

#### **Alberta Politics**

The latest COVID-19 wave has had major impacts on the Albertan political landscape. Disapproval of the government's handling of the outbreak has hit an all-time high while general government satisfaction has also seen a decline this month. The UCP now trail the NDP among all voters and also trail in key segments.

Today, INNOVATIVE is releasing results from the September 2021 *Canada This Month* survey in field from September 24<sup>th</sup> to October 5<sup>th</sup> with a weighted sample size of 500 Alberta residents. Detailed methodology is provided in the appendix.

This report covers key results on how those from Alberta are rating their government's handling of the COVID-19 outbreak and the impacts that is having on more general government approval and provincial vote choice. Under Jason Kenney, the UCP continues to slip and trails the NDP among decided voters. However, different leadership brings the UCP to a tie with the NDP.


#### Government Approval


Generally speaking, how satisfied are you with the performance of the PROVINCIAL government in Alberta? Would you say you are...? [asked of all respondents; n=500]



Do you approve or disapprove of the way the Alberta Government has handled the outbreak of COVID-19? [asked of all respondents; n=500]



#### Read, Seen, Heard


Attention to the provincial government in Alberta is significantly up since last wave of tracking and the impact of what people are hearing is now slightly less negative.

Have you read, seen or heard anything about Jason Kenney in the last few days?









#### **Read, Seen, Heard Tracking:** Awareness has significantly increased (61%) and is now at the same level as August 2021




#### Alberta Read, Seen, Heard, Impact Tracking: The positive impact of RSH has slightly improved since last tracking but is still low





#### **Value Clusters:** Albertans are split on varying degrees on value clusters <sup>14</sup> but a plurality are Business Liberals (23%)










#### **Time for Change Attitudes:** 73% of Albertans say that its time for a change in government in Alberta



Do you agree or disagree with the following statements? [asked of all respondents; n=500]







#### Leadership










#### Jason Kenney Favourability: Unfavourable impression of Kenney is now at an all time high since tracking began in August 2017








#### **Provincial Vote**

Innovative reports on vote intention in two ways.


When we ask people who they would vote for if an election were held today, and who they lean towards if they are unsure, we call those results **Combined vote**. This accounts for the views of everyone in the population including decided voters, undecided voters, and non-voters.

When we look at the results among *only* decided voters, we call that **Decided vote**. These results most tell us what the election results would be like if the survey results matched the election exactly.














## Leader of the UCP Favourables: Brian Jean is most favourable potential UCP leader with a positive net favourablility





Which of the following potential individuals who could be the leader of the United Conservative Party would make the best Premier of Alberta? [asked of all respondents; n=500]






## **Provincial Combined Vote:** UCP (38%) is on par with NDP (39%), having <sup>45</sup> the highest share of combined vote



#### Methodology

#### **Survey Methodology**

These are the results of an online survey conducted between September 24<sup>th</sup> to October 5<sup>th</sup>, 2021.

**Method:** This online survey was conducted using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Dynata, a leading provider of online sample. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample.

**Sample Size:** n=672 Alberta residents, 18 years or older. The results are weighted to n=500 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.

**Field Dates:** September 24<sup>th</sup> to October 5<sup>th</sup>, 2021.

**Weighting:** Results for Alberta are weighted by age, gender, and region to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data; in order to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported in the table.

**Margin of Error:** This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability based sample, a margin of error cannot be calculated. Statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates do not apply to most online panels.

**Note**: Graphs may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.
