

#### **Key Findings – Carbon Tax Exemption**

Support for the carbon tax has fallen to the lowest level since tracking began.

At 33%, 2 points below the July 2018 low-point, support for the carbon tax is the lowest since tracking began. Support is weak among those in the Prairies, AB, and the Atlantic, and among Conservatives and the politically Unaligned.

Support for the carbon tax has declined across nearly all regions and party identifications.

Most regions have become less supportive of the carbon tax. The Atlantic saw the biggest change, with net support dropping 12 points since January 2023. Support also dropped across party ID. Support among Liberals declined the most, with net support down 9 points. Interestingly, while still broadly opposed, net support has grown 14 points among Conservatives.

Canadians are divided on the carbon tax exemption.

The exemption caused mixed reactions, with similar shares reporting anger (37%) and non-anger (40%), and support being closely divided across support (27%), neutrality (31%), opposition (28%). Conservatives reported the most anger (52%), while Liberals expressed the most support (34%).

Support for a carbon tax exemption expansion is high.

Support for expanded carbon tax exemptions is high regardless of region, politics, and demographics. It is highest among Conservatives at 72%, but more than half of Liberals still support an expansion (52%), as do half of Core Liberal Government supporters (50%).

Carbon tax is viewed as an important tool – but people still want to look for ways to expand the exemption.

Just over half (51%) acknowledge the carbon tax as an important tool in fighting climate change, but many nonetheless want more exemptions (20%), or to eliminate the carbon tax completely (33%). Liberals are the most likely to recognize the carbon tax as important, but also want to expand exemptions (28%).


#### Support for Carbon Tax: Nearly equal shares support as oppose the carbon tax, support is highest among Liberals (51%)




Do you support or oppose the federal government implementing the following policy?


### **General Support for Carbon Tax | Tracking:** At +3pts, net support for the carbon tax is the lowest since July 2018










## **Exemption Familiarity:** Just over half (51%) are unfamiliar with the exemption; familiarity is highest among Conservatives (62%)







# **Exemption Reaction:** 55% of those in the Prairies, 51% of those in Alberta, and 52% of Conservatives felt angry with the exemption

How did you feel when you heard about the exemption on the carbon tax on home heating oil for Atlantic provinces?











# **Exemption Support:** A plurality are neutral on the exemption; support is highest among Liberals (34%) and those in the Atlantic (41%)









## **Exemption Expansion Support:** Over half (55%) support an expansion, high among Conservatives (72%); 52% of Liberals support an expansion






#### Exemption Expansion Support by Region and Political Segments: Even 13 among Core and Soft LPC supporters, support for an expansion is high




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# **Exemption Expansion Support by Other Audience Segments:** Net support for an expansion among Strugglers is high, at +57%


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
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#### Reported Impact on Liberal Vote: A plurality (41%) are neither more or 15 less likely to vote Liberal; 46% of the Alienated say they are less likely


After hearing about this announcement, would you say you are more likely or less likely to vote for Justin Trudeau and the Liberal Party in the next federal election?









# One View of Carbon Tax: A majority still support a carbon tax, but many supporters want more exemptions, highest among Liberals (28%)








#### **Another View of Carbon Tax:** Less than a third would not make further 17 reductions, just over half want more cuts or to 'axe the tax'









## **Heat Pump Policy Familiarity:** The Atlantic (58%) is the most familiar with the policy, followed by British Columbians (47%)



As part of the announcement on home heating oil, the federal government also announced supports to help low income people get heat pumps. Heat pumps are a form of electric home heating that works by extracting heat from a low temperature place and delivering it to a higher temperature place. Heat pumps can also work in reverse to provide home cooling.


How familiar were you with the federal government's announcement on supports for electric heat pumps? [asked of all respondents; n=1,000]








# **Heat Pump Policy Support:** Those with high concern for the climate (67%) are the most supportive; Strugglers are also supportive (61%)



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#### Methodology

#### **Survey Methodology**



These are the results of an online survey conducted between November 2<sup>nd</sup> and November 14<sup>th</sup>, 2023.

**Method:** This online survey was conducted using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Lucid, a leading provider of online samples. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample.

**Sample Size:** n=2,634 Canadian citizens, 18 years or older. The results are nationally weighted to n=1,000 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.

**Field Dates:** November 2<sup>nd</sup> and November 14<sup>th</sup>, 2023.

**Weighting:** Results for Canada are weighted by age, gender, region, education, and past federal vote to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data; in order to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported in the table.

**Margin of Error:** This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability-based sample, a margin of error cannot be calculated. Statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates do not apply to most online panels.

**Note**: Graphs may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.
