#### **Throne Speech**


Only half of Canadians say they recall reading, seeing, or hearing about the recent federal throne speech.

While more respondents had an overall positive reaction to the throne speech (48%) than a negative one (36%), much of that positive reaction is soft. On specific questions of personal finances and impact on Liberal support, the plurality of respondents were neutral and more respondents said the throne speech had a negative impact than a positive one.






## **Attention:** Attention is highest in Ontario, where 53% say they have read, seen, or heard about the throne speech


# **Direction:** A plurality say the throne speech is headed in the right direction (48%), while 36% say it is on the wrong track

[Asked of respondents who had read, seen, or heard about the throne speech; n=250]








# **Direction:** Both Liberal and NDP partisans say the throne speech is on the right track, while Conservative partisans say its on the wrong track



## **Impact on Finances:** Nearly half (46%) of respondents who heard about<sup>7</sup> the throne speech say it will have no impact on their finances


How do you think the new throne speech will impact your own personal situation?








# **Impact on Liberals:** Only Liberal Partisans on net say they were left more favourable towards the Liberal government

#### Read, Seen, Heard


Attention has rebounded after declining through most of September – now 57% recall reading, seeing, or hearing something about the Prime Minister and Liberal government, up from only 43% last week.


The impact of that news remains negative on net, with 35% saying what they recalled left them feeling less favourable towards the government while only 30% say it left them more favourable.

The Liberal's throne speech and the accompanying plan to restart the economy is the top item mentioned, with 49% saying they recalled hearing about it and a net impact that is slightly negative (-10%). The governments actions on COVID-19 are the other top item at 37%, with an overall positive impact of +26%.

No —Yes





#### Methodology

#### **Survey Methodology**

#### These are the results of an online survey conducted between September 24<sup>th</sup> and September 29<sup>th</sup>, 2020.

**Method:** This online survey was conducted using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Lucid, a leading provider of online sample. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample.

**Sample Size:** n=1,068 Canadian citizens, 18 years or older. The results are nationally weighted to n=500 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.

Field Dates: September 24<sup>th</sup> and September 29<sup>th</sup>, 2020.

**Weighting:** Results for Canada are weighted by age, gender, and region to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data; in order to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported in the table.

**Margin of Error:** This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability based sample, a margin of error cannot be calculated. Statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates do not apply to most online panels.

**Note**: Graphs may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.
