
This year's results includes a sample of 2,830 Canadians (18 years and older), weighted to n=2,000. Please see slide 42 for a detailed survey methodology.

12% of survey respondents report Indigenous ancestry, steady since last year




Importance of Ancestry:

Do you agree or disagree with the following statement: "My First Nations/Inuit/Métis heritage is an important part of who I am as a person."





Personal connection and contact with Indigenous peoples is stable over time








Net impression on Indigenous peoples' organizations down 5 pts at +23%





Only 15% of respondents have RSH recently about Indigenous peoples, down 8 points since last year




Read, Seen, Heard (Open-Ended):



Which of the following issues is the most important issue to you? [asked of all respondents, n=2,000]




Most Important Indigenous Issue:



Themes around 'equality' were common in recent years while 'land claims' were common in earlier years



Familiarity:


Familiarity with the history of residential schools down directionally 4 pts from last year




Feeling about Treatment:

Net angry remains high at +54% this year but lower than last year (down 12 pts)









Government Efforts:

2-in-5 say the government is doing too little; highest among those who identify as NDP and Core Left cluster








Familiarity:


Issue from Past or Present:

Over half (56%) believe the discovery is a present issue, higher among those who identify as NDP (72%)







- This discovery is an issue from Canada's past and doesn't have any implications for governments today

Net approval of government response up 4 points, now negative at -2%






Government Approval

Net federal gov't approval is up 7 pts from last year; approval highest among those who identify as Liberal (42%)




Federal Government Responsibility:

Less than half (47%) think federal government should be doing more, down 7 pts from last year








Provincial Government Approval by Region (Tracking):


After being in the lead since 2019, Quebec falls to -2% in net approval while BC takes the lead at +8%


United Nations Declaration on Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP)


Only 1-in-5 are familiar with UNDRIP; steady from last year


Support:


Over half (56%) think fully adopting and implementing UNDRIP is a good idea, down 4 pts directionally

The UN declaration includes language that would require "free, prior and informed consent" of Indigenous groups in Canada before adopting and policies that may affect them. On April 24th, 2017, Canada's Minister of Indigenous and Northern Affairs, Carolyn Bennett, announced that Canada would fully adopt and implement the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples.


Attitudes and Values – Moral Obligations:







Indigenous Attitudes Segmentation:

Most Canadians are either equal treatment supporters (36%) or conflicted (34%)

Based on the two statements "Canada's Indigenous peoples should have the same rights as any other Canadian, no more and no less" and "Indigenous peoples should have the rights and status they need to protect their culture and heritage, even if it means they may have certain rights other Canadians do not have," we have segmented the population by their attitudes towards Indigenous rights.









Indigenous rights supporters far more likely than equal treatment supporters to have a positive impression






Restrictions on Mining Permits:

A plurality (45%) support restrictions on mining permits while 30% oppose; support is highest among Core Left

Earlier this year, the BC government announced an interim order placing restrictions on previously-issued mining permits in two BC First Nation traditional territories. These measures prevented mineral developers and prospectors to exercise their permit rights without the consent of the respective Nations. Do you support or oppose the BC government's interim order of placing restrictions on mining permits unless local First Nations agree to the activities?

Methodology

Survey Methodology



These are the results of an online survey conducted between May 2nd and May 12th, 2024.

Method: This online survey was conducted using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Lucid, a leading provider of online samples. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample.

Sample Size: n=2,830 Canadian citizens, 18 years or older. The results are nationally weighted to n=2,000 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.

Field Dates: May 2nd and May 12th, 2024.

Weighting: Results for Canada are weighted by age, gender, region, education, and self-reported federal past vote to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data; in order to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported in the table.

Margin of Error: This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability-based sample, a margin of error cannot be calculated. Statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates do not apply to most online panels.

Note: Graphs may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.




Almost 3-in-5 (58%) say that the main role of the government is "to create equal opportunity"

When governments make major decisions concerning spending on programs and services, do you think they should be basing their decisions mainly on...?




Value Clusters:
