

Ontario Politics in the time of COVID-19

The COVID-19 outbreak has set off a series of changes in the Canadian political landscape. In Ontario, the impression voters have of Doug Ford has remained negative after a large drop in early April.

Today, INNOVATIVE is releasing results from the fifth week of our April 2021 *Canada This Month* survey. This online survey was in field from April 29th to May 4th with a weighted sample size of 400 Ontario residents. Detailed methodology is provided in the appendix.

This report covers key results on how Ontarians rate their government's handling of the COVID-19 outbreak, Ontario vote choice, and evaluation of party leaders.

Read, Seen, Heard

Attention to the Ontario government is steady from last week and remains high with 76% saying they have heard something recently. The net impact of what Ontarians have heard remains strongly negative.

Ontario Read, Seen, Heard: 3-in-4 (76%) have read, seen, or heard something about Doug Ford, 48% were left less favourable




Have you read, seen or heard anything about Doug Ford in the last few days?



Have you read, seen or heard anything about Doug Ford in the last few days? [asked of all respondents; n=400]






Ontario Read, Seen, Heard, Impact Tracking: Favourability of what was read seen or heard is up slightly since March


Government Approval

Ontario government's satisfaction is down at 39%, with 59% saying they are dissatisfied with the government.

Ontario Government Approval: 3-in-5 (59%) are dissatisfied with the Ontario government, only 39% are satisfied




Generally speaking, how satisfied are you with the performance of the PROVINCIAL government in Ontario? Would you say you are...? [asked of all respondents; n=400]


Generally speaking, how satisfied are you with the performance of the PROVINCIAL government in Ontario? Would you say you are...? [asked of all respondents; n=400]

Do you approve or disapprove of the way the Ontario Government has handled the outbreak of COVID-19? [asked of all respondents; n=400]



Restrictions


Three-in-ten Ontarians still believe that the restrictions in place in the province are too tight (30%), but a plurality say restrictions are too loose (38%).

Provincial Restrictions: With the COVID-19 restrictions in place, the share of Ontarians claiming restrictions are too tight remains steady

Recent Lockdown


Attention to recent press conferences and restrictions put in place by Doug Ford remains high with 74% following the news at least somewhat closely. A majority in Ontario feel that the way Ford has dealt with the situation is a sign of a deeper problem.




Awareness: Partisans from the 3 main political parties are more likely to follow Ford's press conferences; highest for Liberal partisans





Now, thinking about how Doug Ford has responded to criticism about recent measures put in place in Ontario, do you think Doug Ford has responded




A Deeper Problem?: The majority (59%) believe the controversy is a sign of a deeper issue with how the government is handling the pandemic




A Deeper Problem?: A significant minority of PC identifiers see a deeper issue with how the government is handling the pandemic














Attitudes: Respondent's belief about the Ontario gov't being warned in ²² Feb. to take immediate action so cases don't skyrocket is up by 5 points





Government Responsible: A plurality of PC supporters feel the government is directly responsibility for the spike in COVID cases






Political Points: NDP more likely to agree that the ON gov't health measures focuses more on scoring political points than fighting COVID




Do you agree or disagree with the following statements? The Ontario government health measures seem more focused on scoring political points than fighting COVID-19.




Responsibility: PC partisans are more likely to agree that Ford has accepted responsibility for his mistakes; NDP least likely to agree




Balance Health and the Economy: A significant minority (28%) of PCs disagree Ford did his best to balance health & economic concerns

COVID-19 is Exaggerated: Limited support from all parties that ON gov'th has been exaggerating the risk of COVID-19, Unaligned and PCs highest






Core Political Values: A majority (59%) say the main role of government is to create equal opportunity



Value Clusters: 1-in-4 (26%) are Business Liberals, while 14% are Left Liberals, Thrifty Moderates, and Populist Conservatives



Clusters are based on 4 basic values: equal opportunity versus redistribution; trust in the profit system; whether spending should be based on ability to afford or public need; and whether government should listen to experts or common sense.



Do you agree or disagree with the following statements? - [asked of all respondents; n=400]












Provincial Party ID: The Ontario Liberals hold a strong lead on Party ID (35%) followed by the PCs at 26%




Thinking about politics in Ontario, generally speaking, do you usually think of yourself as a... [asked of all respondents; n=400]

Leadership

Doug Ford remains the leader with the lowest net favourability, down to -20% on net. He no longer remains the top choice for Premier, with the plurality now saying they do not know or are undecided on who would be best.


Leader Favourables: Doug Ford has the lowest net favourability at - 20% with 33% saying they have a very unfavourable impression of him
















Best Premier Tracking: The plurality now don't know or are undecided on which leader would make the best Premier

Innovative reports on vote intention in two ways.


When we ask people who they would vote for if an election were held today, and who they lean towards if they are unsure, we call those results **Combined vote**. This accounts for the views of everyone in the population including decided voters, undecided voters, and non-voters.

When we look at the results among *only* decided voters, we call that **Decided vote**. These results most tell us what the election results would be like if the survey results matched the election exactly.

Provincial Combined Vote: The Ontario Liberals have a 3-point lead over the Progressive Conservatives among all voters



If a provincial election were held today, which party would you vote for? In that case, which party do you lean toward slightly? [Vote + Lean] [asked of all respondents; n=400]






Provincial Vote Tracking: The Ontario Liberals (32%) maintain their narrow lead over the Progressive Conservatives (29%)

Combined Vote by Party ID: NDP and Green voters are the most loyal, while only 70% of Liberal Partisans would vote for their party






Provincial Combined Vote by Value Cluster: PCs now have the support 51 of just under half of the Deferential Conservatives









Provincial Combined Vote by Value Cluster: Liberals continue to lead by a large margin among Business and Left Liberals







Provincial Combined Vote by Value Cluster: Liberals lead among Thrifty Moderates as PCs slide







Provincial Combined Vote by Economic Gap: PCs lead the Liberals among Achievers but are on par with Liberals among Strugglers





Provincial Combined Vote by Economic Gap: NDP leads the others among the Alienated but Liberals have the lead among the Ambivalent






Provincial Decided Vote: The Ontario Liberals (36%) maintain their narrow lead over the Progressive Conservatives (32%)



If a provincial election were held today, which party would you vote for? In that case, which party do you lean toward slightly? [DECIDED] [decided voters only; n=354]






Provincial 2nd Choice: The NDP are the top 2nd choice with 21% of voters saying they are their second choice

Methodology

Survey Methodology

These are the results of an online survey conducted between April 29th and May 4th, 2021.

Method: This online survey was conducted using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Dynata, a leading provider of online sample. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Ontario population according to Census data to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample.

Sample Size: n=481 Ontario residents, 18 years or older. The results are weighted to n=400 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.

Field Dates: April 29th to May 4th, 2021.

Weighting: Results for Ontario are weighted by age, gender, and region to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data; in order to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported in the table.

Margin of Error: This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability based sample, a margin of error cannot be calculated. Statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates do not apply to most online panels.

Note: Graphs may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.
