

#### **Key Findings**

Public interest in the federal budget relatively steady since last year, down in the previous five years.

46% of respondents have heard something about the federal budget, while 48% had not heard anything.

Public opinion on the federal budget is negative among those familiar with the topic.

Net satisfaction with the federal budget saw a sharp decrease of 23 points since last year, now at -30%.

3-in-4 think their personal situation will be negatively impacted by the federal budget.

When thinking about the federal budget, at least 45% report feeling anxious or angry.

The plurality think that the federal budget will make things worse for younger Canadians.

More than twice the amount of people think that the impact on young people would be negative.

The plurality are familiar with the capital gains tax and think it is a mistake.

44% are familiar with the capital gains tax and 46% think it is a mistake that will hurt the economy. 44% say it will impact how much tax they pay.

#### Methodology

#### **Survey Methodology**



These are the results of an online survey conducted between April 18<sup>th</sup> and April 21<sup>st</sup>, 2024.

**Method:** This online survey was conducted using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Lucid, a leading provider of online samples. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample.

**Sample Size:** n=1,408 Canadian citizens, 18 years or older. The results are nationally weighted to n=1,000 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.

Field Dates: April 18<sup>th</sup> to April 21<sup>st</sup>, 2024.

**Weighting:** Results for Canada are weighted by age, gender, region, education, and self-reported federal past vote to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data, in order to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported in the table.

**Margin of Error:** This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability-based sample, a margin of error cannot be calculated. Statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates do not apply to most online panels.

**Note**: Graphs may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.











## **Read, Seen, Heard Budget (Tracking):** Attention to federal budget has not shifted compared to past years






## **Satisfaction with Budget:** Over half are dissatisfied with the federal budget, while only 23% are satisfied






#### Satisfaction with Budget by Values Clusters: Satisfaction since last year down 10 most among Conservative clusters and Left Liberals

In general, how satisfied are you with the federal budget? [asked of those aware of budget, n=464]




## **Impression of Budget:** 49% were left feeling less favourable towards the federal government; 33% say the budget made no difference






#### Impression of Budget (Tracking): Net favourability down sharply, now at -34%







Do you think your own personal situation will be directly impacted by the new Liberal federal budget? [asked of all respondents, n=1,000]




## **Type of Impact:** 3-in-4 say the federal budget will have a negative personal impact; Populist Conservatives and Hostiles most likely to say 'negative'

#### **Type of Impact by Age:** Perception of impact more positive among younger Canadians, but net positive is still highly negative across all age groups









## **Impact on Economy:** 44% think that the federal budget will have a negative impact on the economy, highest among Populist Conservatives and Hostiles










#### **Impact on Unemployment:** 1-in-3 believe that the budget will result in higher unemployment, higher among Populist Conservatives and Hostiles






## **Impact on Unemployment (Tracking):** Share of those who say higher unemployment up 5 points since last year








#### **Impact on Economic Growth:** 40% believe that the budget will result in a lower rate of economic growth







## **Impact on Economic Growth (Tracking):** Share of those who say lower rate up 6 points since last year



## **Impact on Health Care:** Over 1-in-3 believe that the federal budget will leave health care system worse off; 32% say it will make no difference






## **Impact on Health Care (Tracking):** Share of those who say better off down by 9 points since last year



Do you think the budget will leave the Canadian health care system better off, worse off or will it make no difference? [asked of all respondents, n=1,000]





## **Impact on User Fees:** Nearly half think that the budget will result in them paying more for gov't fees, with only 5% saying less










# **Impact on Taxes:** 3-in-5 believe that the federal budget will result in them paying more taxes, highest among Populist Conservatives and Hostiles






## **Impact on Taxes (Tracking):** The share of those who say the federal budget will result in them paying more taxes is up 6 points




Do you think the budget will result in you paying more taxes, less taxes, or will it make no difference? [asked of all respondents, n=1,000]





## **Anxiety:** When thinking about the new federal budget, 45% feel anxious often and 42% not very often







## **Anxiety (Tracking):** More feel anxious often when thinking about the new federal budget now than ever before




# **Anger:** When thinking about the new federal budget, 47% feel angry often and 43% not very often












#### Capital Gains Tax

#### Familiarity with Capital Gains Tax: 44% are familiar with the capital gains tax, highest among Populist Conservatives (64%)




How familiar are you with the government's plan to collect more revenue from capital gains taxes? [asked of all respondents, n=1,000]







## Attitude towards Capital Gains Tax: More people think that capital gains tax is a bad idea than a good idea





## **Personal Impact of Capital Gains Tax:** Slightly more think that capital gains tax will impact how much tax they pay, higher in Time for Change segment (65%)




## **Federal Combined Vote (Tracking):** No significant change in horserace results following the budget - Conservatives lead Liberals by 12 points


#### Federal Decided Vote (Tracking): No significant change in horserace results following the budget - Conservatives maintain a large lead over Liberals




## **Economic Gap Segmentation:** 1-in-3 qualify as Strugglers; other segments are relatively equally distributed




Do you agree or disagree with the following statements? - *It is time for a change in government here in Canada*. [asked of all respondents, n=1,000]


Do you agree or disagree with the following statements? - The Liberals may have their problems but they are still the best party to form government. [asked of all respondents, n=1,000]




When governments make major decisions concerning spending on programs and services, do you think they should be based on... [asked of all respondents, n=1,000]




Which of the following statements comes closest to your view? [asked of all respondents, n=1,000]






## **Values Clusters:** 20% qualify as Business Liberals, while 21% falls in Pay-as-you-go Moderates
