Federal Politics: Tracking

Today, INNOVATIVE is releasing results from the second wave of our election tracking survey.

This online survey was in field from September 10th to September 12th, 2021 with a weighted sample size of 2,400. The full results combines two samples. A core sample of 1,200 asked our standard tracking questions and an additional sample of 1,200 asked a separate set of questions. Detailed methodology is provided in the appendix.

While the Liberals are still vulnerable coming into the last week of the election, they have the clear advantage. With leads in Ontario, Quebec, and Atlantic Canada they are well positioned to win important seats and there are no clear issues that the CPC can overtake them on. The main threat to the Liberals are the NDP gains in BC and Ontario, and the potential for a Bloc rebound in Quebec if they can make the issue of defending Quebec more salient.

Campaign Impacts

Measuring Campaign Impacts

Each campaign hopes to win over voters first by their ability to capture their attention and second by what those voters hear about them.

INNOVATIVE tracks the impact of each campaign by asking Canadians whether they have heard about each party recently, what they have heard, and whether it has had a positive or negative impact on their impressions of that party.

Each respondent is asked whether they have read, seen, or heard something in the last few days about the Liberals, the Conservatives, the Bloc (in Quebec only) and one other party selected randomly from the NDP, Greens and PPC.

For each party that a respondent has heard about, they are asked what they heard and whether that news had a positive or negative impact on their impression of that party.

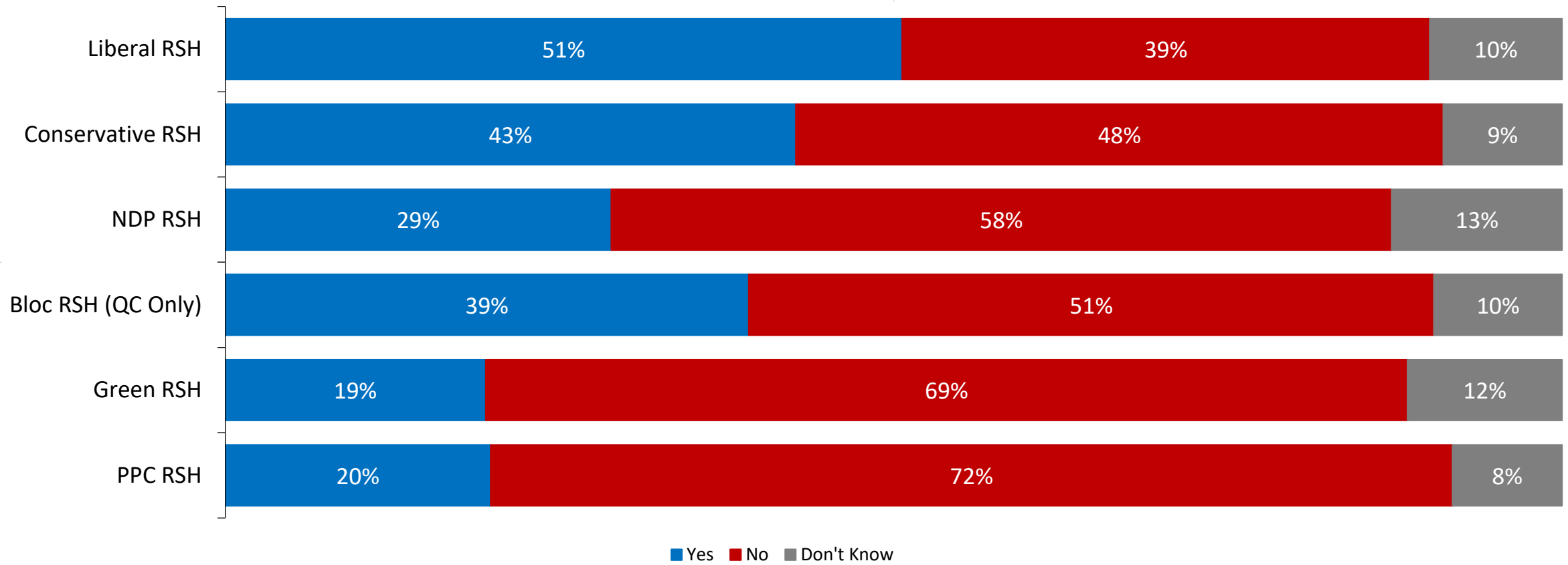

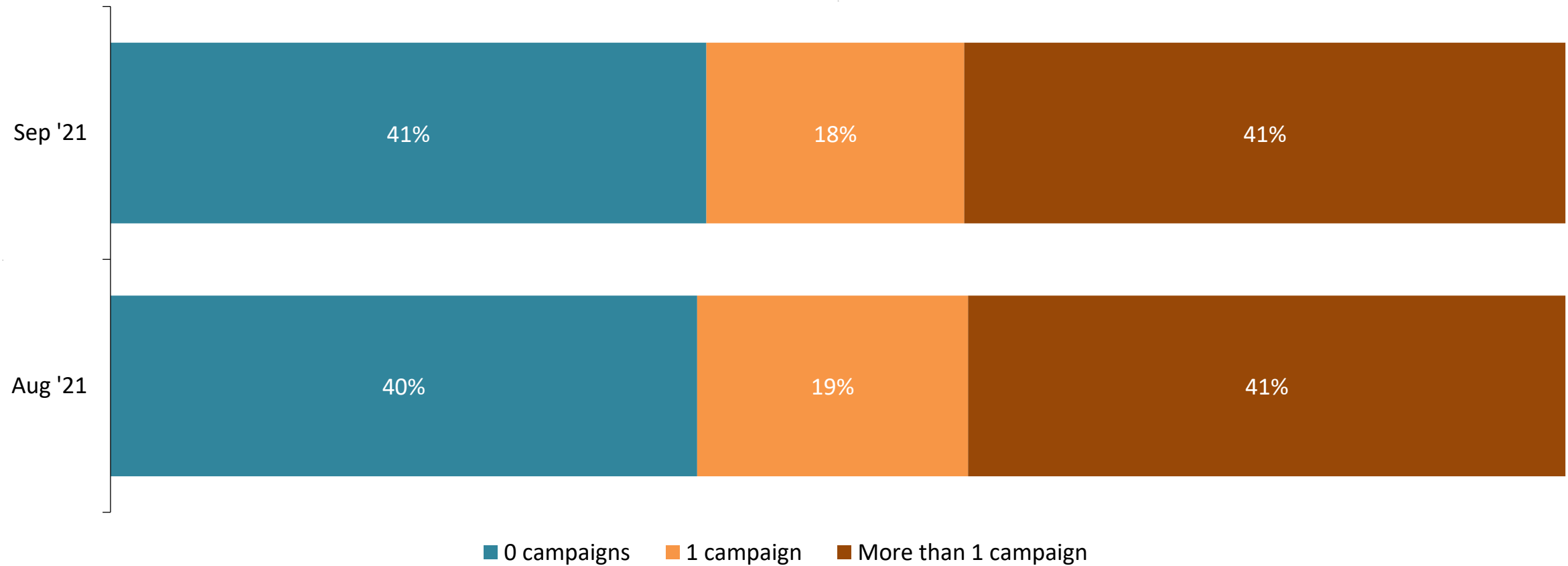

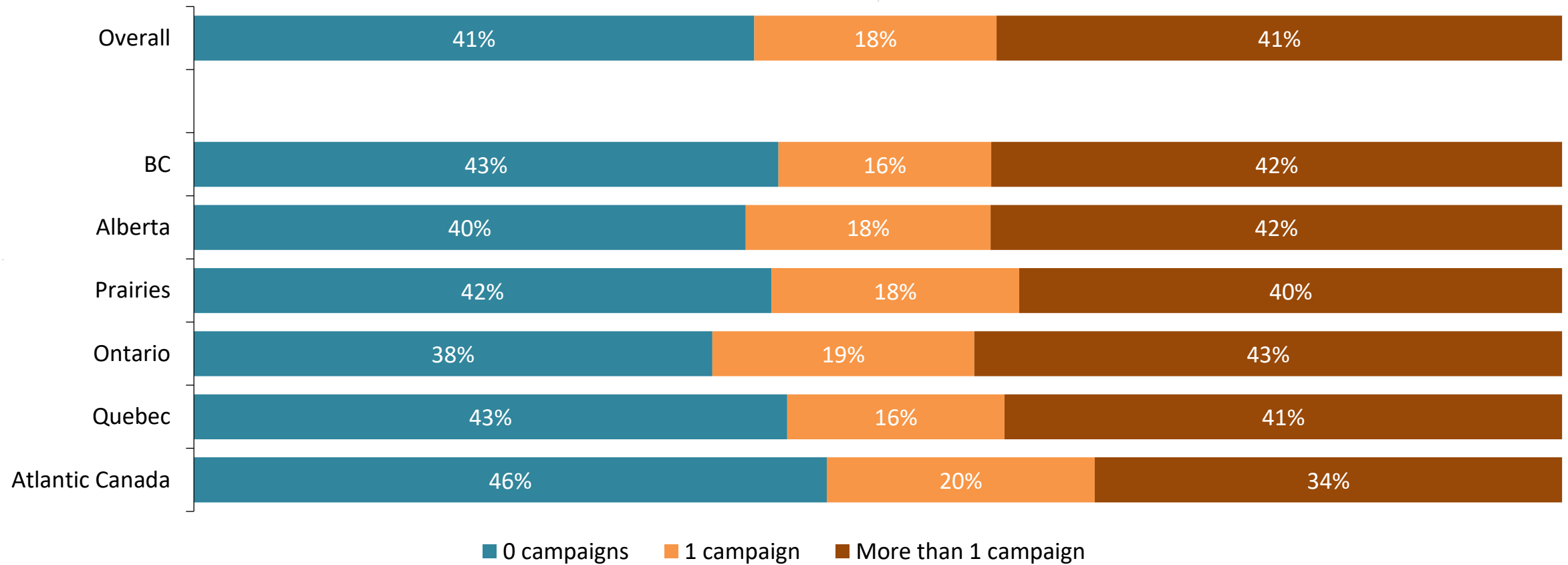


Attention: The share of people who have heard about more than one campaign is steady in all provinces except Atlantic Canada

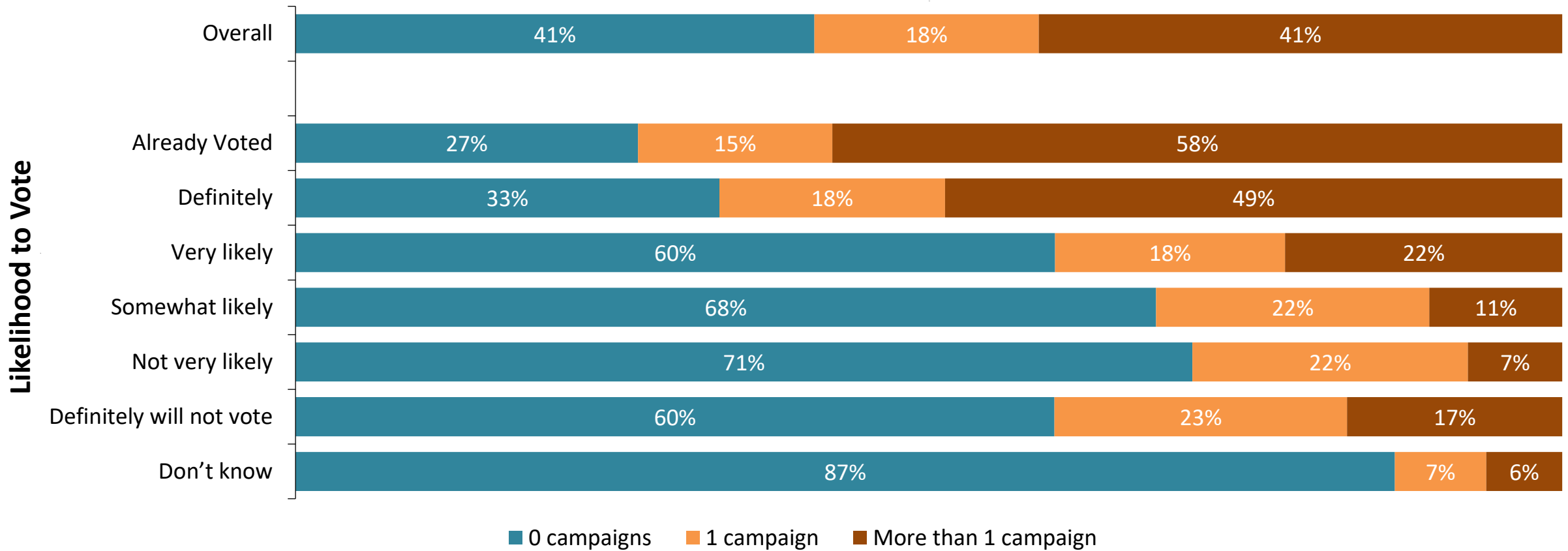

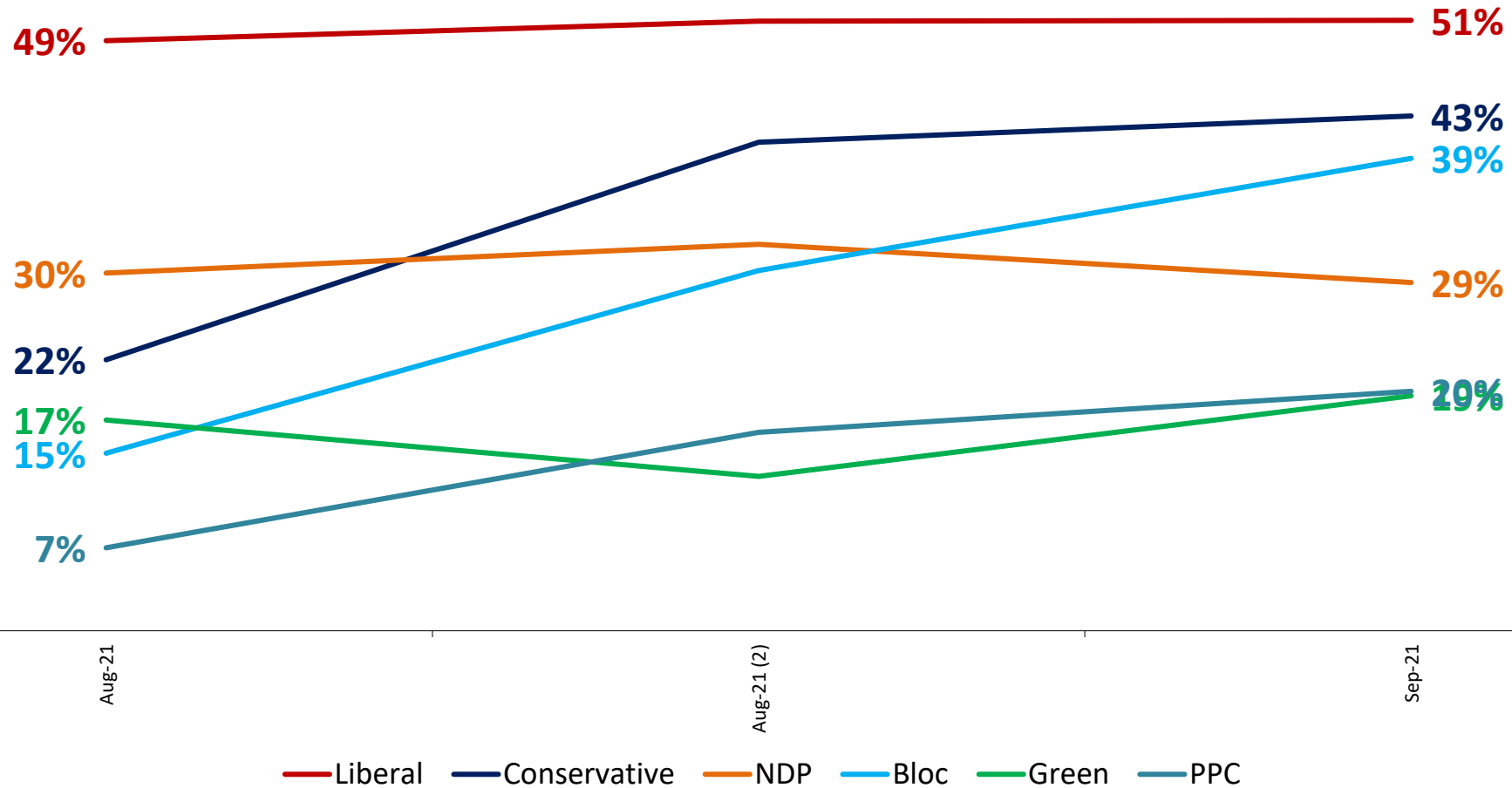

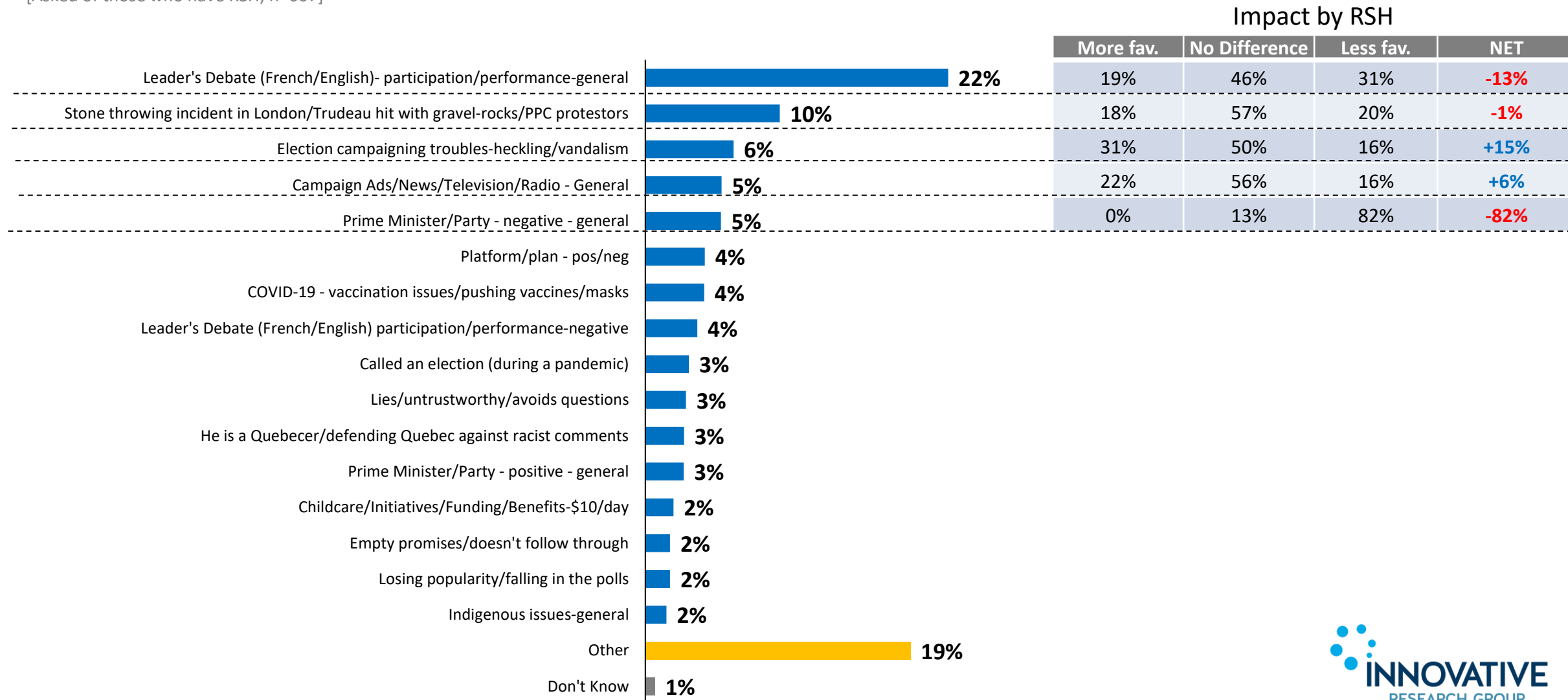


RSH Trudeau: The Liberals/Trudeau's performance in the debate is the top mention (22%) with a negative net impact of -13%

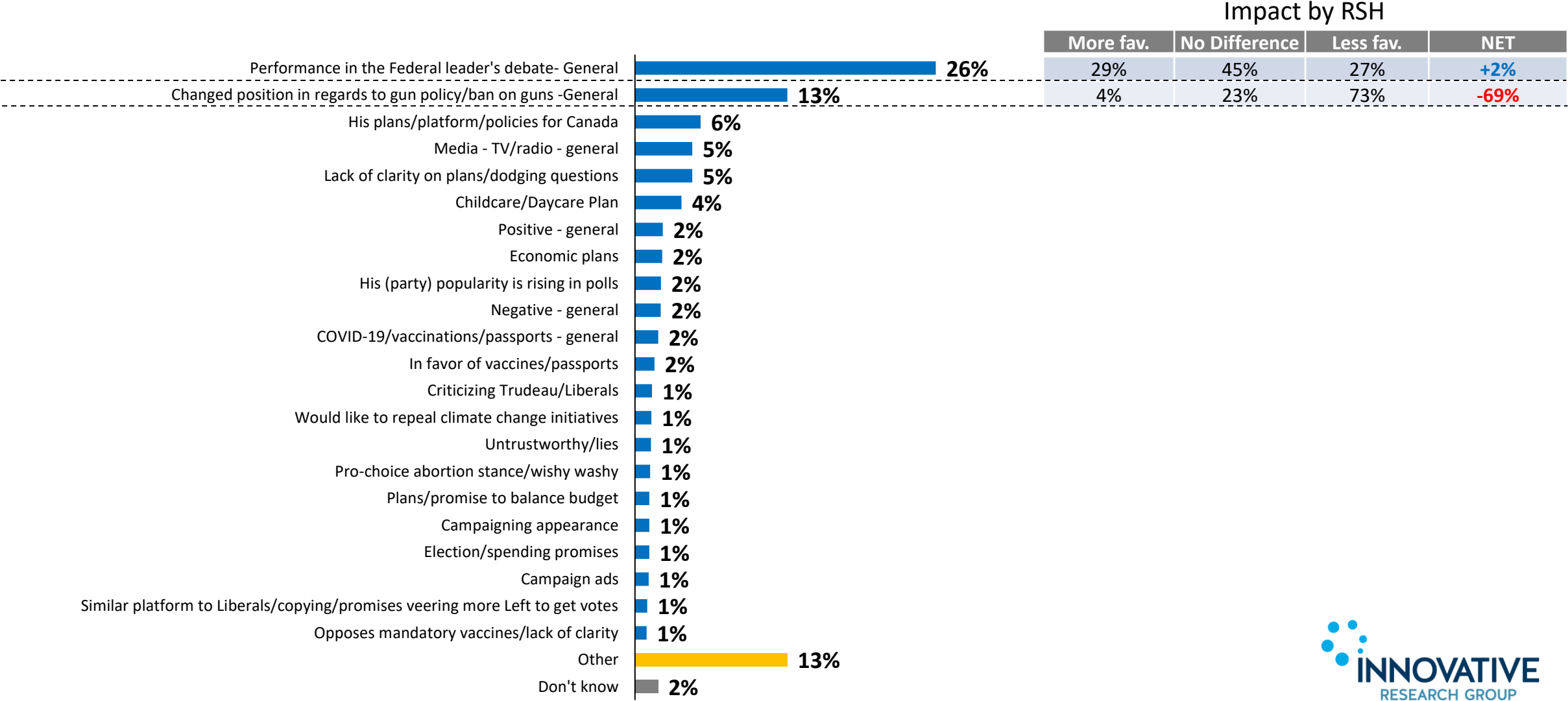

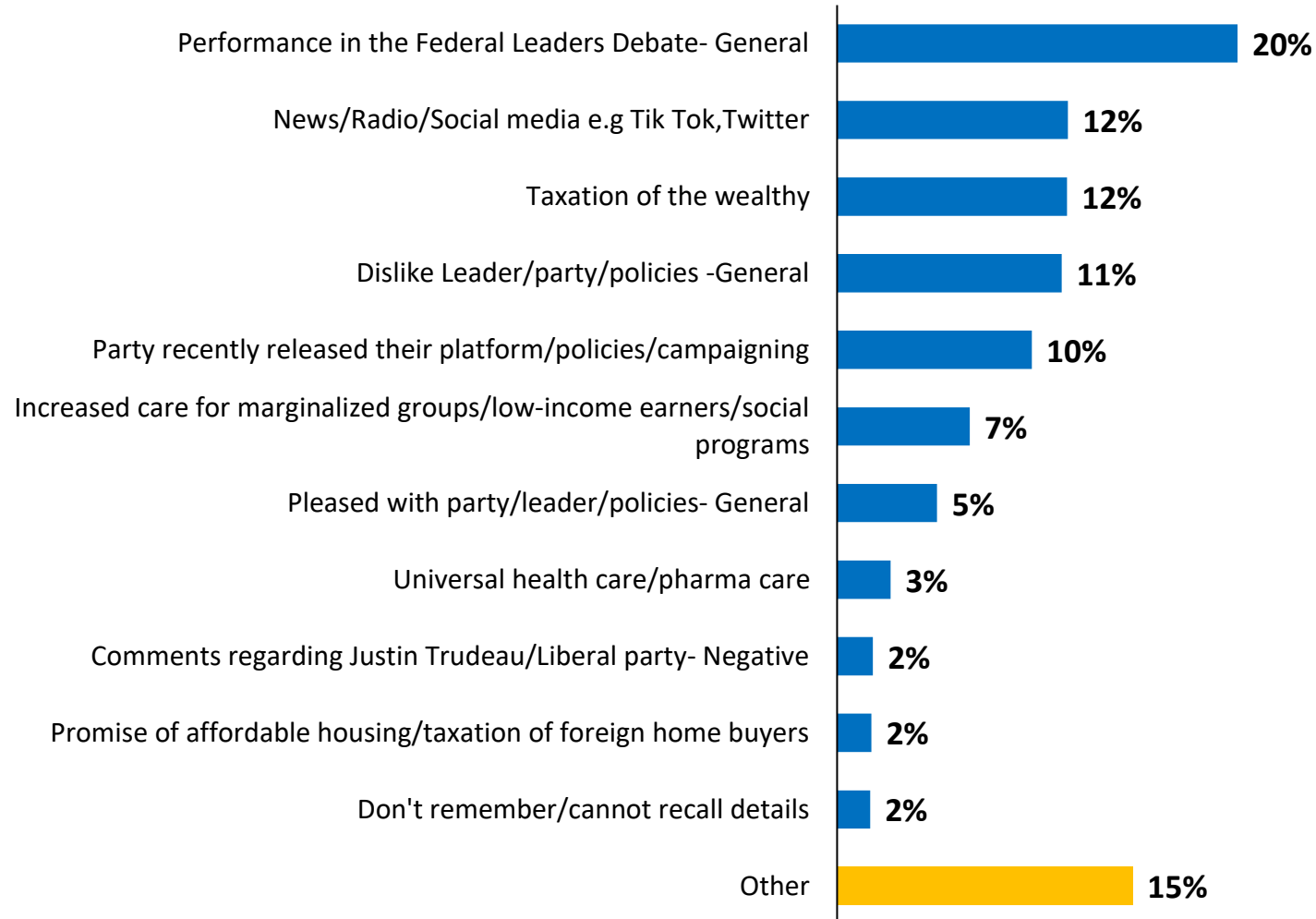

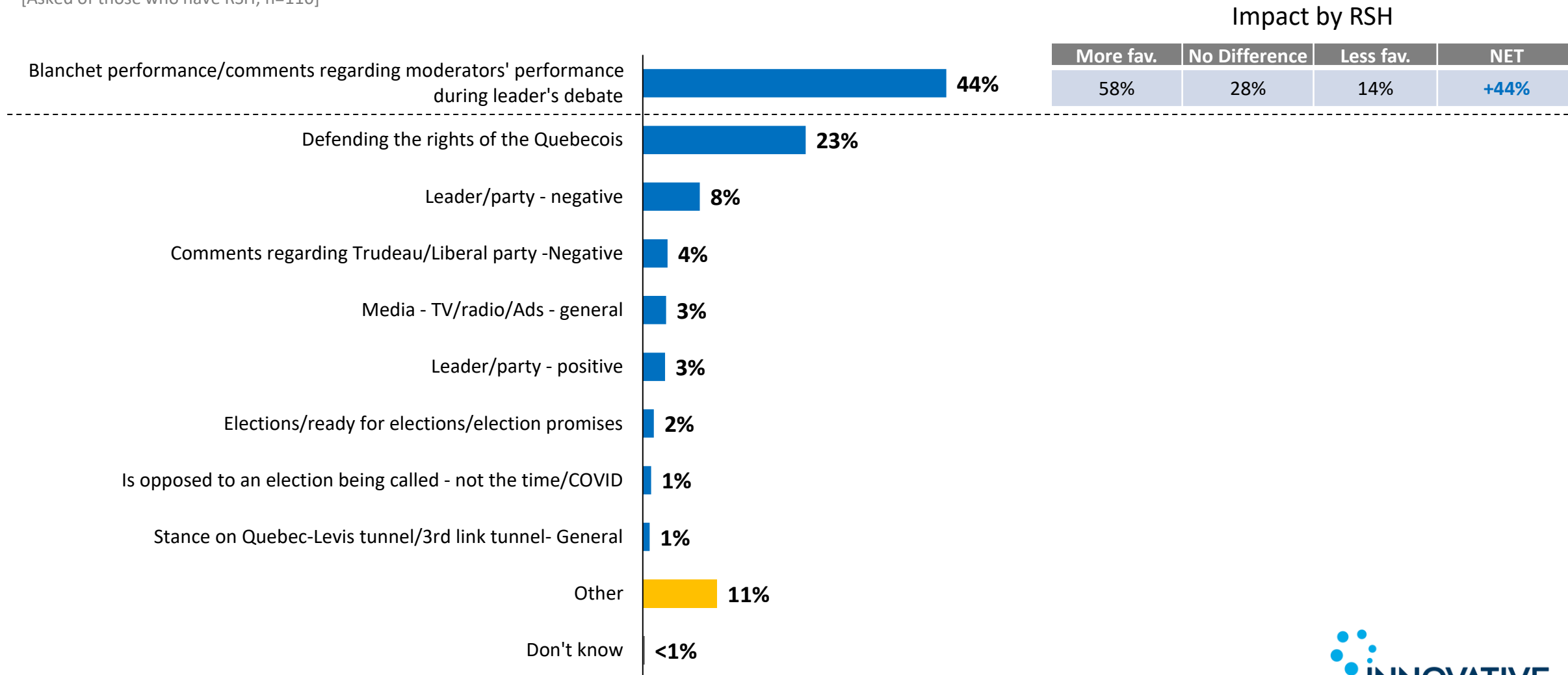

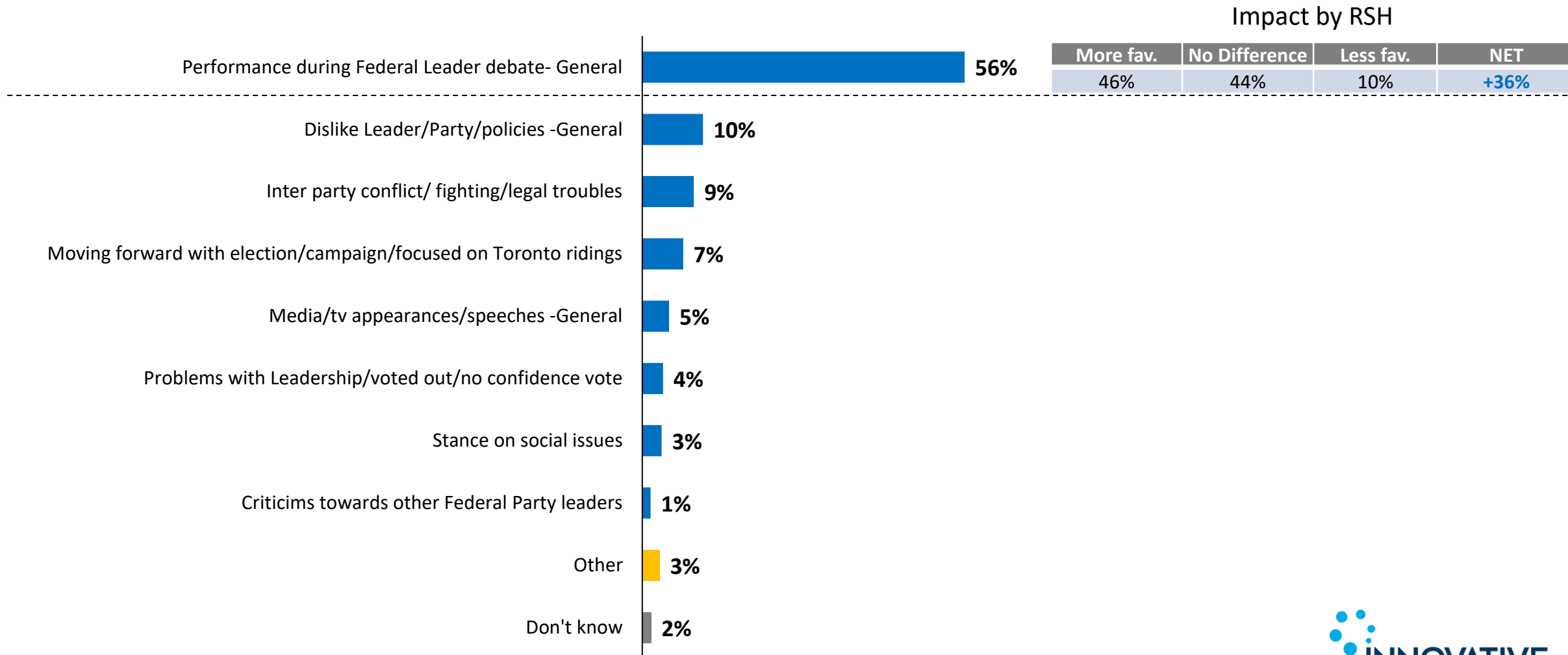

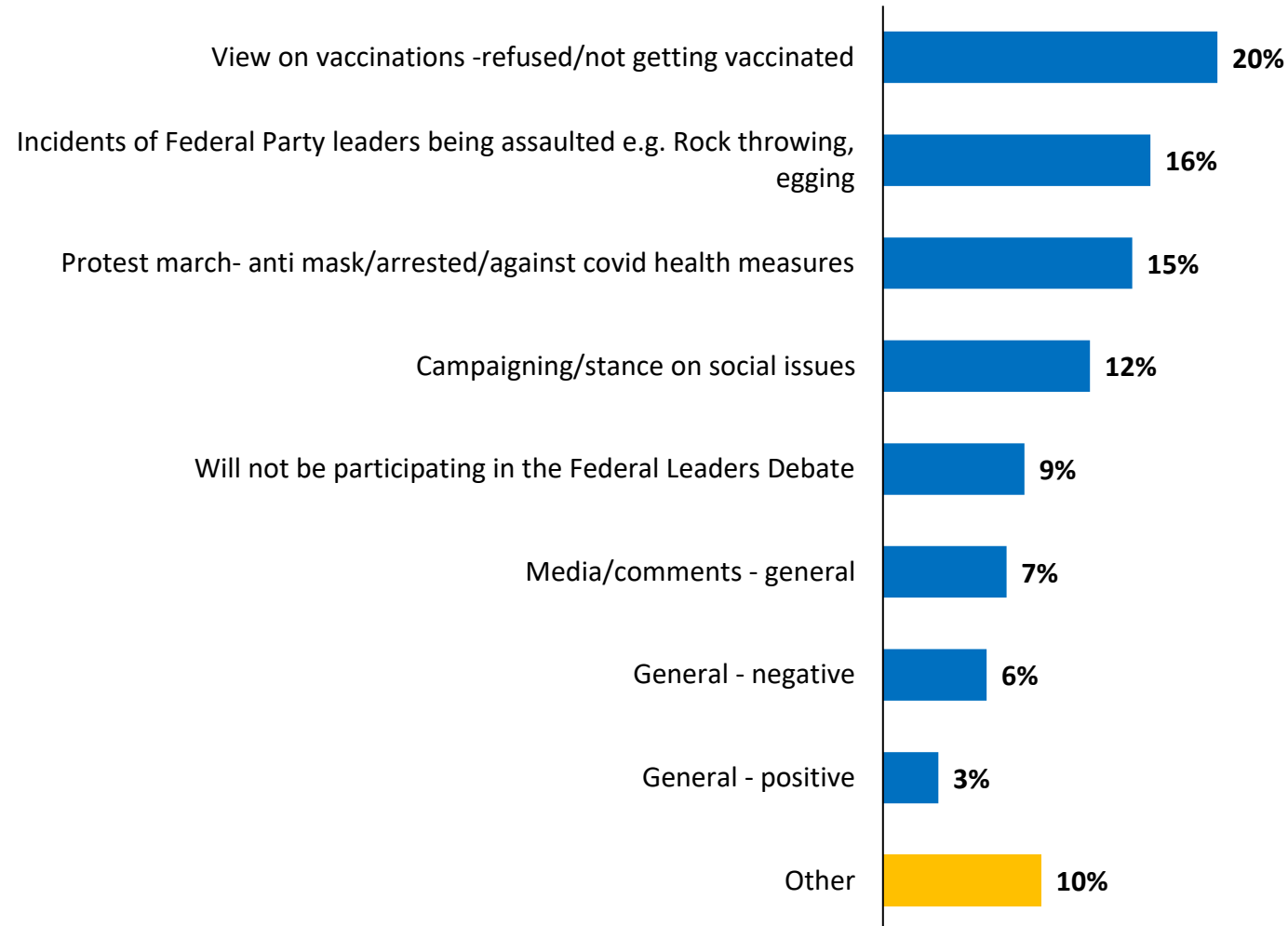

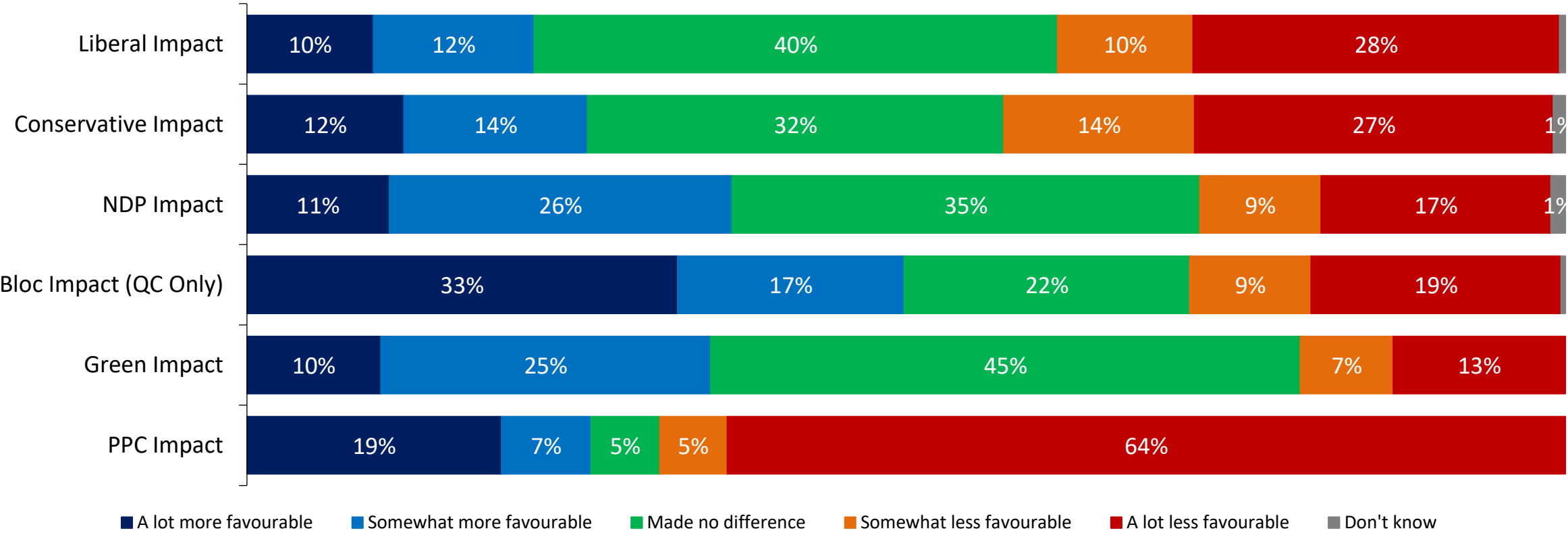

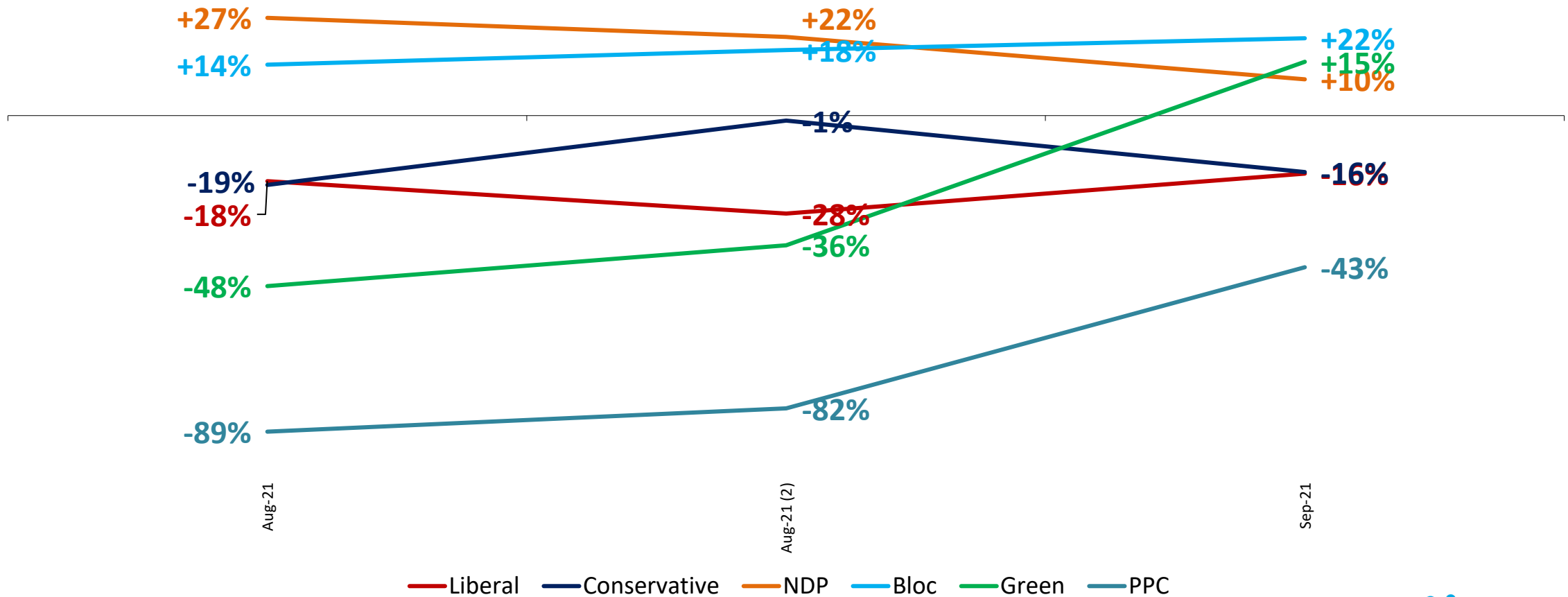


Net Impact Tracking: The Green and the PPC are showing the strongest improvement in the net impact of campaign awareness

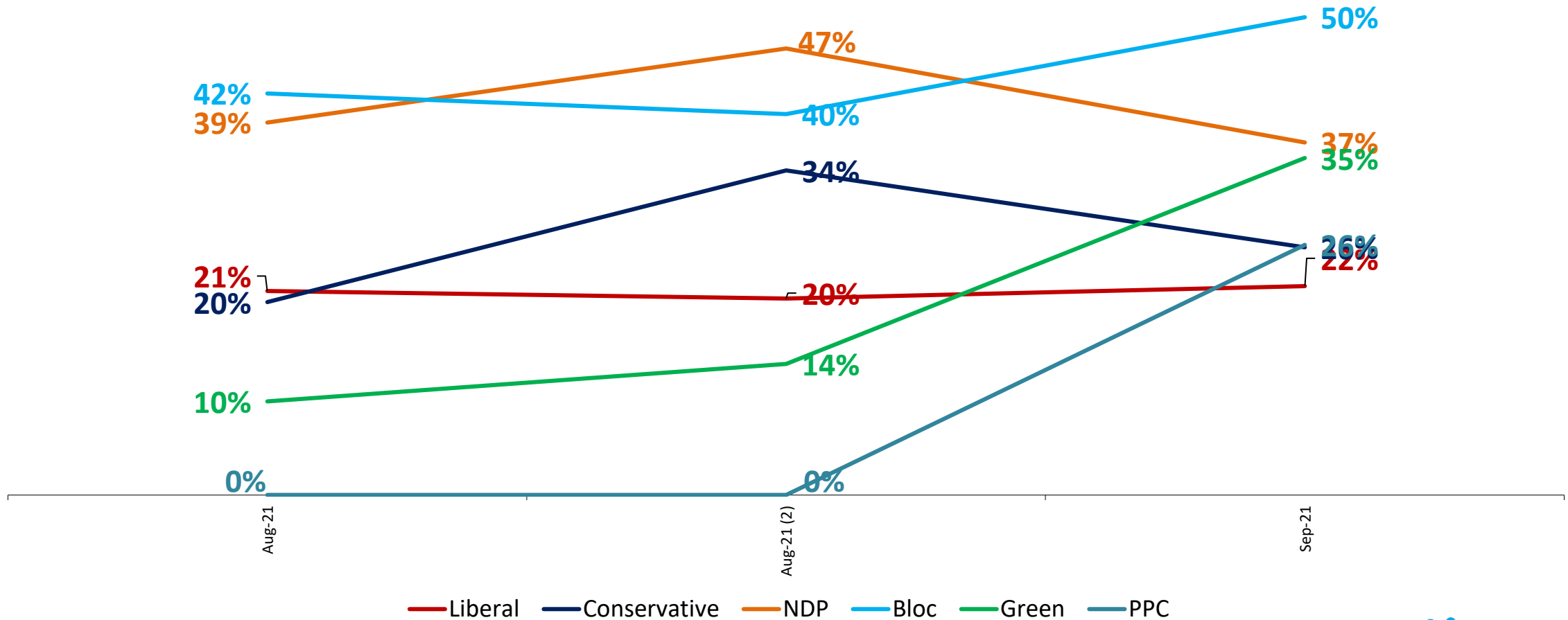


Positive Impact Tracking: Positive impacts are up for the Bloc, Green, PPC and Liberals but down for the Conservatives and NDP

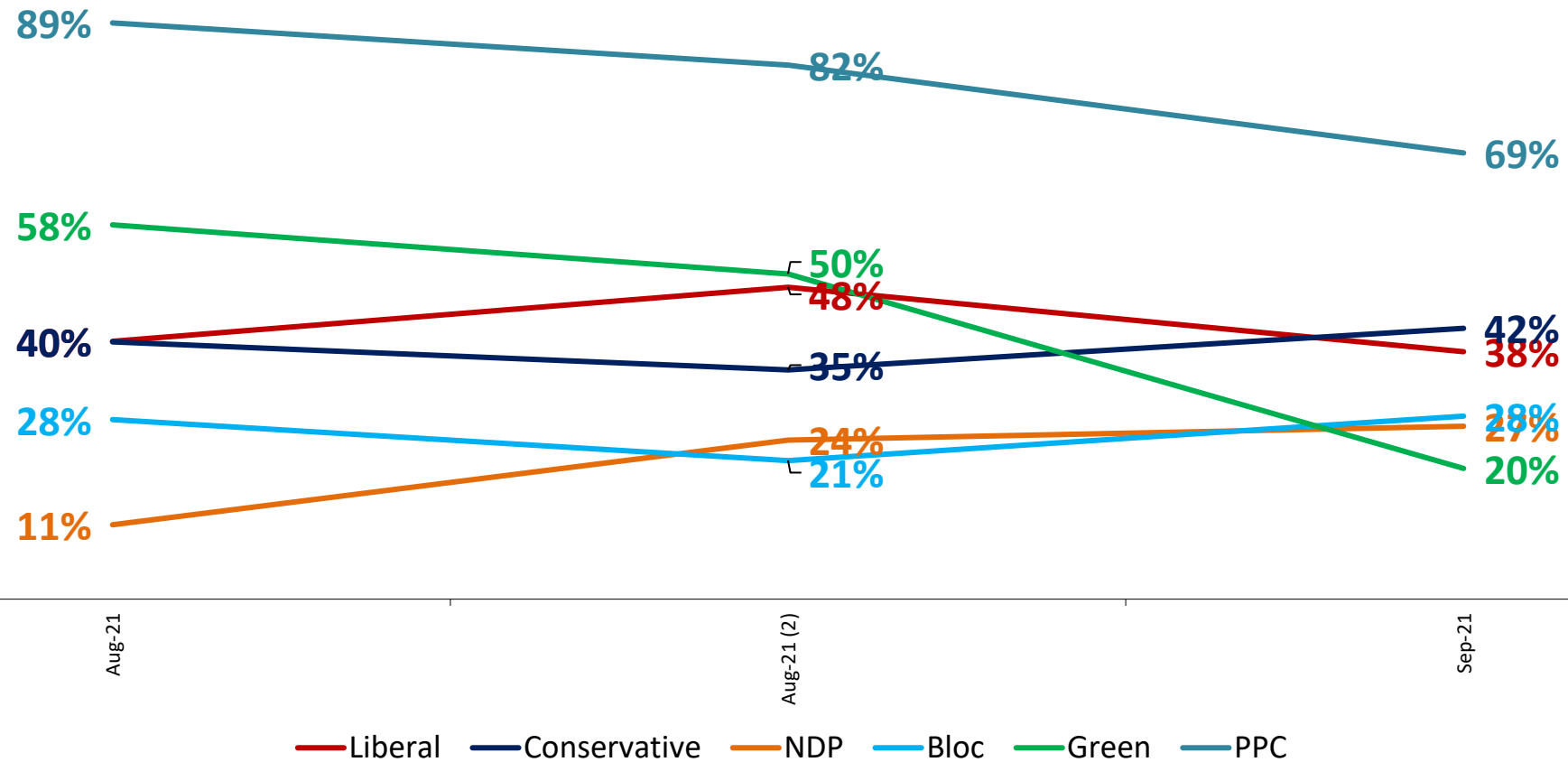


Negative Impact Tracking: Negative impacts are down for most parties¹⁹ except CPC, Bloc and NDP, which have gone up

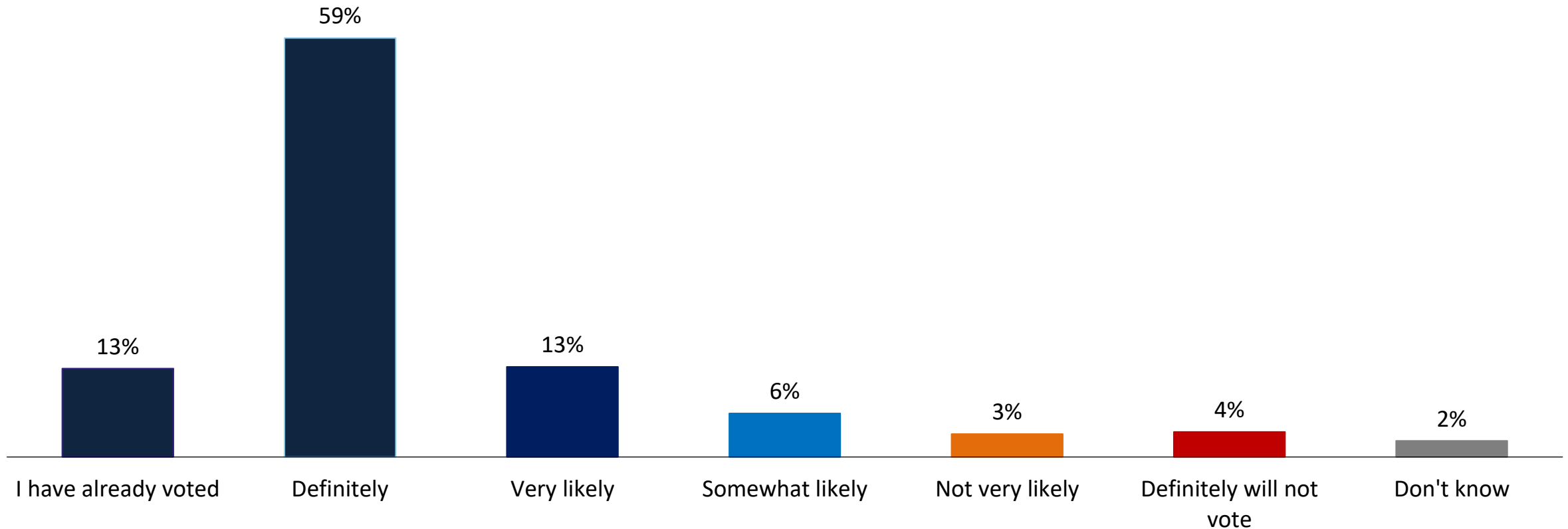

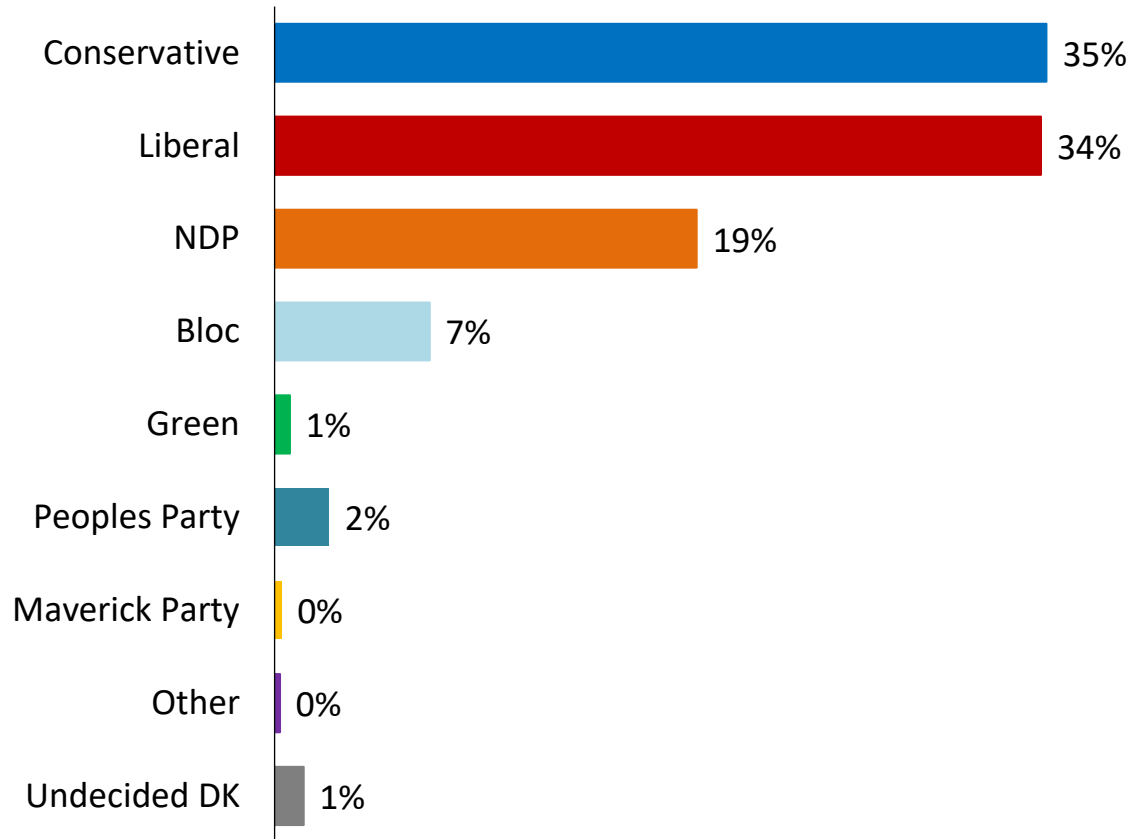

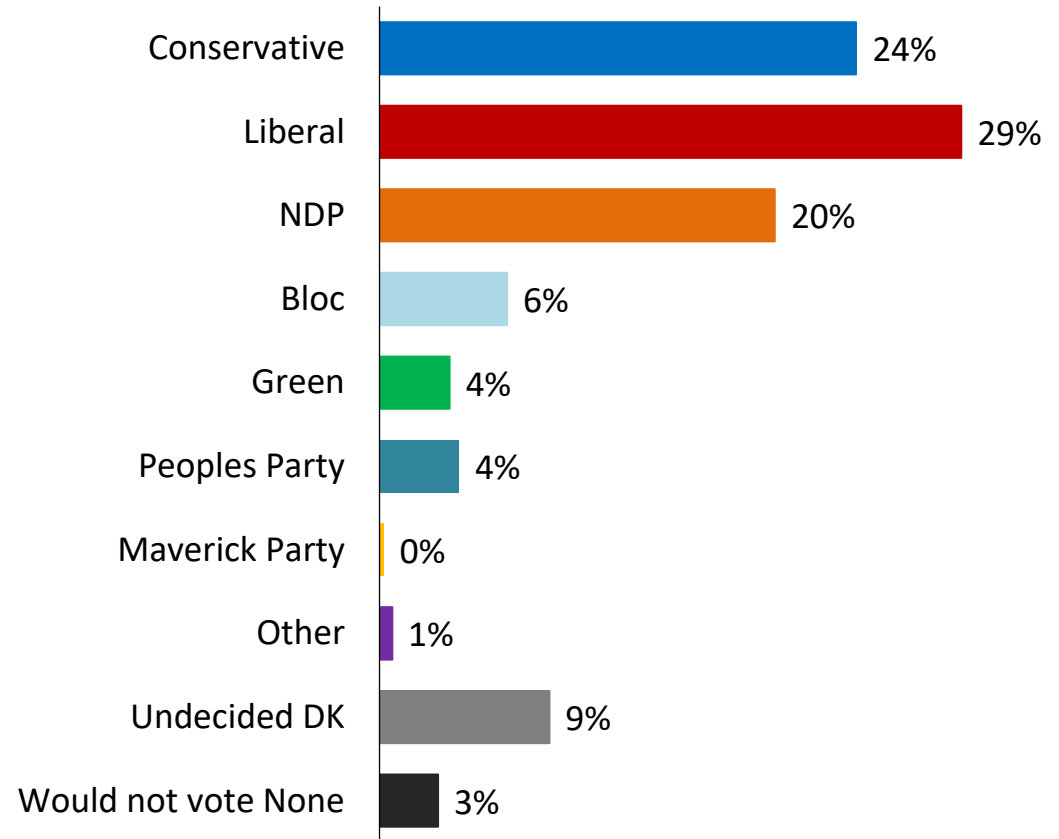

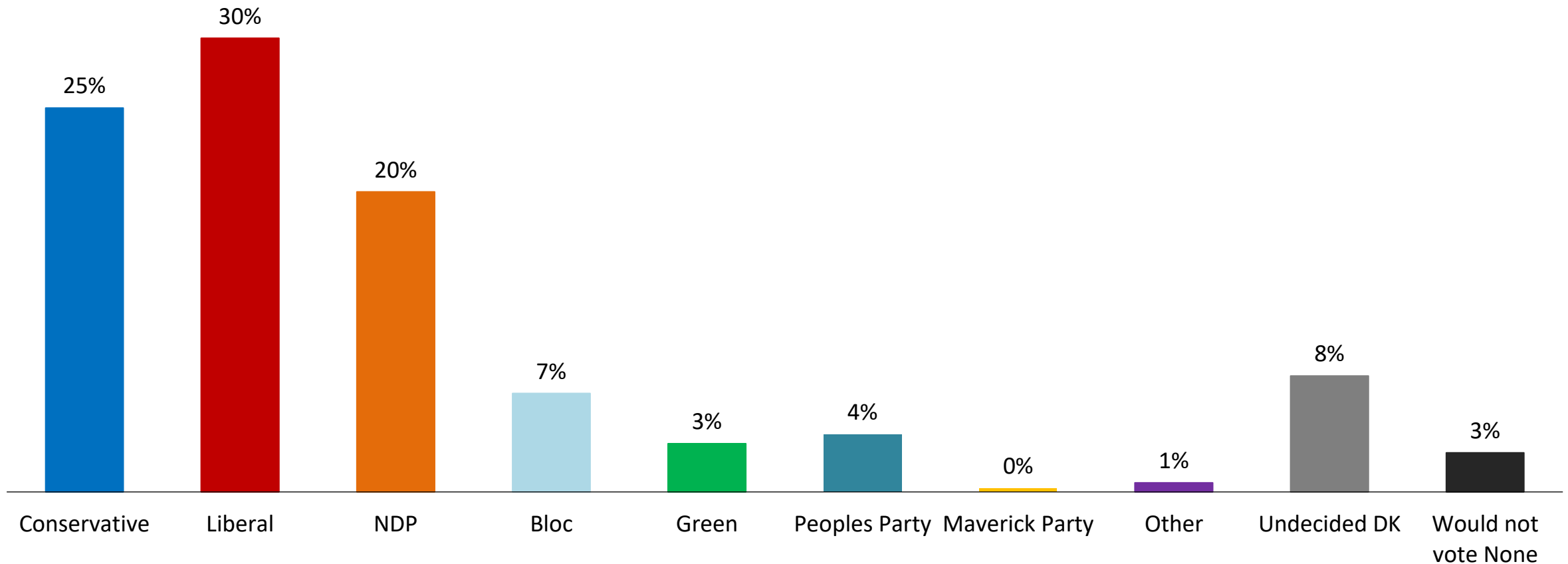

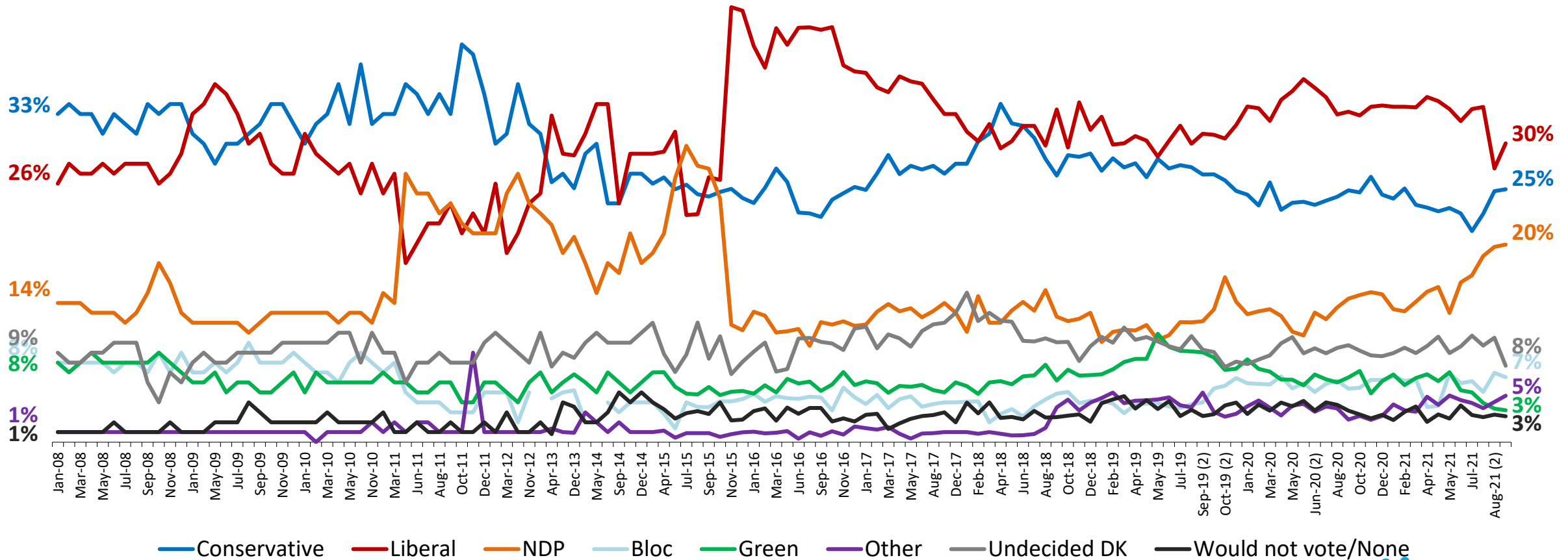

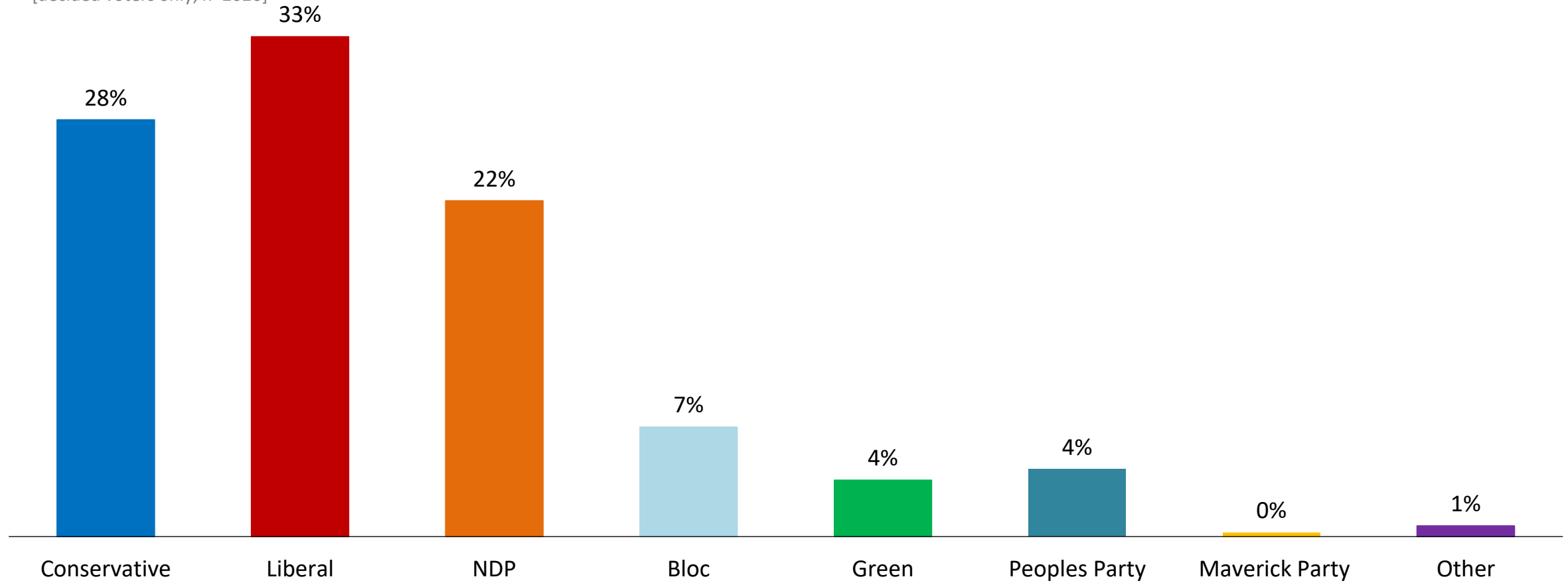

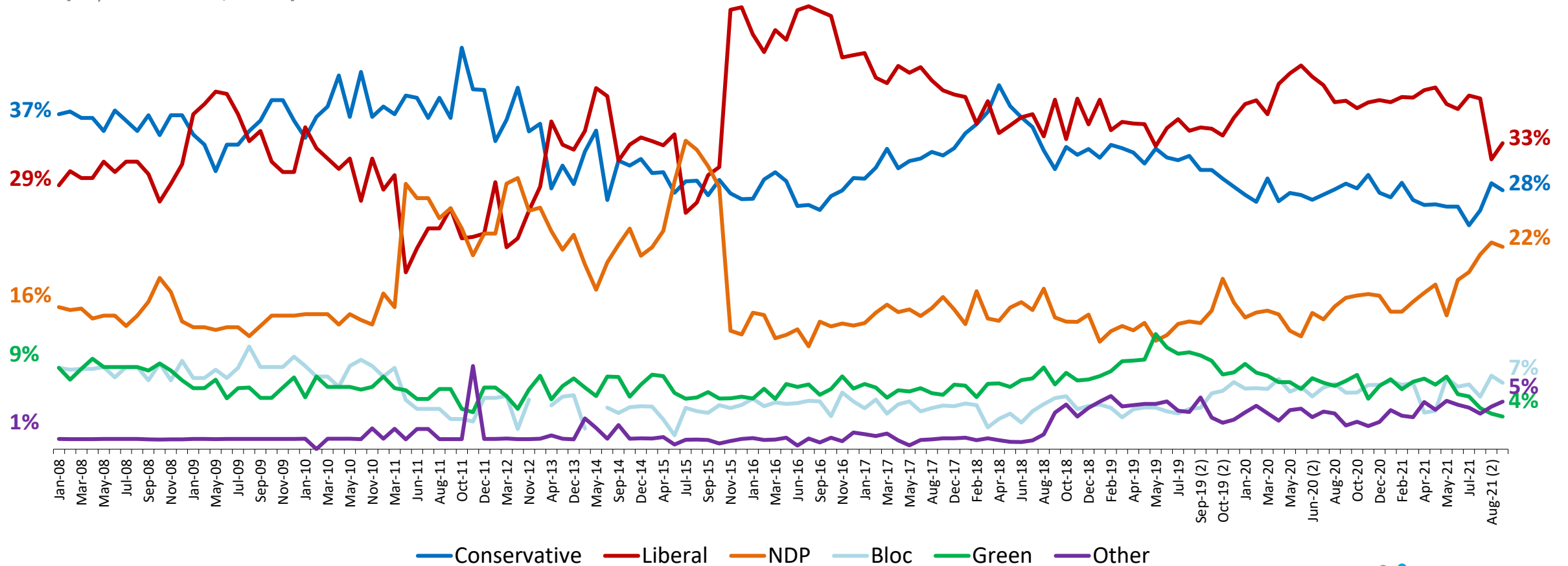

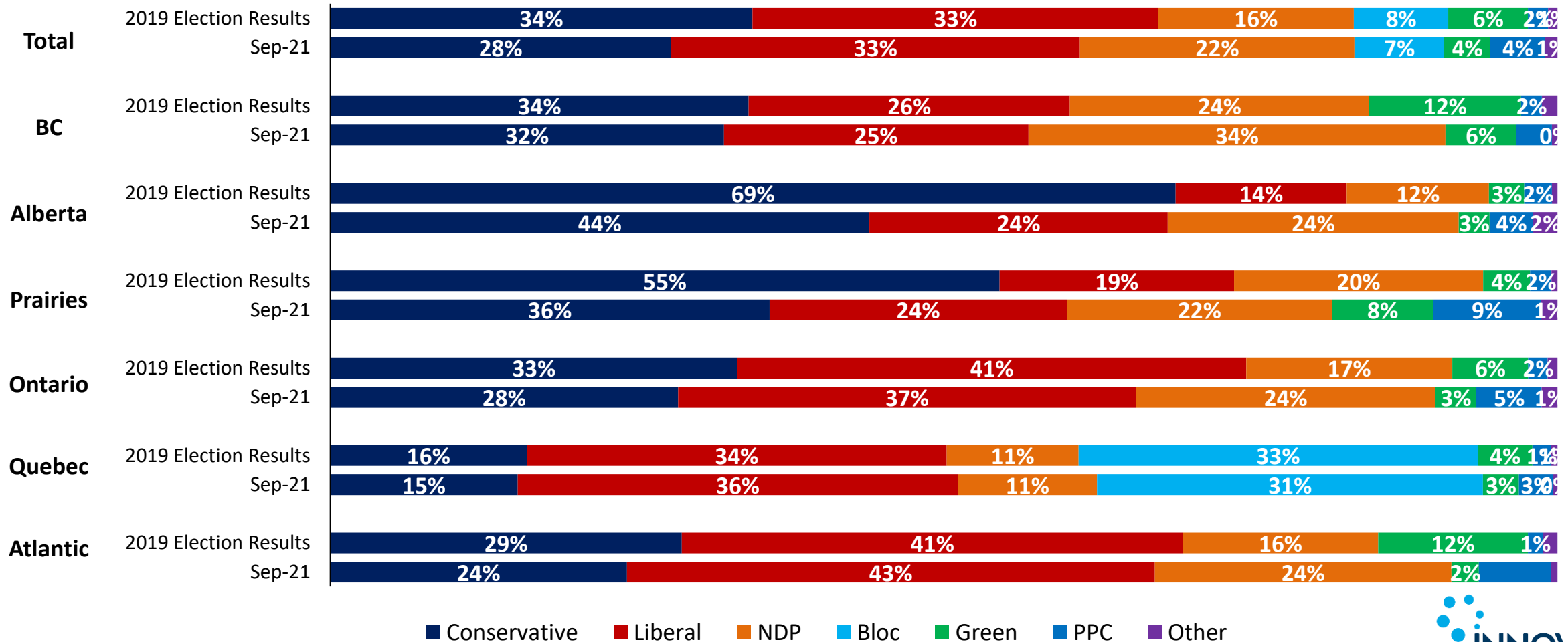

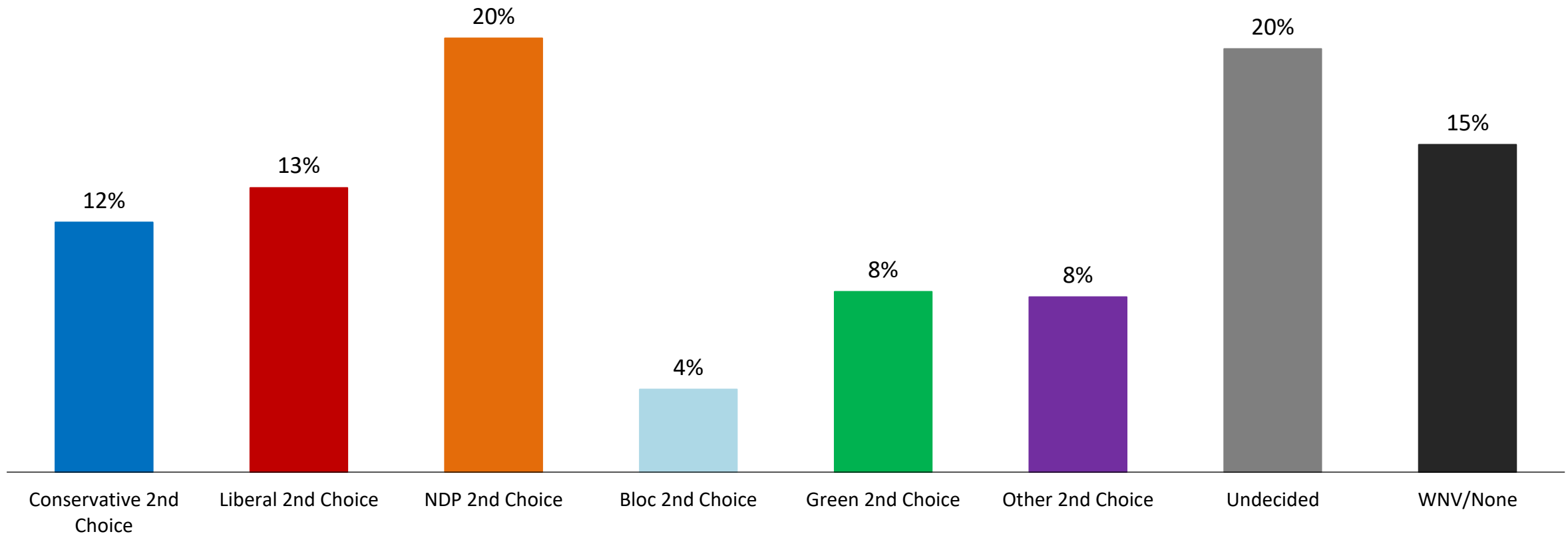

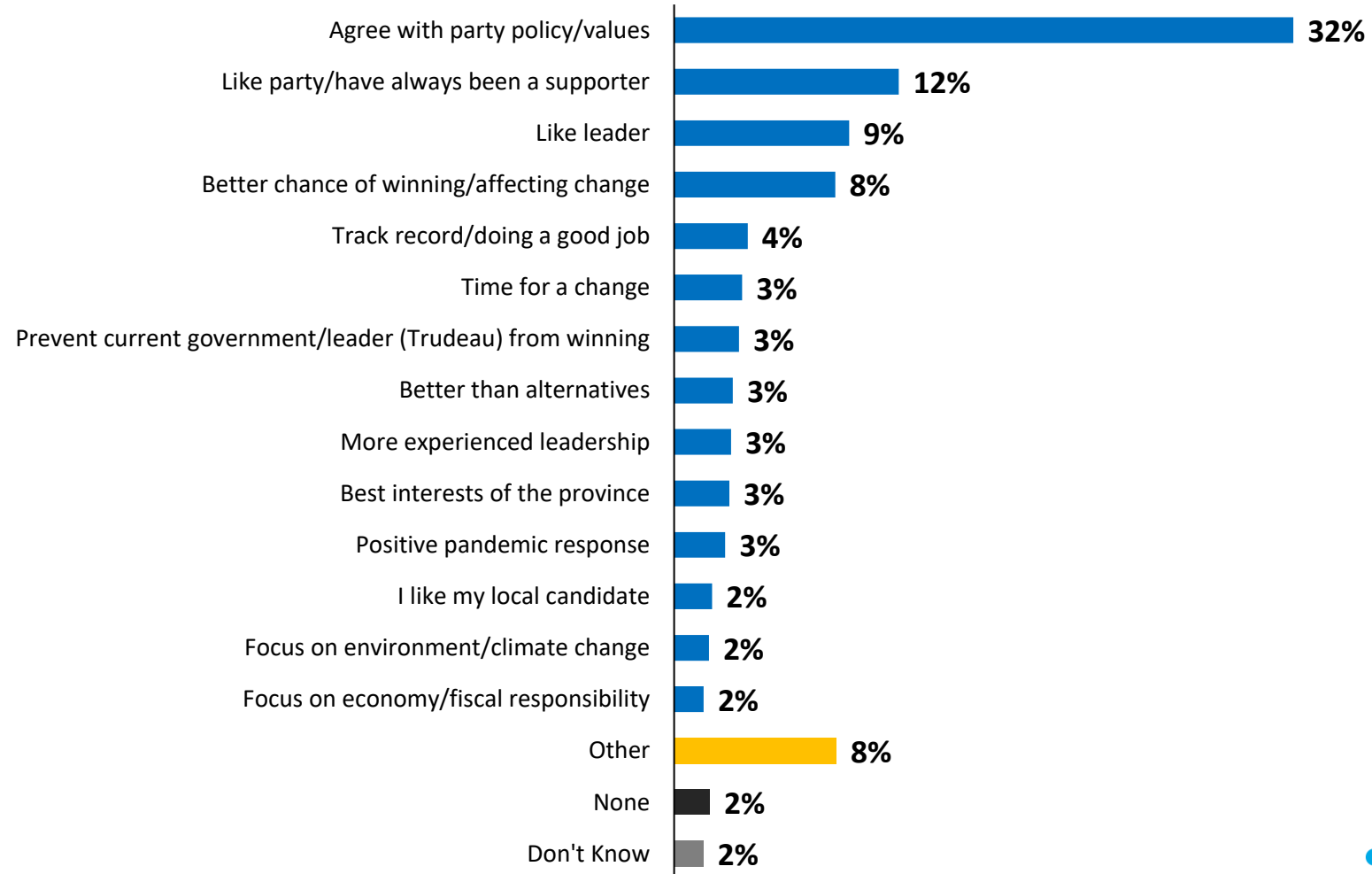

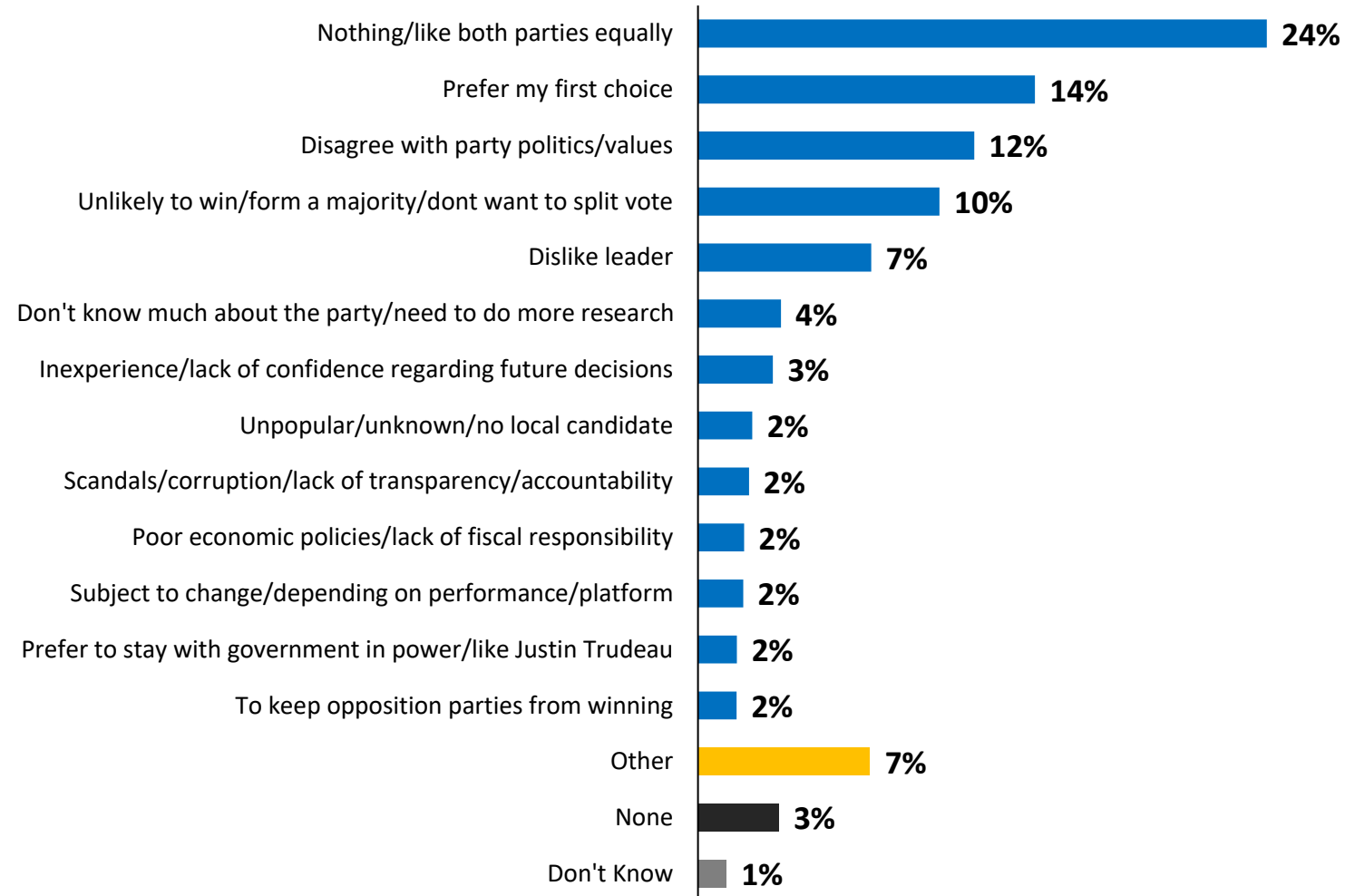

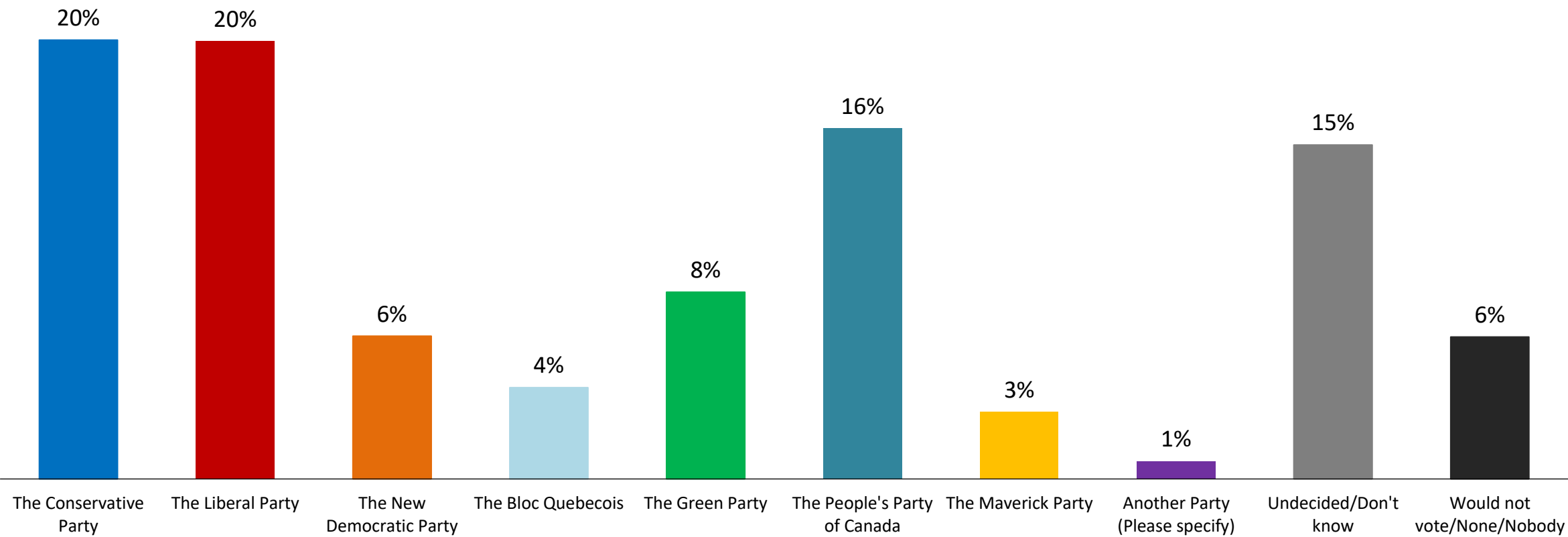

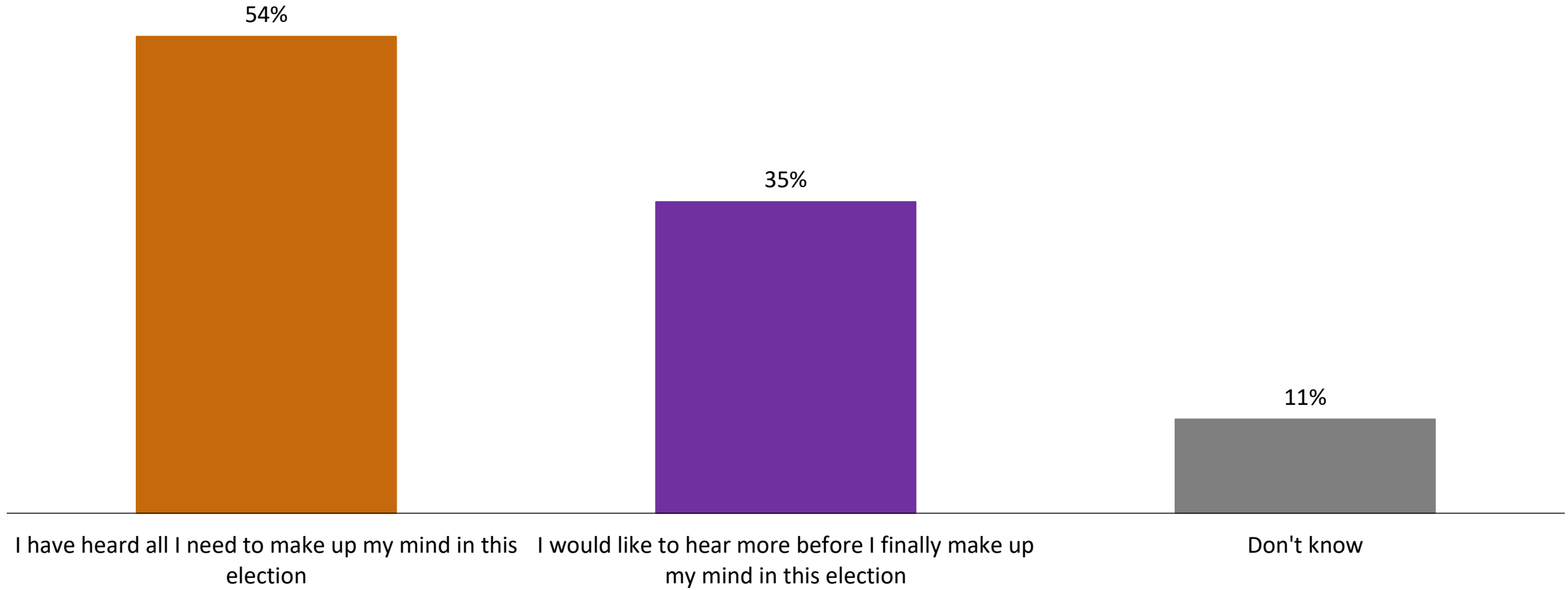

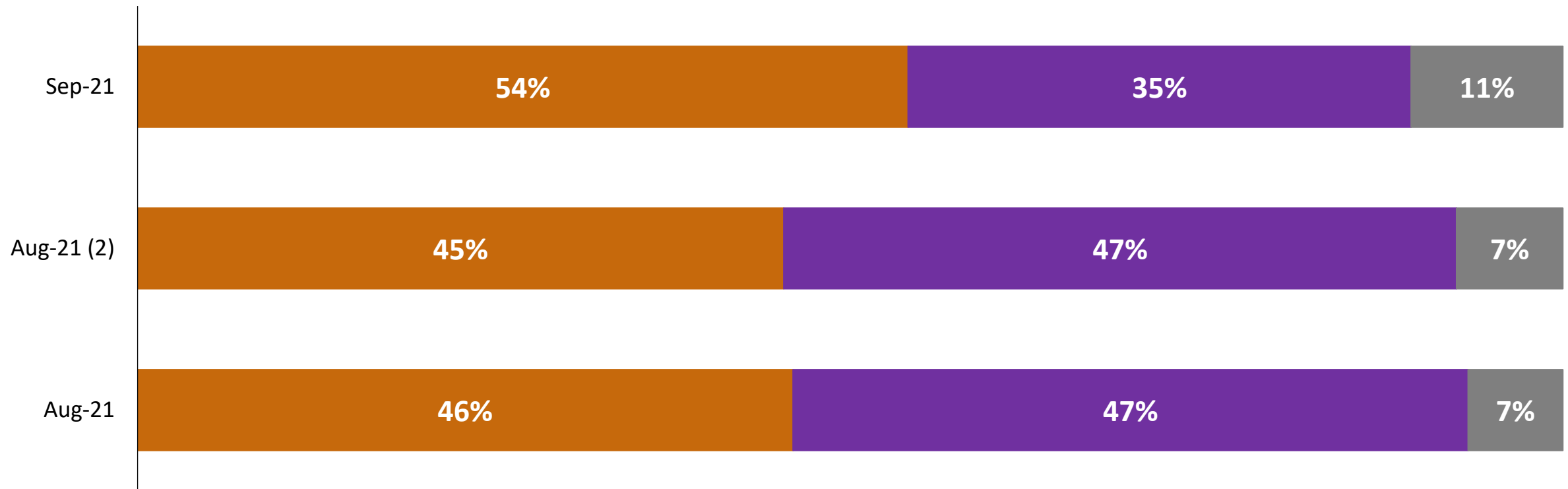


Satisficing Tracking: Voters are now are more likely to have made up their minds now than at start of campaign

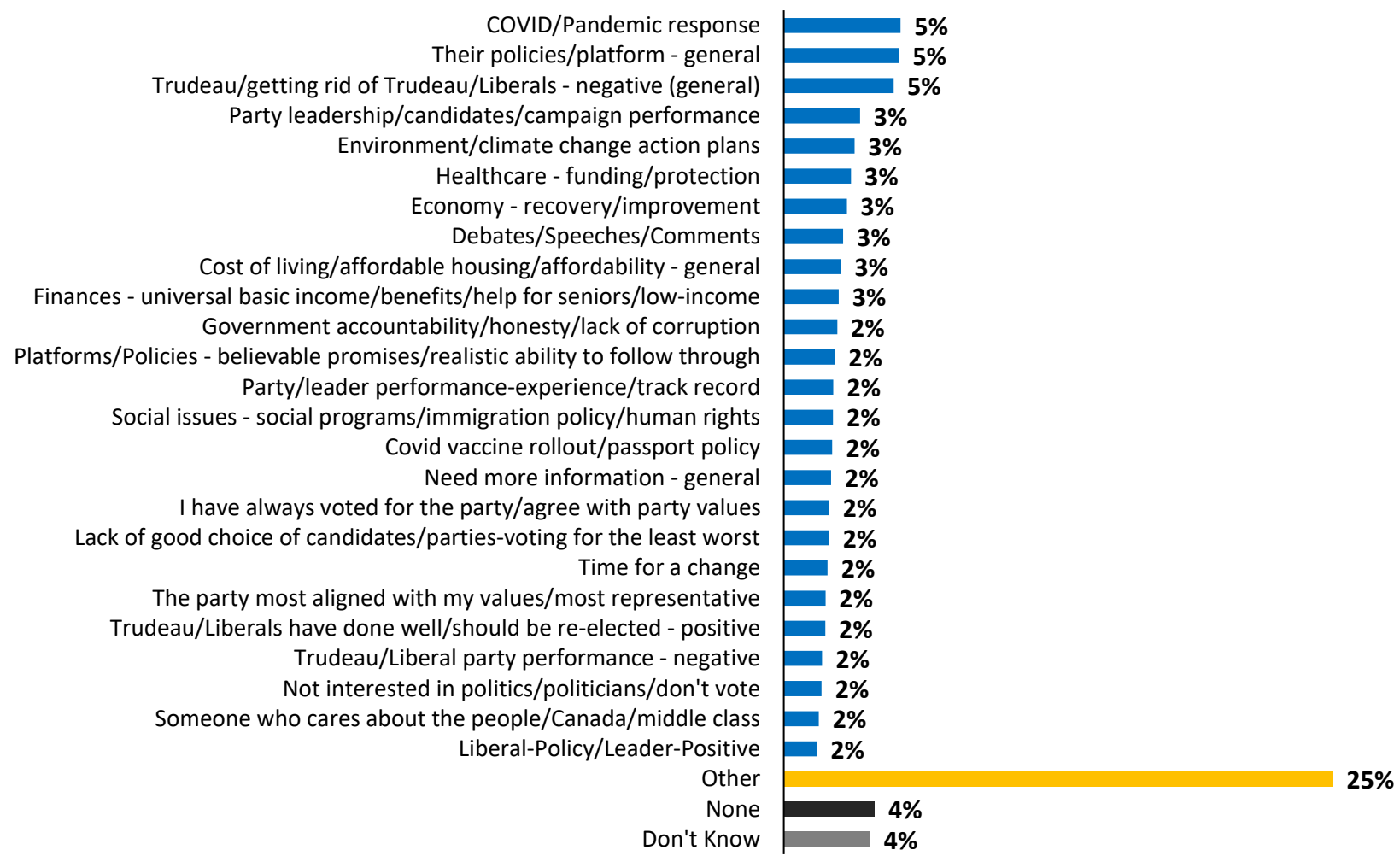

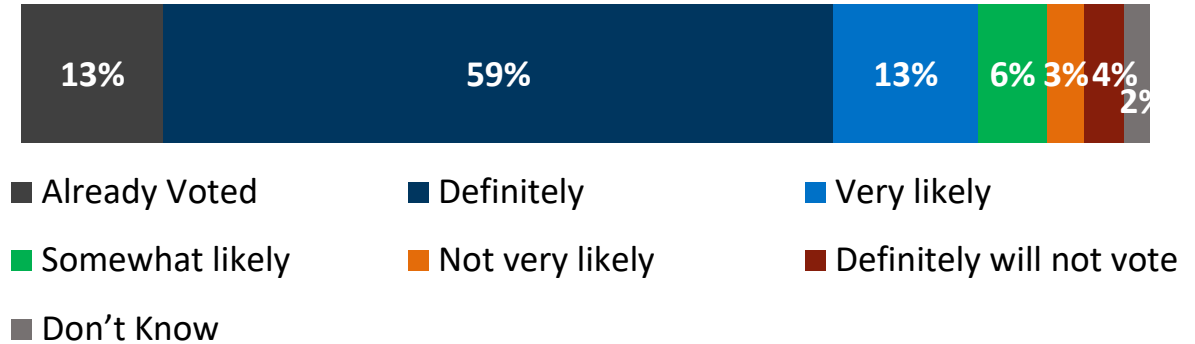
- Because turnout can impact the final election results, we also look at voting intention within groups of people that are more likely to turn up at the polling stations.

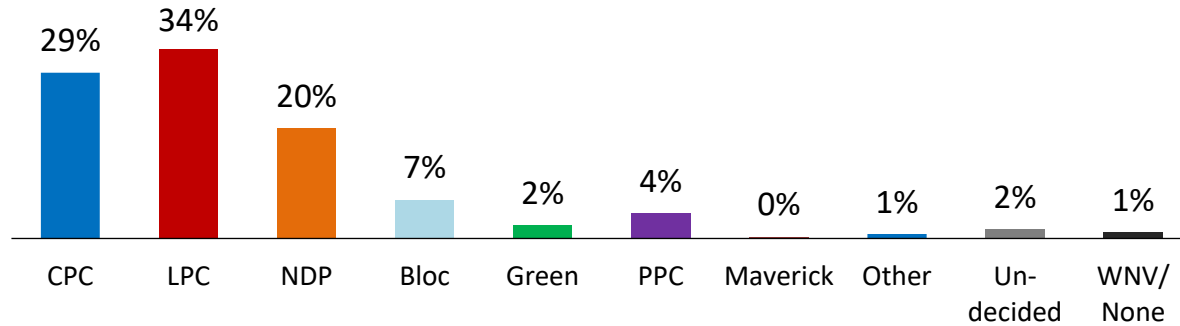

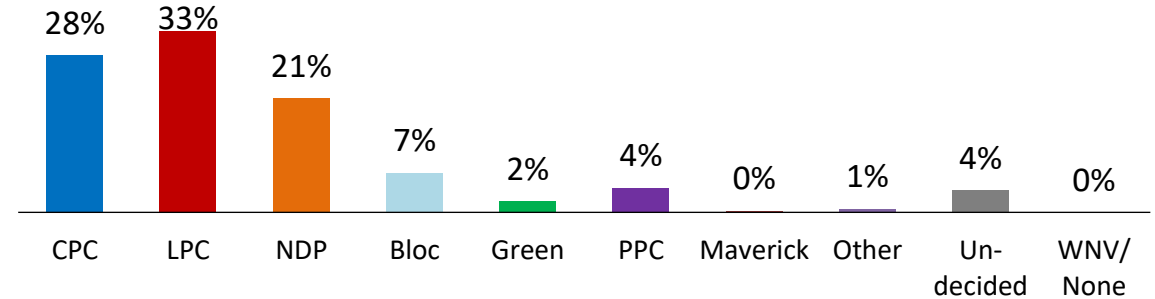

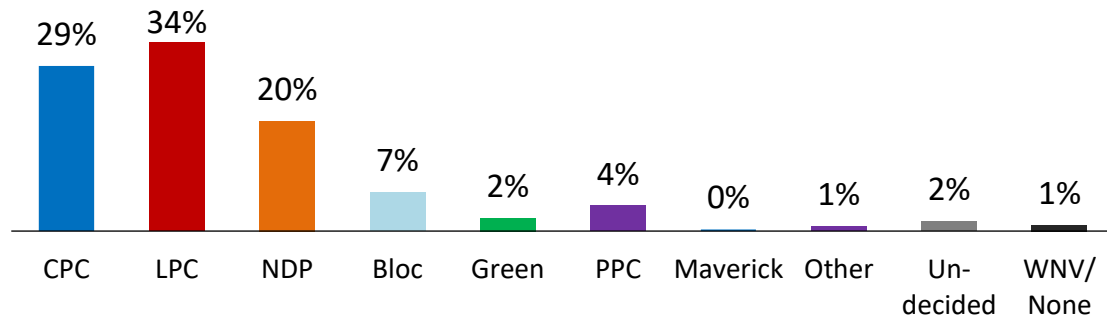

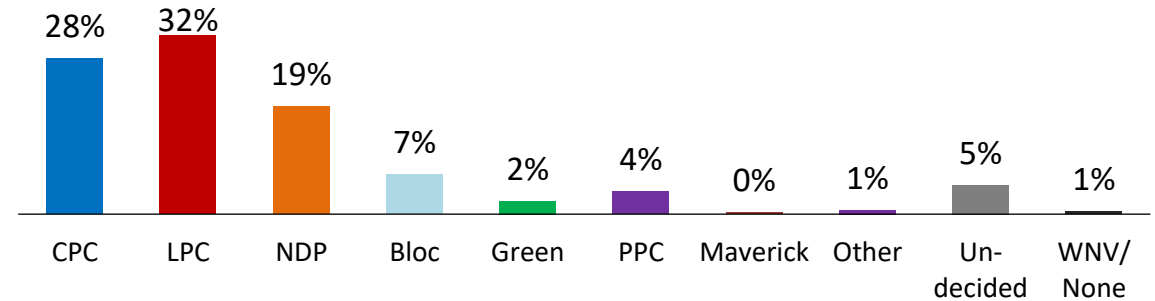

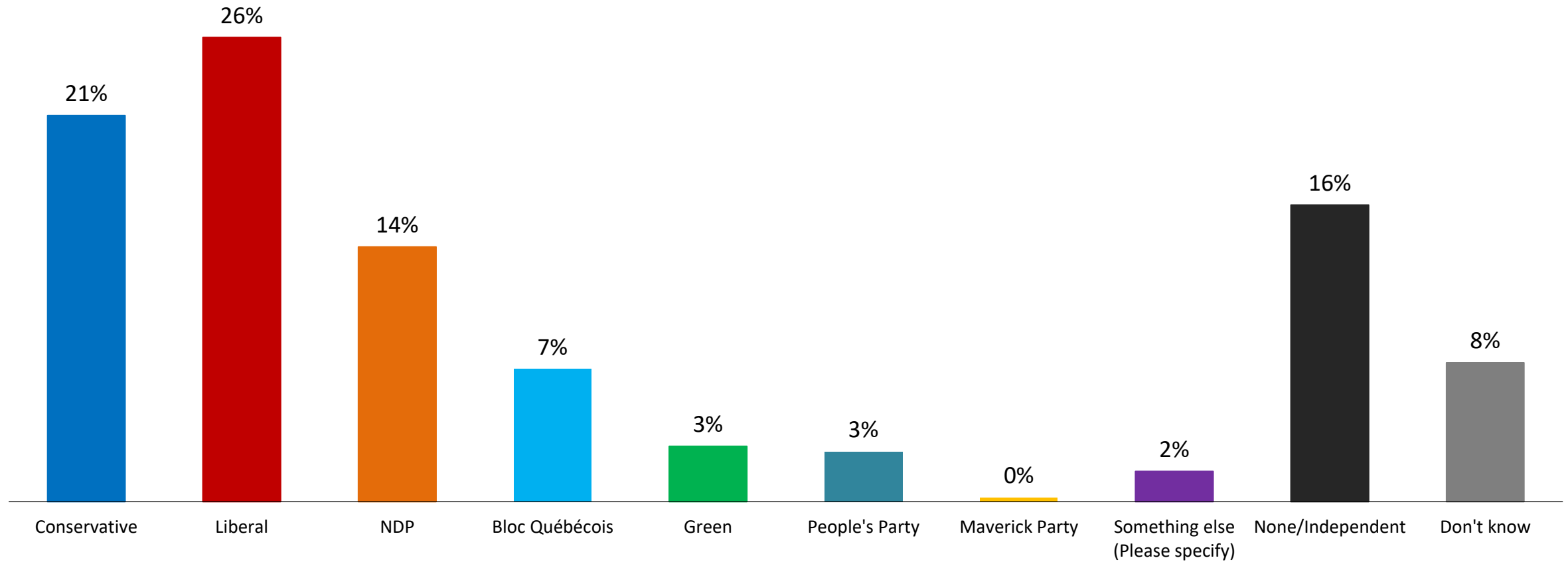

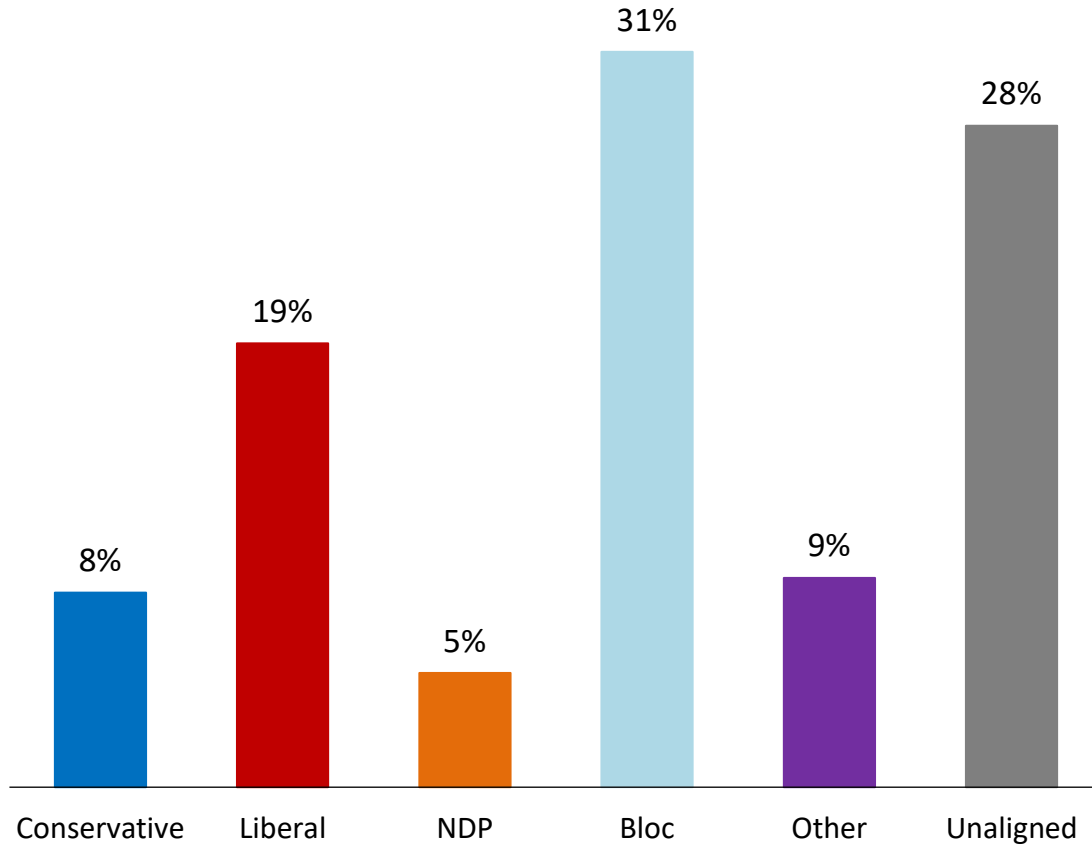

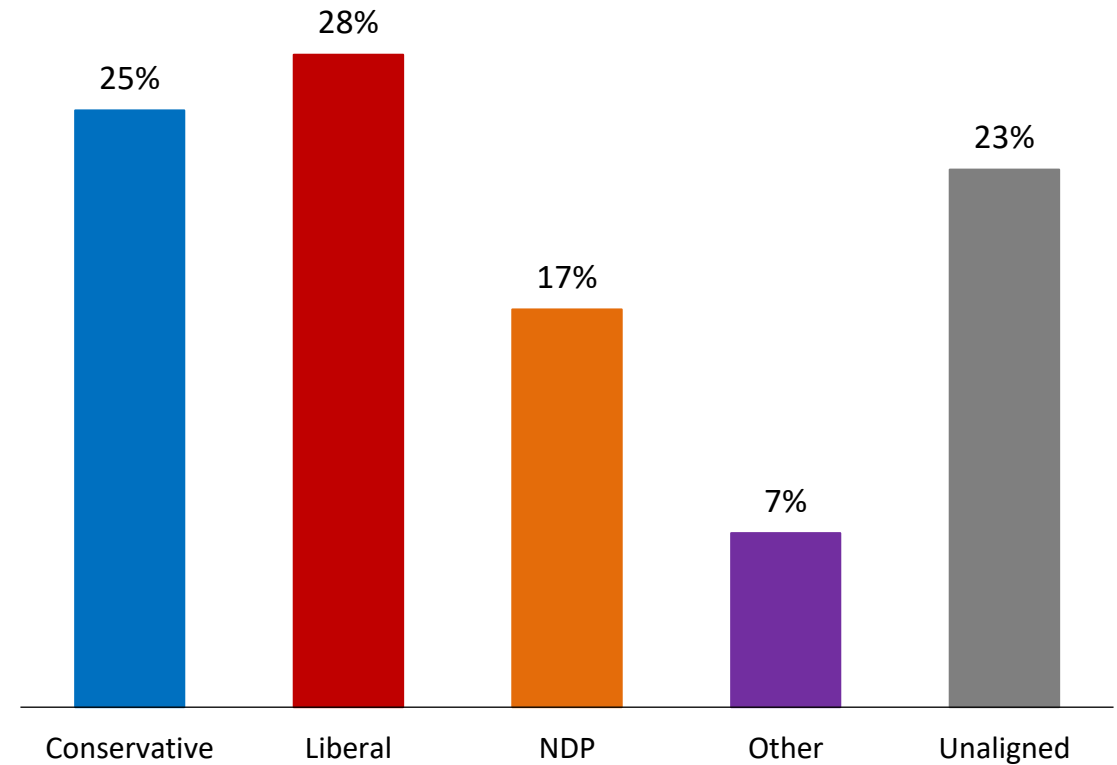

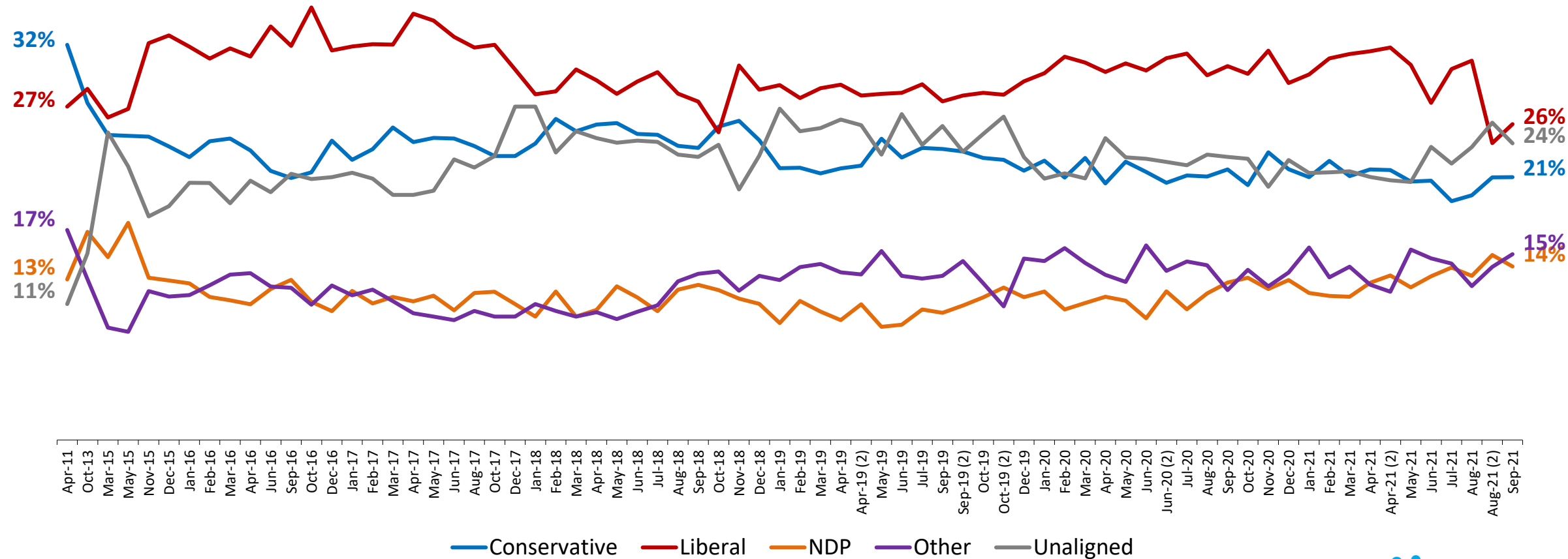

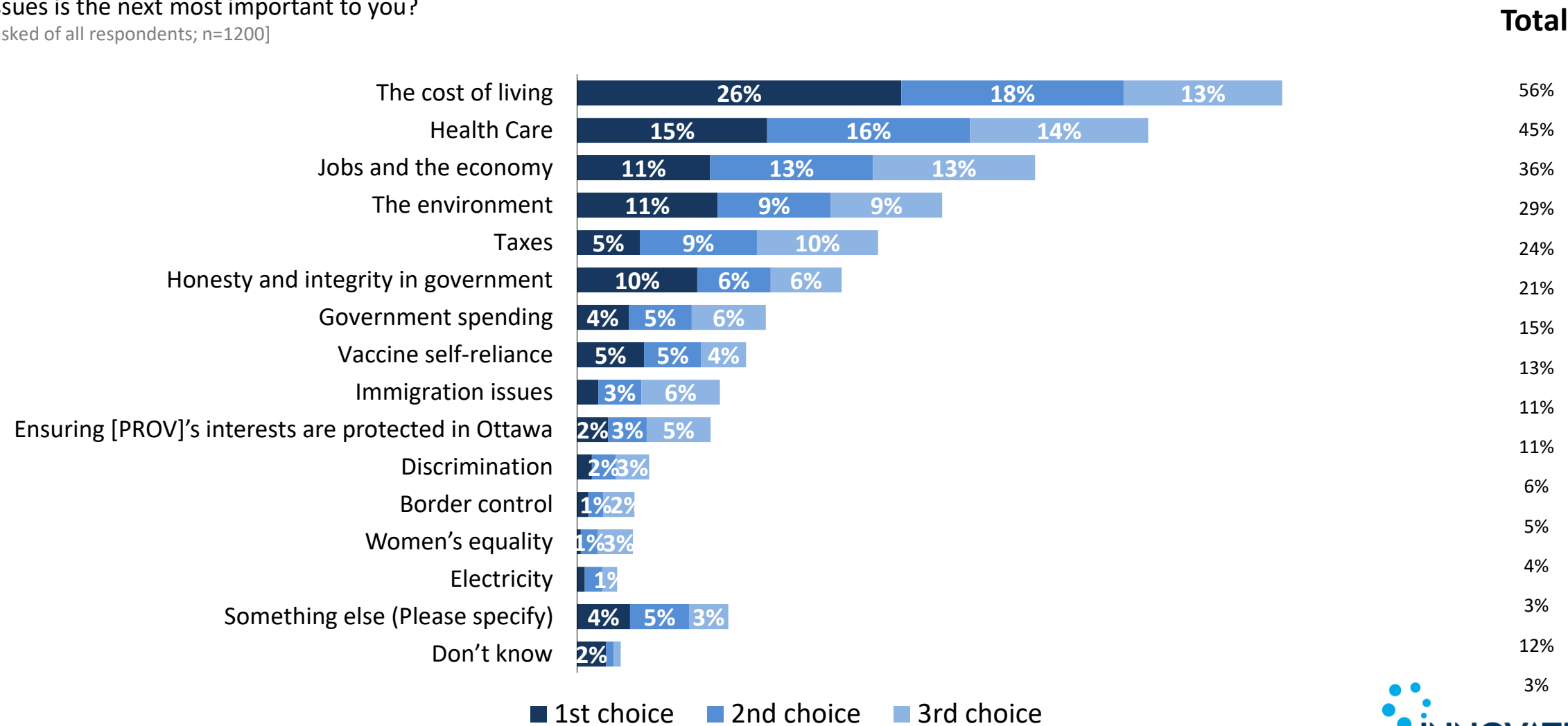

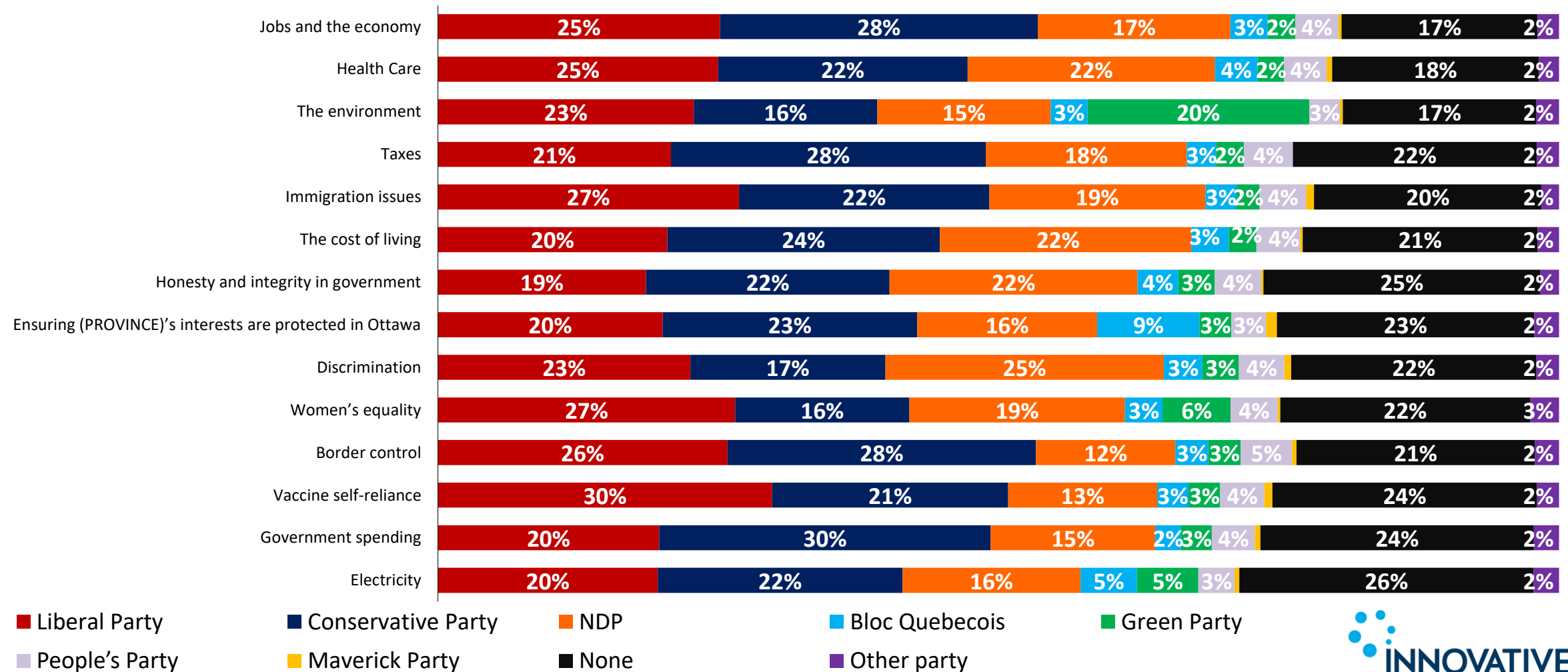

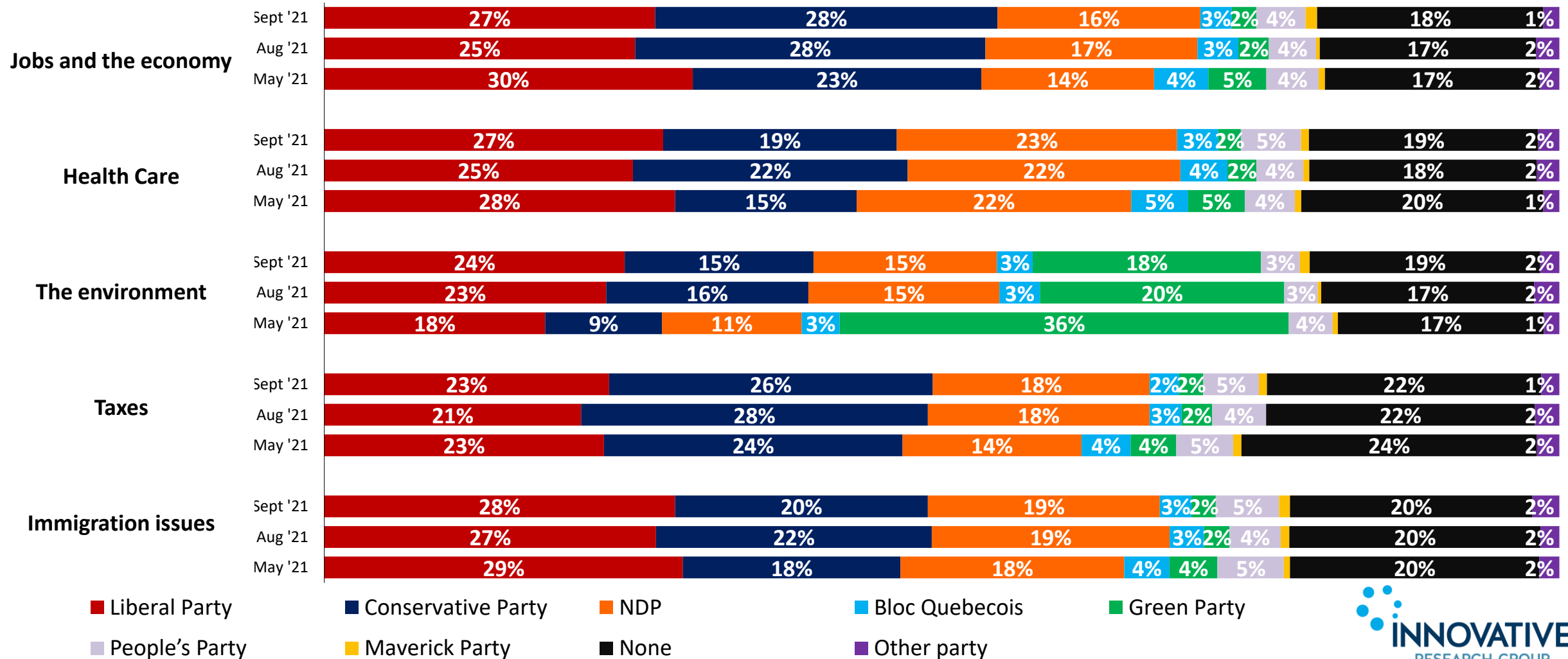

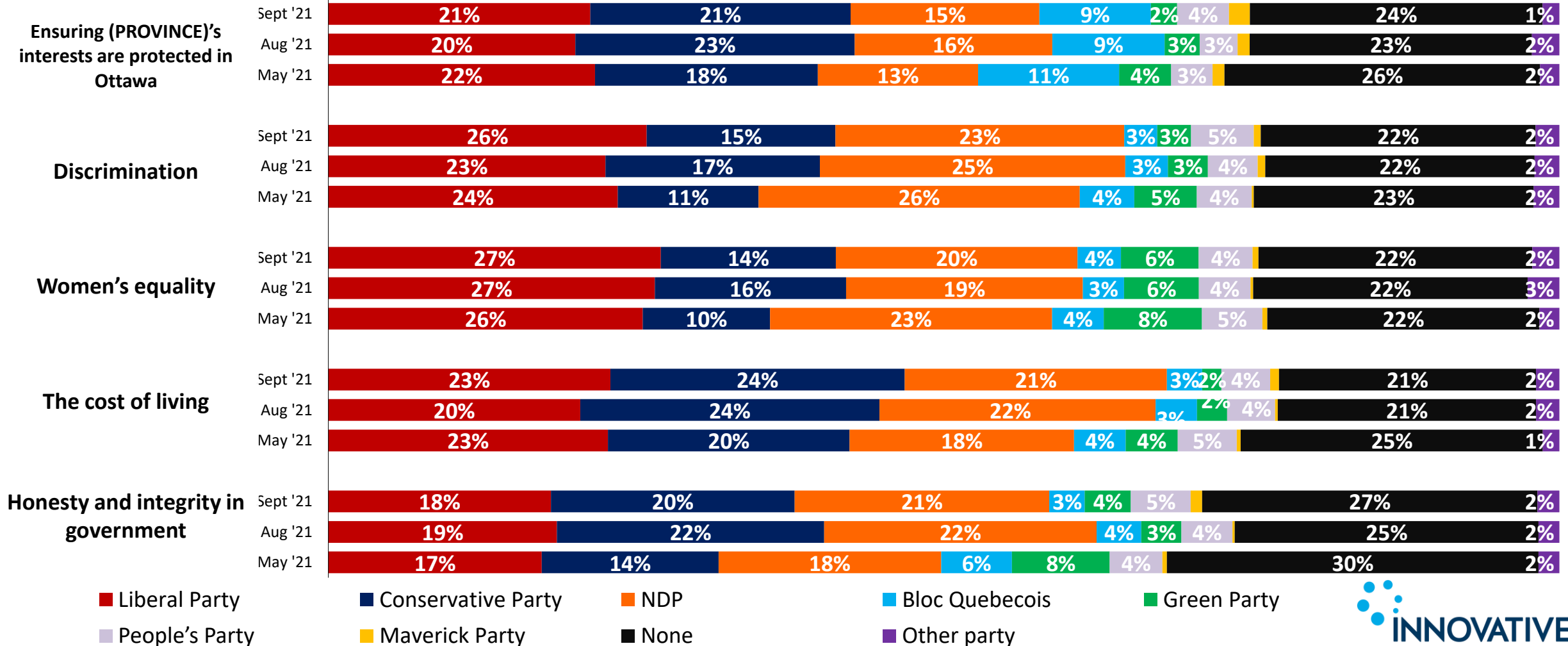

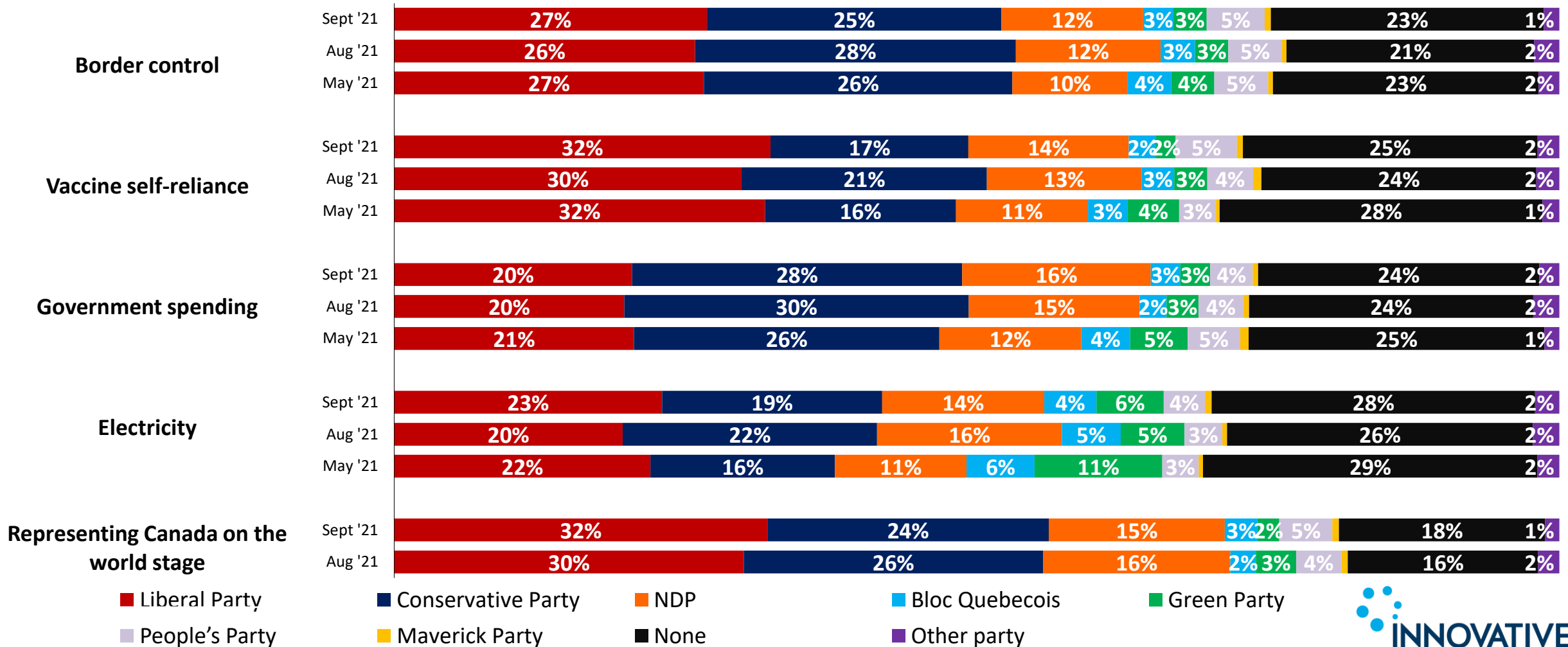

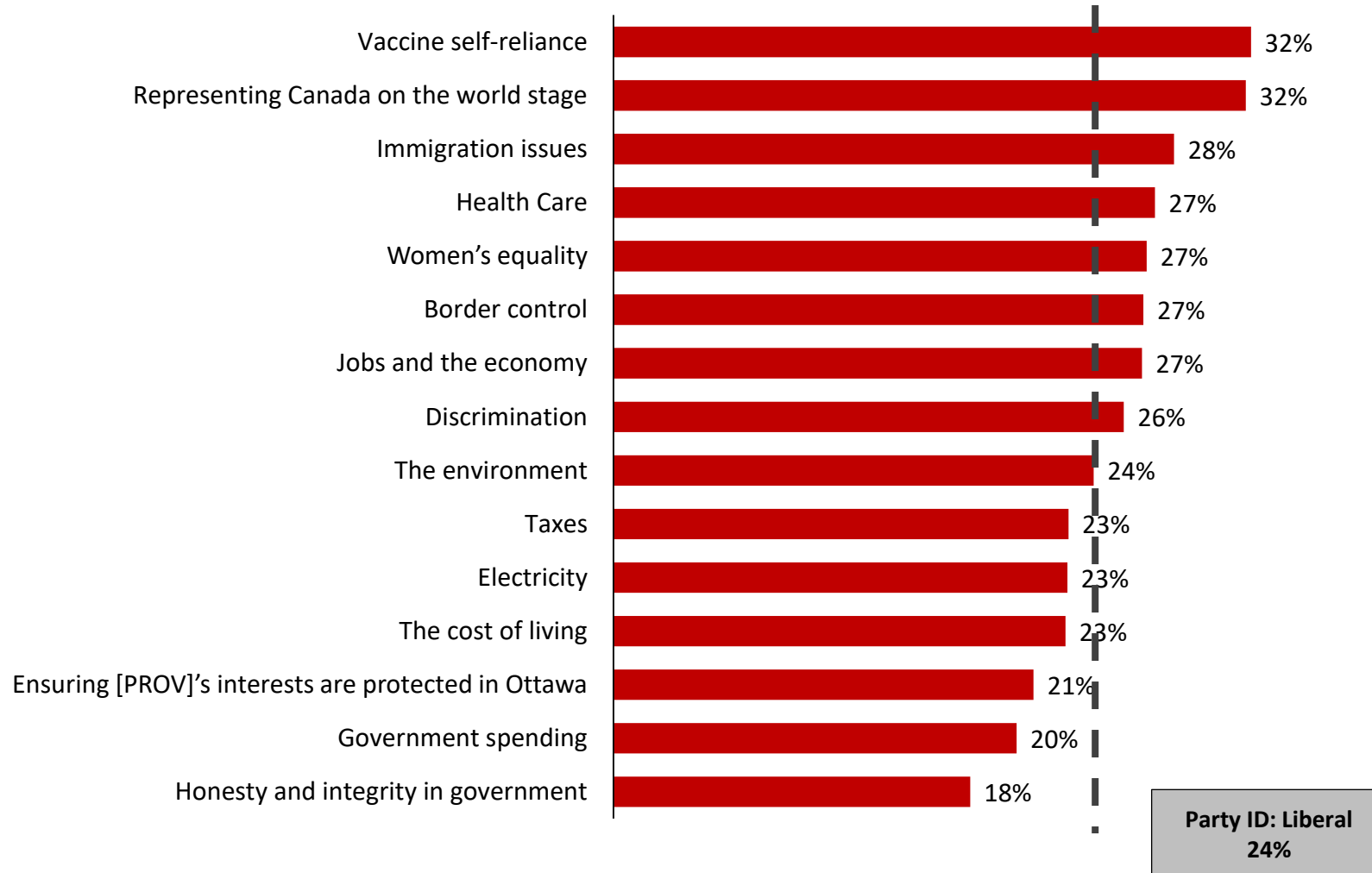

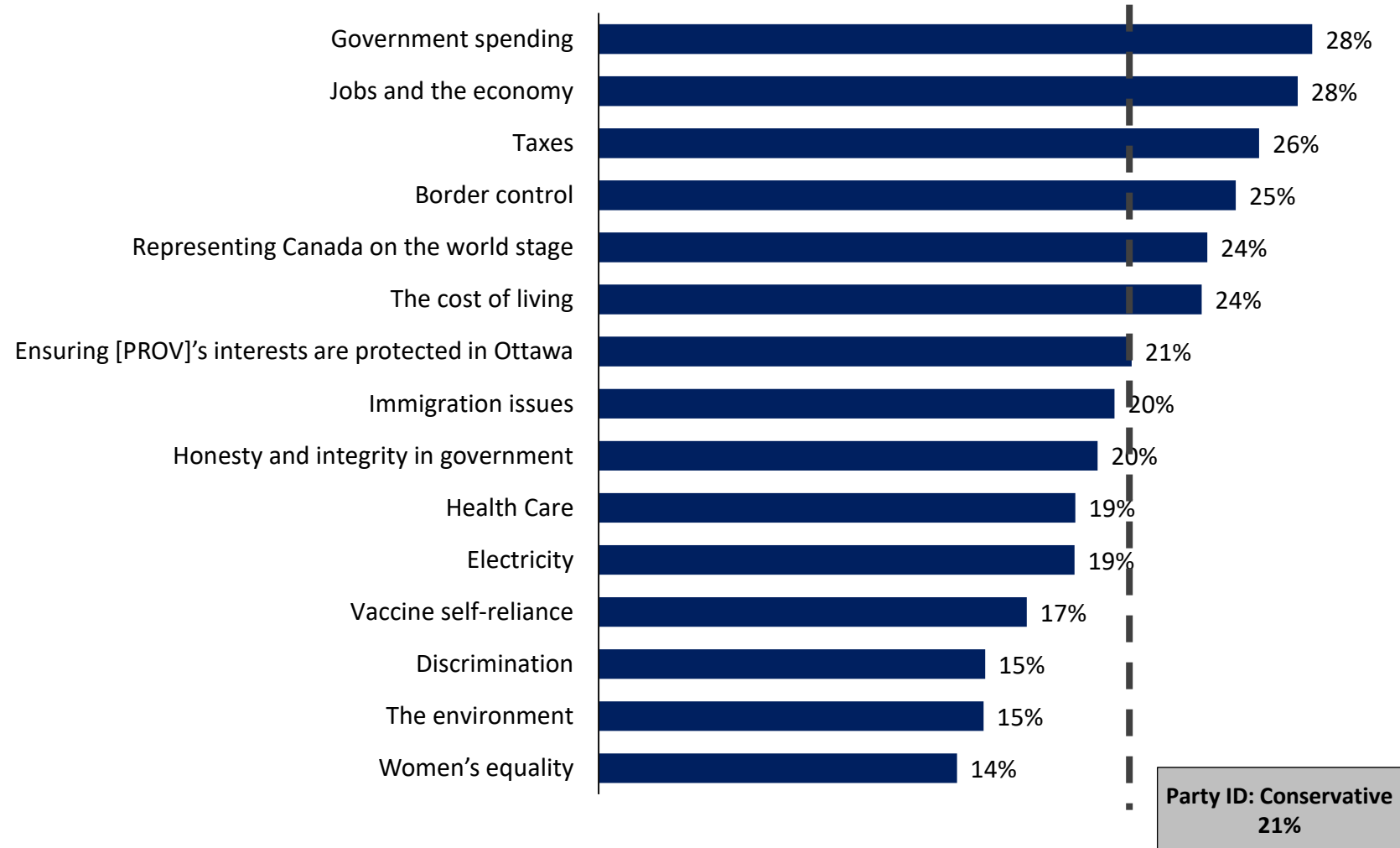

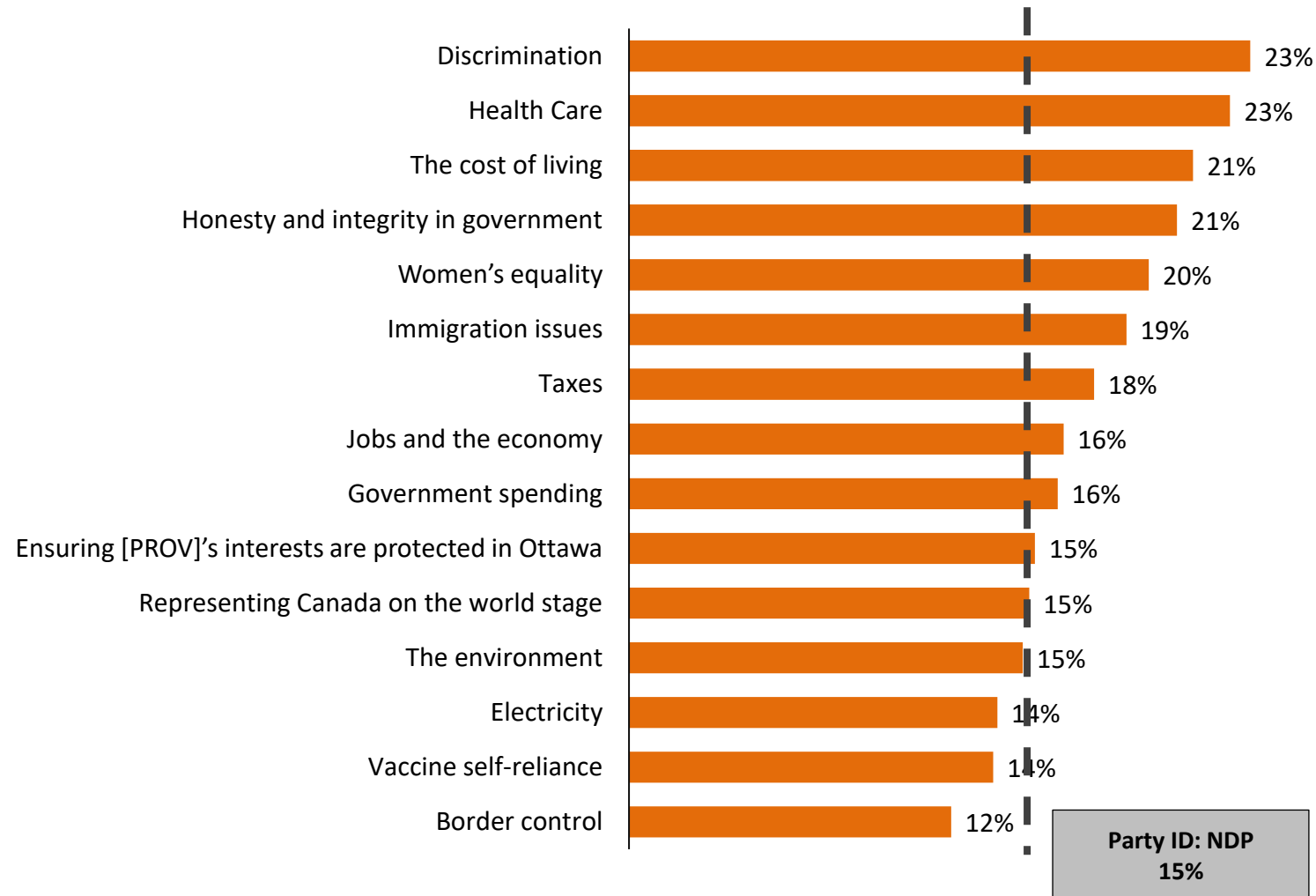

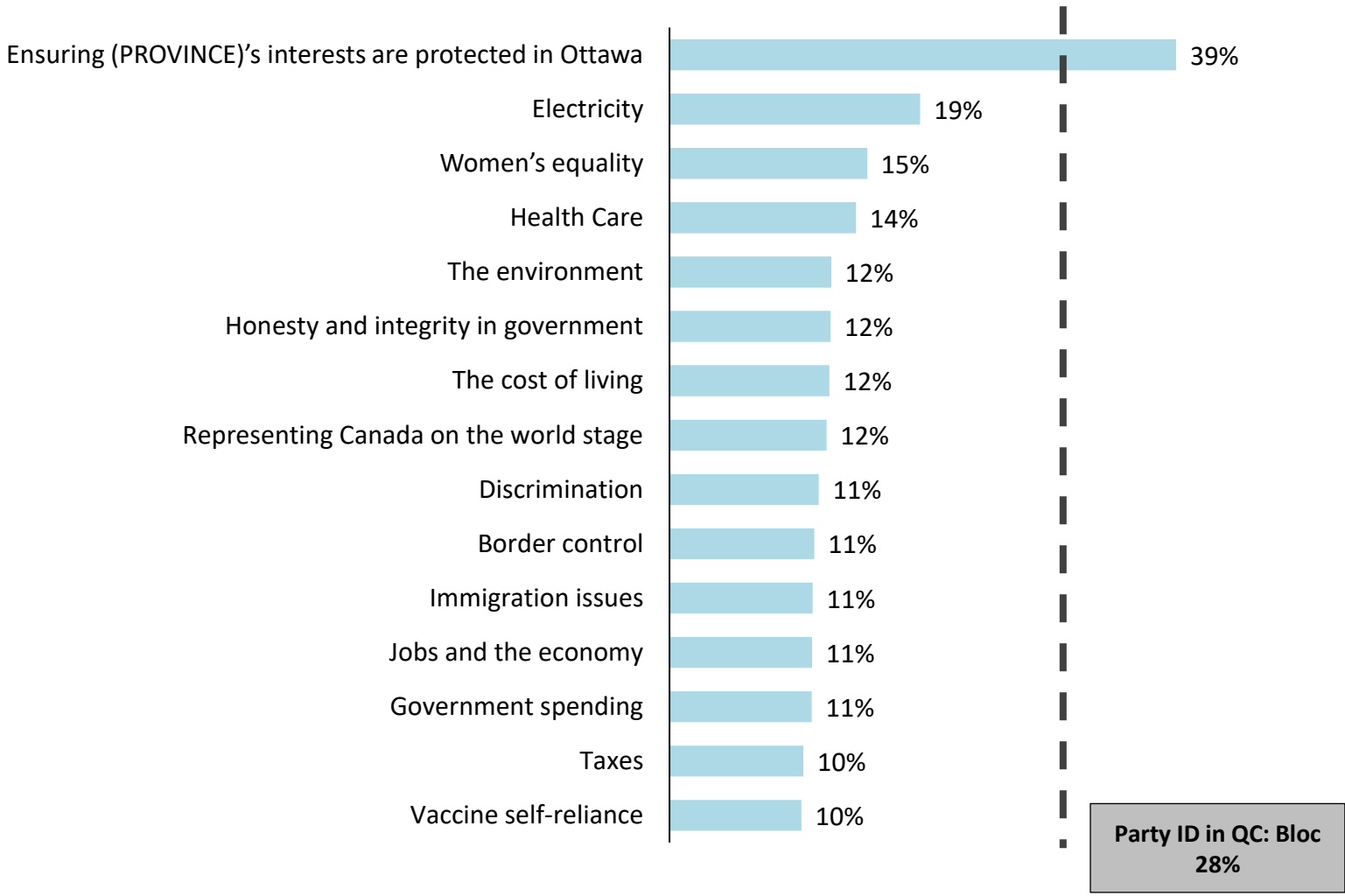

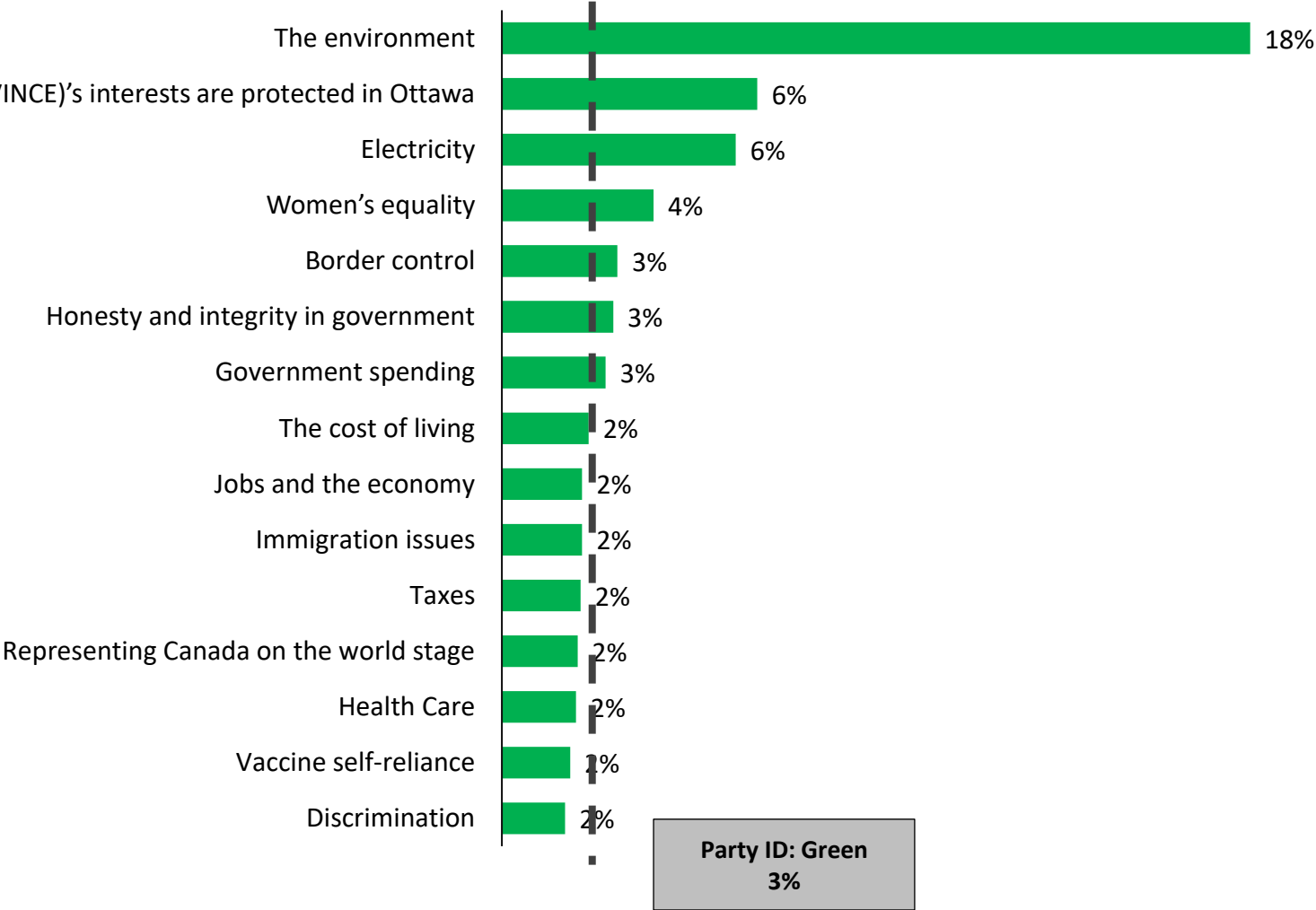

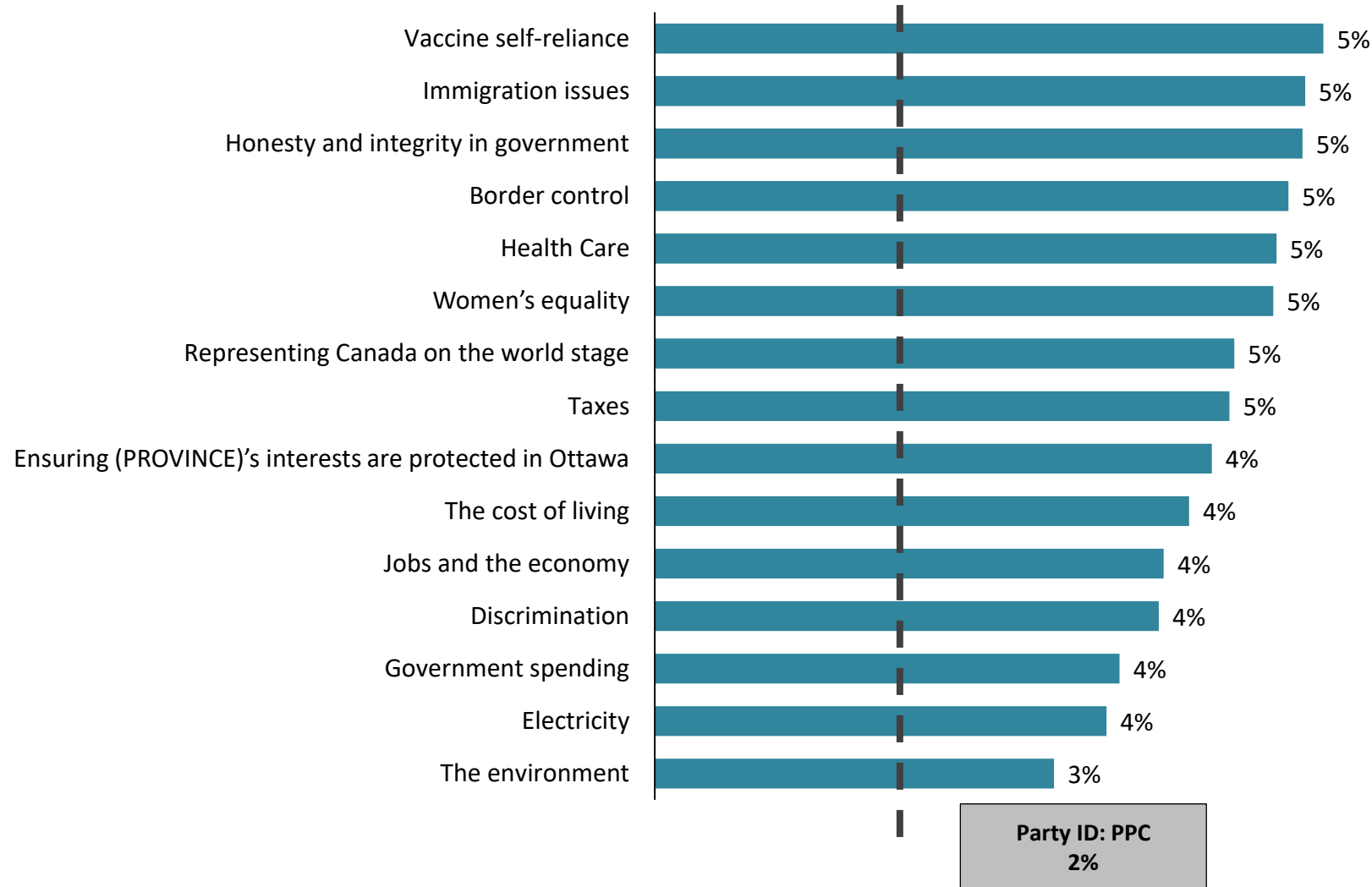

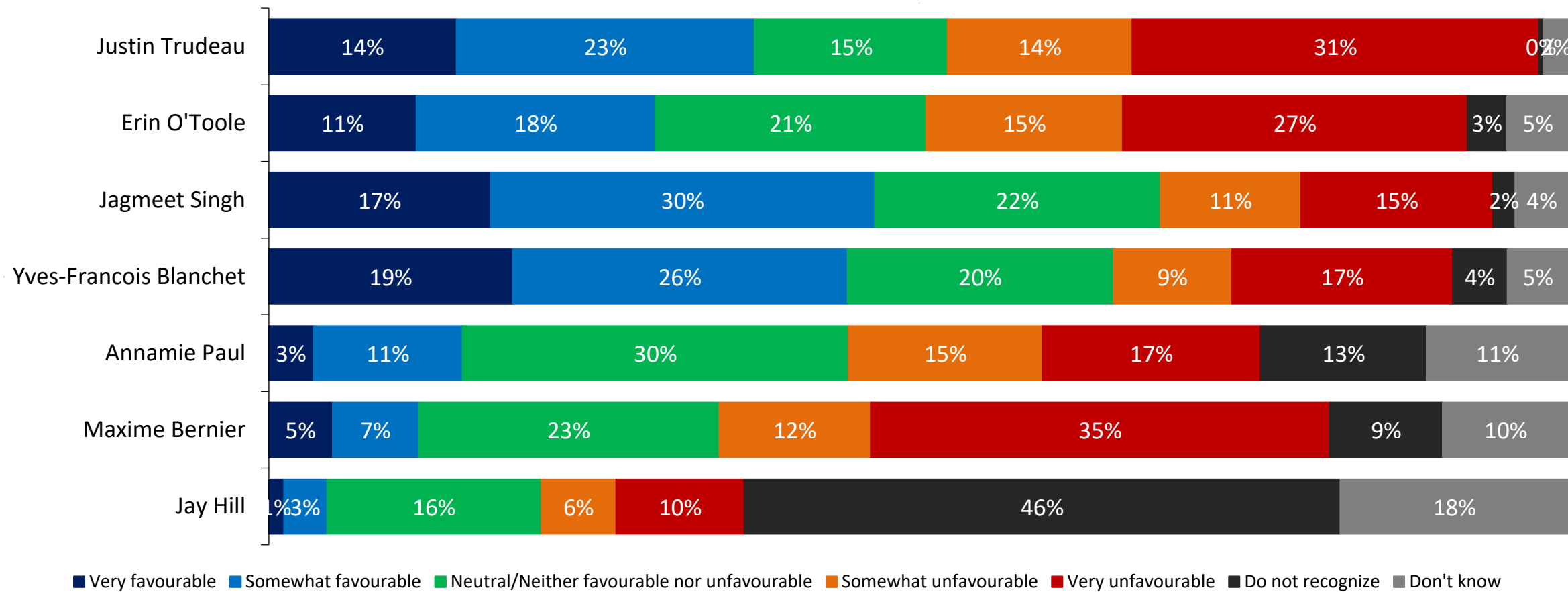

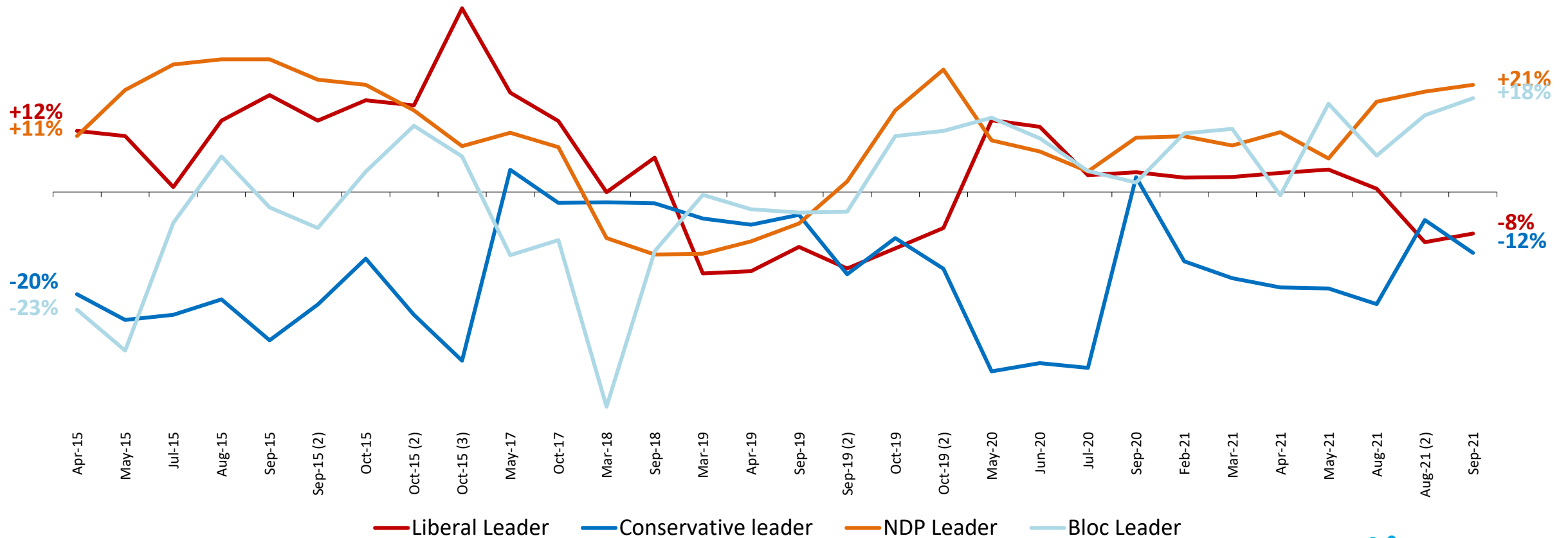

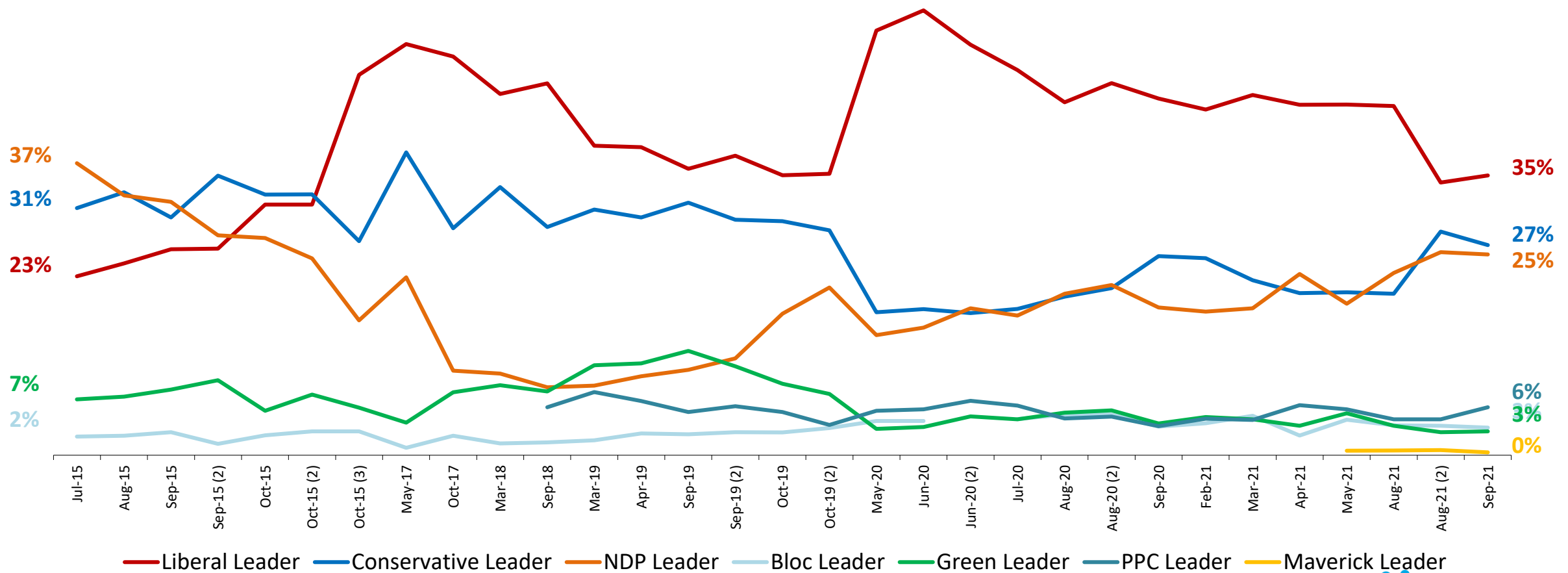

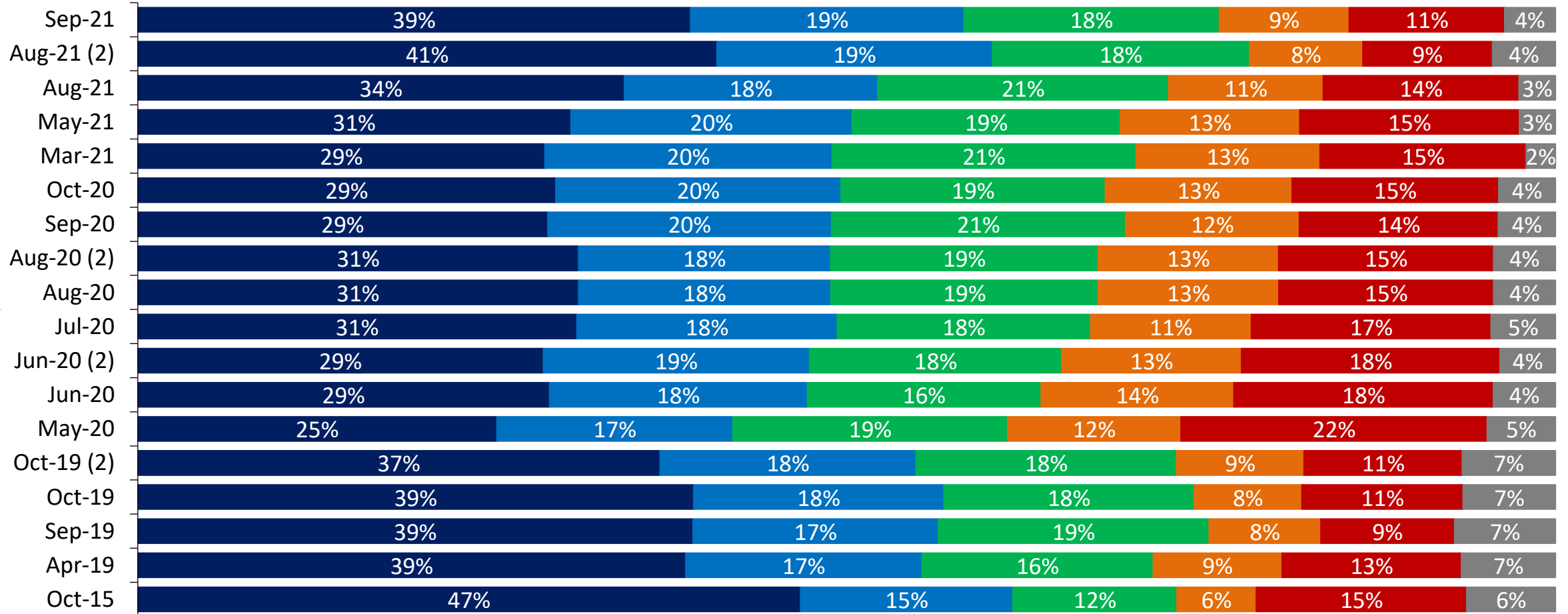

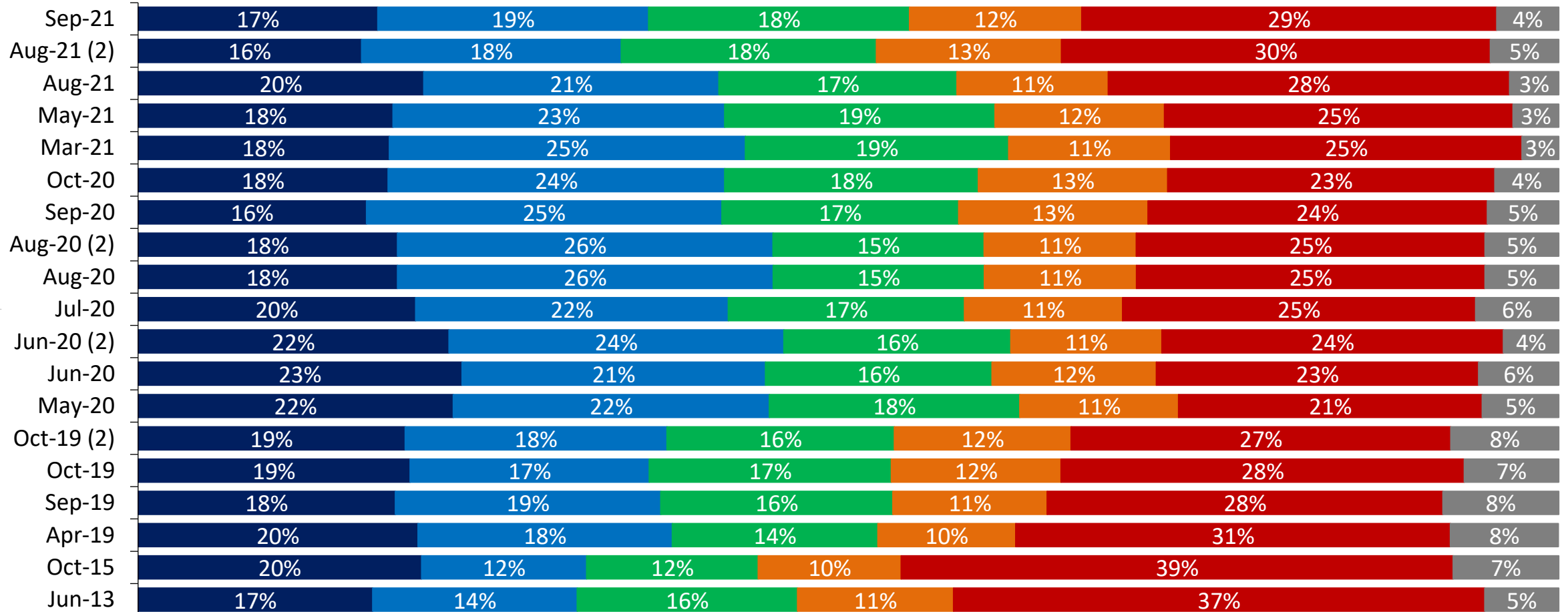

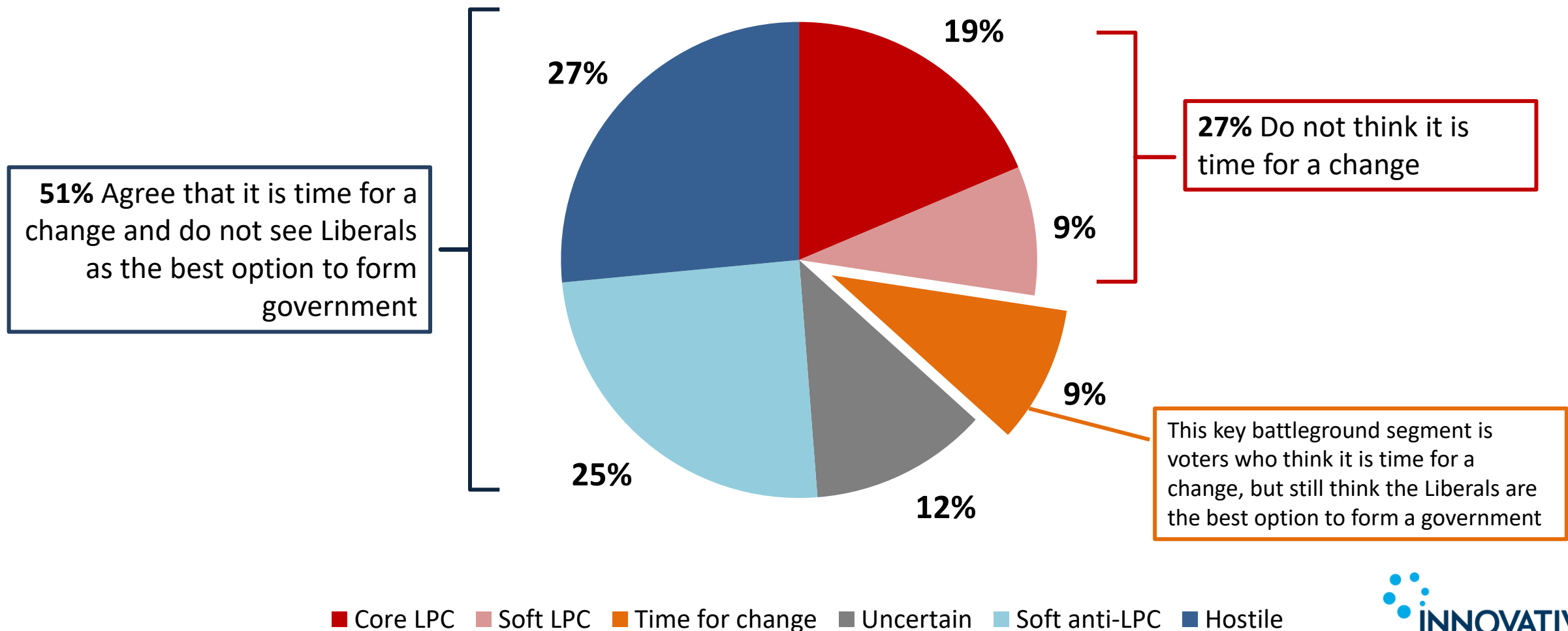

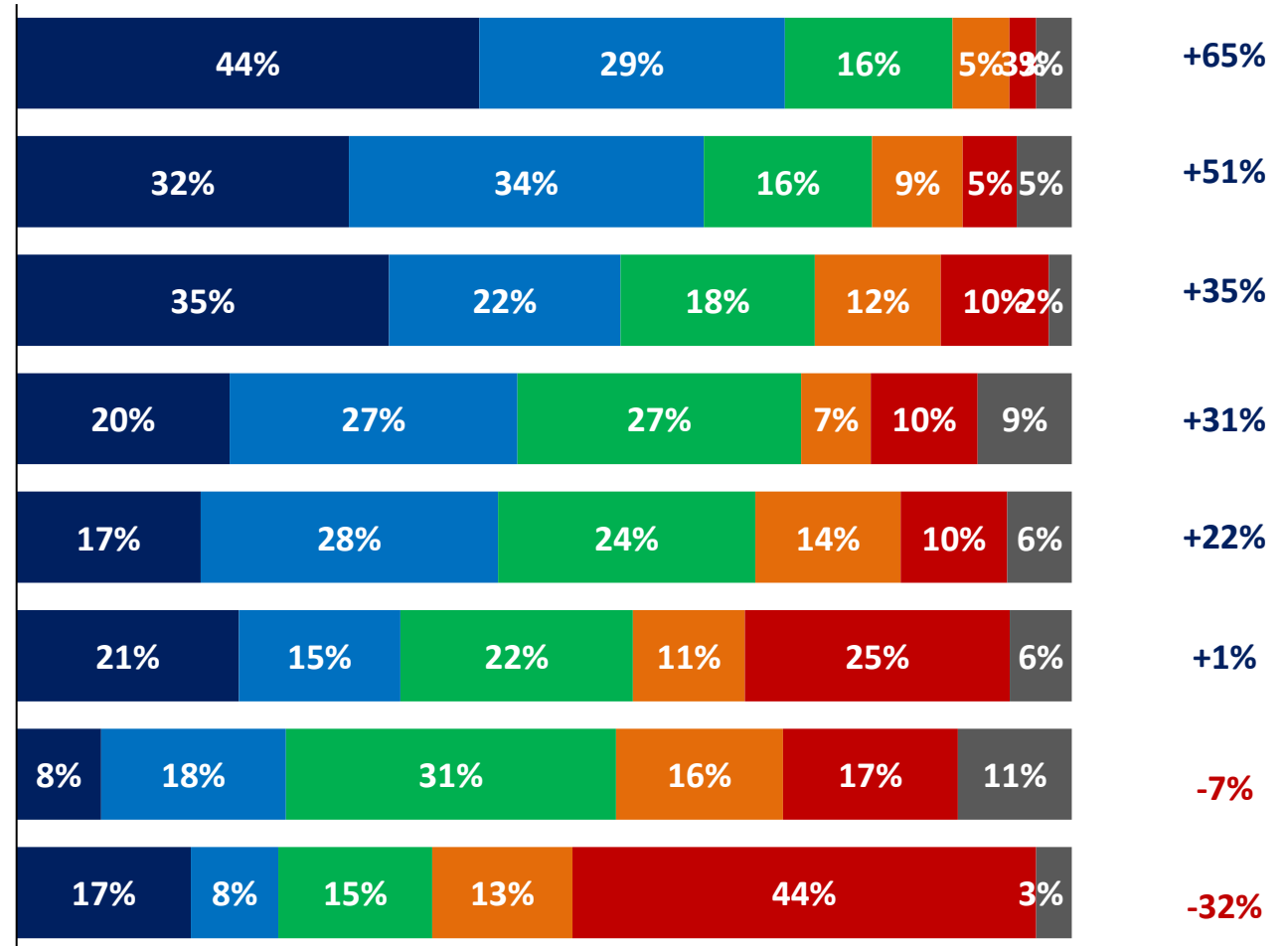

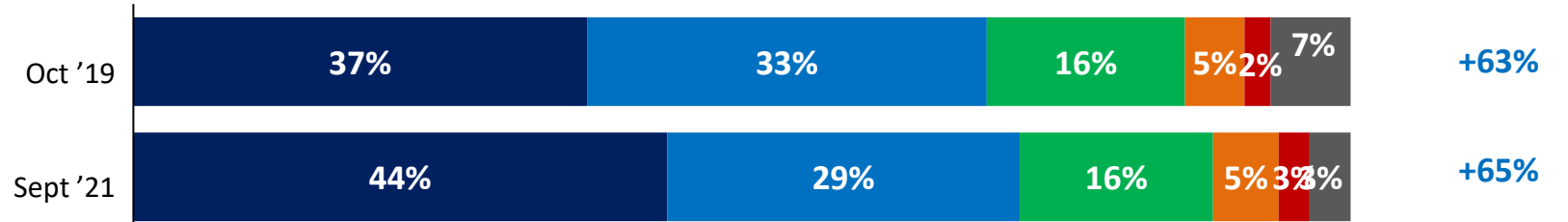

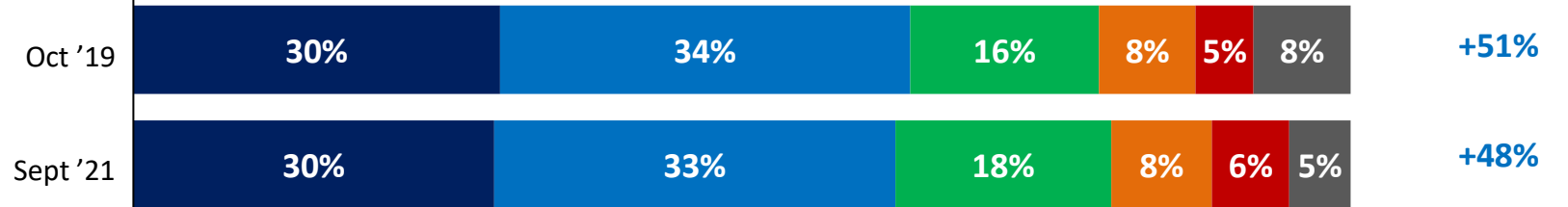

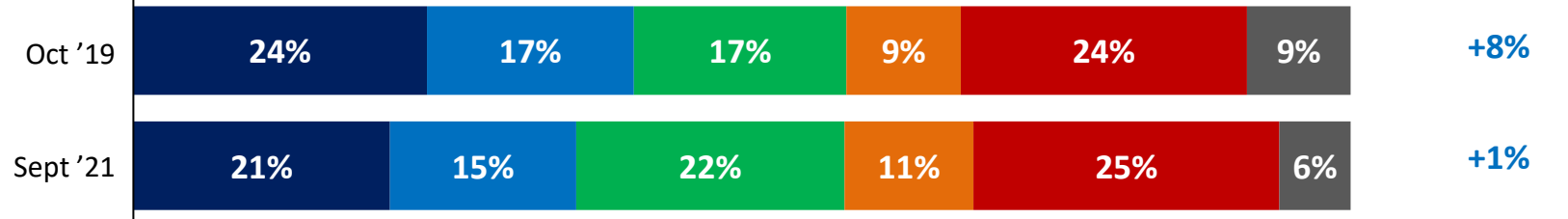

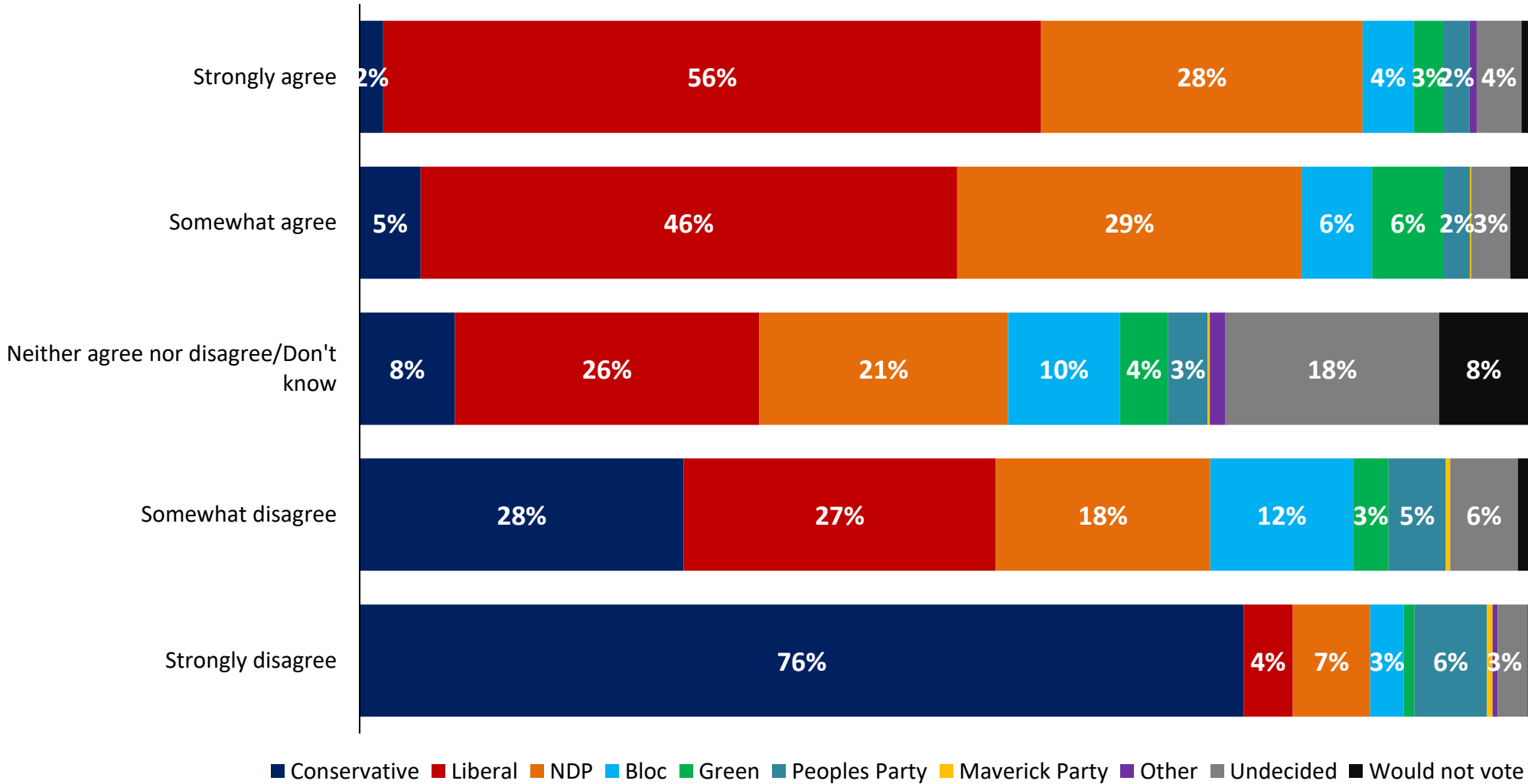

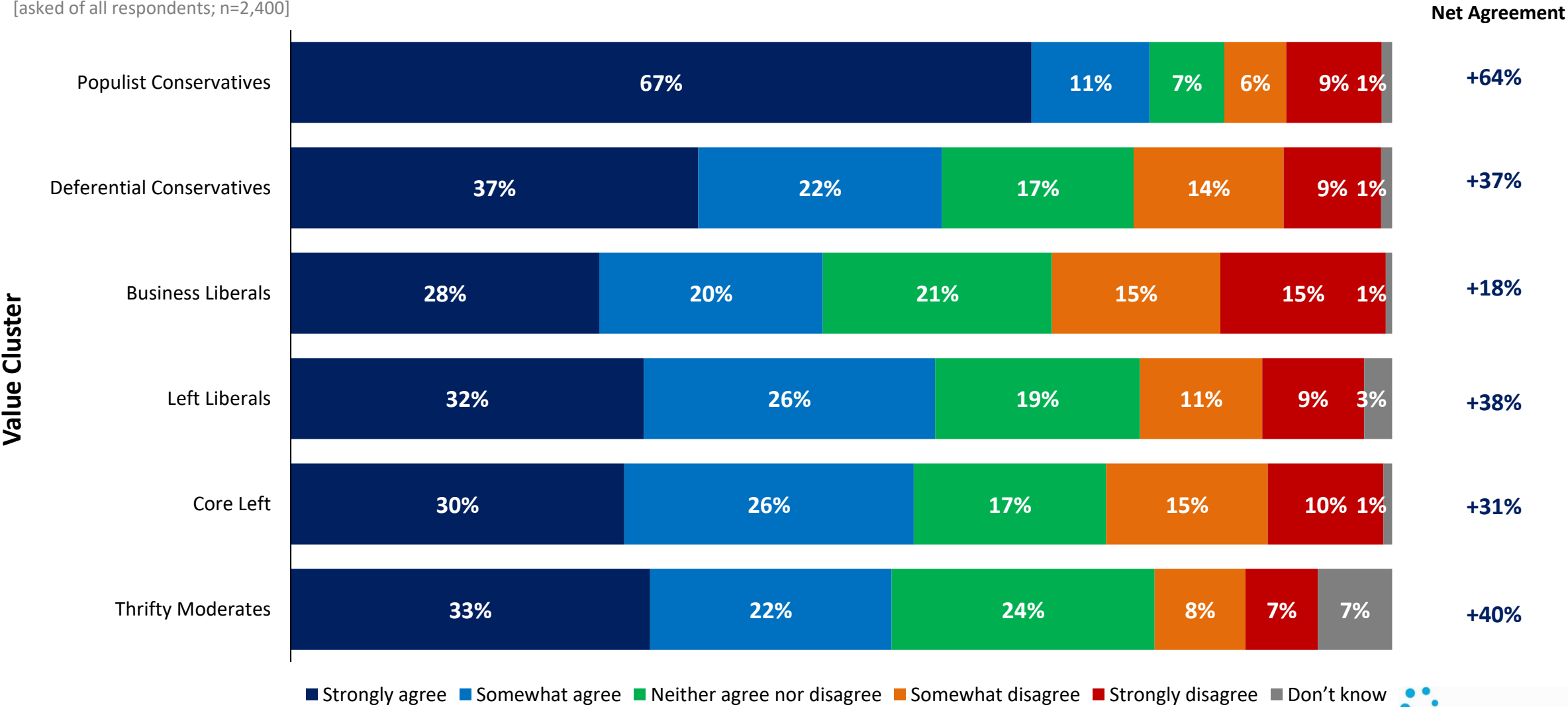

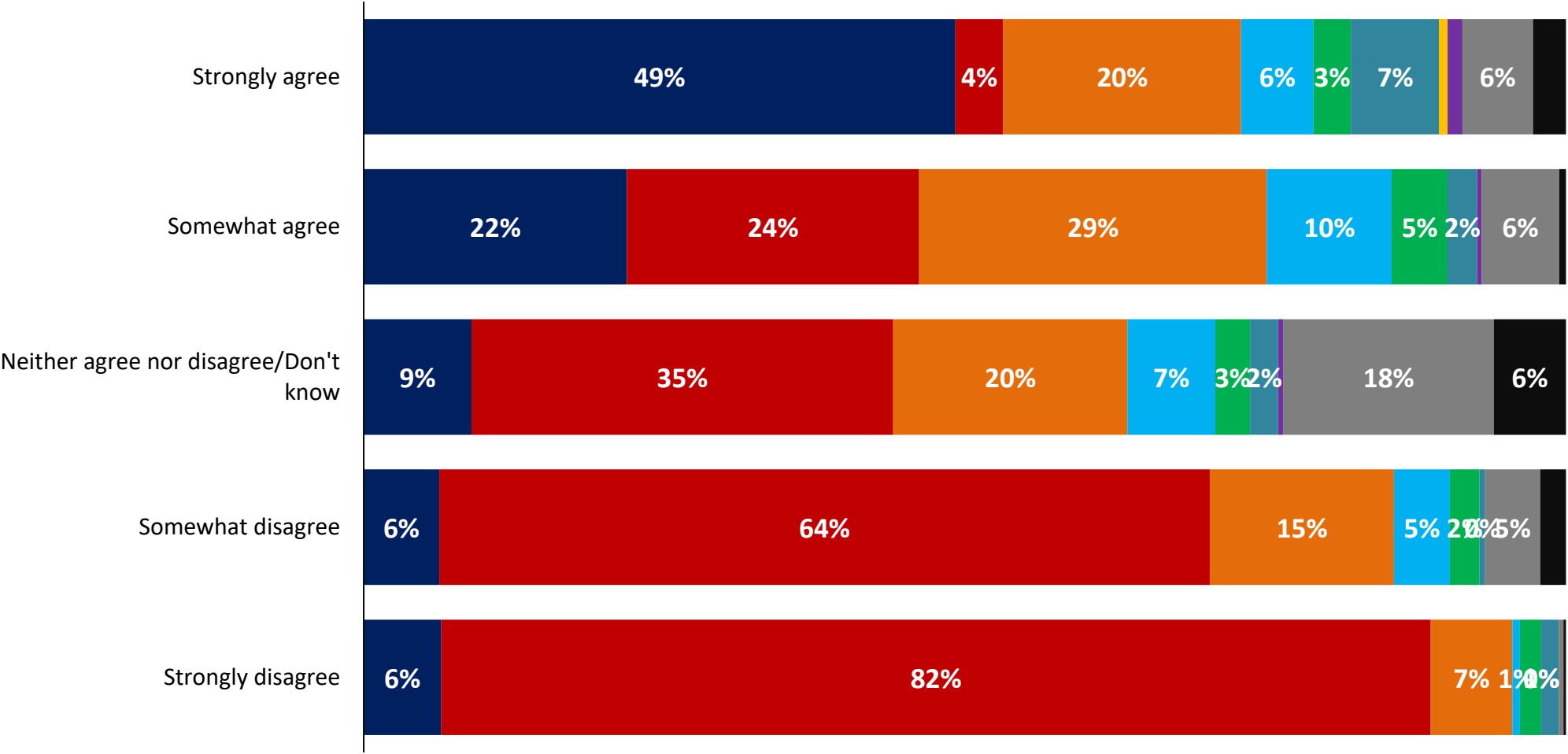

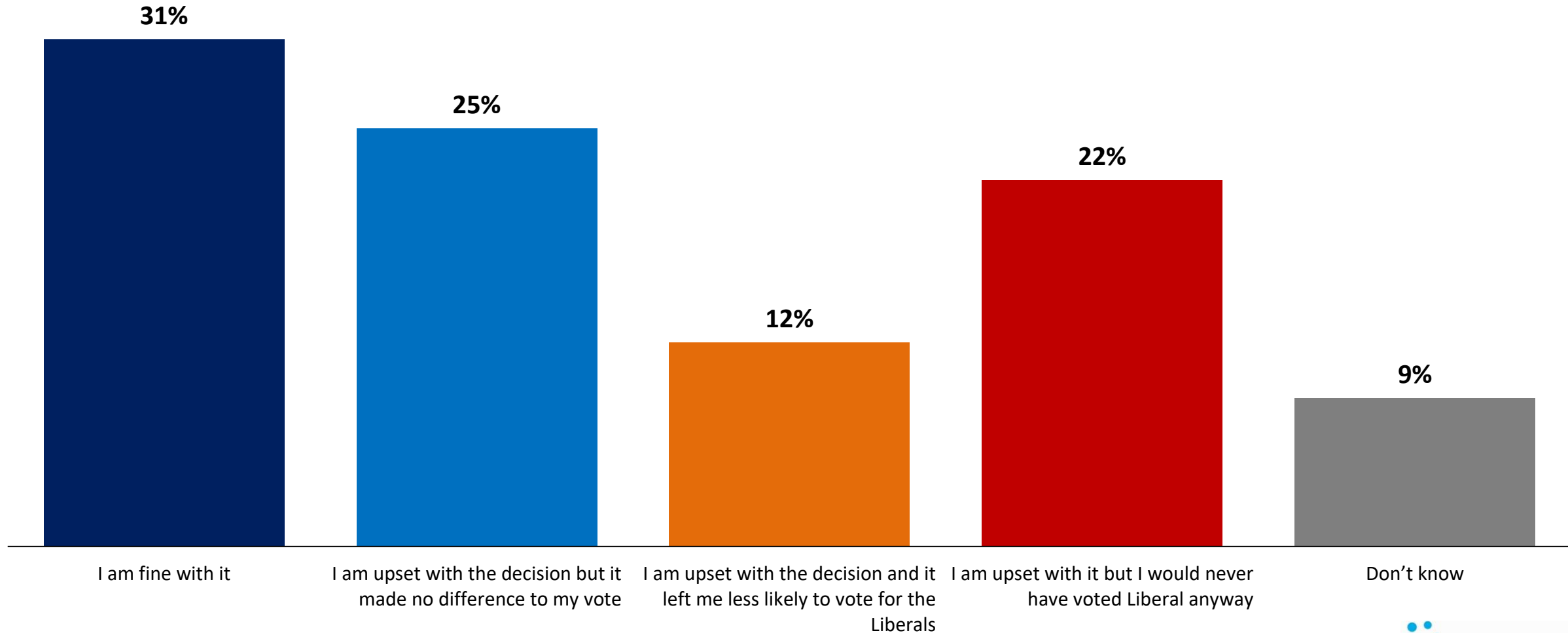

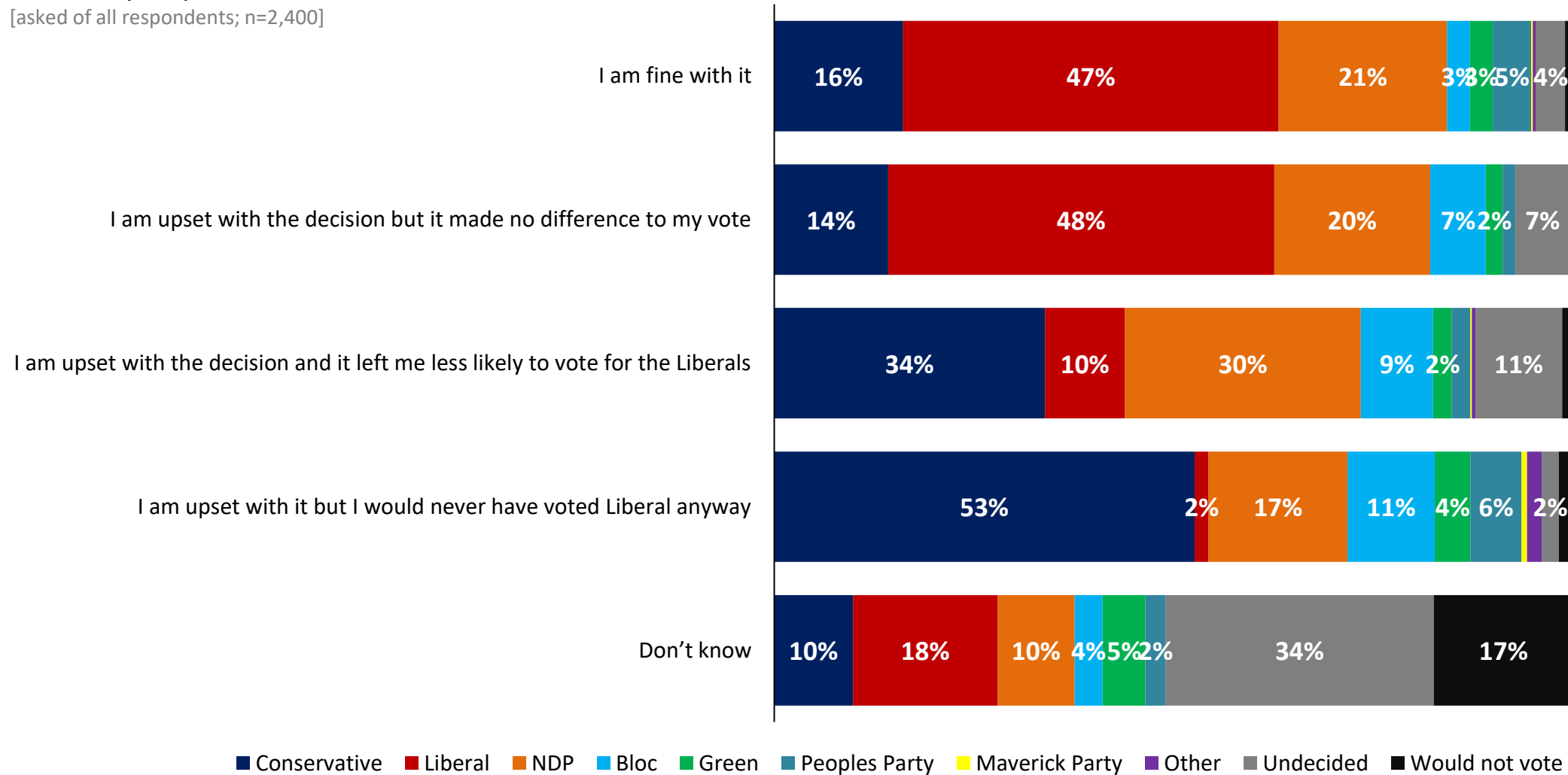

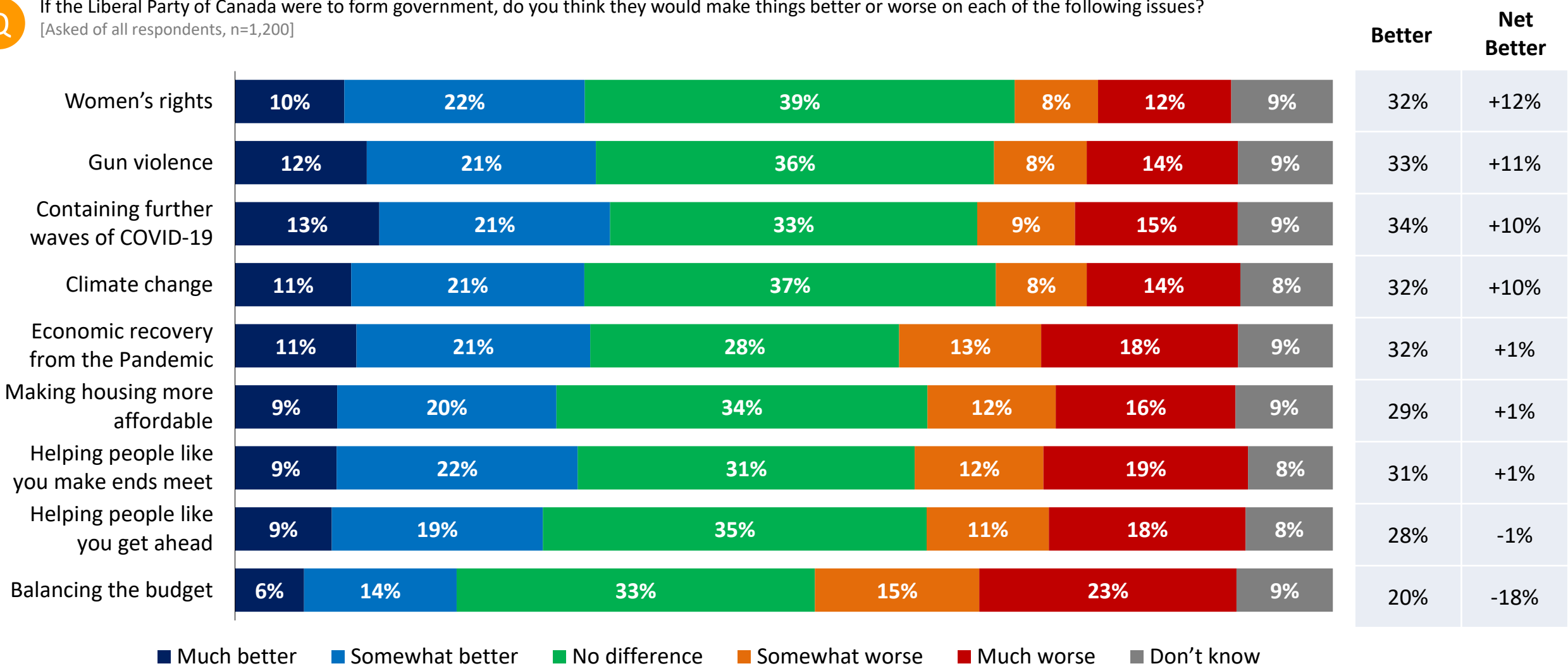

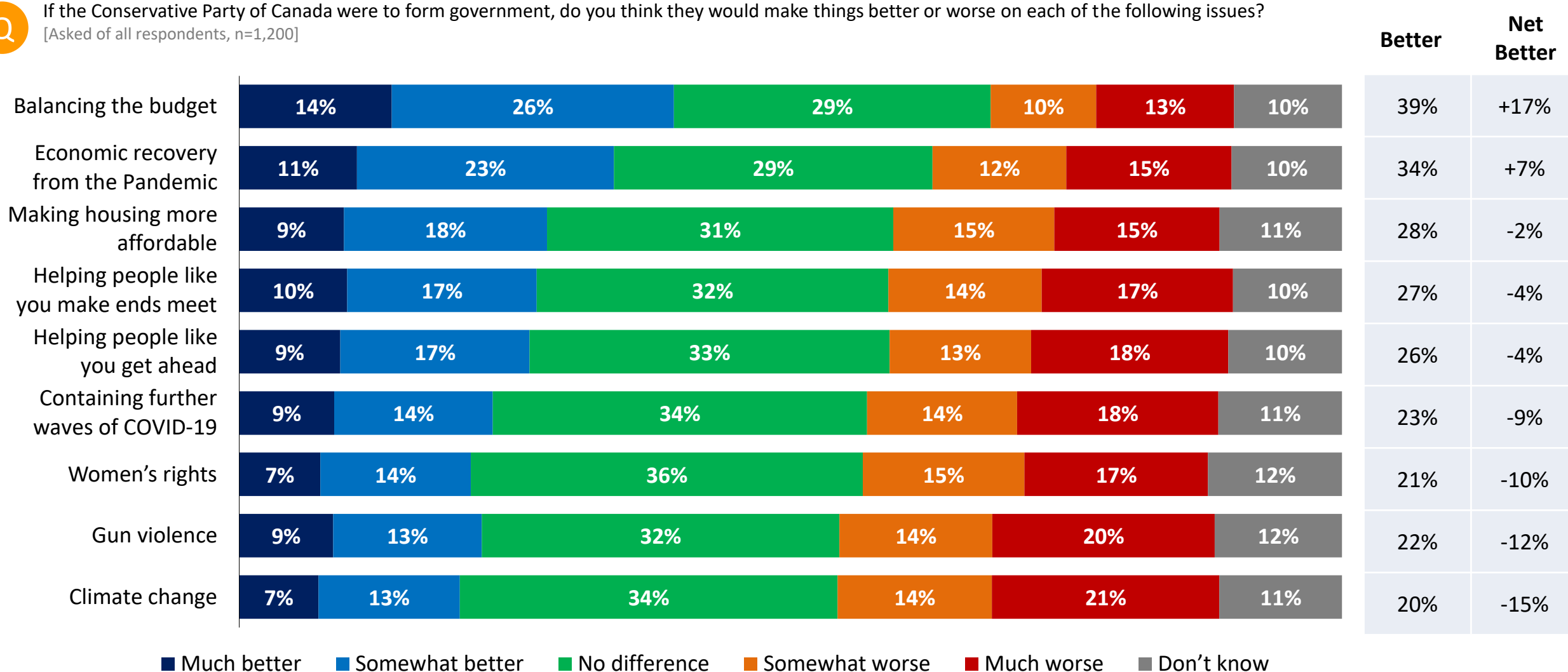

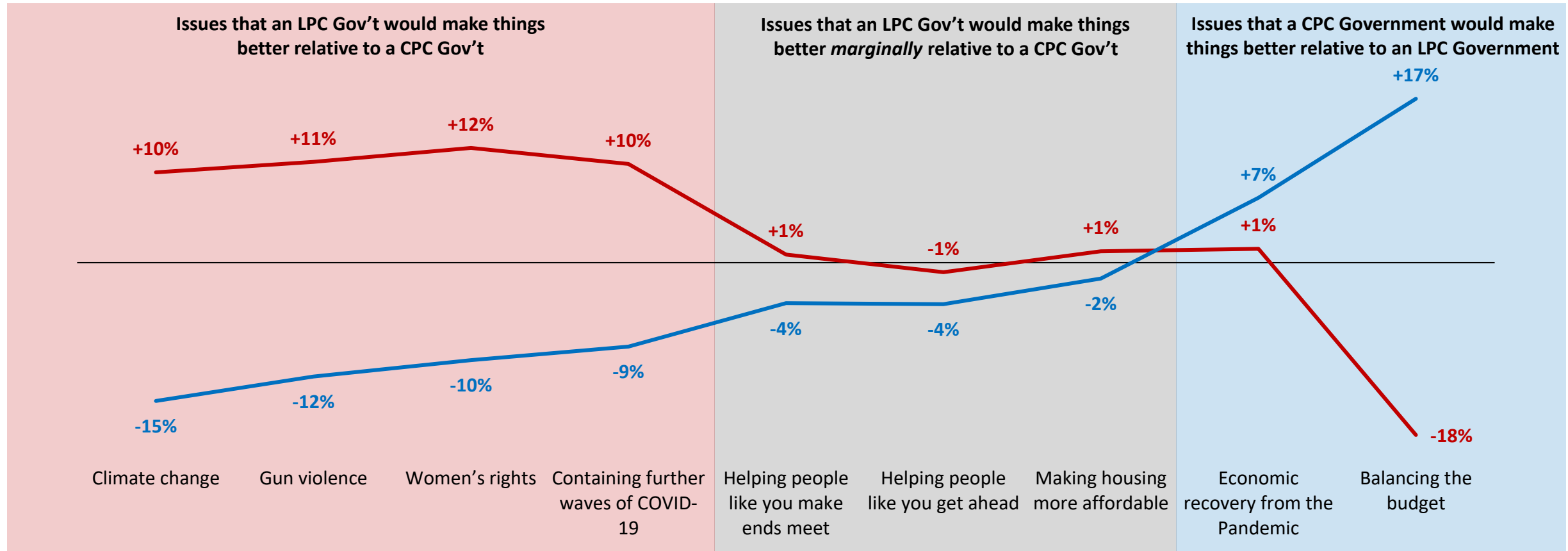

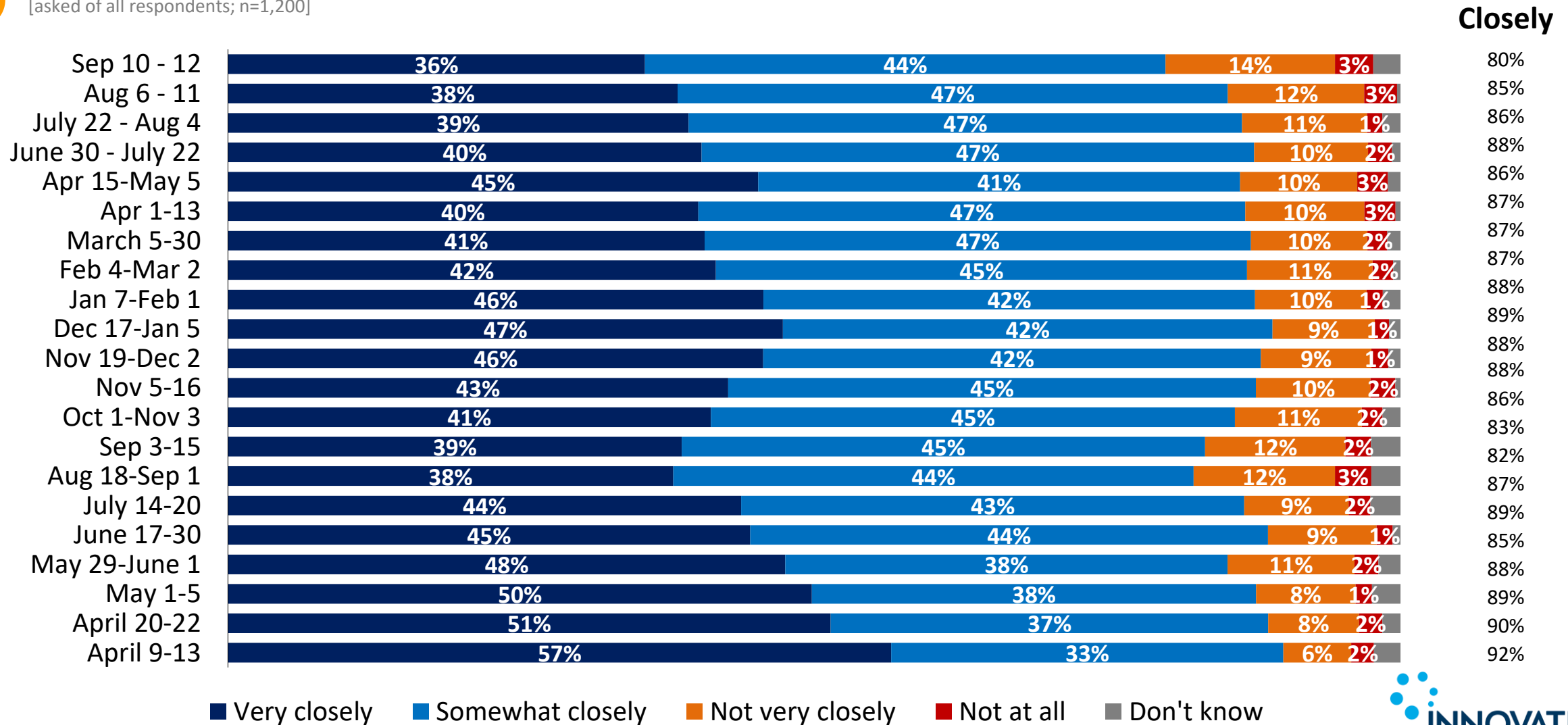

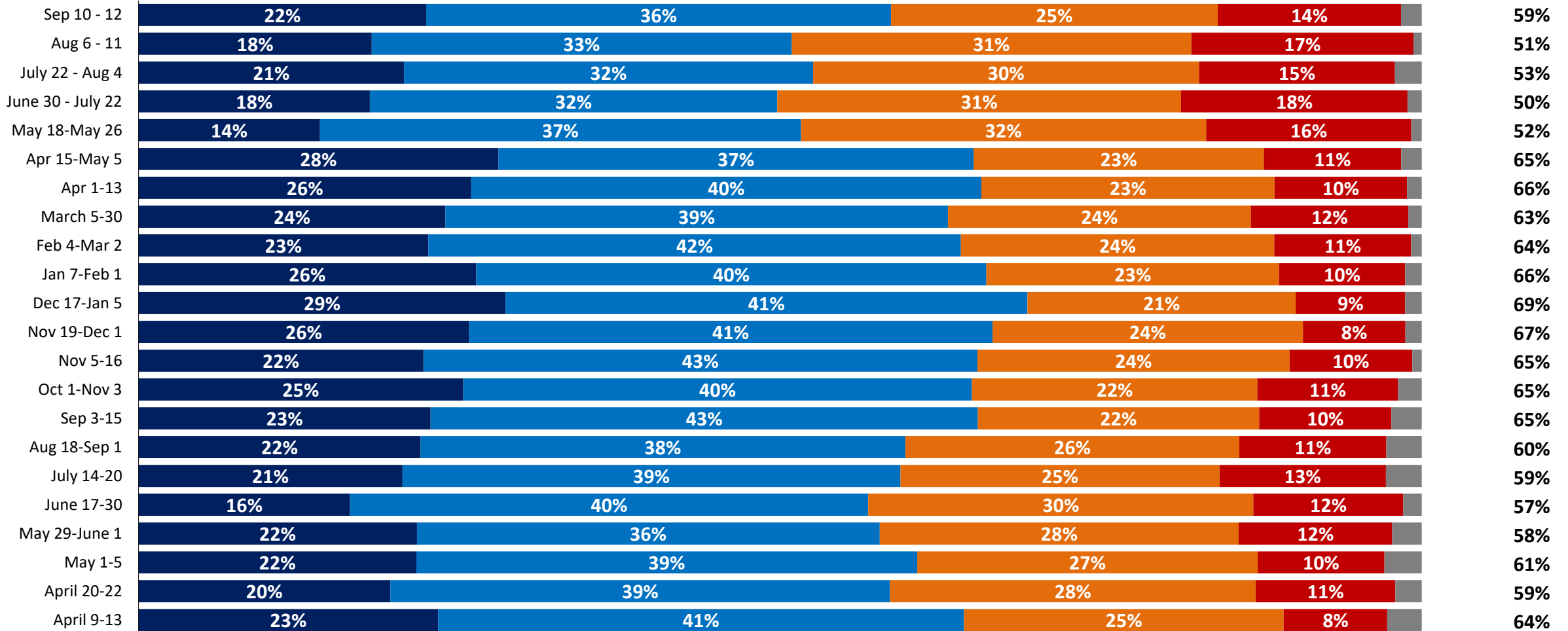

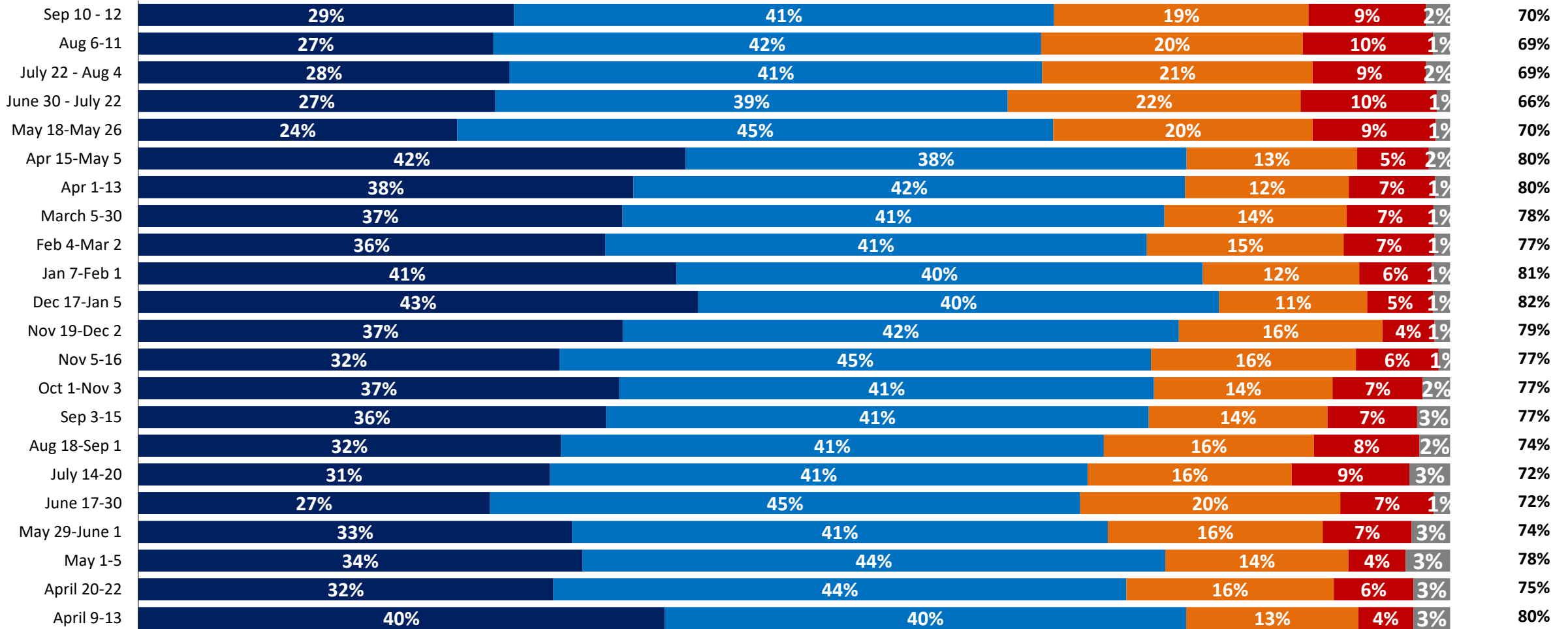

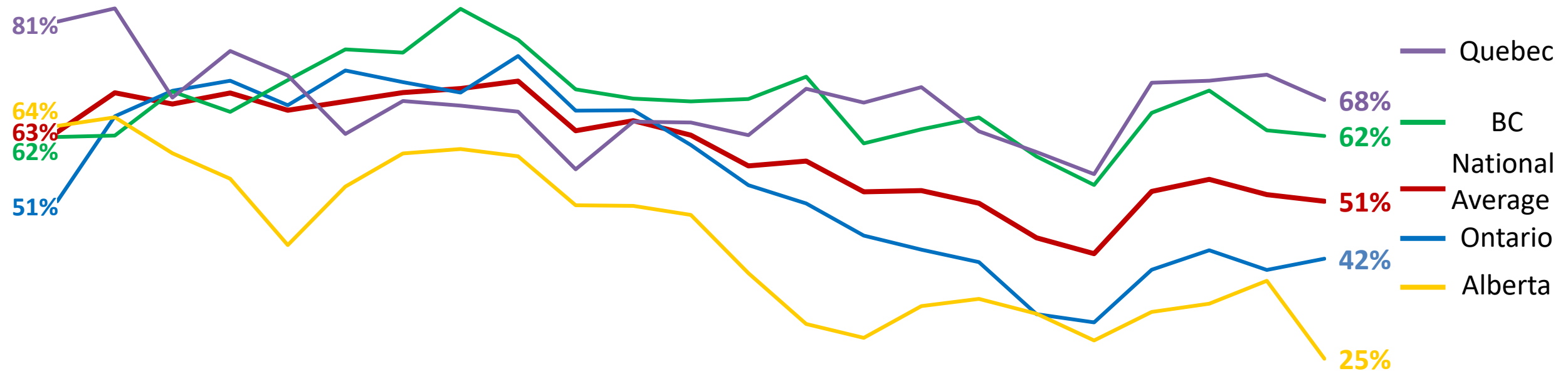
COVID-19 Provincial Handling Tracking: Approval of the Alberta government's handling of the Pandemic is down since August

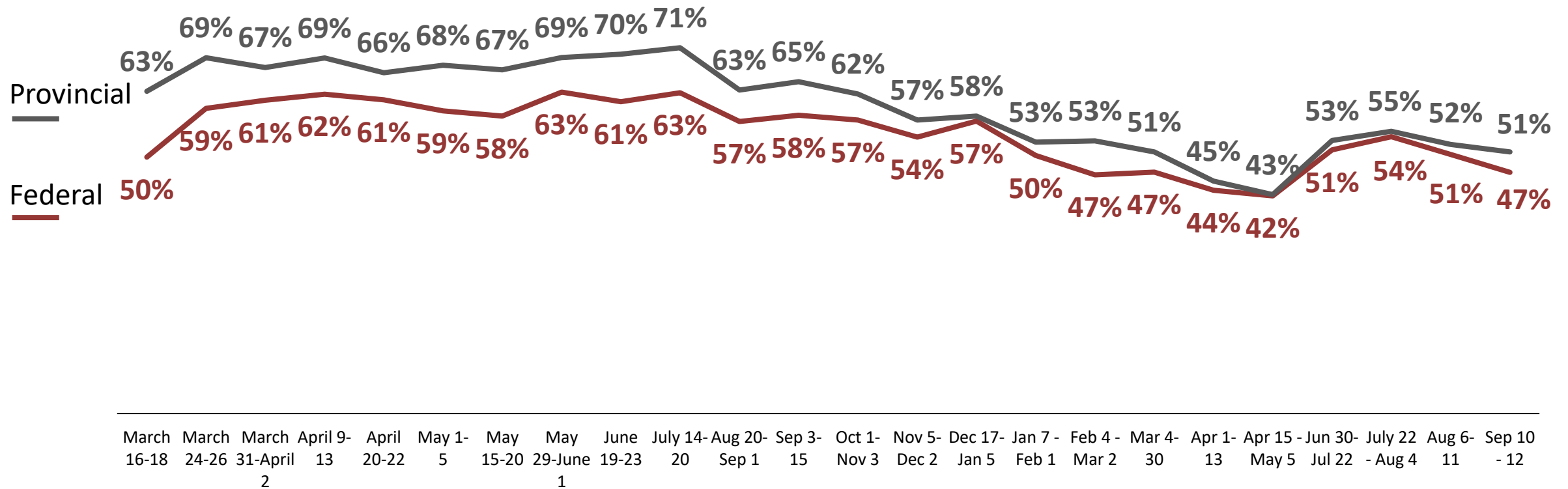

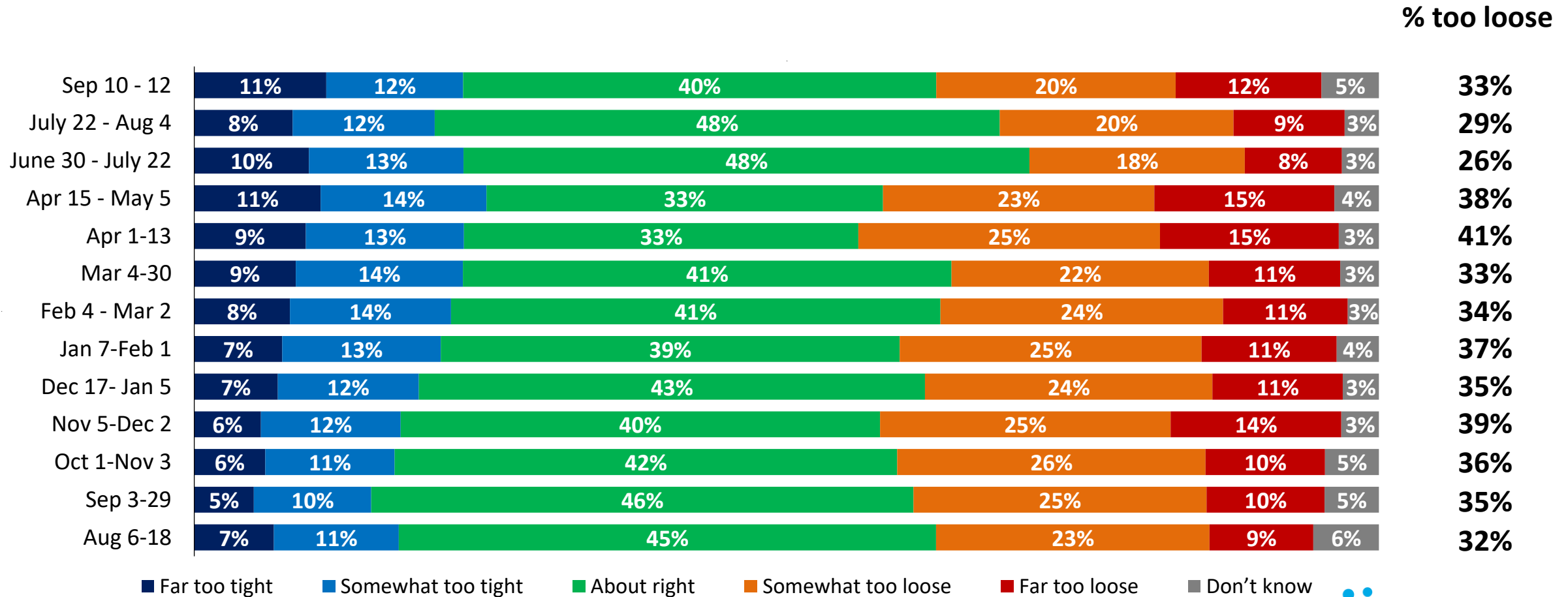

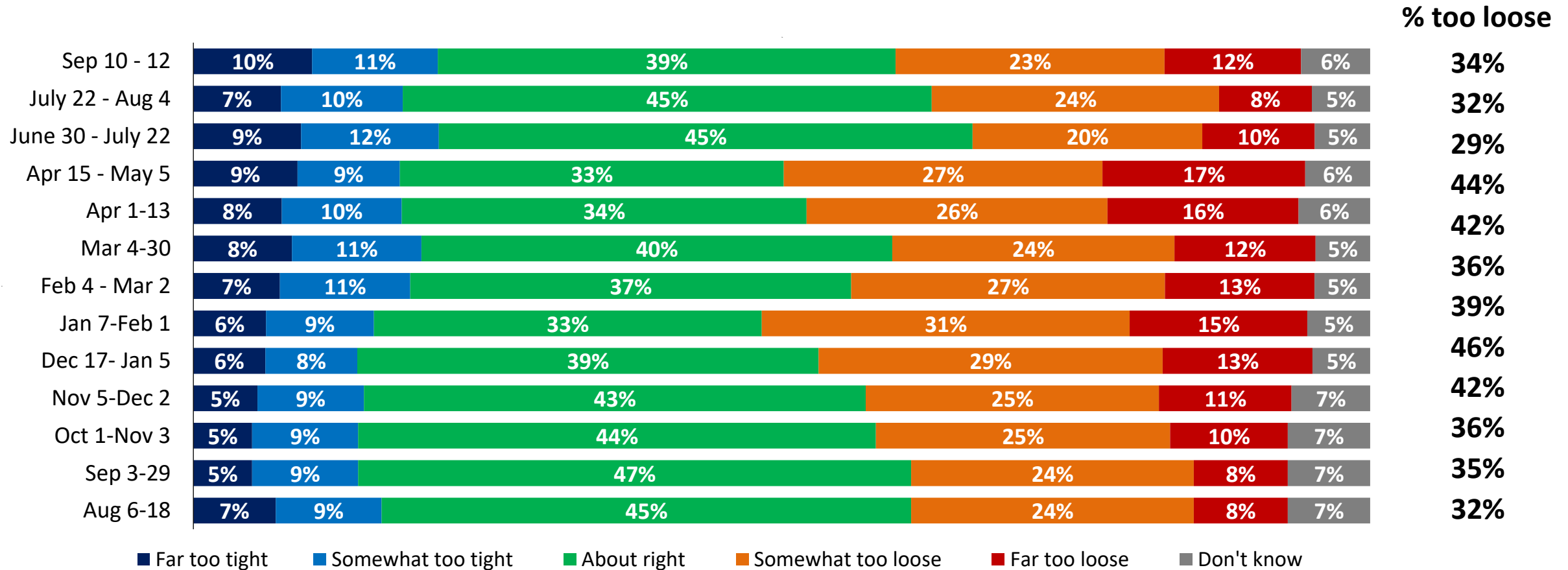

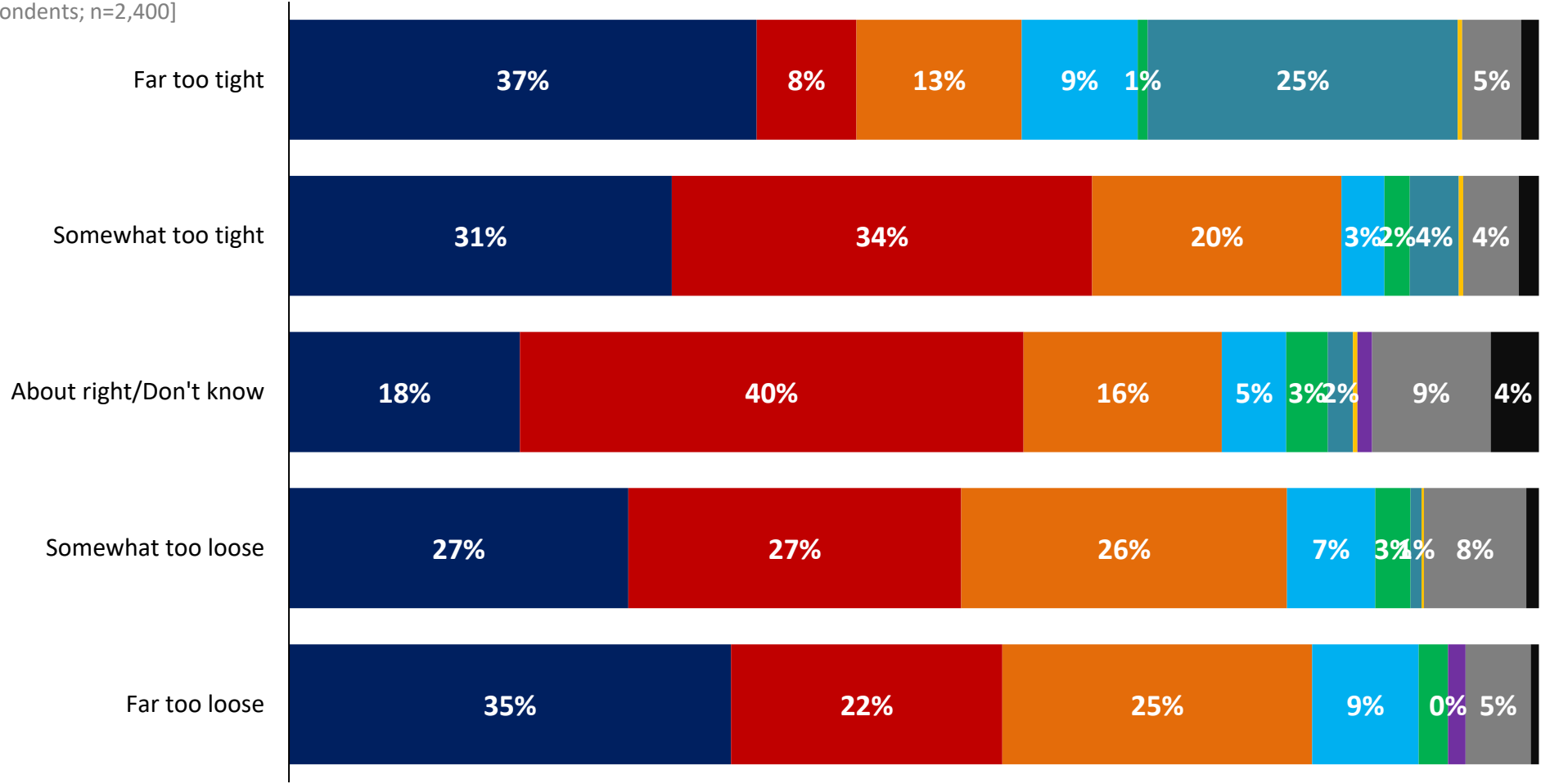

We group individuals into segments based on key political and economic values and attitudes

We use these segments throughout the remainder of the report to analyze vote and leadership results.

Key Segmentations

Throughout the campaign, INNOVATIVE will use three key segmentations to understand movement in vote intention and leader reputation. These segmentations have been developed, refined, and validated over the course of dozens of elections campaigns that we have tracked. Detailed definitions and results for each segment can be found in the appendix.

Political Value Clusters

We group Canadians into six “values” clusters based on 4 key political values:

1. Populist Conservatives (11%)
2. Deferential Conservatives (11%)
3. Business Liberals (24%)
4. Left Liberals (16%)
5. Core Left (19%)
6. Thrifty Moderates (18%)

Economic Gap

The economic gap segmentation divides Canadians by their outlook on their economic future, splitting them into four groups:

1. Canadian Dream Achievers (26%)
2. Canadian Dream Strugglers (31%)
3. Ambivalent (22%)
4. Alienated (21%)

Time For Change

This segmentation separates Canadians by their views on the incumbent government. Is it time for a change, and is there a better alternative than the current government? This creates six groups:

1. Core Liberals (15%)
2. Soft Liberals (9%)
3. Time for Change Liberals (10%)
4. Uncertain (13%)
5. Soft anti-Liberals (26%)
6. Hostile (27%)

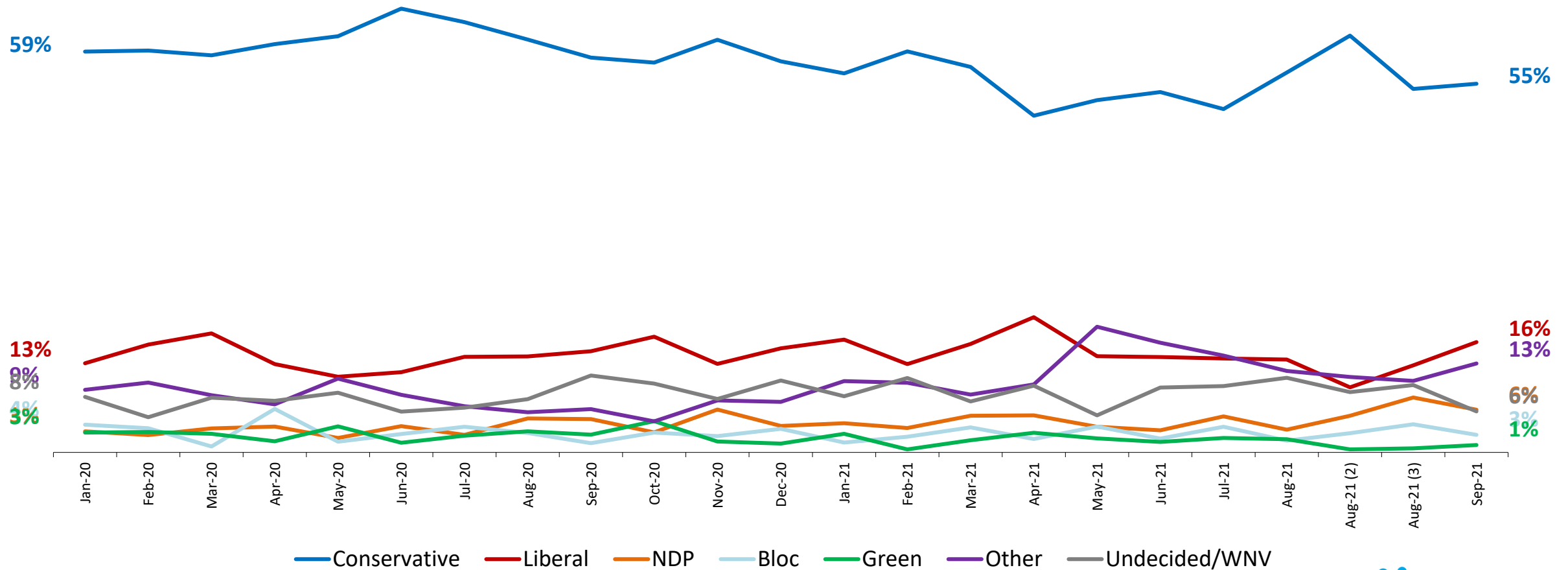

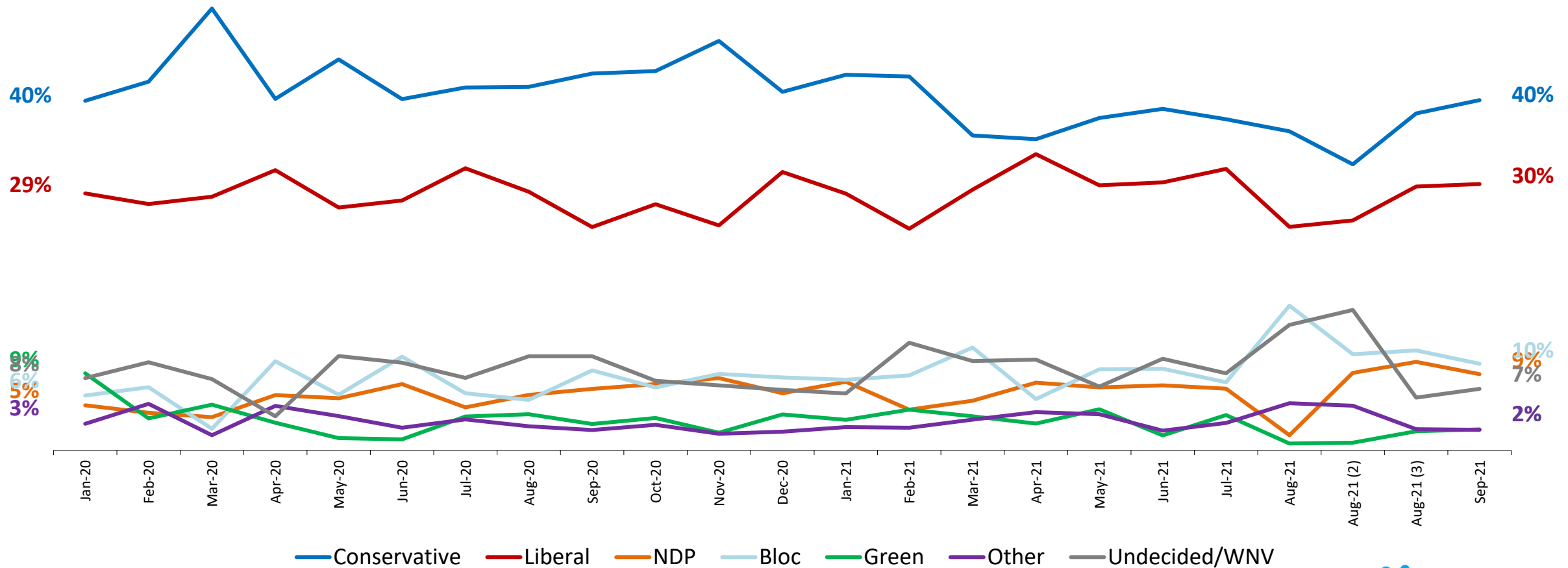

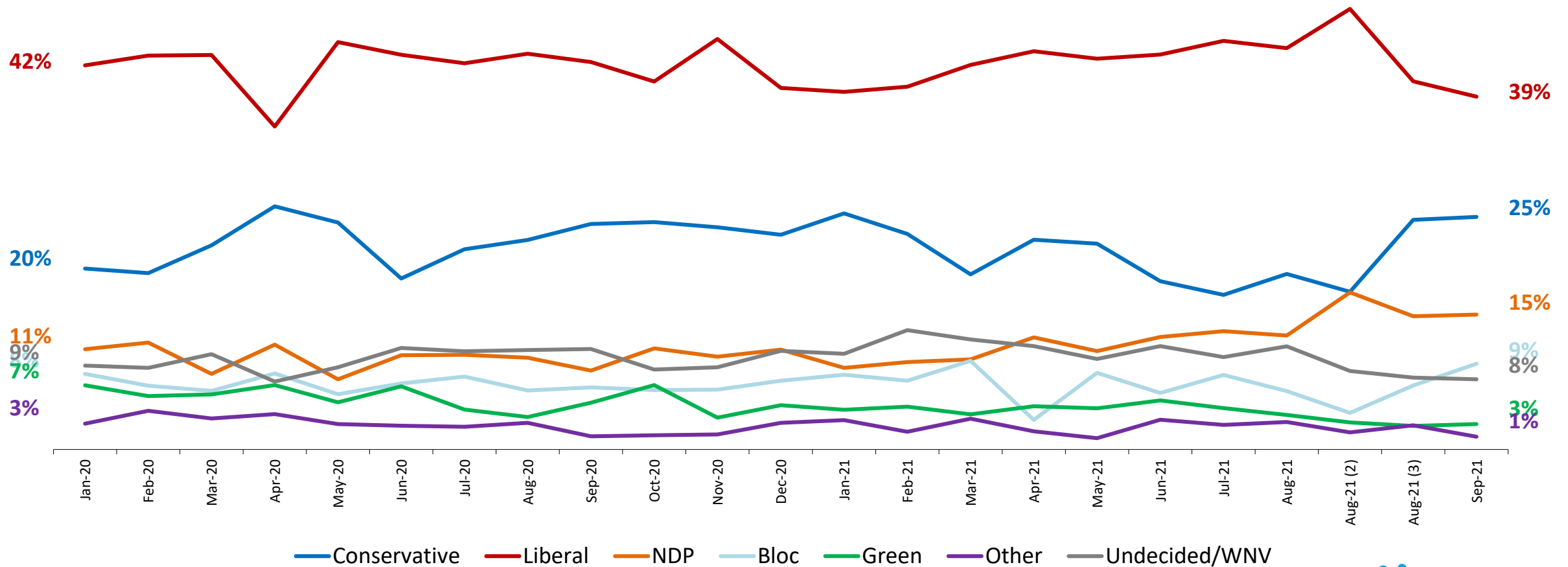

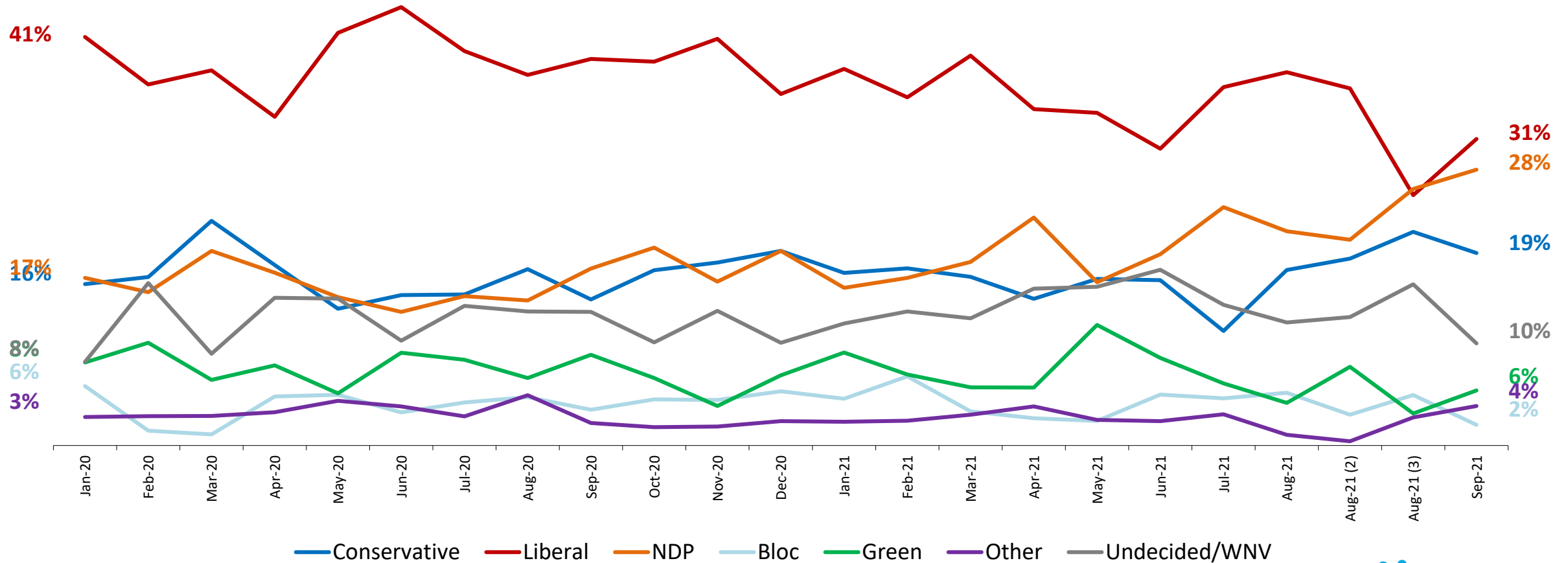

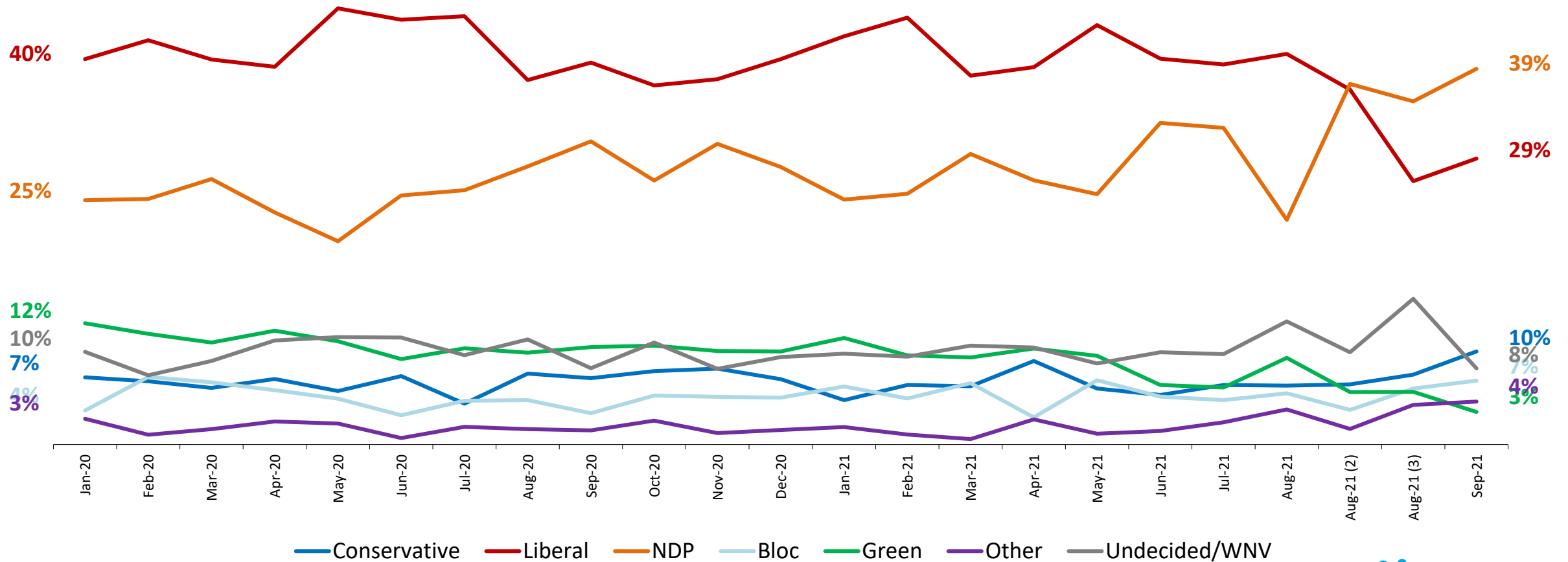

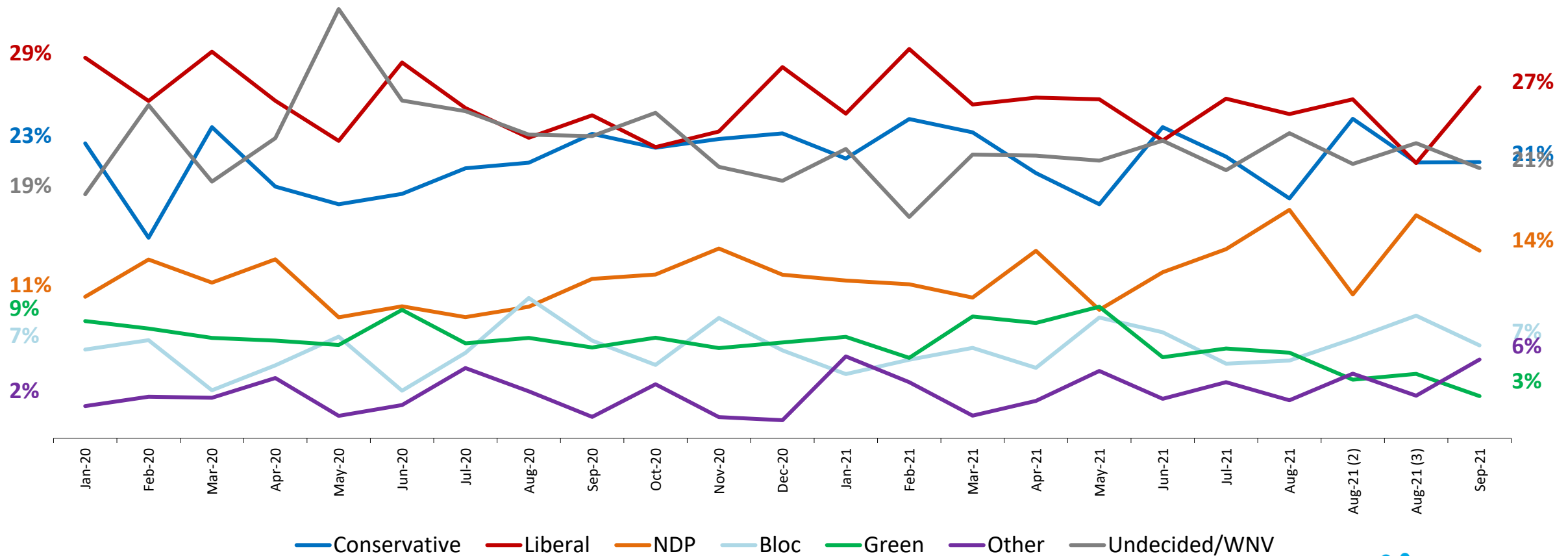

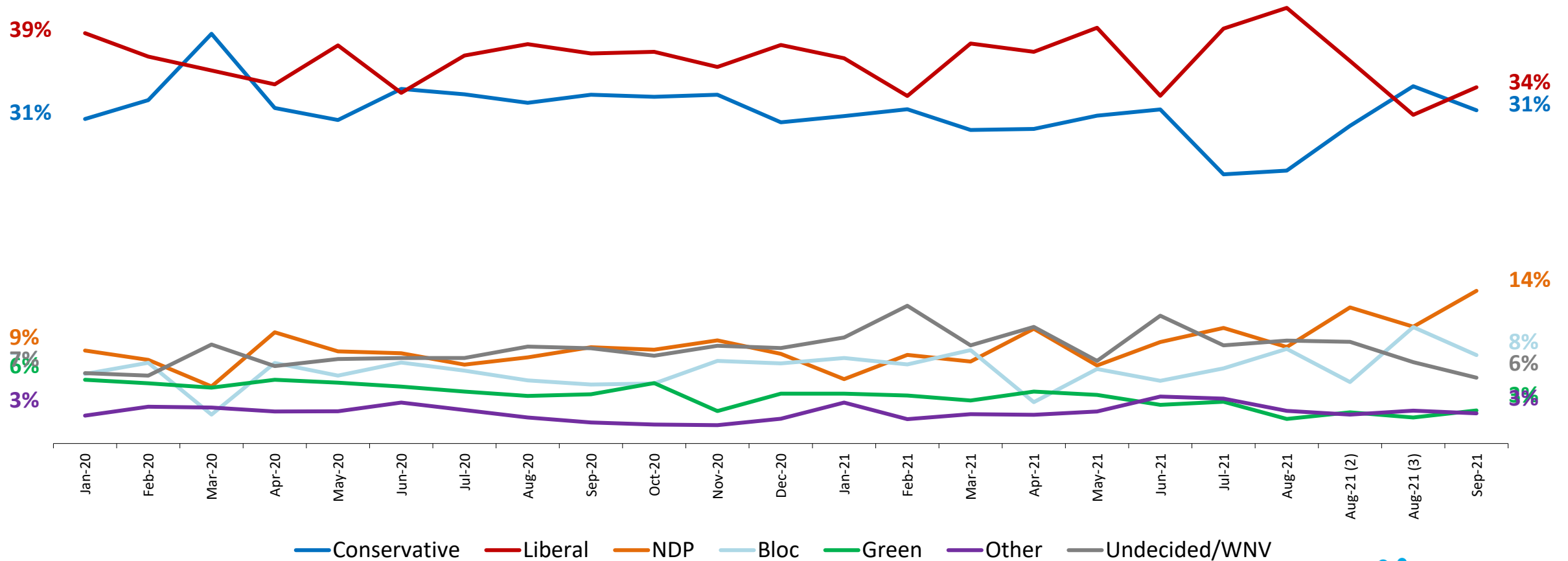

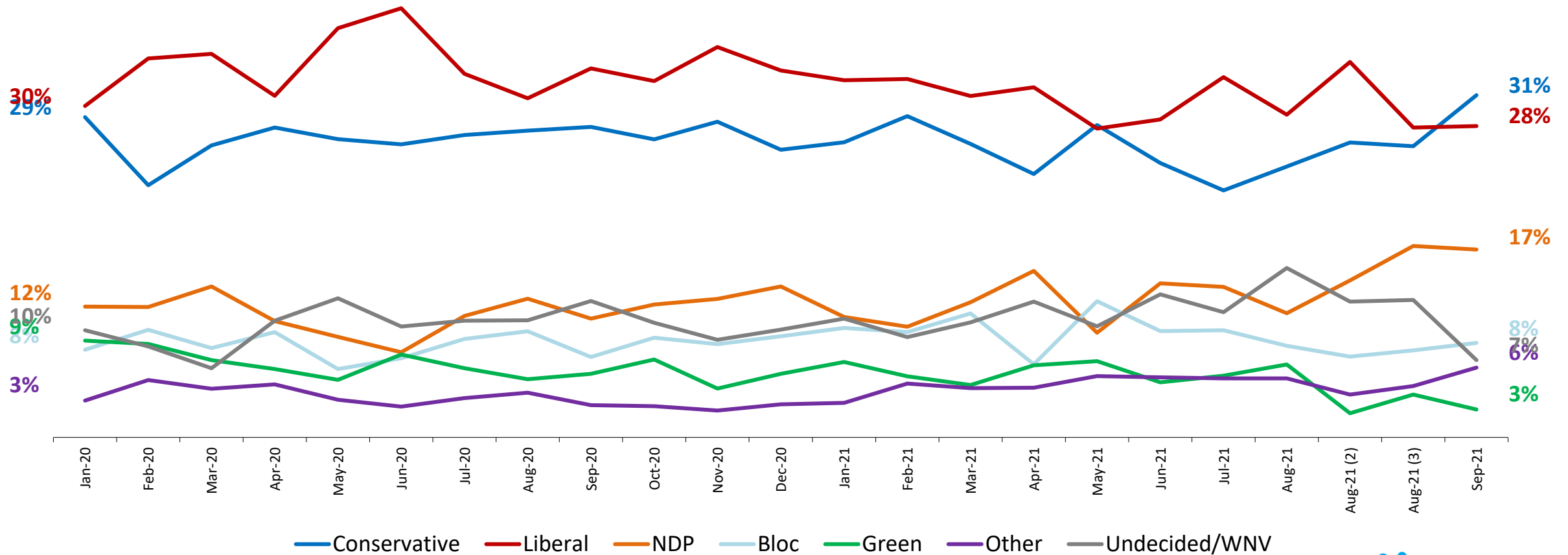

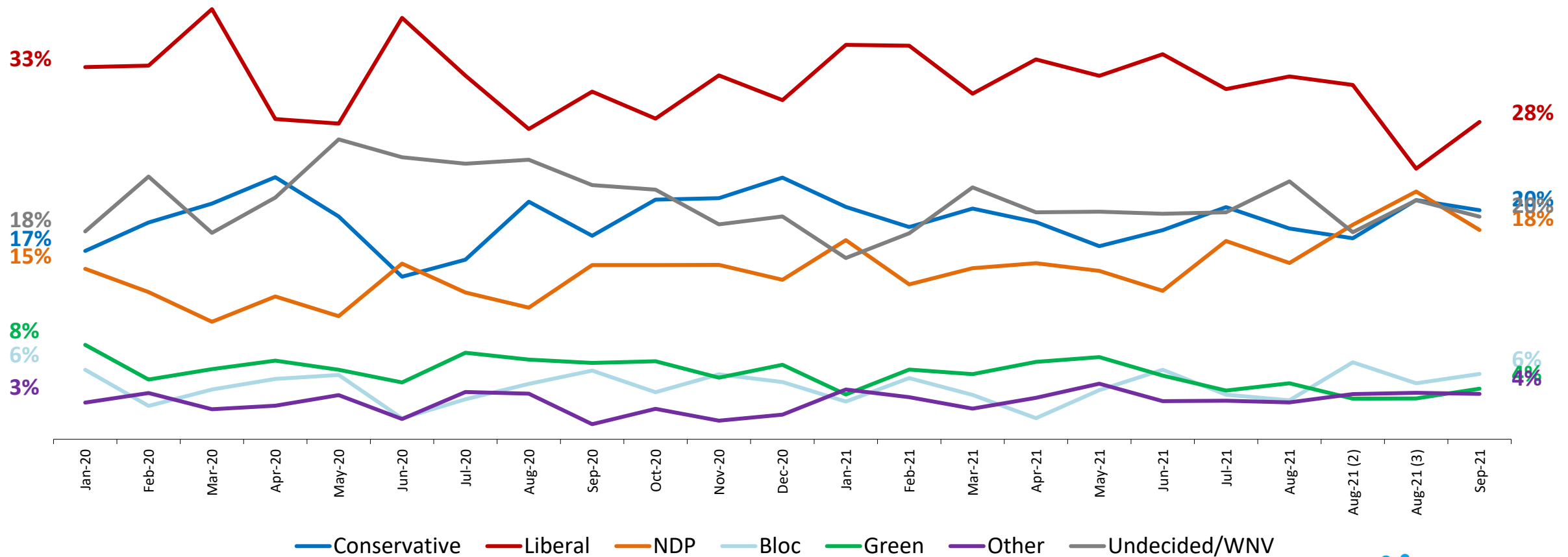

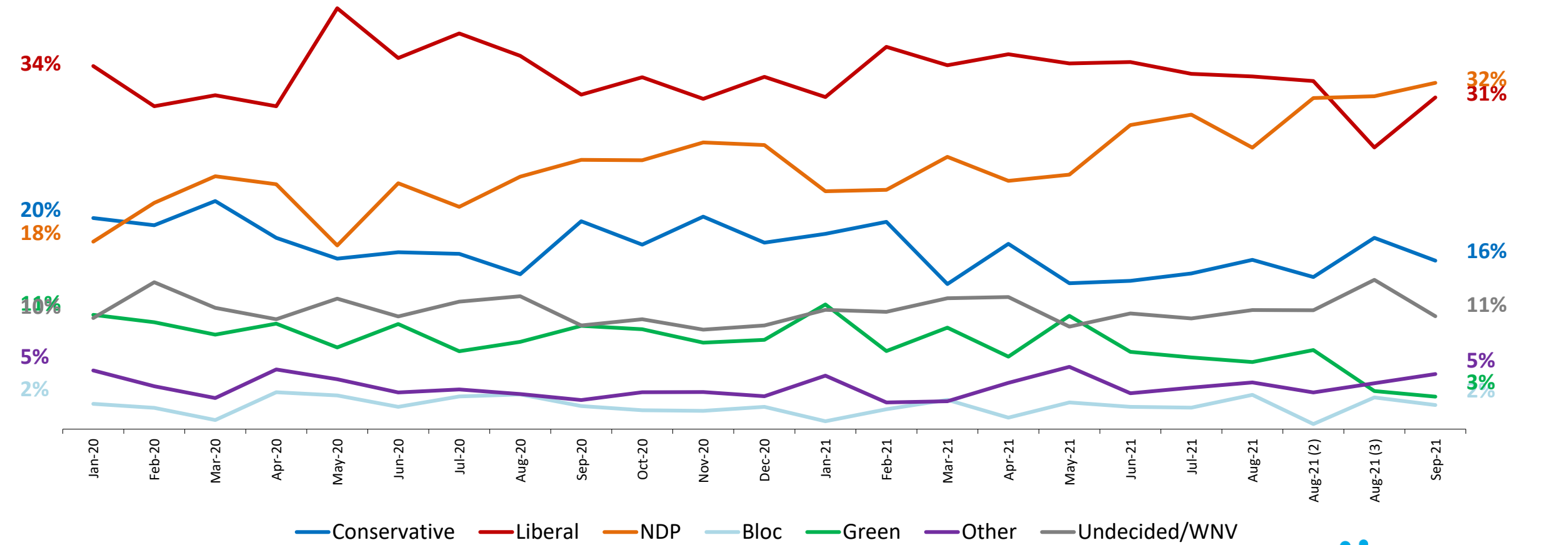

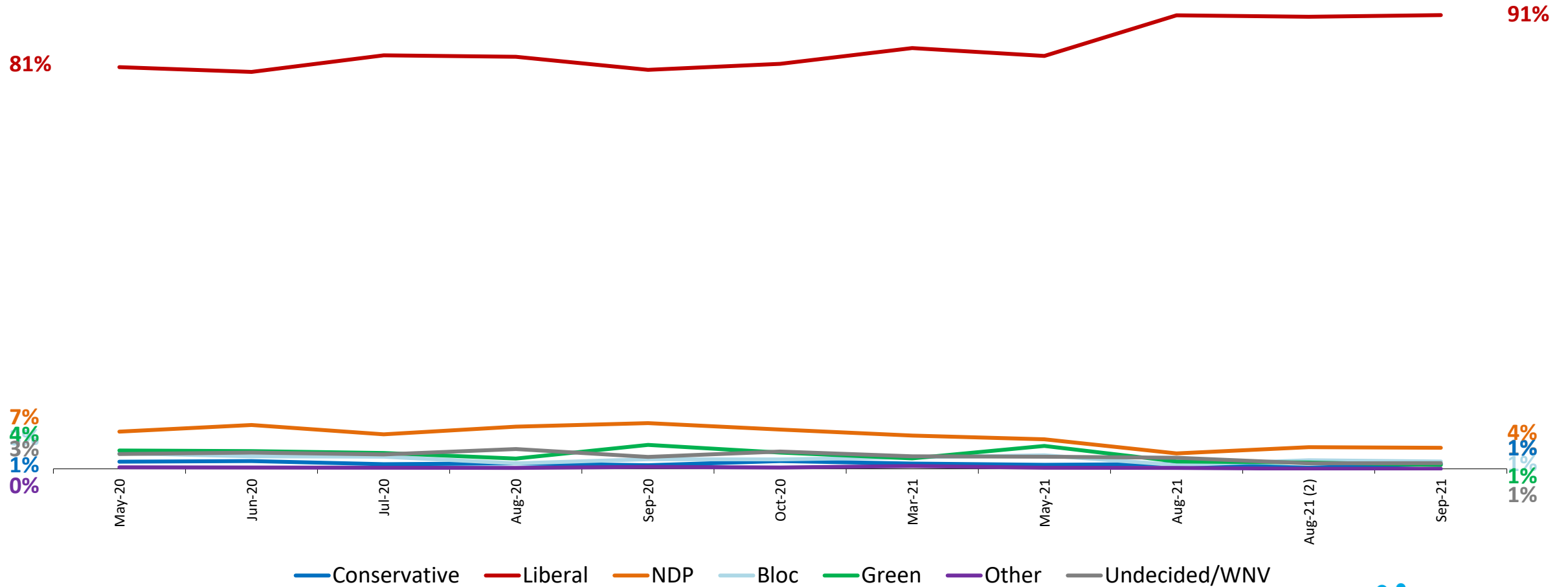

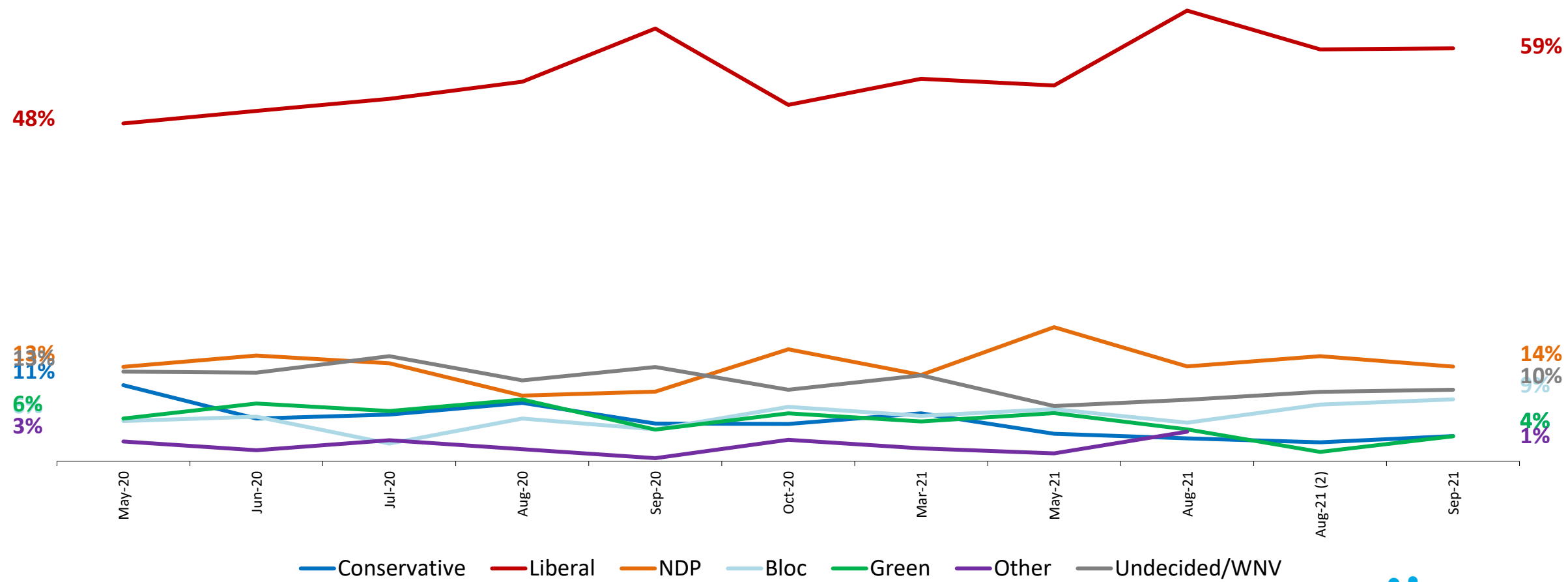

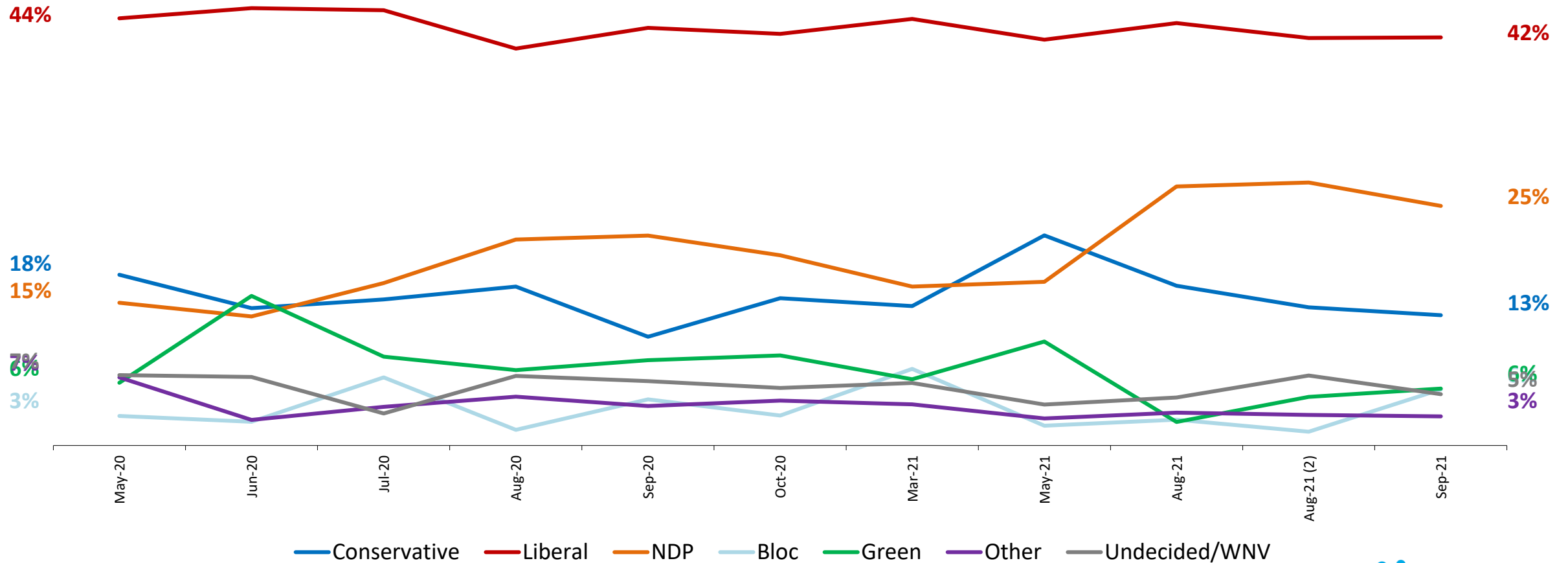

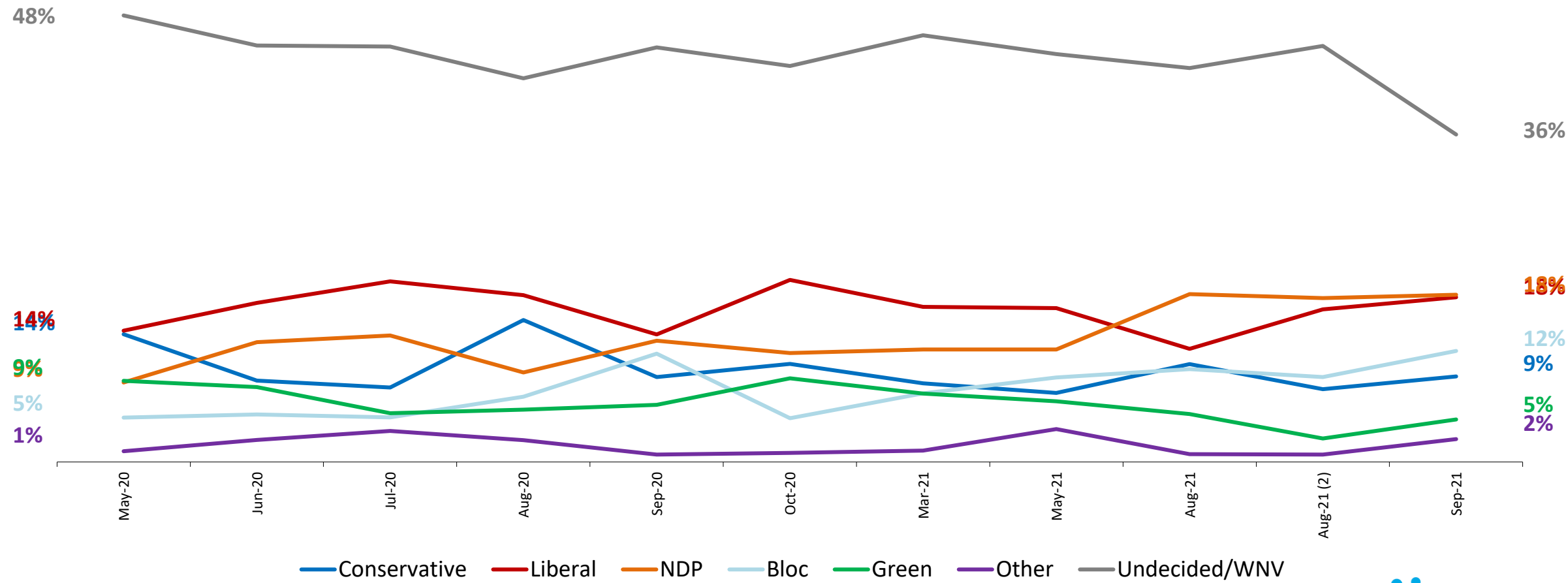

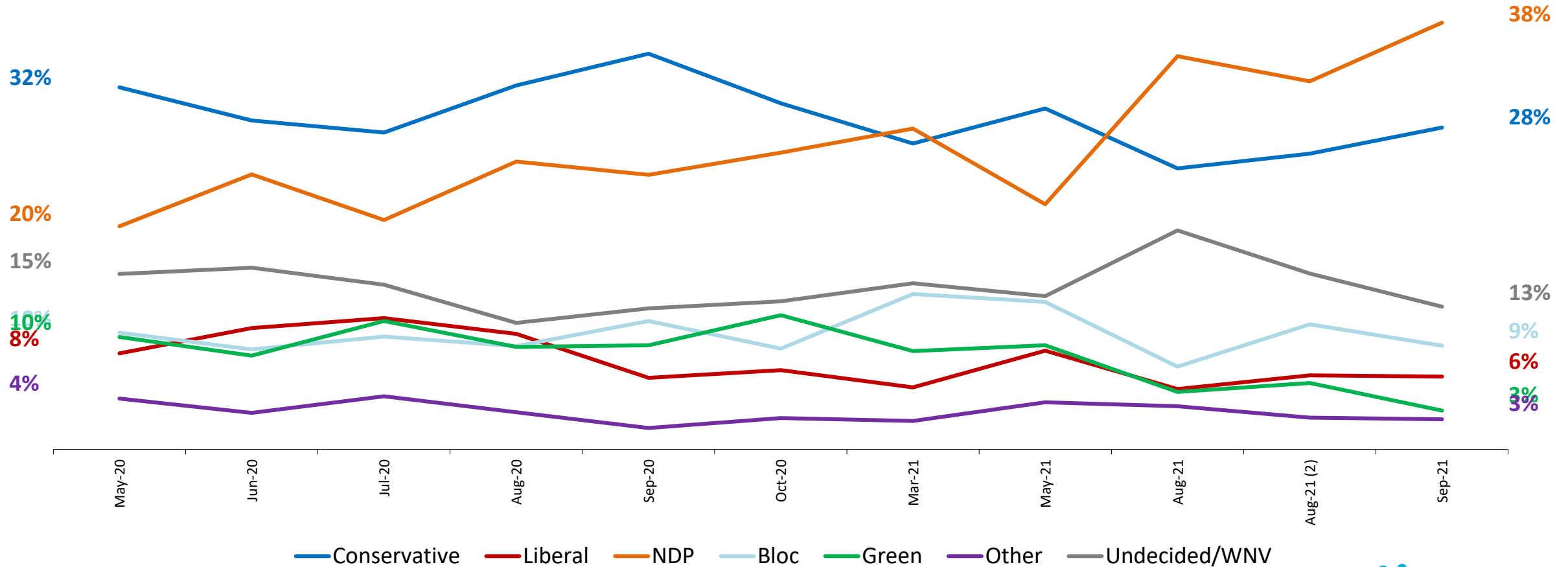

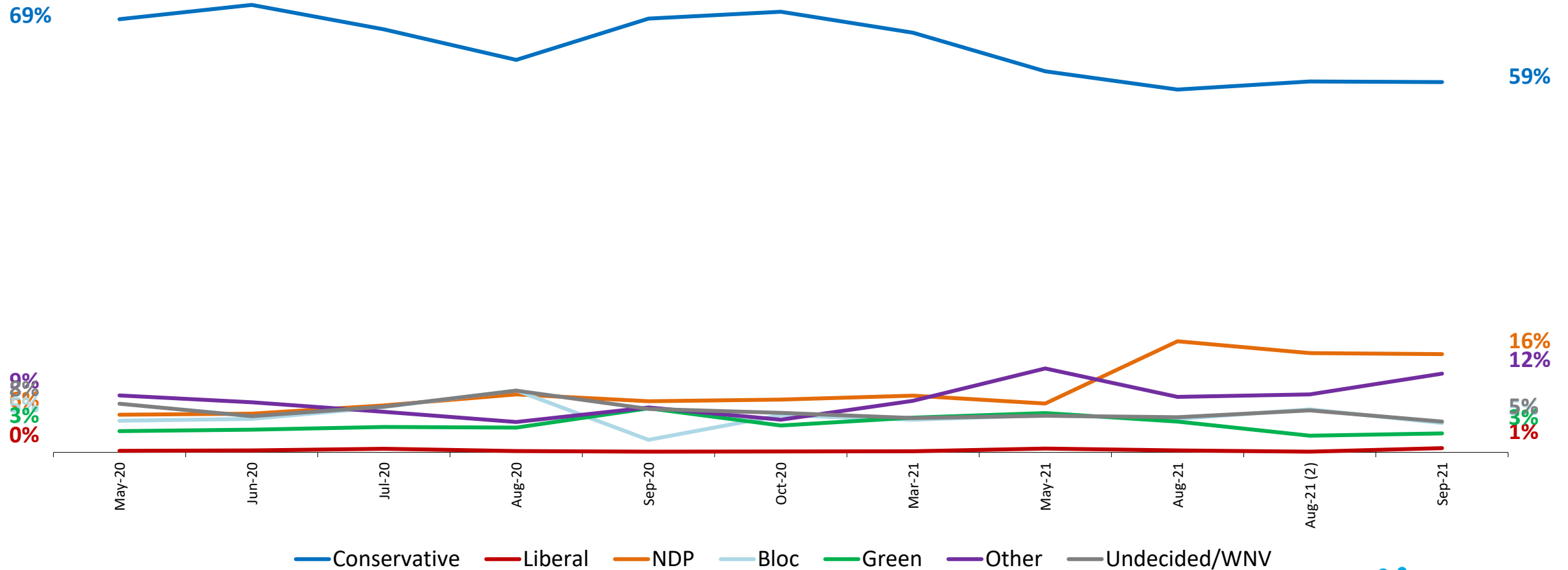

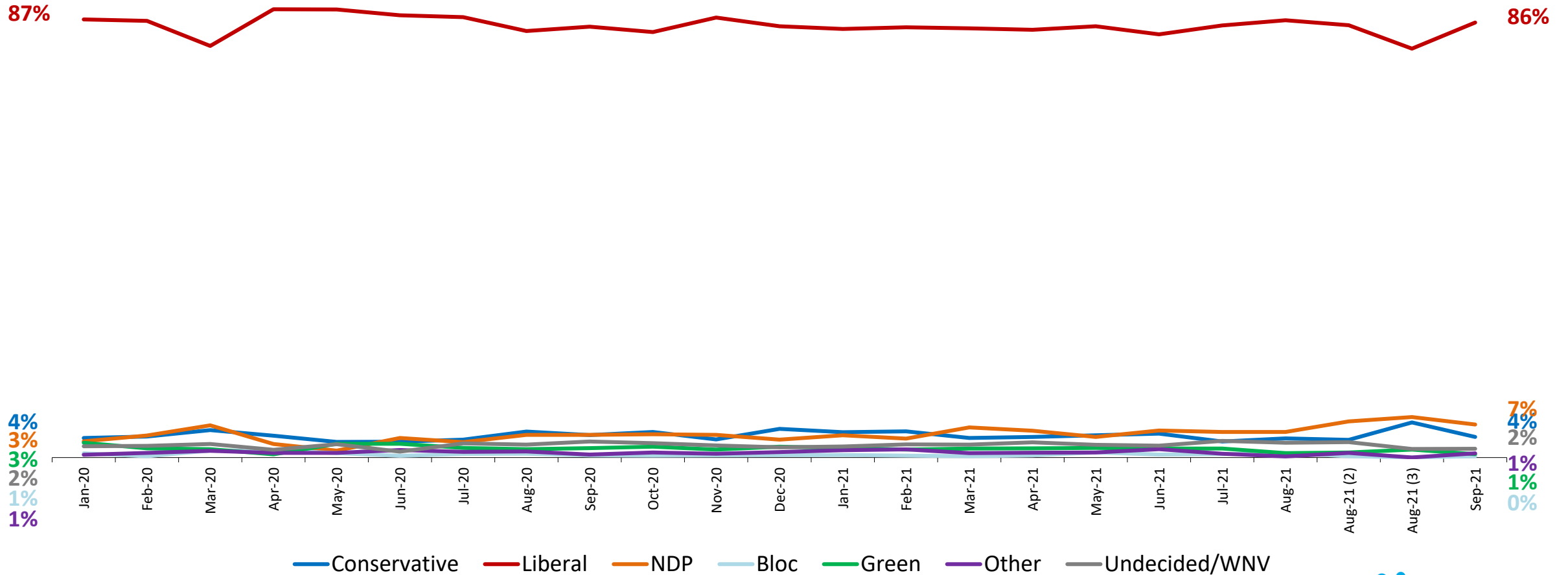

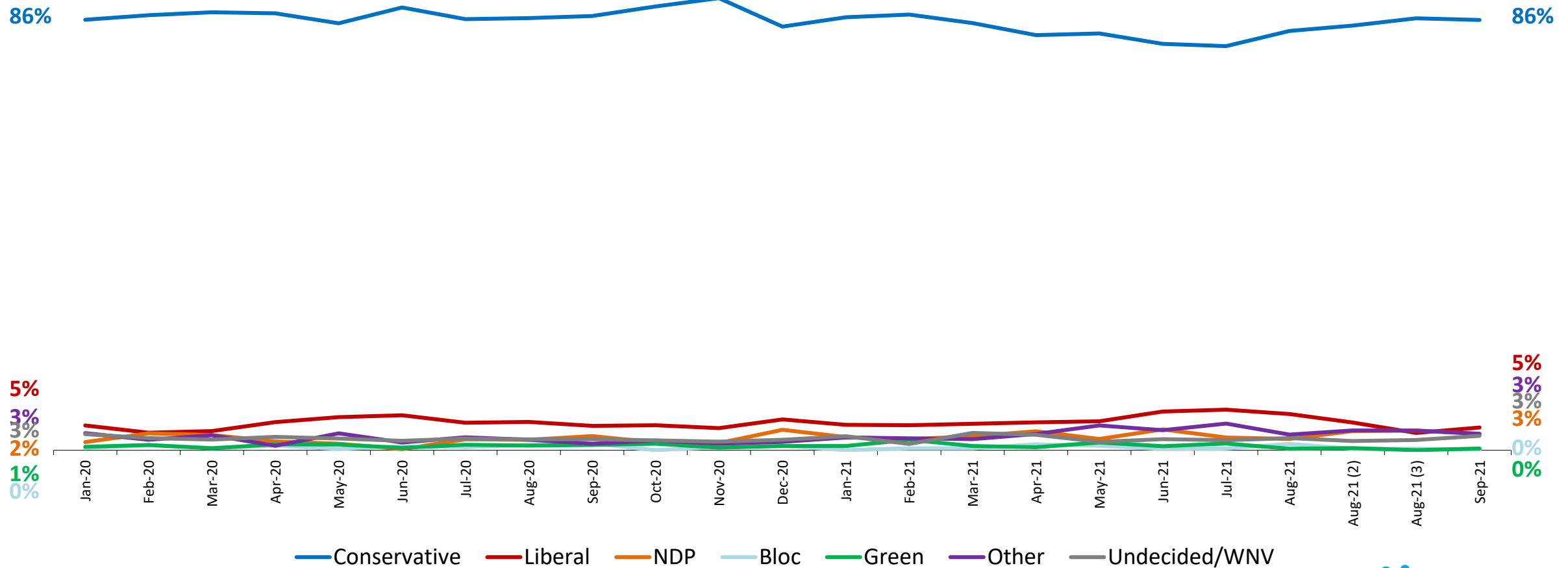

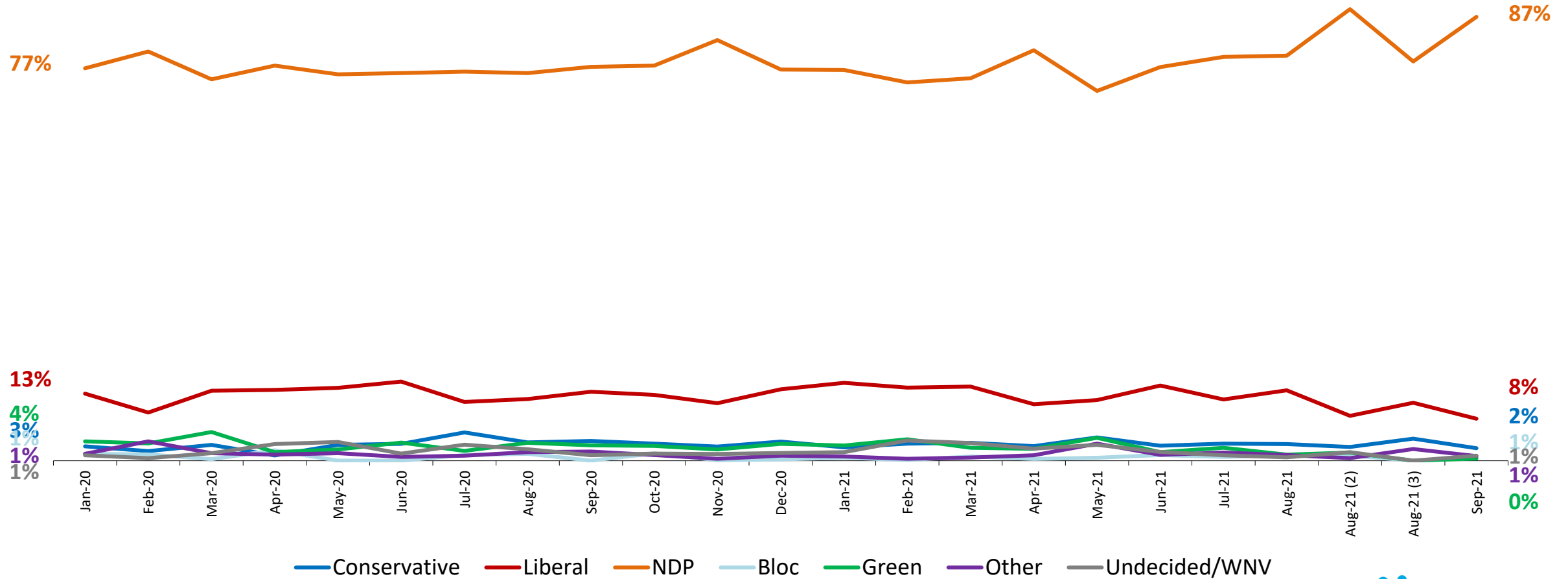

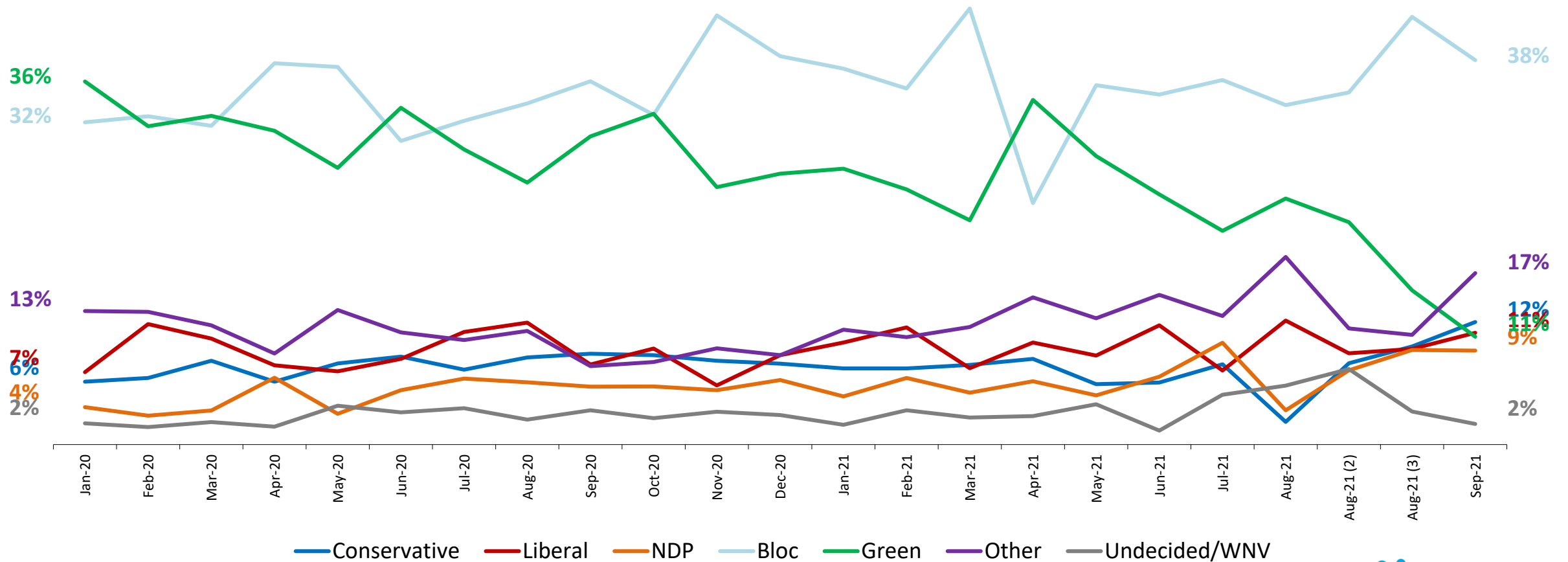

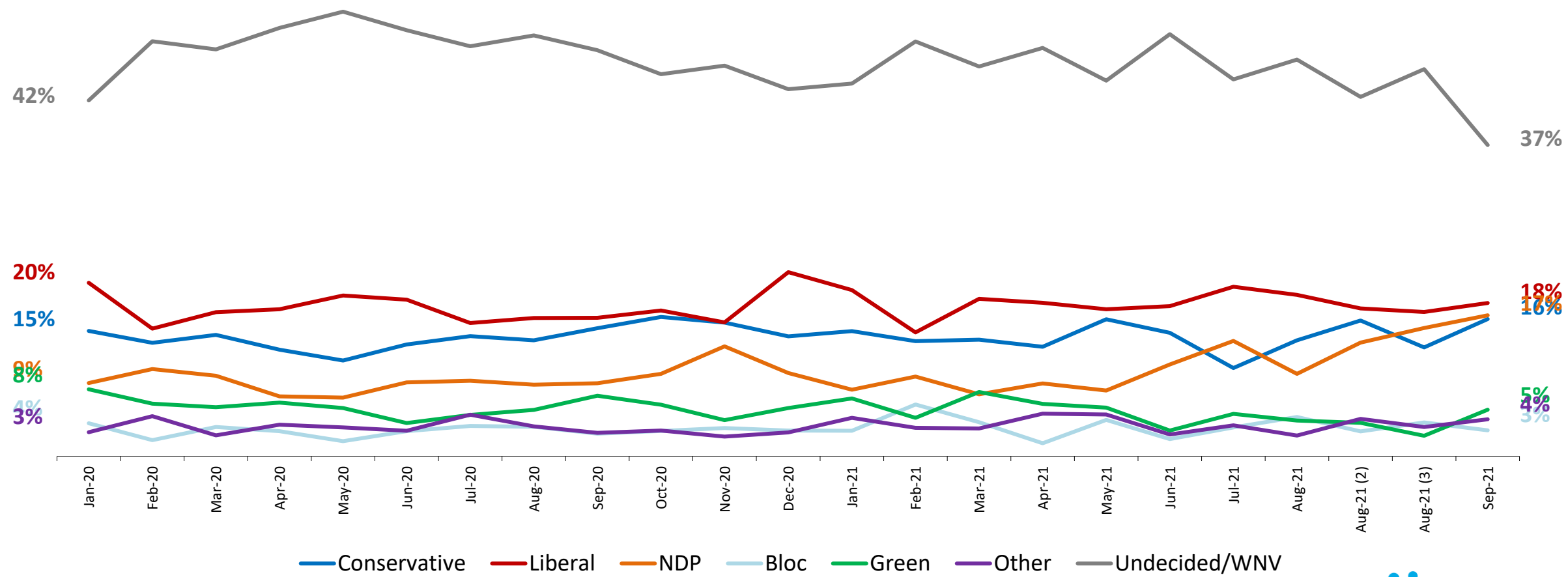

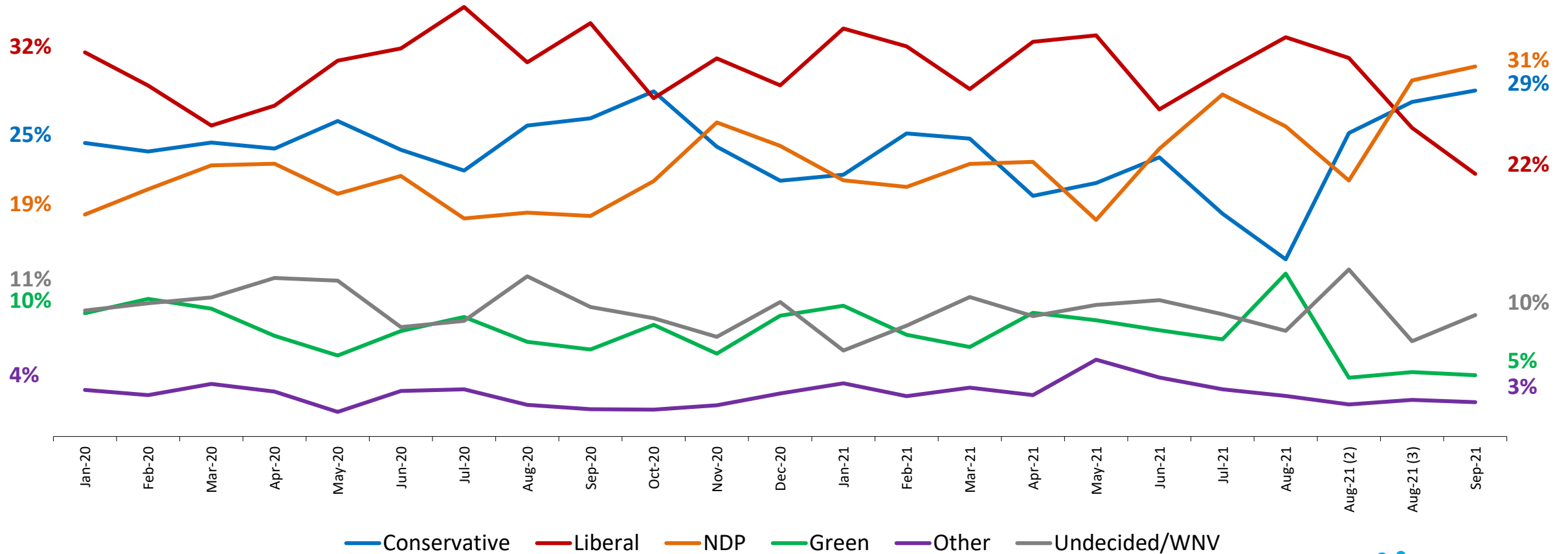

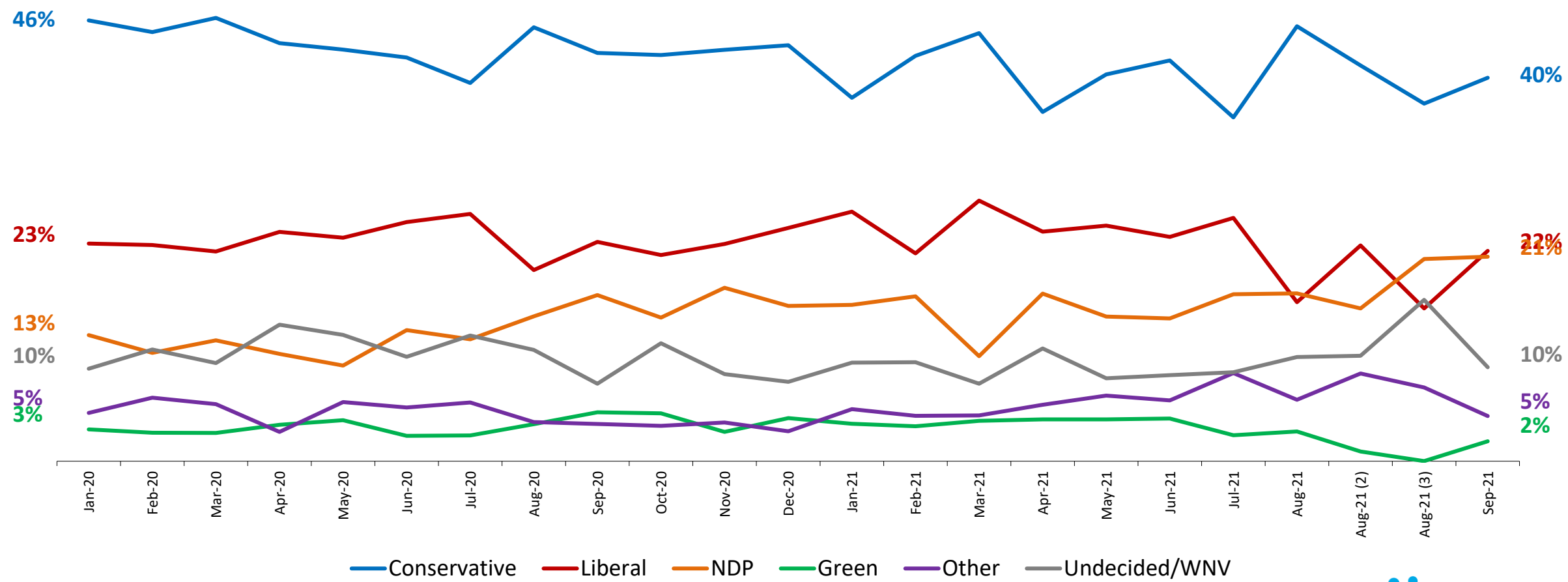

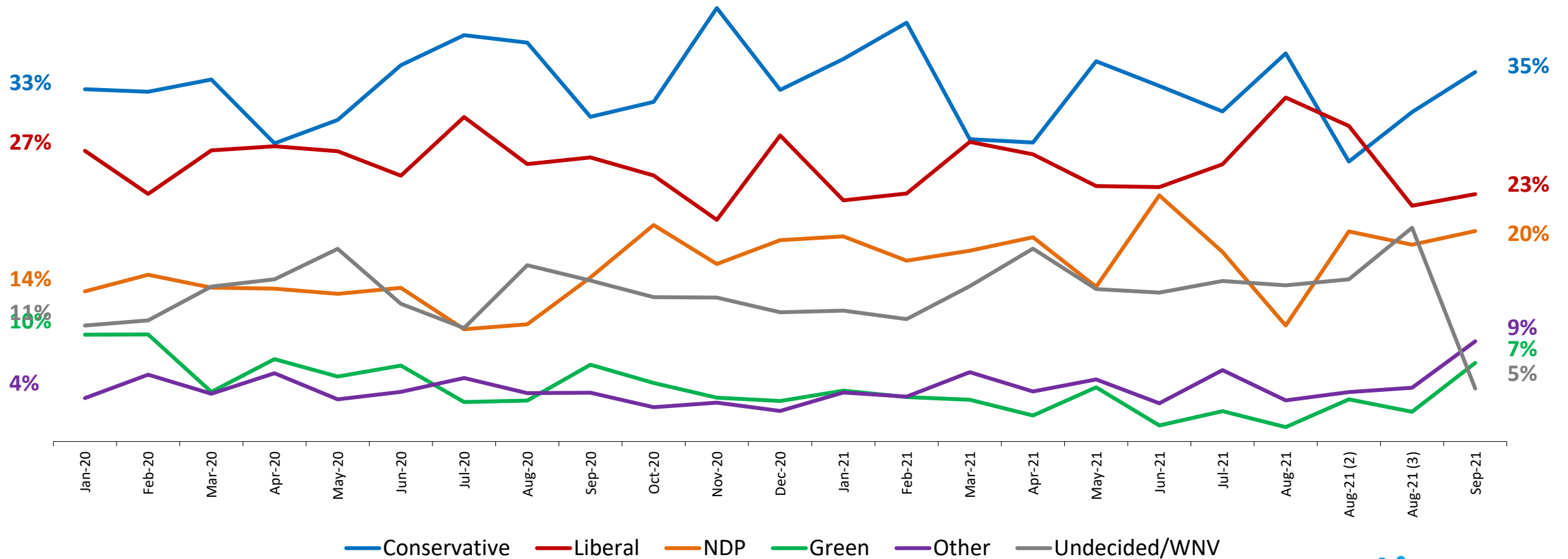

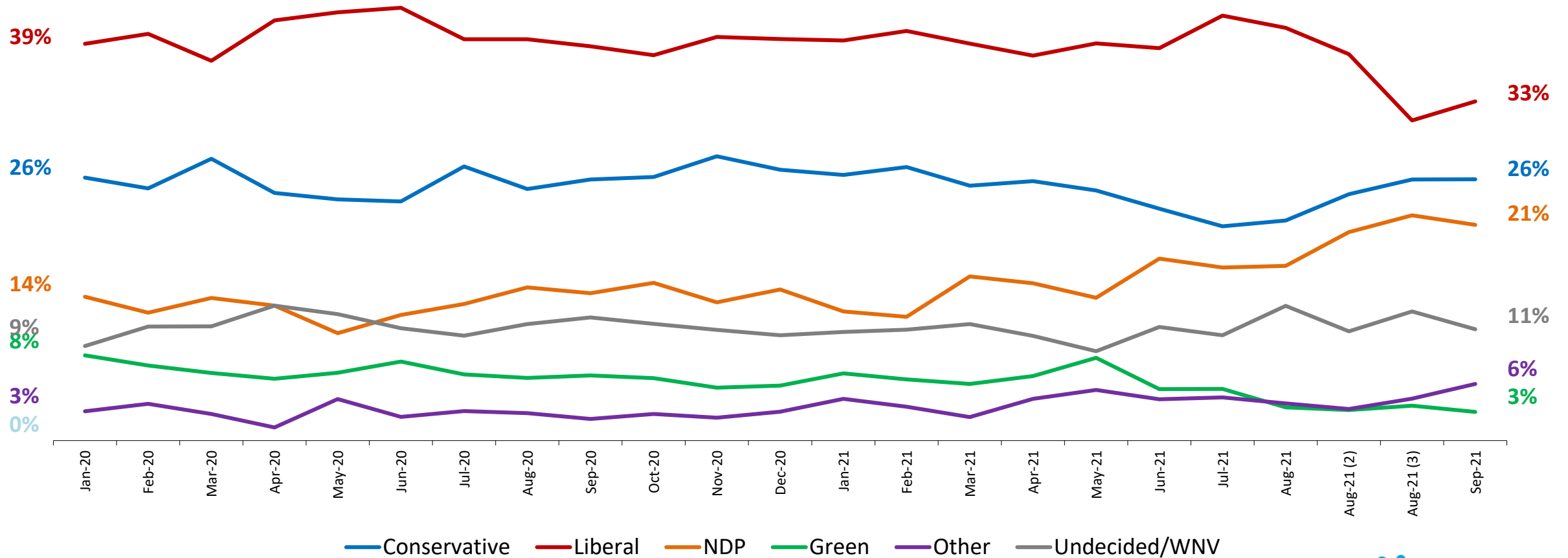

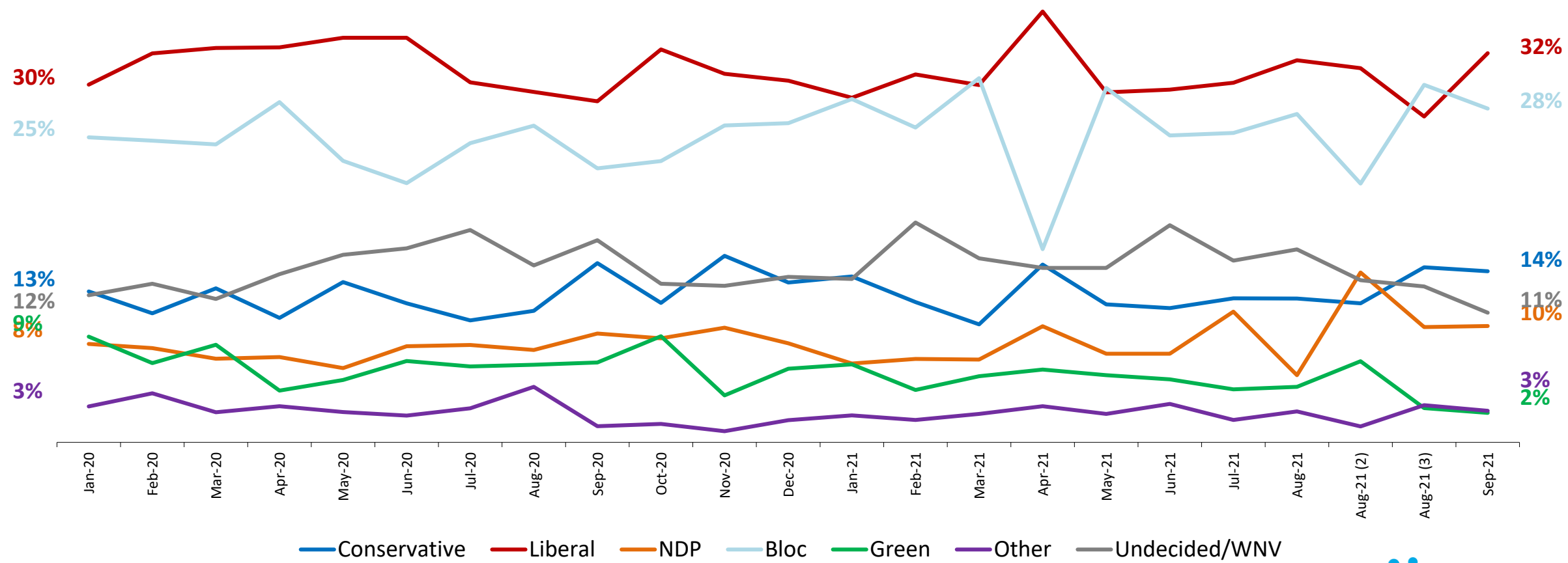

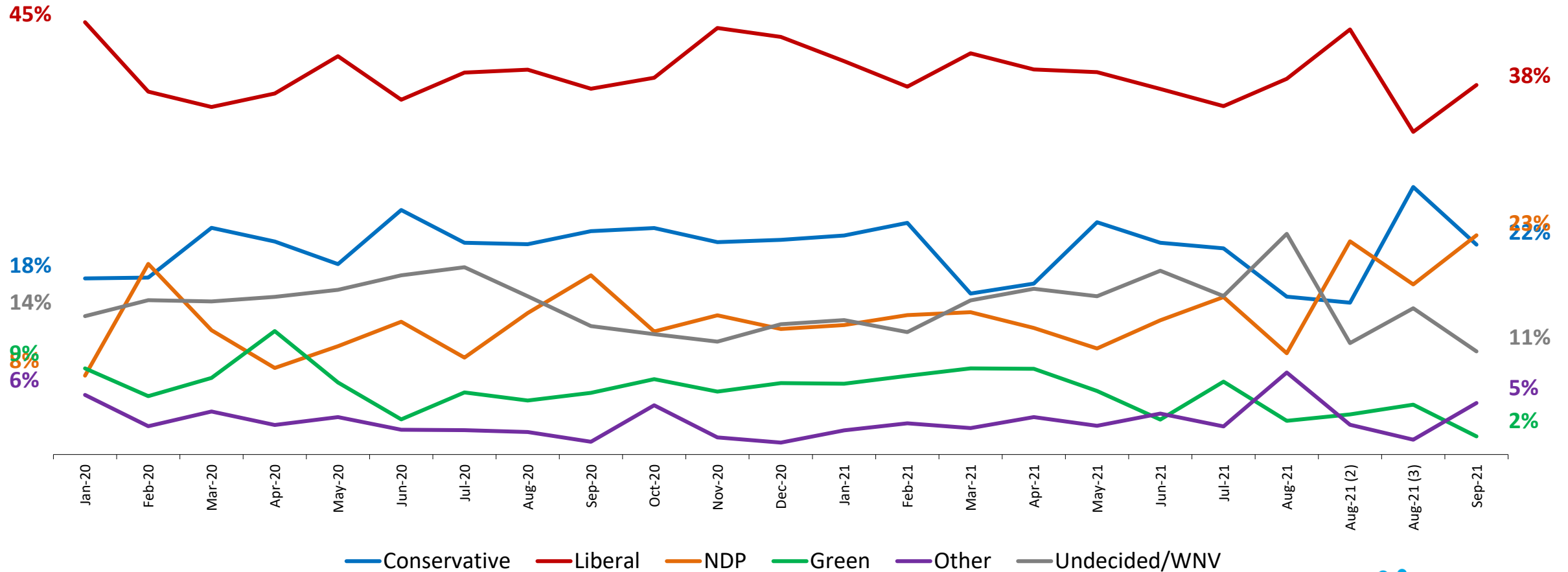

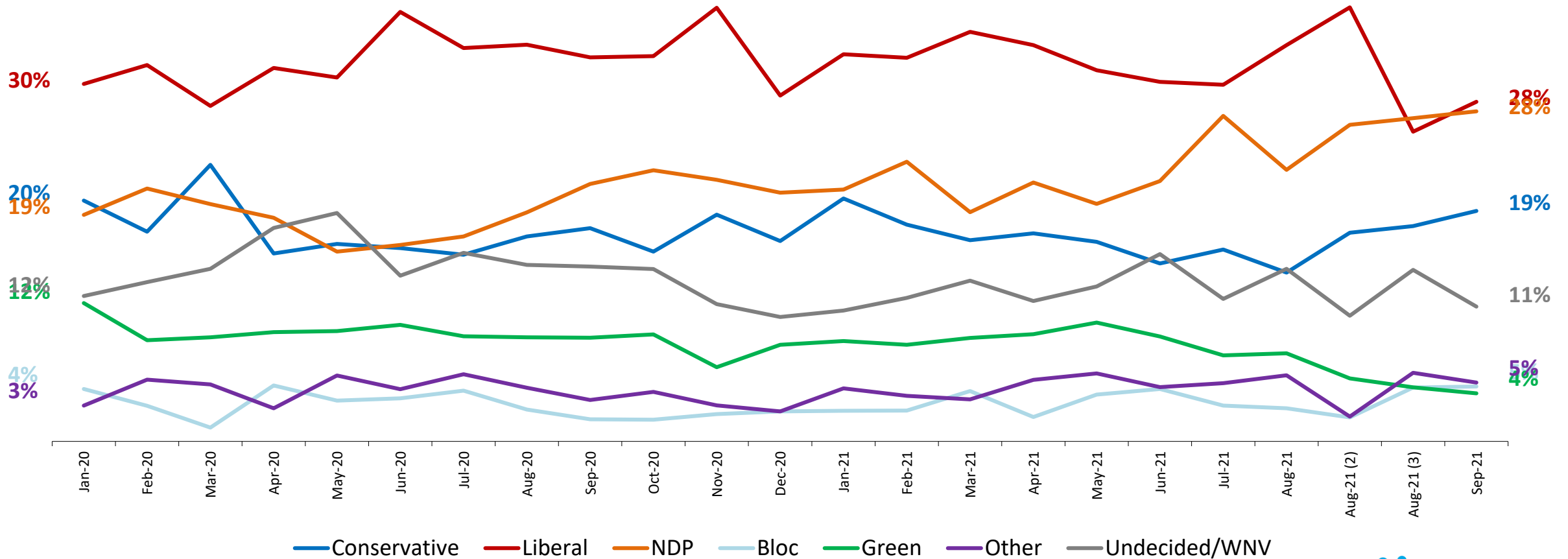

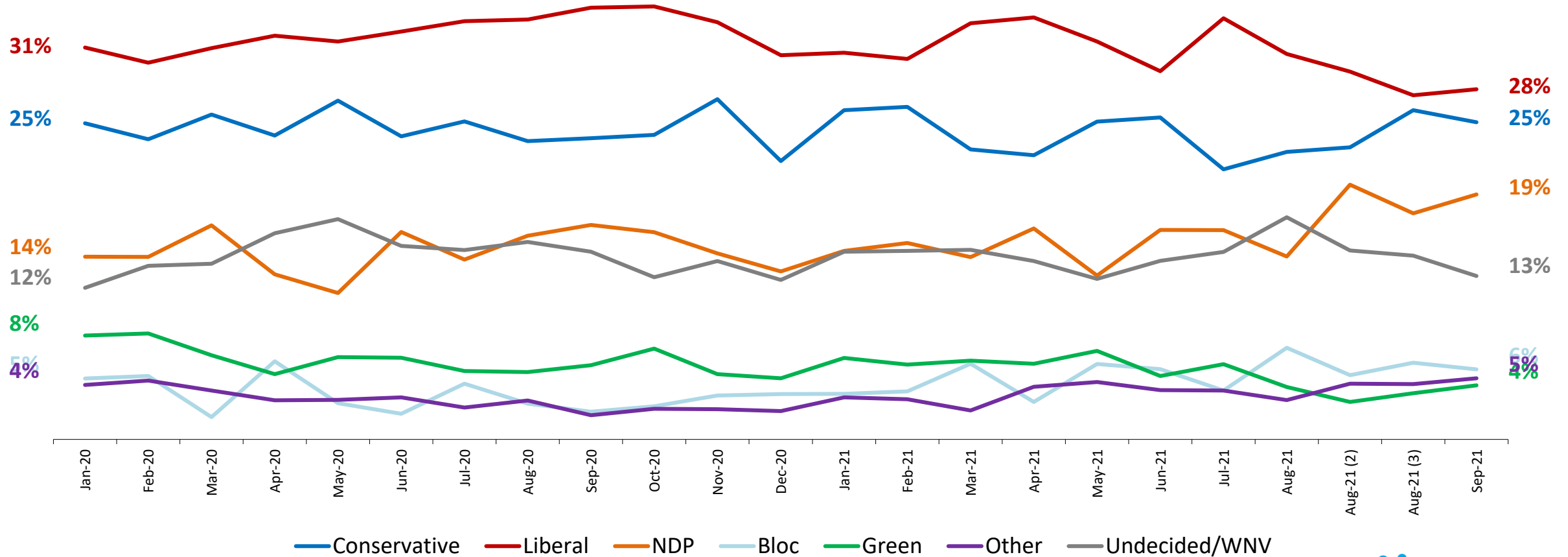

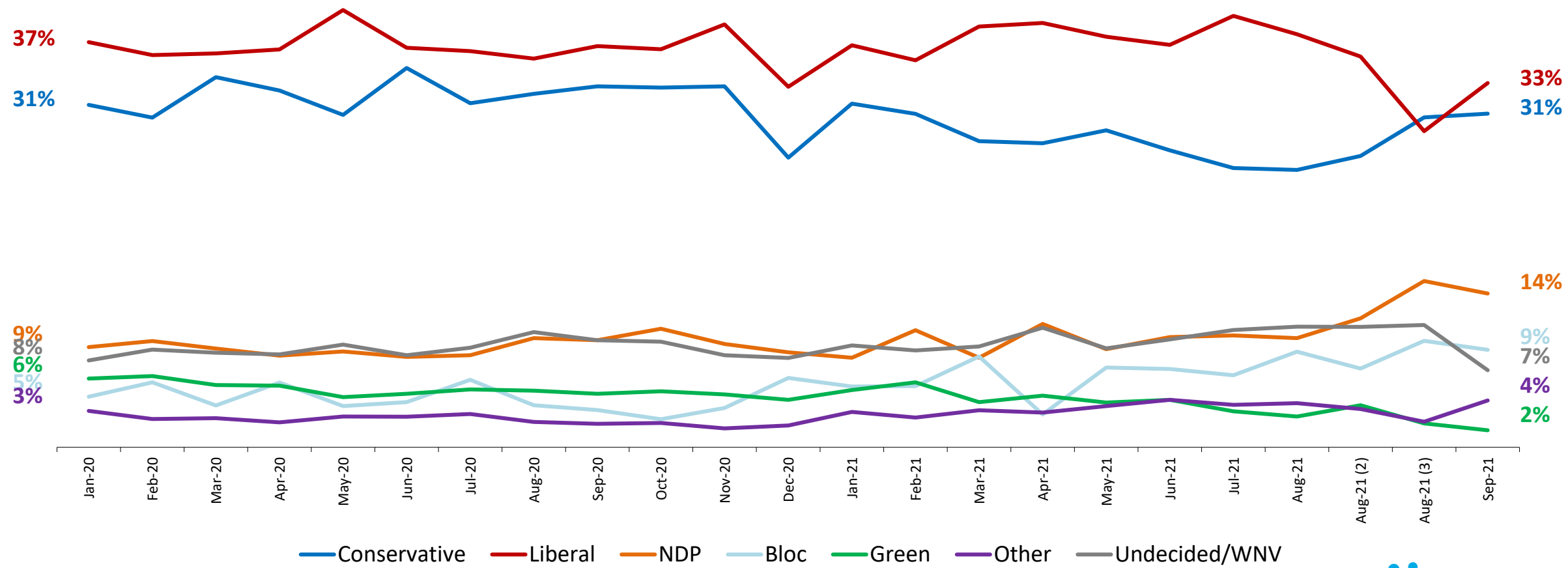

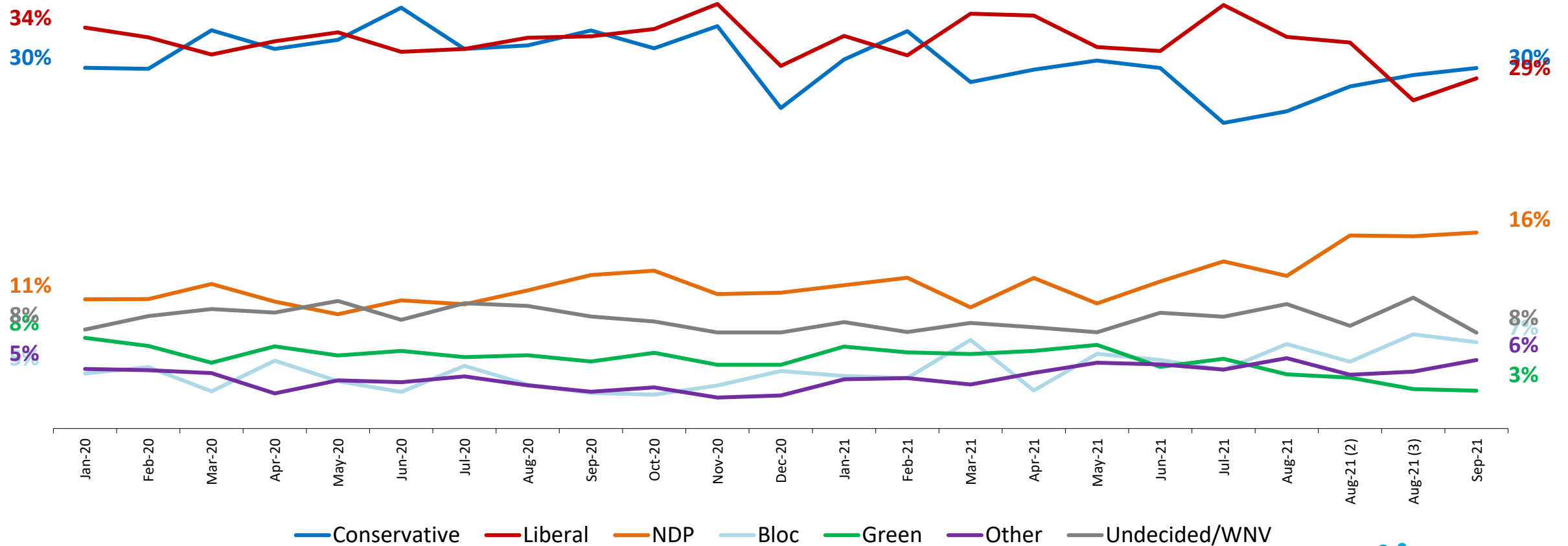

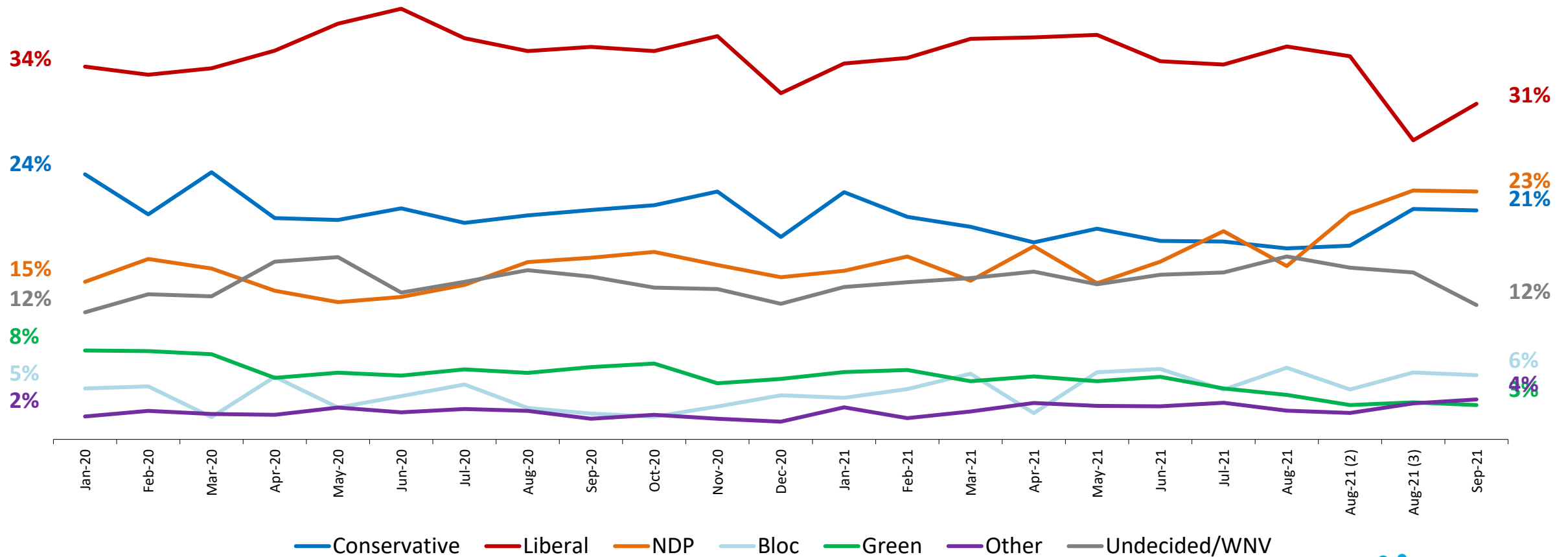

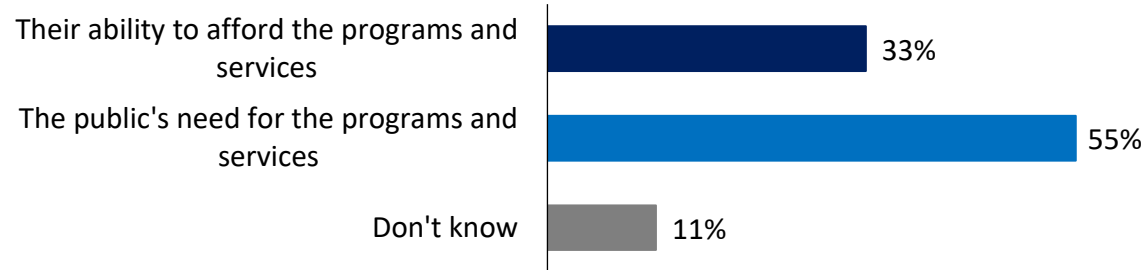

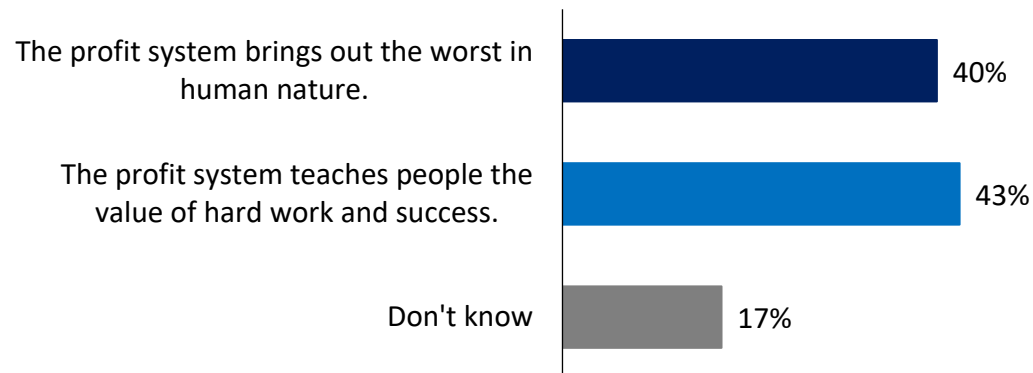

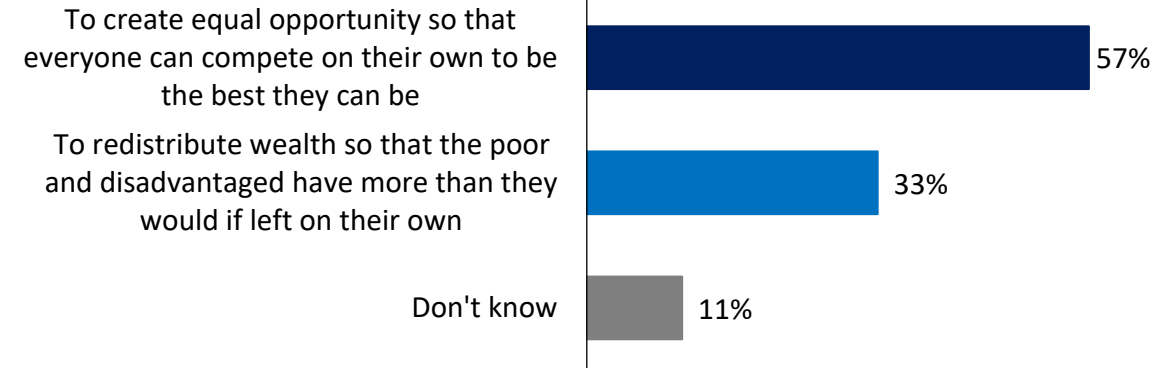

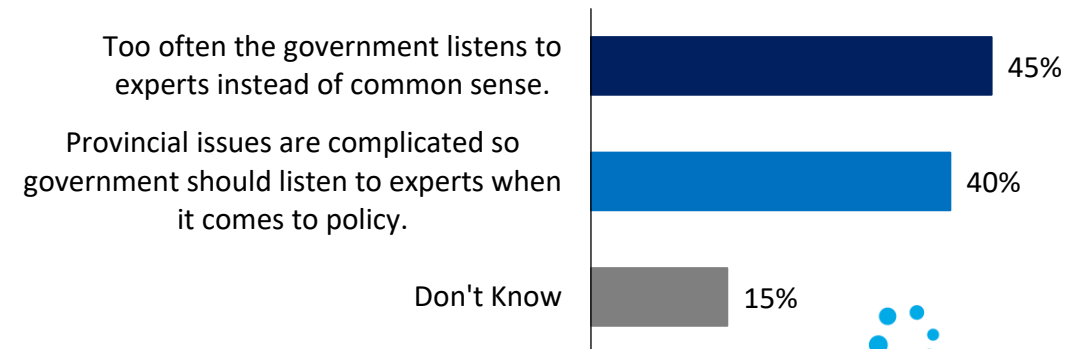

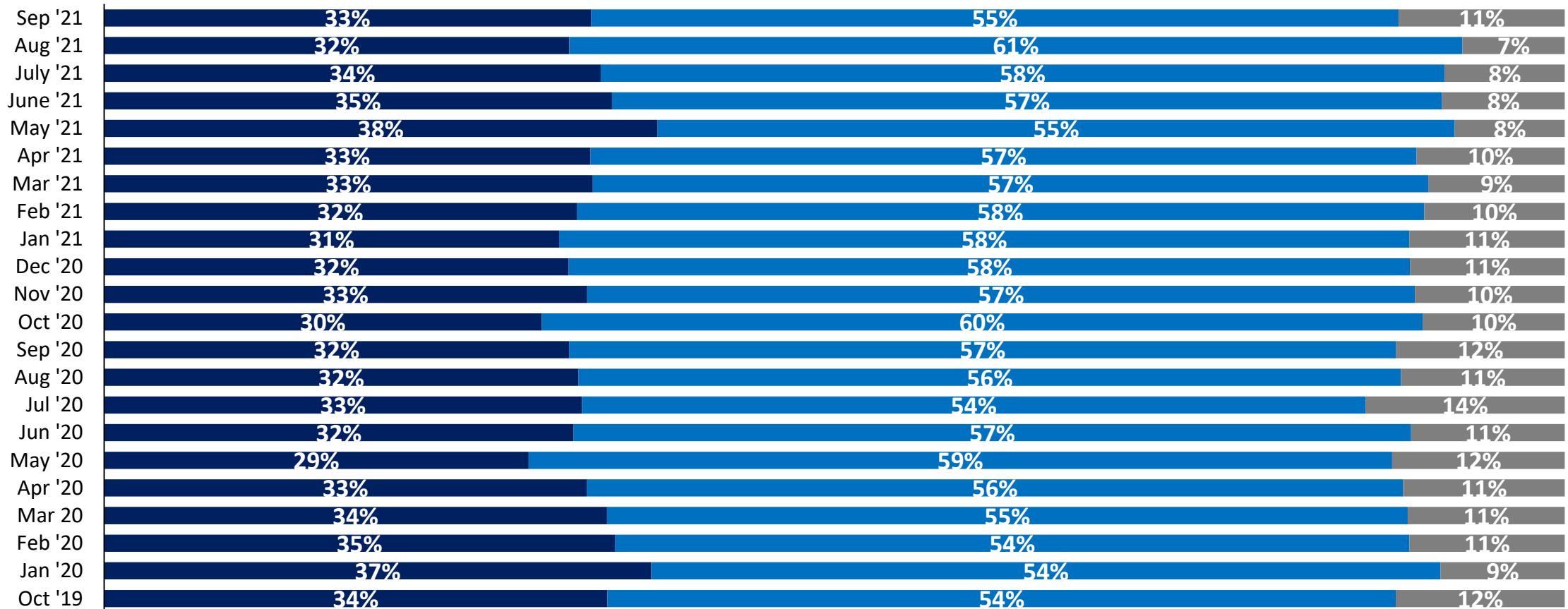

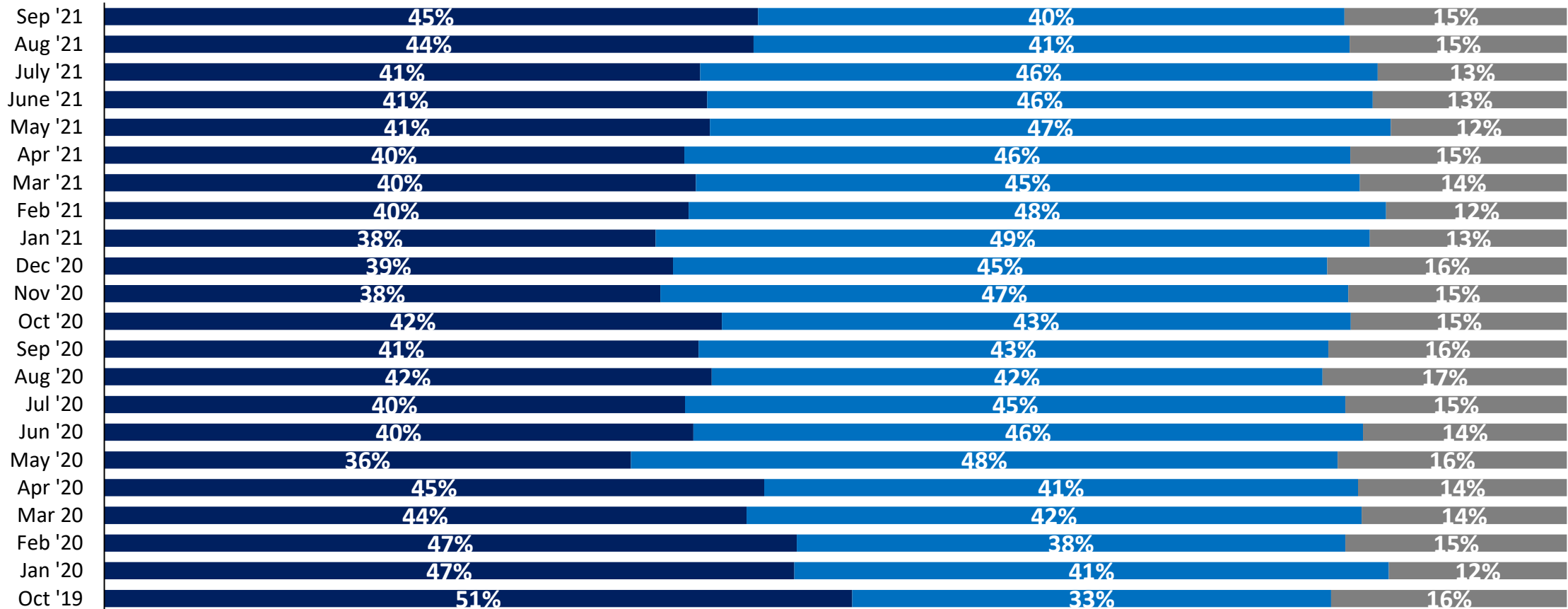

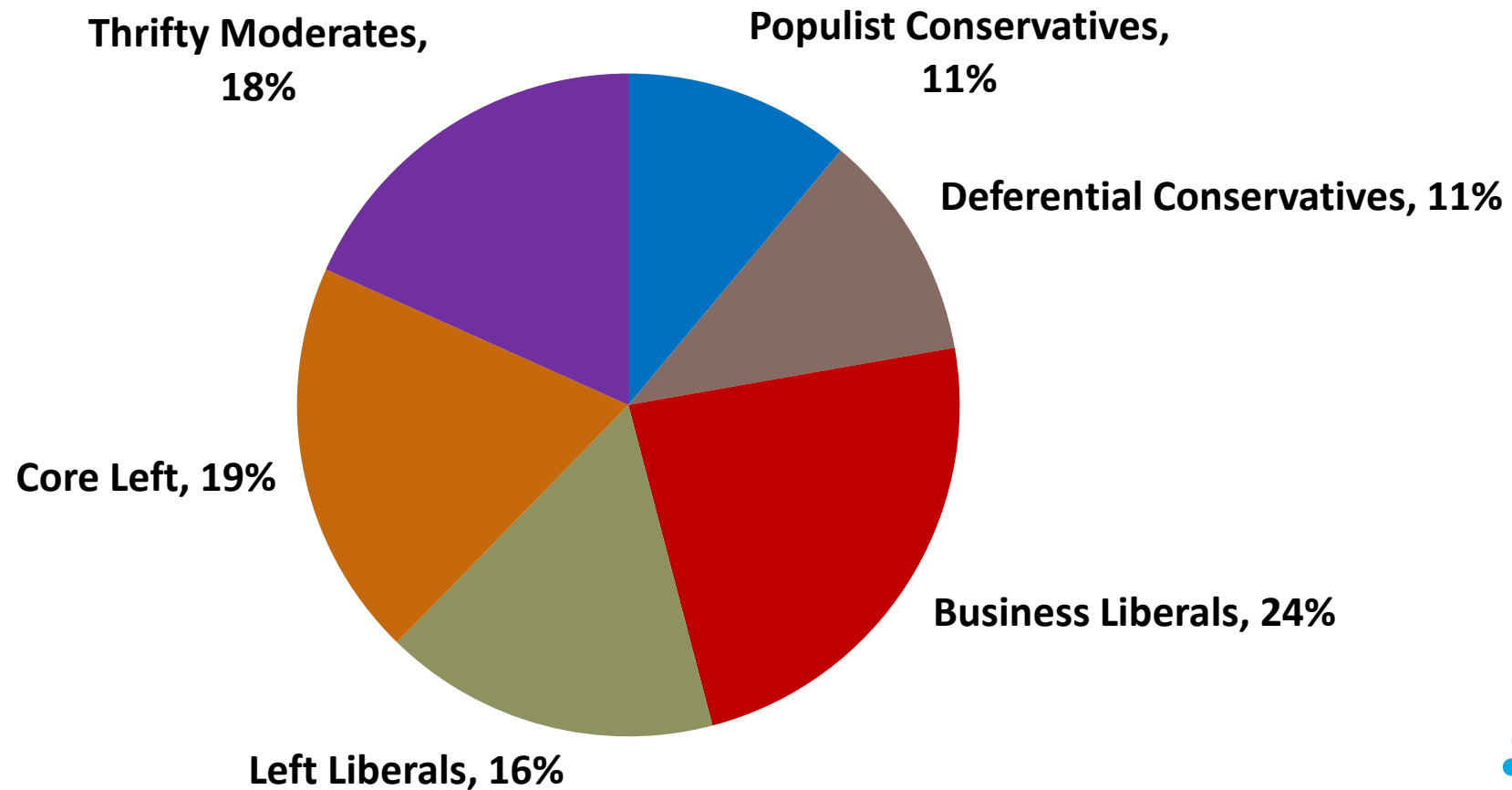

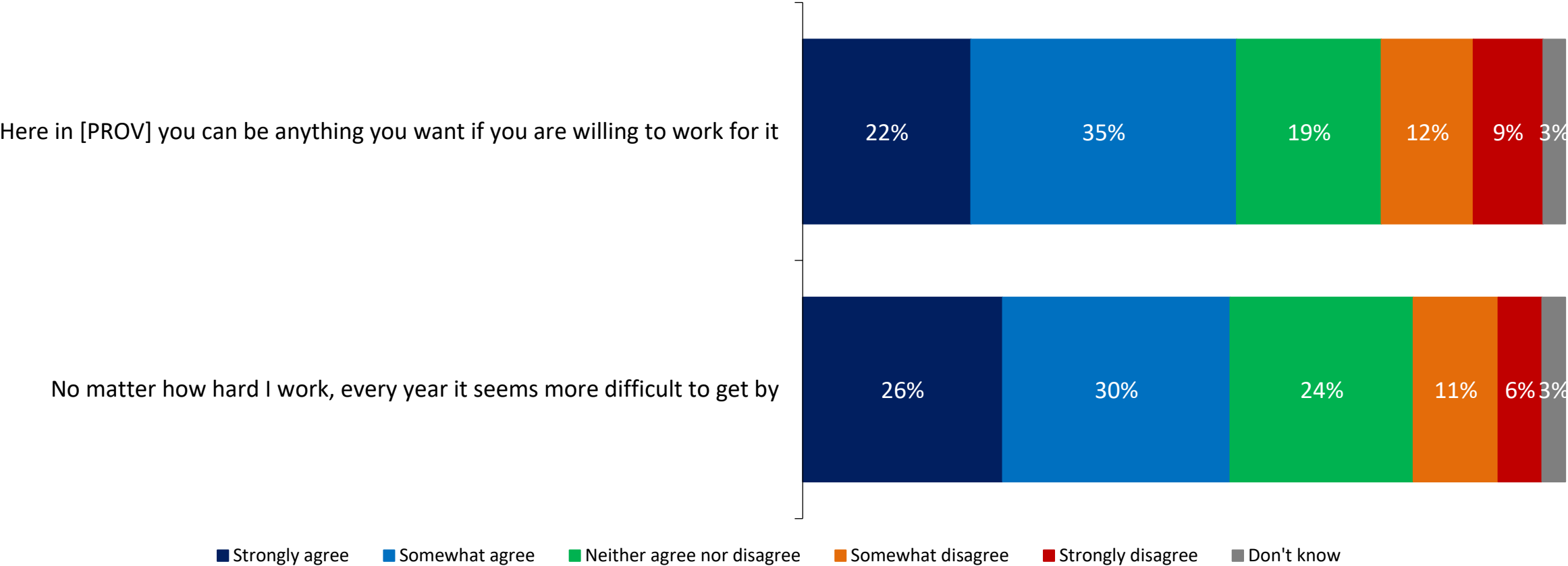

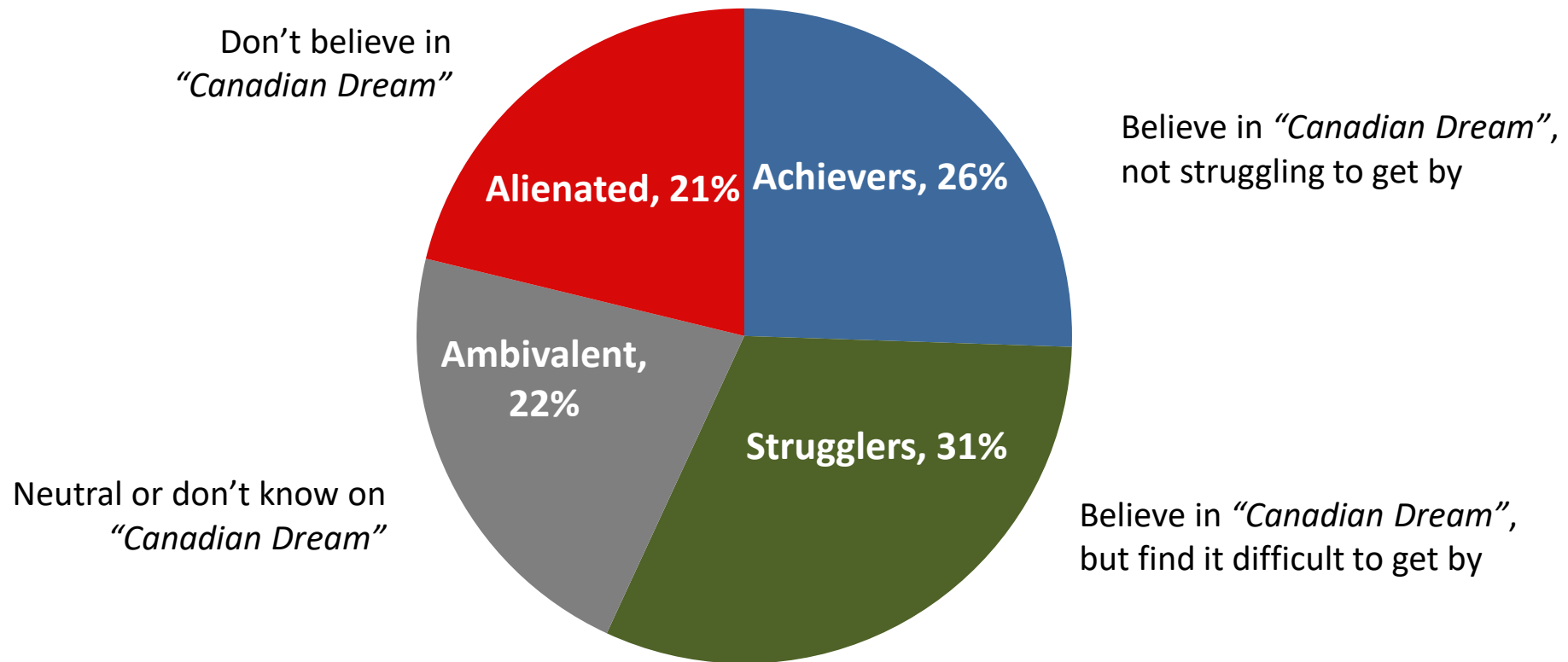

Methodology

Survey Methodology

These are the results of an online survey conducted between September 10th 2021 and September 12th, 2021, consisting of two samples merged together.

Method: The main sample was conducted using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Dynata, a leading provider of online sample. All of INNOVATIVE's core tracking questions were asked of the main sample. The secondary sample was conducted with sample from Lucid. Respondents in this sample, were asked a portion of the core tracking survey, including vote intention, and then received a series of questions on additional, separate topics. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample.

Sample Size: n=1,831 Adult Canadians, 18 years or older are in the core sample and 1,372 are in the secondary sample. The combined results are weighted to n=2,400 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.

Field Dates: September 10th 2021 to September 12th 2021.

Weighting: Results in both samples are weighted by age, gender, region, and education to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data; in order to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample. Additionally, both samples are weighted by the distribution of reported 2019 vote to match previous samples in the 2021 election to ensure that the tracking on vote intention is not influenced by a change in online panel providers. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported below.

Margin of Error: This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability based sample, a margin of error cannot be calculated. Statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates do not apply to most online panels.

Note: Graphs may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.
