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Methodology

Survey Methodology

These are the results of an online survey conducted between April 13th to April 19th, 2023.

Method: This online survey was conducted using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Lucid, a leading provider of online sample. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample.

Sample Size: n=1,508 Alberta residents, 18 years or older. The results are weighted to n=1,500 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.

Field Dates: April 13th to April 19th, 2023.

Weighting: Results for Alberta are by age, gender, region and education using the latest available Census data to reflect the actual demographic composition of the population.

Margin of Error: This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability-based sample, a margin of error cannot be calculated. Statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates do not apply to most online panels.




Core Political Values: 3-in-5 (62%) say the main role of the gov't is to create equal opportunity so that everyone can compete on their own

When governments make major decisions concerning spending on programs and services, do you think they should be basing their decisions mainly on...?



Value Clusters: 1-in-4 identify as Business Liberals while nearly 1-in-5 identify as Left Liberals (19%) or Thrifty Moderates (18%)















Generally speaking, how satisfied are you with the performance of the Alberta government under the United Conservative Party's leadership? [asked of all respondents; n=1,500]



Thinking back to their last term (2015-2019), generally speaking, how satisfied were you with the performance of the Alberta Government under the New Democratic Party's leadership?















If the **United Conservative Party** were to form the next government or hold the balance of power in a minority government, do you think **you personally** would be better off or worse off?






Impacts of UCP: Healthcare decline the top reason why people think they will be worse off under UCP and better economy for "better off"





If the **Alberta New Democratic Party** were to form the next government or hold the balance of power in a minority government, do you think **you personally** would be better off or worse off?














NDP Personality: Non-NDP voters have a better opinion of NDP than non-UCP voters have of UCP









Alberta Riding Segmentation: To win govt, the NDP must will all of last election's swing seats and half the UCP solid seats




Imputed Vote Segmentation: Ambivalent voters are a key battleground in this election






Leader Favourables by Important Segments: Notley is more favourable ⁴⁷ among the Solid UCP cluster and ambivalent voters than Smith












Which of the following leaders would make the best Premier of Alberta? [only decided voters; n=1,500]














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

































[asked of all respondents; n=1,500]






Debate Familiarity: Almost 3-in-5 (59%) were unfamiliar with the debate surrounding Take Back Alberta before the survey



As you may know, Take Back Alberta describes itself as a grassroots movement built to advance freedom and transfer power from the ruling elite to the people of the province. They say they led the fight to remove Jason Kenney as Premier due to the restrictions his government imposed during COVID-19. Now they are focused on stopping the NDP from winning the next election.

Critics feel Take Back Alberta is an extreme group trying to take control of the UCP. Some are concerned that a key organizer is facing a charge over the Coutts border blockade. Some are concerned TBA is pushing the UCP towards more private health care and education or loosen or break Alberta's ties with the rest of Canada. Others say their efforts to elect candidates and riding level UCP executives feel like a coup.


How familiar were you with the debate surrounding Take Back Alberta before this survey? [asked of all respondents; n=1,500]



Take Back Alberta: 2-in-5 (41%) oppose the Take Back Alberta organization while 1-in-4 (19%) support it




Do you support or oppose the Take Back Alberta organization? [asked of all respondents; n=1,500]
