

#### Federal Politics in the time of COVID-19

The COVID-19 outbreak has set off a series of changes in the Canadian political landscape. General satisfaction with the government is up since April to 53%. The Liberals continue to lead in vote over the Conservatives, with Justin Trudeau the top choice for Prime Minister.

Today, INNOVATIVE is releasing results from our May 2021 Canada This Month survey. This online survey was in field from May 7<sup>th</sup> to May 31<sup>st</sup> with a weighted sample size of 2,000. Detailed methodology is provided in the appendix.

This report covers key results on government satisfaction, federal leadership and vote choice.


#### **Government Approval**

General government approval remains quite high at 53%, up from 51% in April.

### **Federal Satisfaction:** Half (53%) are satisfied with the performance of the federal government while the other half (44%) are dissatisfied

#### Read, Seen, Heard


Half of Canadians have read, seen, or heard something about Trudeau in the last few days. Among those who have, impact is slightly more negative than it was in late April.

Have you read, seen or heard anything about Canada's Prime Minister and the Federal government in the last few days?











### **Core Political Values:** Over half (57%) say the main role of government is to create an equal opportunity so that everyone can compete










Which of the following statements comes closest to your view?





### Value Clusters: 1-in-4 (24%) Canadians are Business Liberals followed by Core Left (20%) and Thrifty Moderates (16%)

Clusters are based on 4 basic values: equal opportunity versus redistribution; trust in the profit system; whether spending should be based on ability to afford or public need; and whether government should listen to experts or common sense.








### **Economic Gap Segmentation:** Most Canadians are either Canadian Dream Achievers (30%) or Strugglers (27%)






### **Time for Change Tracking:** The desire for change in Canada is up from March 2021



Do you agree or disagree with the following statements? - It is time for a change in government here in Canada [asked of all respondents; n=2,000]






### **Best of a Bad Lot Tracking:** More than 4-in-10 Canadians (41%) say the Liberals are still the best party to form government



Do you agree or disagree with the following statements? - The Liberals may have their problems but they are still the best party to form government [asked of all respondents; n=2000]









### Federal Party ID: 1-in-3 (30%) identify as Liberals followed by Conservatives (21%) while the NDP trails (125)





### Federal Party ID (Quebec vs. ROC): The Liberals have the lead in party ID in both Quebec and the rest of Canada






#### Leadership





### **Leader favourability by value clusters:** Trudeau has a positive impression among Core Left, Left Liberals, and Business Liberals




#### **NET Favourability by Value Clusters:**



Innovative reports on vote intention in two ways.


When we ask people who they would vote for if an election were held today, and who they lean towards if they are unsure, we call those results **Combined vote**. This accounts for the views of everyone in the population including decided voters, undecided voters, and non-voters.

When we look at the results among *only* decided voters, we call that **Decided vote**. These results most tell us what the election results would be like if the survey results matched the election exactly.

### **Federal Combined Vote:** The Liberals (33%) lead over the Conservatives (24%) when it comes to the federal vote




If a federal election were held today, which party would you vote for? In that case, which party do you lean toward slightly? [Vote + Lean] [asked of all respondents; n=2000]



### **Federal Vote Tracking:** The Liberals continue their lead over the Conservatives while the NDP is down this wave




If a federal election were held today, which party would you vote for? In that case, which party do you lean toward slightly? [Vote + Lean] [asked of all respondents; n=2000]



### **Federal Decided Vote:** Among decided voters, the Liberals (38%) hold a 11-point lead over the Conservatives (27%)




If a federal election were held today, which party would you vote for? In that case, which party do you lean toward slightly? **[DECIDED]** [decided voters only; n=1774]






#### Combined Vote by Value Cluster: The Conservatives continue to lead among both conservative value clusters





### **Combined Vote by Value Cluster:** The Liberals maintain their lead among both Business and Left Liberals




















## Federal 2nd Choice: A plurality of decided voters either choose the NDP (19%) as their second choice or are undecided (22%)

### Methodology

#### **Survey Methodology**

These are the results of an online survey conducted between May 7<sup>th</sup> and May 31<sup>st</sup>, 2021.

**Method:** This online survey was conducted using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Dynata, a leading provider of online sample. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample.

**Sample Size:** n=2,579 Canadian citizens, 18 years or older. The results are nationally weighted to n=2,000 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.

Field Dates: May 7th and May 31st, 2021.

**Weighting:** Results for Canada are weighted by age, gender, and region to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data; in order to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported in the table.

**Margin of Error:** This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability based sample, a margin of error cannot be calculated. Statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates do not apply to most online panels.

**Note**: Graphs may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.
