

Neighbours 2: Energy and Trade What make Canadians and American alike, and different

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Summary

01

Canadians and Americans are conflicted on the energy transition. While Americans and Canadians are concerned about climate change and have a positive impression of the energy transition, they also favour energy selfsufficiency and support developing and exporting oil and gas.

02

Both Americans and Canadians see free trade agreements as a good way to create economic growth in their country. Additionally, both Canadians and Americans see the existing free trade agreement between the two countries as a good thing and see the export/import of oil and electricity as a good thing.

This survey shows cancelling the IRA divides Americans and may not be an effective election wedge with swing voters, <u>But once elected, cancelling the IRA has some appeal to the Republican base</u>. The US IRA has put pressure on Canadian governments to increase incentives so Canadian corporations can effectively compete for investments in green technologies. If Trump does cancel the IRA, it removes an important factor driving Canadian incentives.



The general idea of raising tariffs has strong appeal among Republicans, but raising taxes on Canadian imports is less popular. Free trade with Canada, including energy imports, is well regarded by Americans. So Canadian interests have a strong case to make for being left out of a general tariff increase. <u>But if Trump wants to raise</u> <u>Canadian tariffs, it will not significantly hurt him with the Republican base, at least not initially.</u>

Canadian Survey Methodology

These are the results of an online survey conducted between June 7th and June 11th, 2024.

Method: This online survey was conducted using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Dynata, a leading provider of online sample. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample.

Sample Size: n= 1,733 general population, 18 years or older. The results are weighted to n=1,500 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.

Field Dates: June 7th to June 11th, 2024.

Weighting: Results for Canada are weighted by age, gender, education, region and past federal vote to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data; in order to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported in the table.

Margin of Error: This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability based sample, a margin of error cannot be calculated. Statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates do not apply to most online panels.

Note: Graphs may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.

American Survey Methodology

These are the results of an online survey conducted between June 7th and June 17th, 2024.

Method: This online survey was conducted using Dynata, a leading provider of online sample. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual American population according to Census data to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample.

Sample Size: n=2,946 registered voters, 18 years or older. The results are weighted to n=2,000 based on Census and Current Population Survey data for all adults, with those who report not being registered screened out. Four potential tipping point states were oversampled to n=300 each (North Carolina, Pennsylvania, Georgia and Minnesota)

Field Dates: June 7th to June 17th, 2020.

Weighting: Results for all American adults are weighted by age, gender, education, race, past presidential vote, and region to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census and population survey data; in order to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample. Respondents who report not being registered to vote were screened out of the final sample. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported in the table.

Margin of Error: This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability based sample, a margin of error cannot be calculated. Statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates do not apply to most online panels.

Note: Graphs may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.


Canada vs US - Environment






Climate Change: Both Canadians (76%) and Americans (72%) believe that human activity is the cause of climate change




NOTE: For tracking in Canada, prior to 2010, the term "global warming" was used in place of "climate change." Prior to 2024, results only show who believe climate change is occurring. Extremely concerned' was recently added in March 2022.

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




Energy Transition Familiarity: in 2024, more Americans (58%) are familiar with the energy system transition idea than Canadians (48%)




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NOTE: "Don't know" was not included as an option when asked in September 2023. In addition, wording for two response options are slightly different from November 2019 to April 2023 i.e. "Very familiar and can explain it to others in detail" was "I understand the details and can explain them to others" while "Somewhat familiar with the idea but cannot explain it others" was "I am familiar with the idea of an energy transition but cannot explain it to others".








Do you agree or disagree with the following statements? [asked of all respondents; Canada n=1,500, United States n=2,000]


















The United States currently has a free trade agreement with Canada. Do you think free trade with Canada has generally been a good thing for America or a bad thing for America?




Free Trade: Both Canadians and Americans see the imports/exports of oil and electricity as more of a good thing than bad thing for their country

Canada currently exports electricity to the United States. Do you think exporting electricity to the United States has generally been a good thing for Canada or a bad thing for Canada?



Canada currently exports oil to the United States. Do you think exporting oil to the United States has generally been a good thing for Canada or a bad thing for Canada?



The United States currently imports electricity from Canada. Do you think importing oil from Canada has generally been a good thing for America or a bad thing for America?


