

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
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Have you read, seen or heard anything about [PREMIER] in the last few days?




Leader Favourables:





If a provincial election were held today, which party would you vote for? In that case, which party do you lean toward slightly? [Vote + Lean] [asked of all respondents; n=1500]






Provincial Vote Tracking:

If a provincial election were held today, which party would you vote for? In that case, which party do you lean toward slightly? [Vote + Lean] [asked of all respondents; n=1500]




Provincial Decided Vote:

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Progressive Conservative party holds over half the entire vote (51%); Liberals and NDP only making 41% together


If a provincial election were held today, which party would you vote for? In that case, which party do you lean toward slightly? [DECIDED] [decided voters only; n=1286]




Provincial 2nd Choice:



60% of Ontarians agree it is time for a change in government in Ontario, despite 49% still believing in the PC Party






Time for Change Segmentation:

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




There has been speculation that an election may be called in Ontario. Which of the following statements is closest to your point of view? BY Combined Vote



Methodology

Methodology

This online survey was conducted using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Lucid, a leading provider of online sample. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Ontario population according to Census data to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample. The survey was conducted among 1,800 Ontario citizens, 18 years of age and older, from January 03, 2025 to January 27, 2025.

The sample has been weighted (n=1,500) by age, gender, region, education, and self-reported federal past vote using the latest available Census data to reflect the actual demographic composition of the population.

Note: The two questions about calling an election were added to the survey on January 23rd and carry a weighted sample of n=500.

This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability-based sample, a margin of error cannot be calculated. Statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates do not apply to most online panels.



Note: Graphs and tables may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.

Ontario Weights: Age, gender, and region

Results for Ontario are weighted by age, gender, region, education, and self-reported federal past vote to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data; in order to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported below.
