

#### Ontario Politics in the time of COVID-19

The COVID-19 outbreak has set off a series of changes in the Canadian political landscape. In Ontario, Ford's leadership favourables have dropped again as the PCs remain in a tight race with the Ontario Liberals.

Today, INNOVATIVE is releasing results from our April 2021 Canada This Month survey. This online survey was in field from April 1<sup>st</sup> to 13<sup>th</sup> with a weighted sample size of 800 Ontario residents. Detailed methodology is provided in the appendix.

This report covers key results on how Ontarians rate their government's handling of the COVID-19 outbreak, Ontario vote choice, and evaluation of party leaders.


#### **Government Approval**

Ontario government satisfaction is down month to month to only 42% while 55% are dissatisfied. On their handling of the COVID-19 pandemic, only 33% approve while 54% now disapprove.

Generally speaking, how satisfied are you with the performance of the PROVINCIAL government in Ontario? Would you say you are...? [asked of all respondents; n=800]




### **Government Approval Tracking:** The share of Ontarians saying they are satisfied with the provincial gov't is down 9 points month-to-month






### **COVID-19 Handling:** When is comes to COVID handling specifically, over half (54%) disapprove of the ON provincial gov't




Do you approve or disapprove of the way the Ontario Government has handled the outbreak of COVID-19? [asked of all respondents; n=800]

#### Read, Seen, Heard

Attention to the Ontario government is at an all time high with 79% saying they have heard something recently. The net impact of what Ontarians have heard is strongly negative.


Have you read, seen or heard anything about Doug Ford in the last few days?







### **Read, Seen, Heard Tracking:** Those saying they have RSH about Ford in the last few days is up from 58% in March to 79% now



Have you read, seen or heard anything about Doug Ford in the last few days? [asked of all respondents; n=800]








### Ontario Read, Seen, Heard, Impact Tracking: The share saying what they RSH left them with a more favourable impression is down 7 points




We use these segments throughout the remainder of the report to analyze vote and leadership results.

Now we would like to ask a few questions about basic values and society...When governments make major decisions concerning spending on programs and services, do you think they should be basing their decisions mainly on...?










Which of the following statements comes closest to your view? [asked of all respondents; n=800]








Is the main role of government to ...?



When it comes to government decision making, which of the following statements is closest to your view?






### Value Clusters: A plurality of Ontarians are either business liberals (26%) or core left (22%)

Clusters are based on 4 basic values: equal opportunity versus redistribution; trust in the profit system; whether spending should be based on ability to afford or public need; and whether government should listen to experts or common sense.



Do you agree or disagree with the following statements?




#### Leadership

Ford continues to hold a lead on best premier, but this lead has shrunk significantly since March, while his net favourability has dropped from -2% to -15%.




### **Doug Ford Favourability:** Negative impressions of Doug Ford are up since March from 41% to 49%




### **Steven Del Duca Favourability:** Del Duca's favourability of down 5 points month-to-month from 20% to 15%














#### **NET Favourability by Value Clusters:**

Each chart shows the net favourability (% favourable minus % unfavourable) for each leader within INNOVATIVE's 6 value cluster segments.


### Leader favourability by Economic Gap: Ford receives positive net scores among achievers and strugglers but not ambivalent and alienated

## The PCs and Liberals are in a tight race in vote share

Innovative reports on vote intention in two ways.


When we ask people who they would vote for if an election were held today, and who they lean towards if they are unsure, we call those results **Combined vote**. This accounts for the views of everyone in the population including decided voters, undecided voters, and non-voters.

When we look at the results among *only* decided voters, we call that **Decided vote**. These results most tell us what the election results would be like if the survey results matched the election exactly.

### **Provincial Combined Vote:** The Liberals (29%) and PCs (28%) are neckin-neck in vote share with the NDP (21%) not too far behind




If a provincial election were held today, which party would you vote for? In that case, which party do you lean toward slightly? [Vote + Lean] [asked of all respondents; n=800]



#### Provincial Vote Tracking: The Liberals and PCs continue to be in a tight 31 vote race with just under one third of the vote for each party




If a provincial election were held today, which party would you vote for? In that case, which party do you lean toward slightly? [Vote + Lean] [asked of all respondents; n=800]



### **Provincial Decided Vote:** 1-in-3 decided voters say they would vote for the Liberals while another third say the PCs




If a provincial election were held today, which party would you vote for? In that case, which party do you lean toward slightly? [DECIDED] [decided voters only; n=704]




### **Provincial 2nd Choice:** The NDP (20%) and Liberals (19%) are the top 2<sup>nd</sup> choice parties among decided voters



### **Provincial Party ID:** While the Liberals and PCs are tied in vote share, the Liberals lead when it comes to party ID




Thinking about politics in Ontario, generally speaking, do you usually think of yourself as a... [asked of all respondents; n=800]

### Methodology

#### **Survey Methodology**

These are the results of an online survey conducted between April 1<sup>st</sup> and April 13<sup>th</sup>, 2021.

**Method:** This online survey was conducted using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Dynata, a leading provider of online sample. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Ontario population according to Census data to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample.

**Sample Size:** n=989 Ontario residents, 18 years or older. The results are weighted to n=800 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.

**Field Dates:** April 1<sup>st</sup> to April 13<sup>th</sup>, 2021.

**Weighting:** Results for Ontario are weighted by age, gender, and region to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data; in order to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported in the table.

**Margin of Error:** This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability based sample, a margin of error cannot be calculated. Statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates do not apply to most online panels.

**Note**: Graphs may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.
