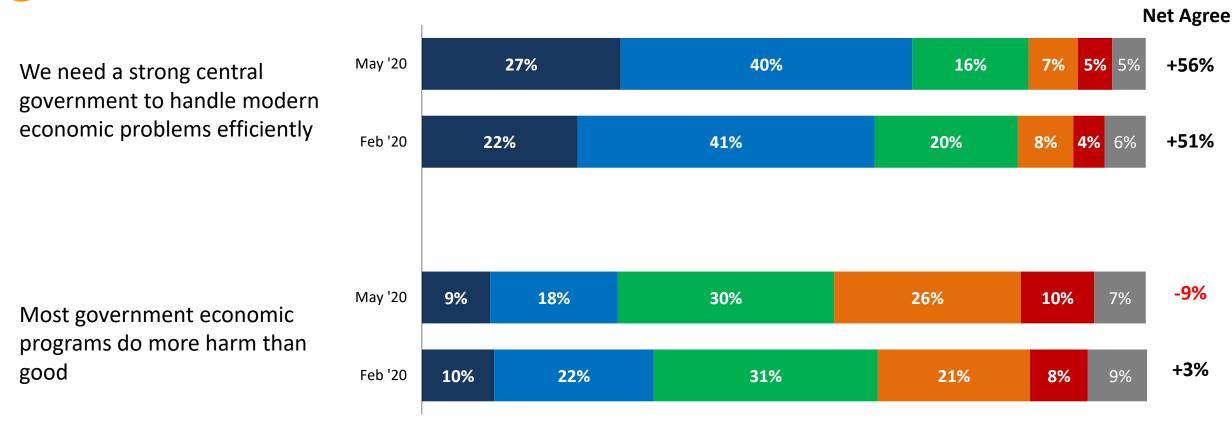

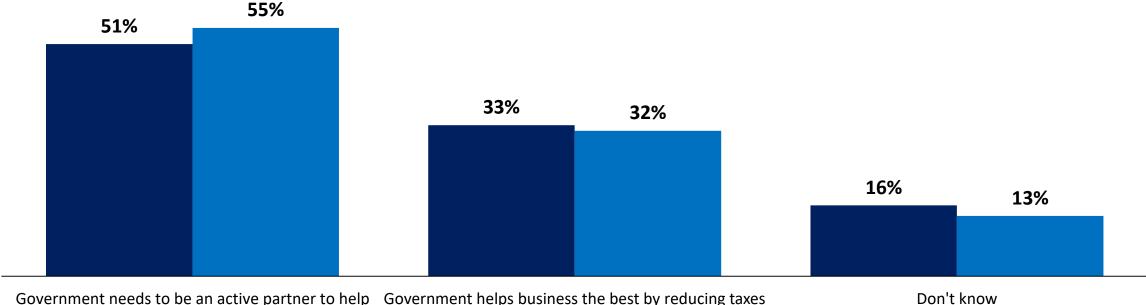

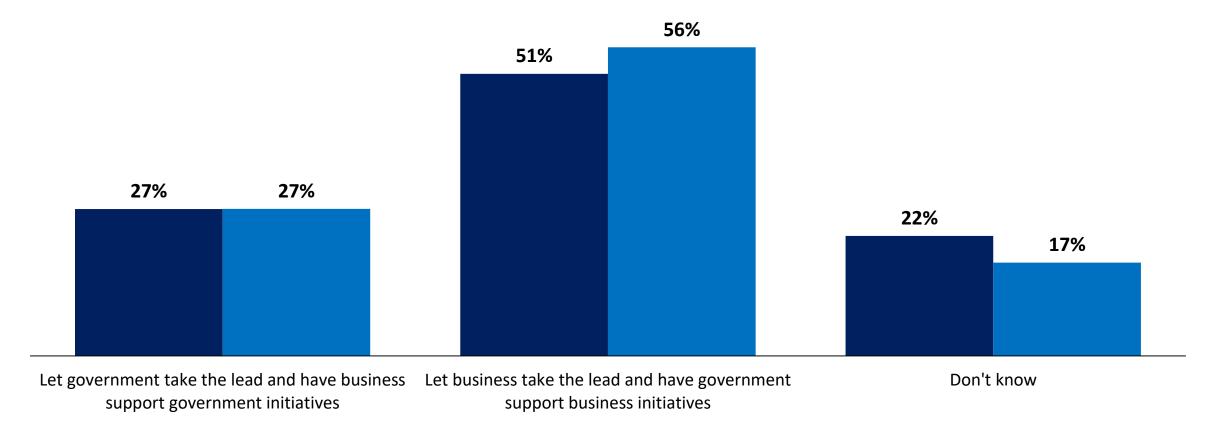

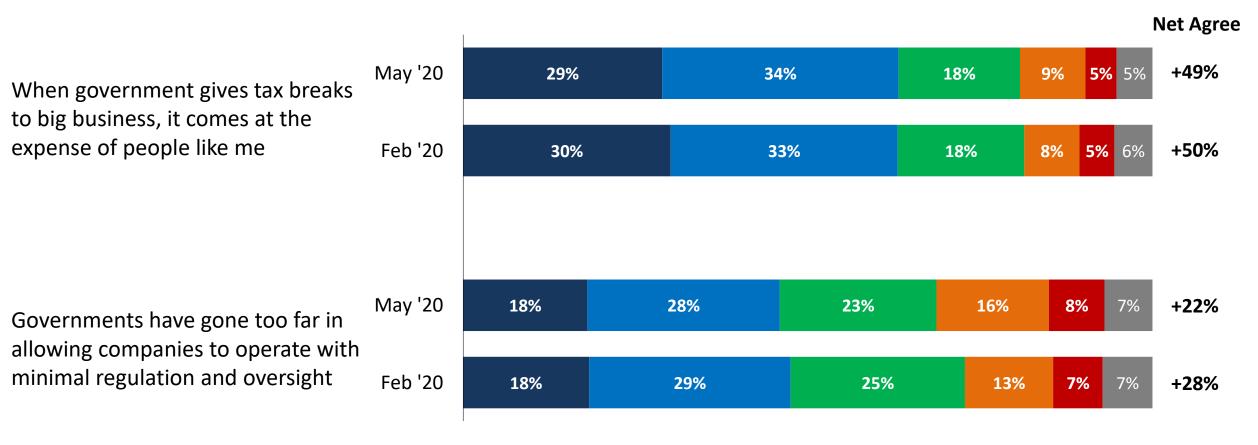


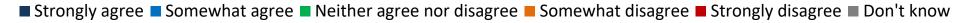


### 63% agree that tax breaks for big business come at their expense. 46% say gov'ts have gone too far in allowing minimal regulation.

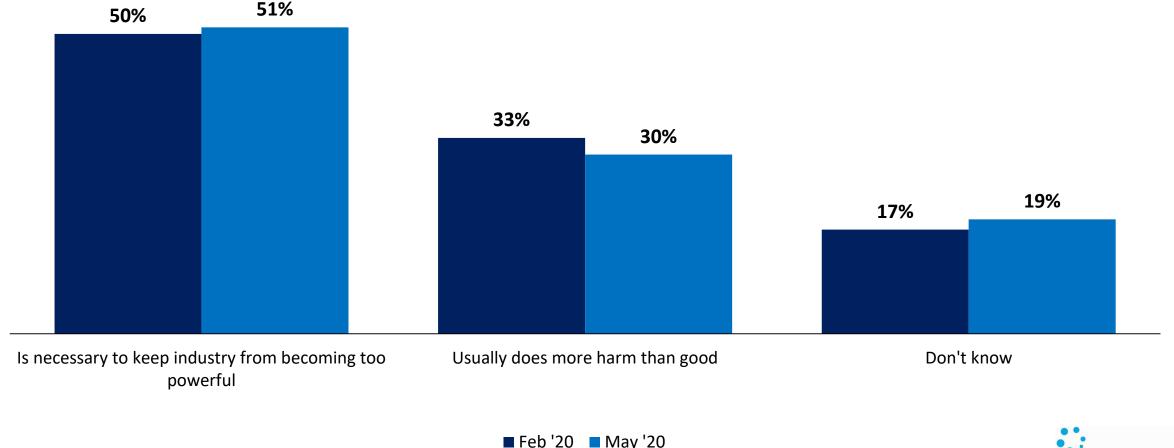




## **Government Regulation:** Half (51%) say government regulation of business is necessary, 3-in-10 (30%) say it does more harm than good

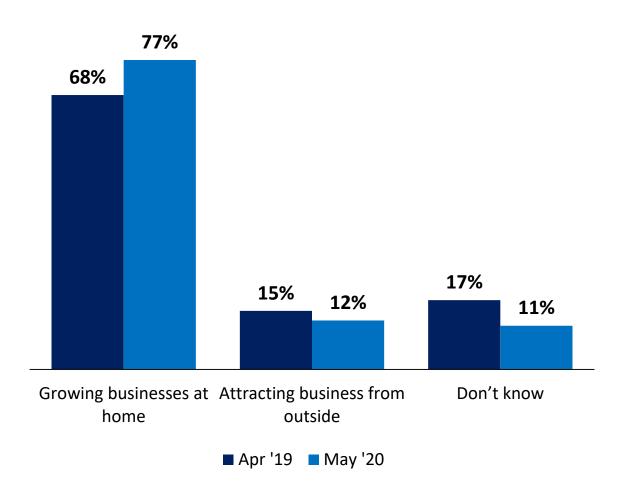
#### **Growing Business:** A large majority continue to say priority should be given to grow local companies

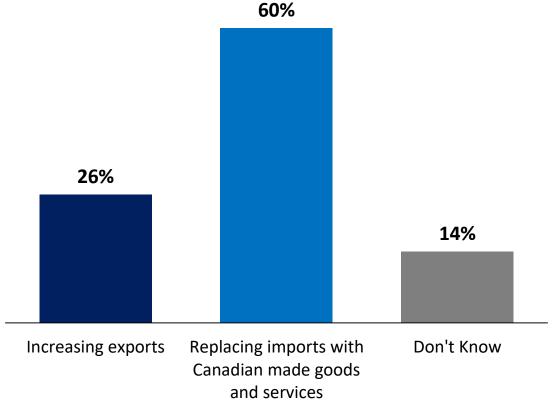


Should the federal government spend more resources growing businesses at home or attracting business from outside of Canada? [asked of all respondents; n=1,000]



In thinking about an economic recovery from the current downturn, do you think Canada would be better off focusing on increasing exports or reducing imports?



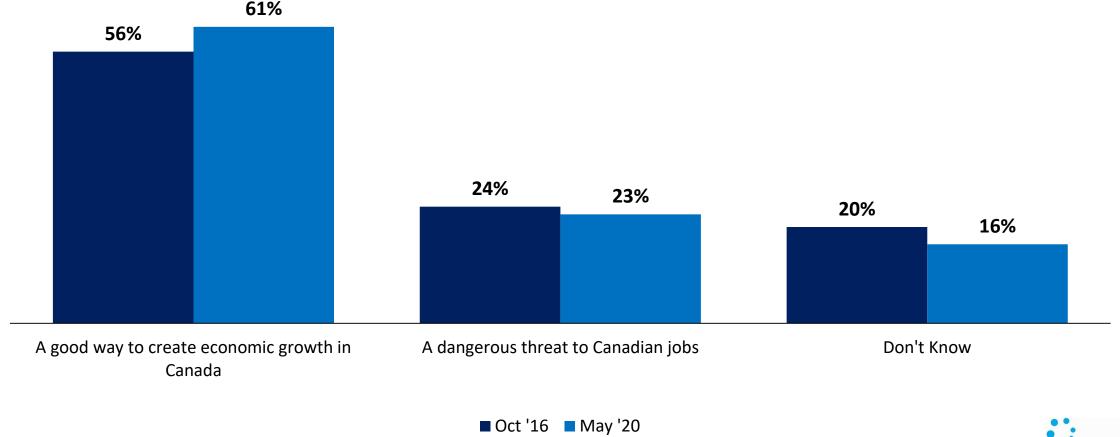




#### **Free Trade:** Despite a strong emphasis on growing local businesses, many continue to say Canada should not abandon trade



Which statement is closer to your point of view? Free trade agreements are...





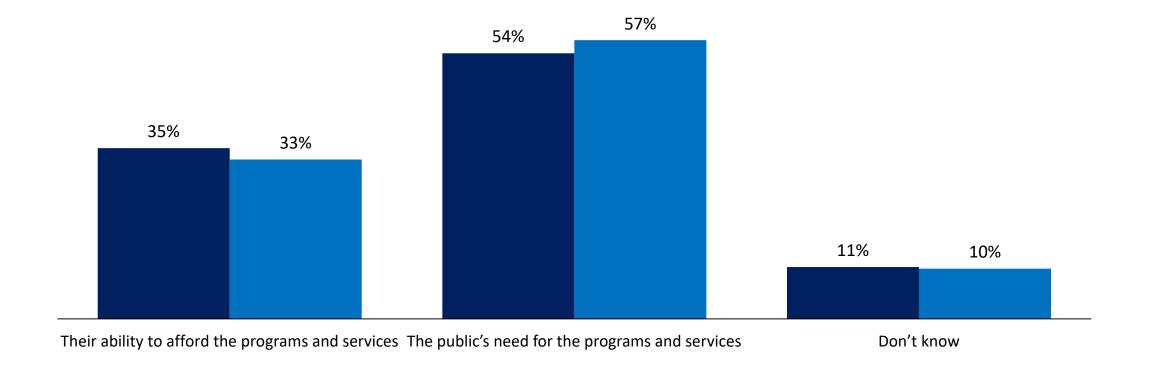

When governments make major decisions concerning spending on programs and services, do you think they should be based on ...?

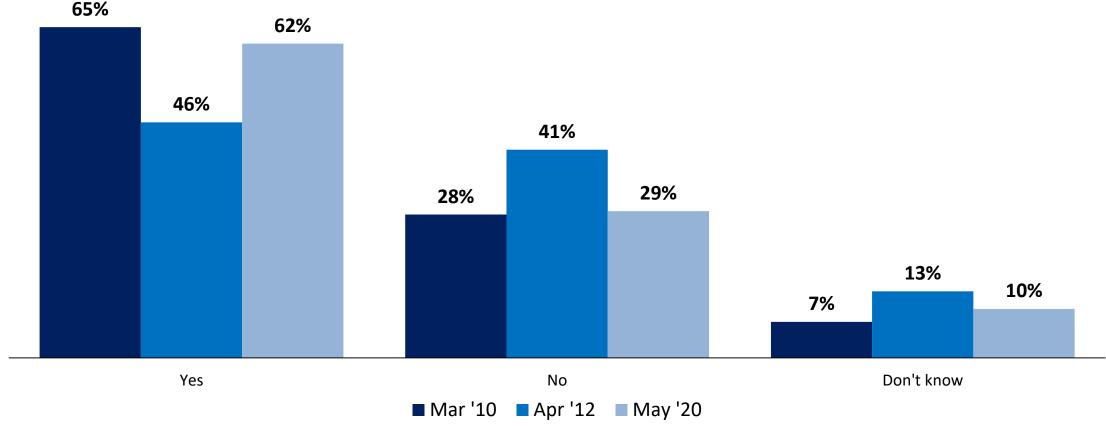




#### **RSH Deficit:** The deficit still a limited concern, now returning to 2010 post-recession levels

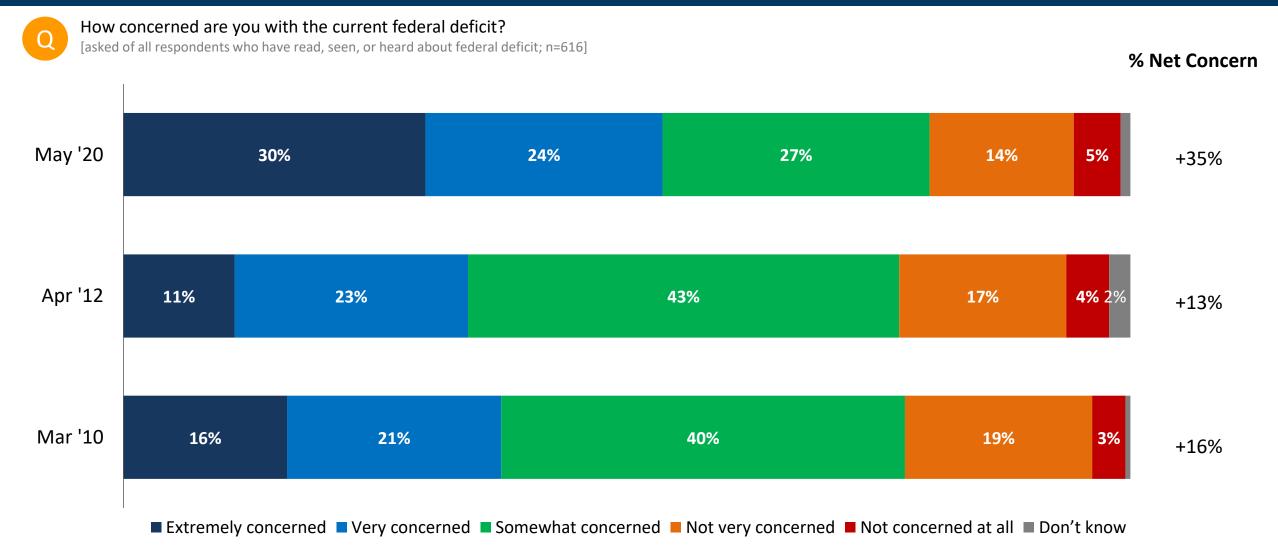


Have you read, seen or heard anything recently about the federal government running a deficit in its budget? [asked of all respondents; n=1,000]





### **Deficit Concern:** Concern about the federal deficit is higher now than it <sup>35</sup> was in 2012 or in 2010 but still with more room to grow

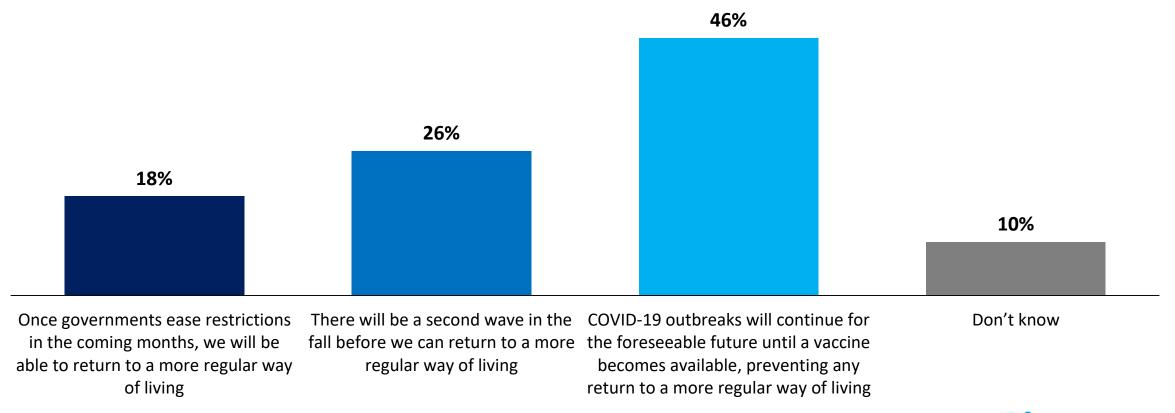




#### III. So where does that leave government?

Canadians expect the battle with COVID-19 to be prolonged. For that, they — especially recipients of government benefit programs — are looking to their government for more support down the line.







## **Receiving CERB:** 1-in-3 (29%) say either themselves or someone in their family has received CERB

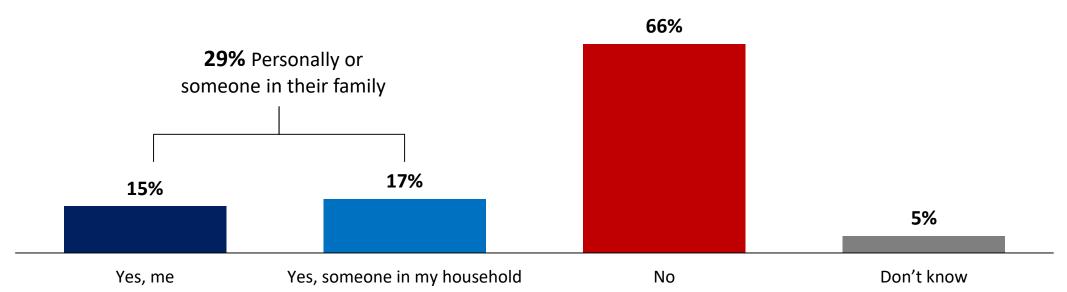


One of the main programs that the Federal government has put into place to assist Canadians impacted by the COVID-19 outbreak is the **Canada Emergency Response Benefit (CERB)**.

The CERB pays \$2,000 a month to Canadians who are unemployed or have incomes under \$1,000 a month due to the COVID-19 outbreak.

Currently, eligible Canadians can receive up to 4 months of support total, for any periods between now and October 3, 2020.

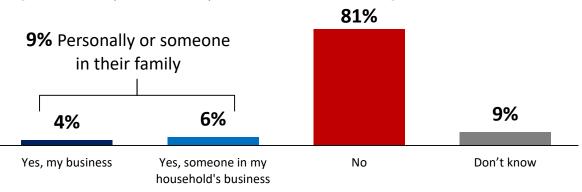




### Receiving CEWS: 15% say either their or someone in their household's business or employer has received CEWS

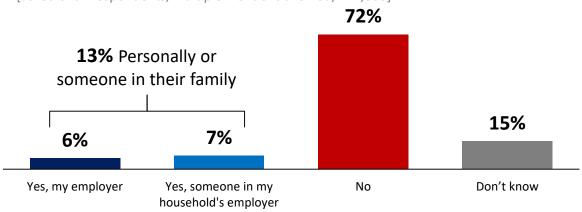
Do you or anyone in your household **own** a business (in whole or in part) that has received the Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy? Please select all that apply.

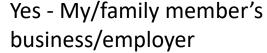


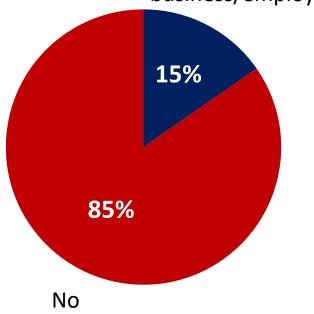
Do you or anyone in your household work for a business that has received the Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy? Please select all that apply.

#### My Business or Employer has **Received CEWS**



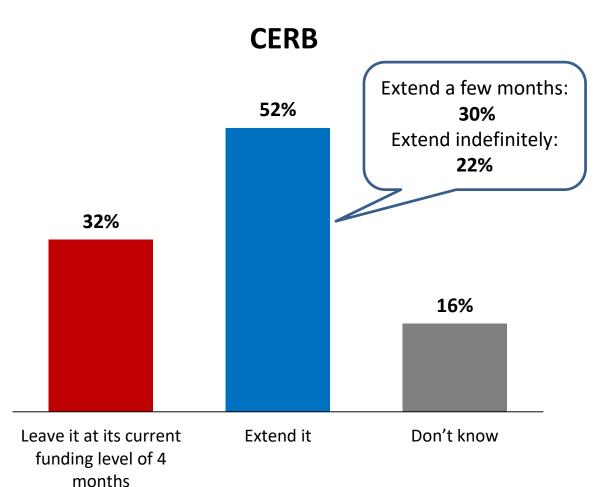




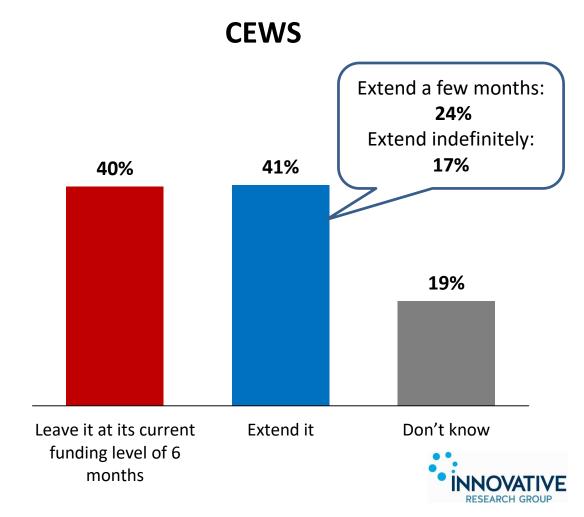
### Extending Programs: Support to extend CERB (52%) is 11-pts higher than support to extend CEWS (41%)

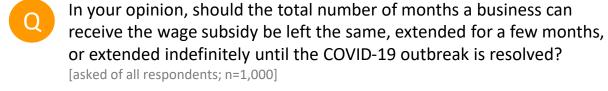


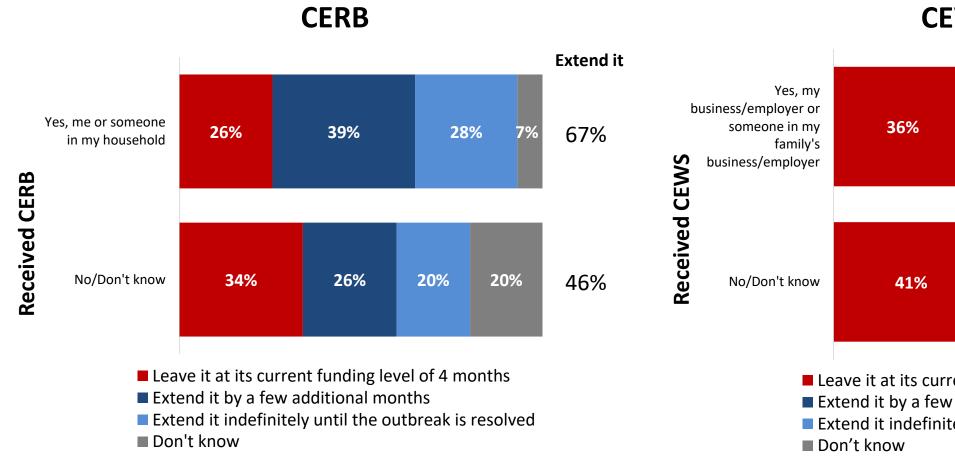

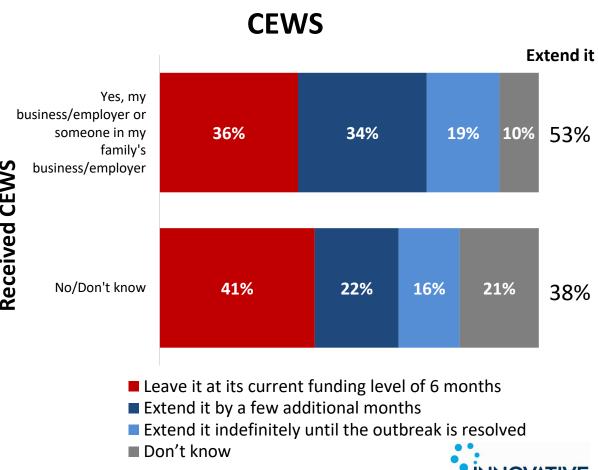


# **Extending Programs:** For both CERB (67%) and CEWS (53%), support to <sup>41</sup> extend it is higher among those who have received the benefit

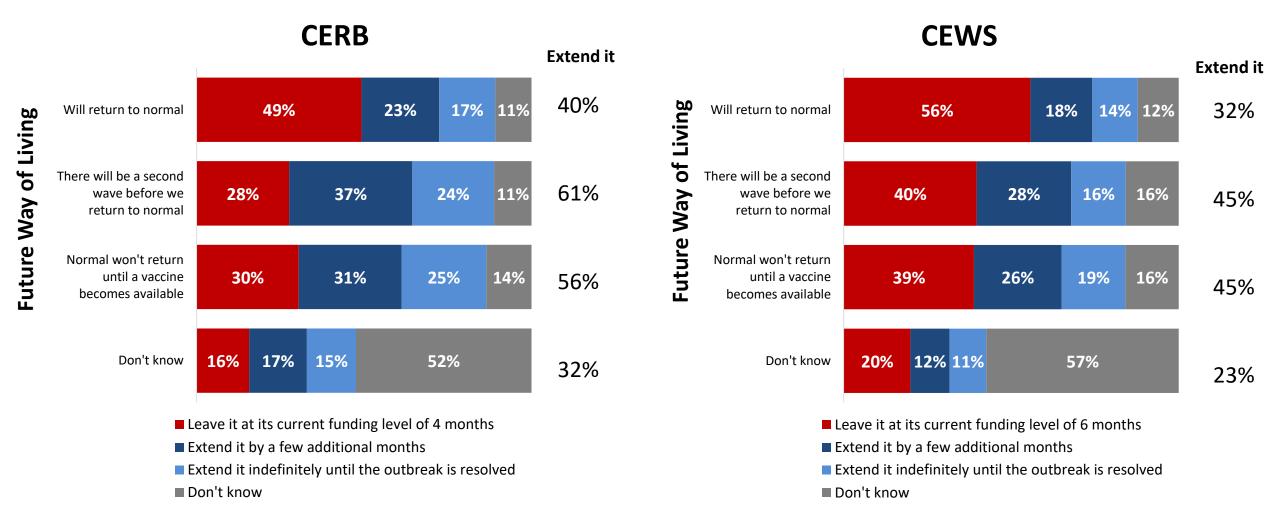


# **Extending Programs:** Those who think they will return to normal are more likely to say we should leave programs at current funding levels

## **Perceived Impacts:** About a third to less than half say their household will continue to face business disruptions

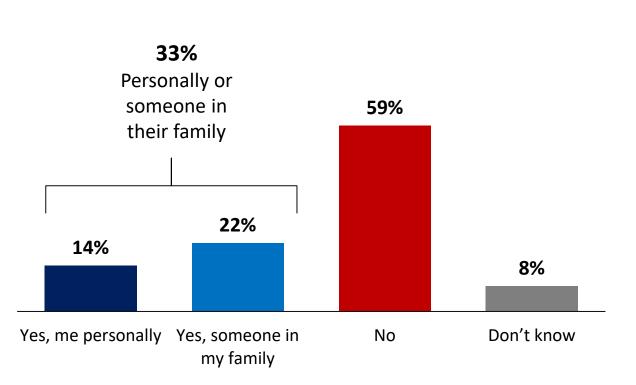


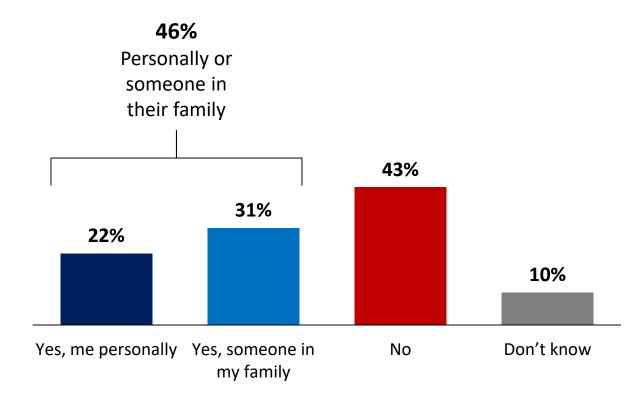

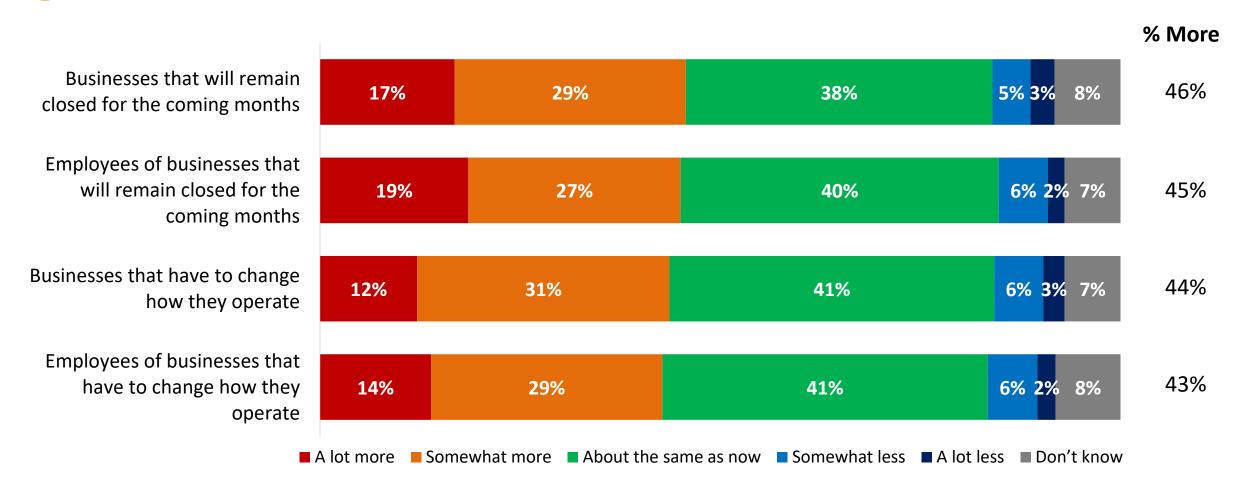




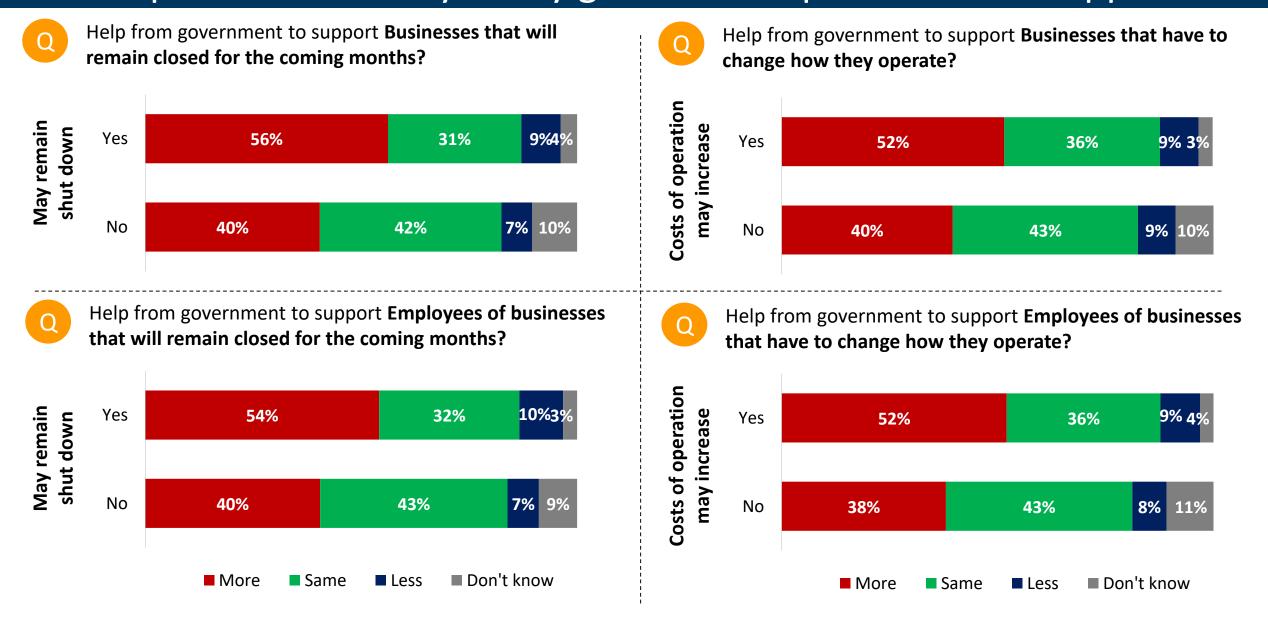
# **Government Support:** Nearly half (46%) say the government needs to offer more support to businesses that will remain closed for months

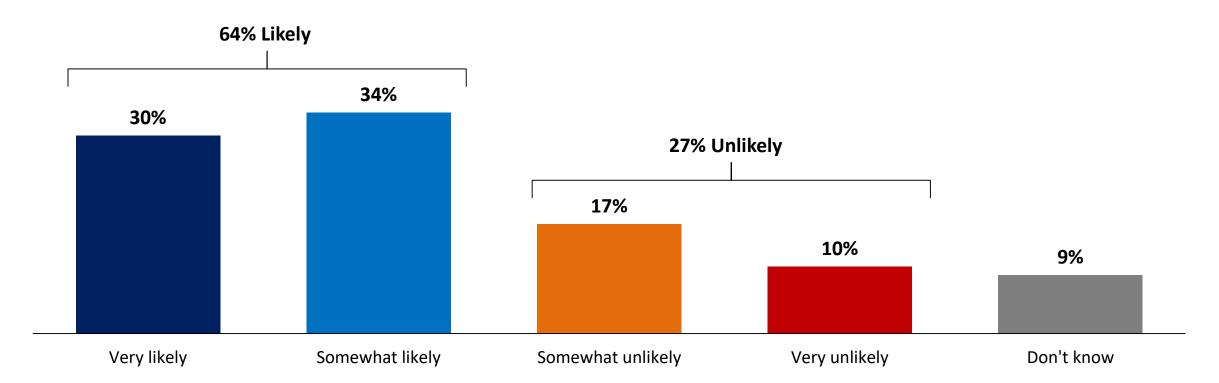
But Canadians are concerned that benefits may create unintended effects. Many think CERB recipients will continue collecting the benefit instead of working. That concern may be justified as recipients are split on whether they would be worse off taking a job than staying on the benefit.

# **CERB Instead of Returning to Work:** A majority (64%) say it's likely some Canadians on CERB will stay on the benefit instead of working



Some people have expressed concerns that Canadians who <u>could</u> work will choose to stay home and collect the CERB even as restrictions are lifted and the economy begins to re-open.

How likely do you think it will be that some Canadians currently on CERB will stay on the benefit rather than returning to work? [asked of all respondents; n=1,000]



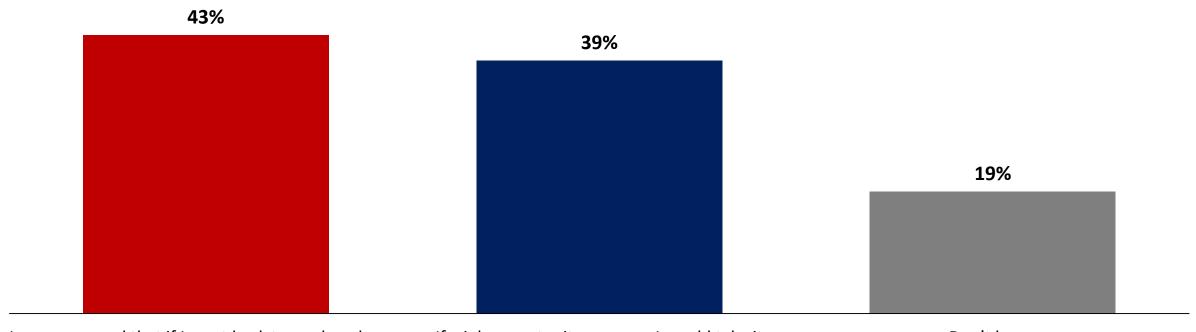


# **Giving Up Emergency Benefits:** 2-in-5 (43%) are concerned about being<sup>48</sup> worse off if they give up emergency benefits

Childcare and K-12 education may also limit the recovery. While a significant number of parents are worried about access, safety is an even bigger concern.

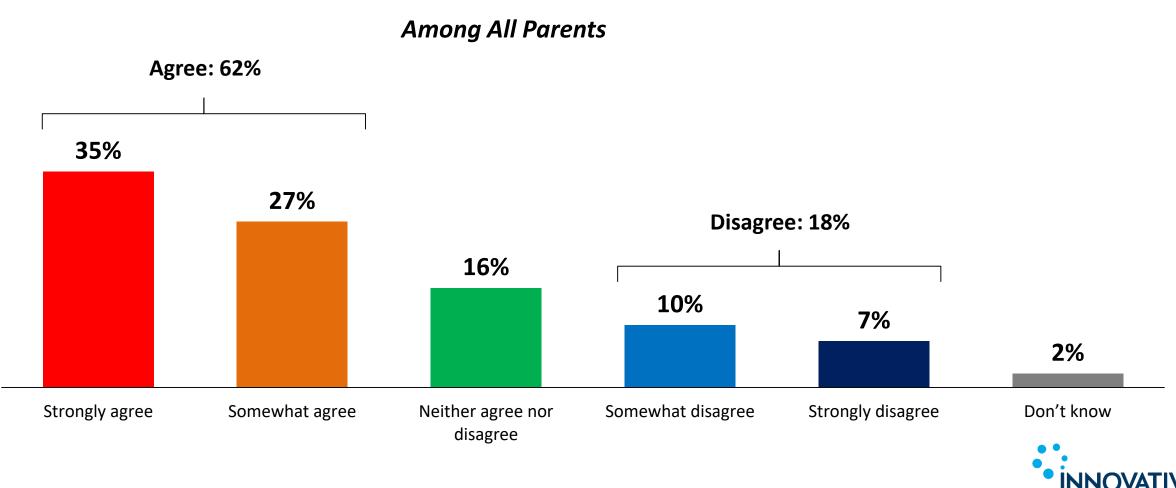
# Impact on Parents and Children: 6-in-10 (62%) parents are concerned about safety surrounding sending children back to daycare or school

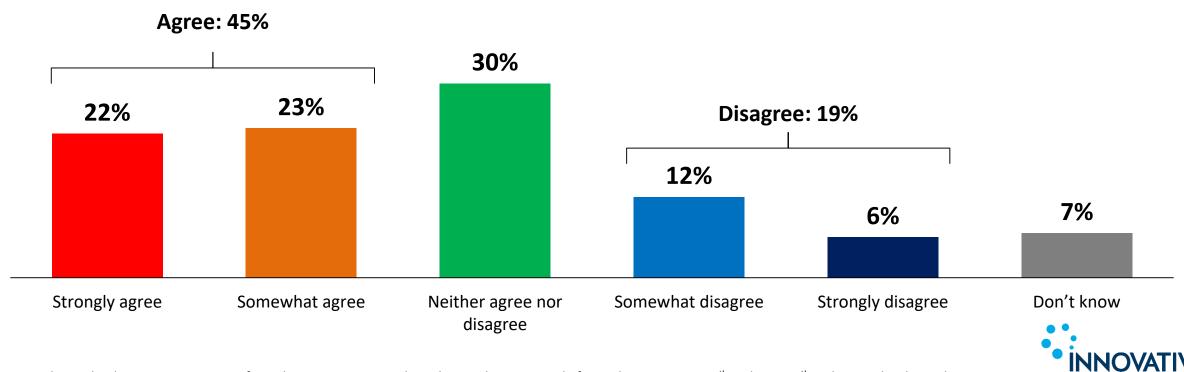


Do you agree or disagree with the following statements?

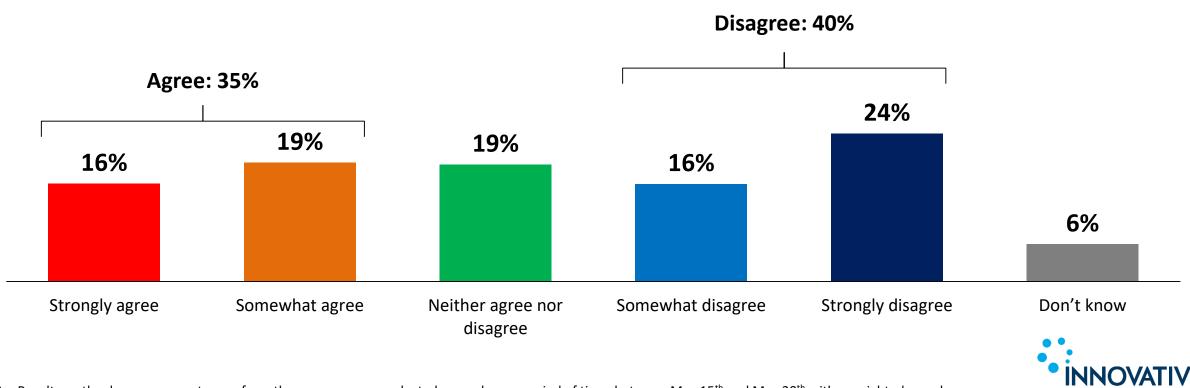


Do you agree or disagree with the following statements?

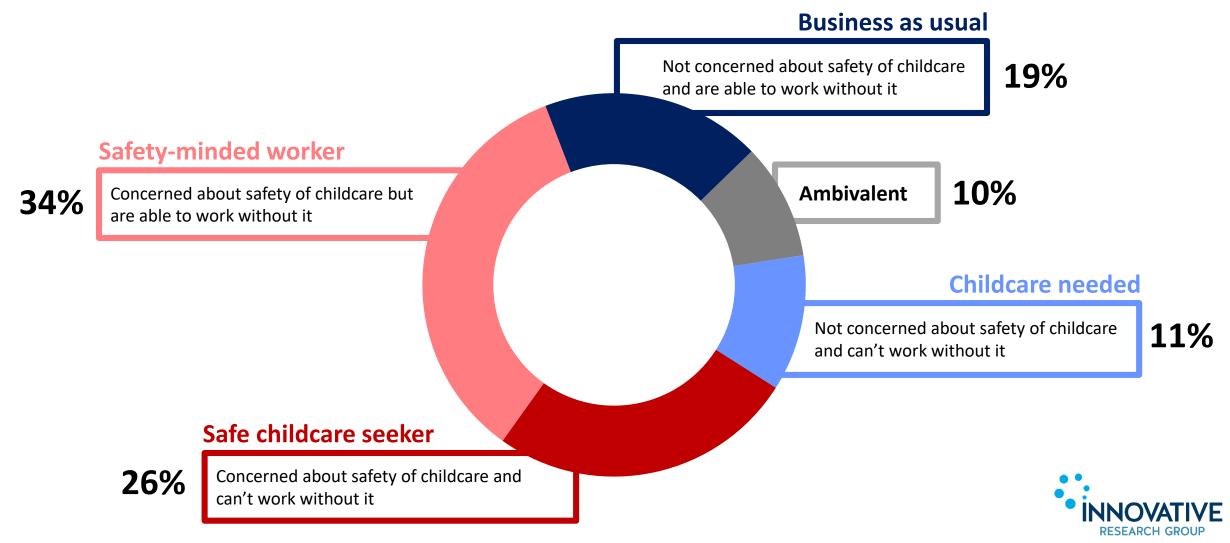
### **Among Working Parents**

## Methodology

### **Survey Methodology**

These are the results of an online survey conducted between May 15<sup>th</sup> and May 19<sup>th</sup>, 2020.

**Method:** This online survey was conducted using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Lucid, a leading provider of online sample. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample.

**Sample Size:** n=1,973 general population, 18 years or older. The results are weighted to n=1,000 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.

Field Dates: May 15<sup>th</sup> to May 19<sup>th</sup>, 2020.

**Weighting:** Results for Canada are weighted by age, gender, and region to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data; in order to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported in the table.

**Margin of Error:** This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability based sample, a margin of error cannot be calculated. Statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates do not apply to most online panels.

**Note**: Graphs may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.
