# Survey Methodology

The findings in this survey report are based on an online survey conducted by INNOVATIVE.

## WHO?



Adults (18+) in Ontario

## HOW MANY?



A survey of 963 adults. The final sample is weighted to n=800 among all adults.

## WHEN?



February 12<sup>th</sup> to  
February 16<sup>th</sup>, 2025

## HOW?



Online survey using online sample from INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Lucid, a leading provider of online sample.

# Key Findings

1. The Ontario PCs continue to maintain a huge lead with 45% in the decided vote despite a small decline.
2. Despite Ford net leader favourables being down to +3%, 37% believe Ford would still be the best choice for Premier followed by 22% who believe Crombie would be the best Premier.
3. This wave, just under half (49%) have read, seen, or heard anything about Ford. Compared to previous waves, more have read, seen, or heard something about Crombie (from 25% in the previous waves to 33% this wave).
4. The top mention recalled about Ford is his stance against Trump followed by the Premier conference in Washington to discuss the tariffs from the United States. Of those who have read, seen, or heard something, more have a favourable impression at +20% this wave.

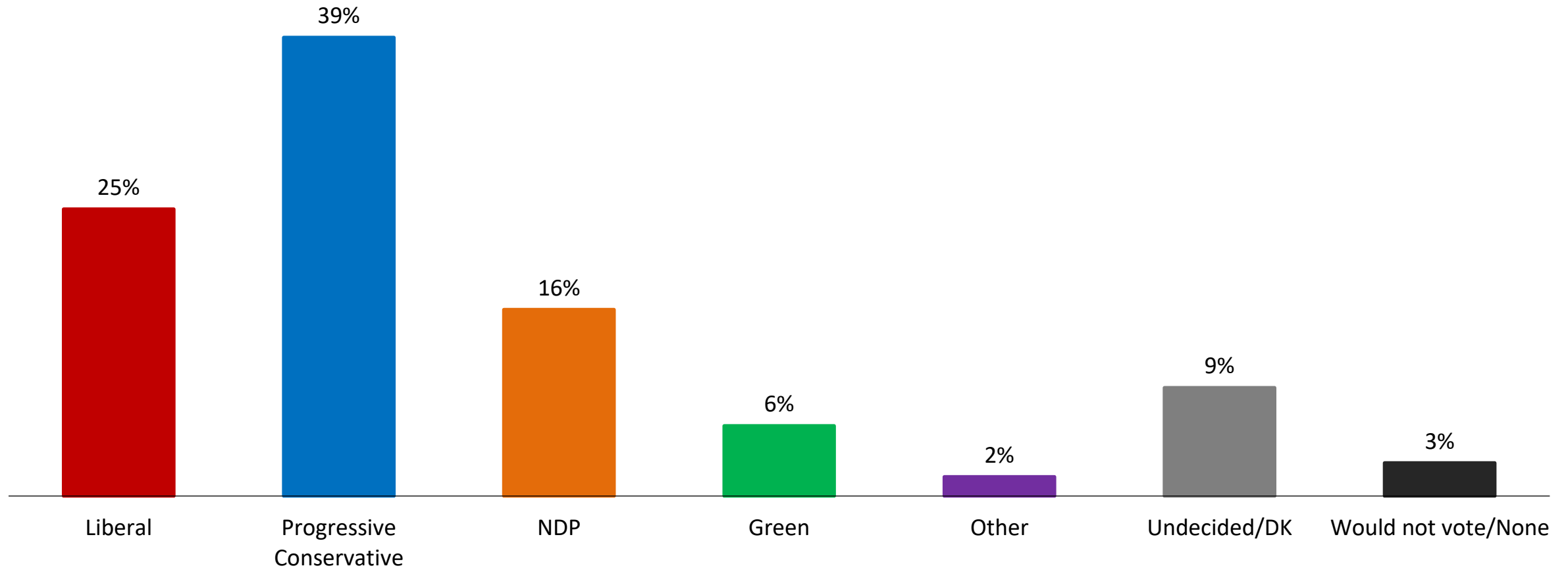

If a provincial election were held today, which party would you vote for? In that case, which party do you lean toward slightly? **[Vote + Lean]**

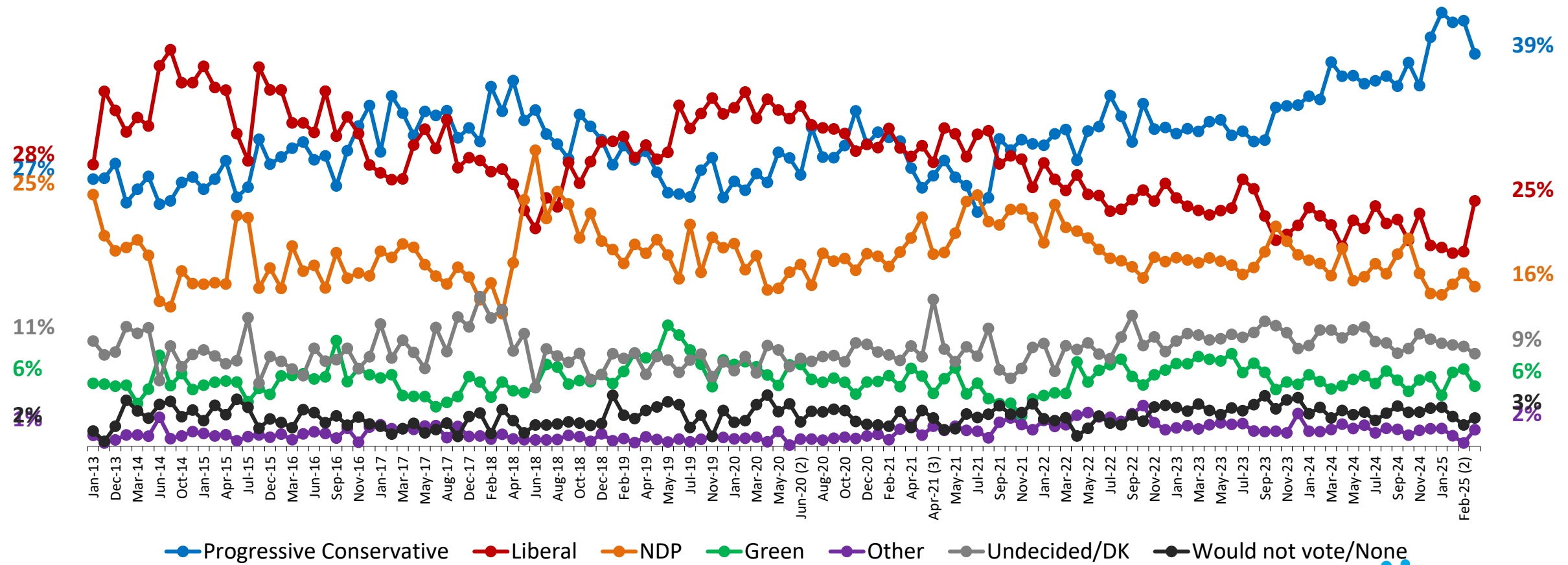

# Provincial Vote Tracking: Progressive Conservatives continue to maintain a lead over the other parties though Liberals are up this wave



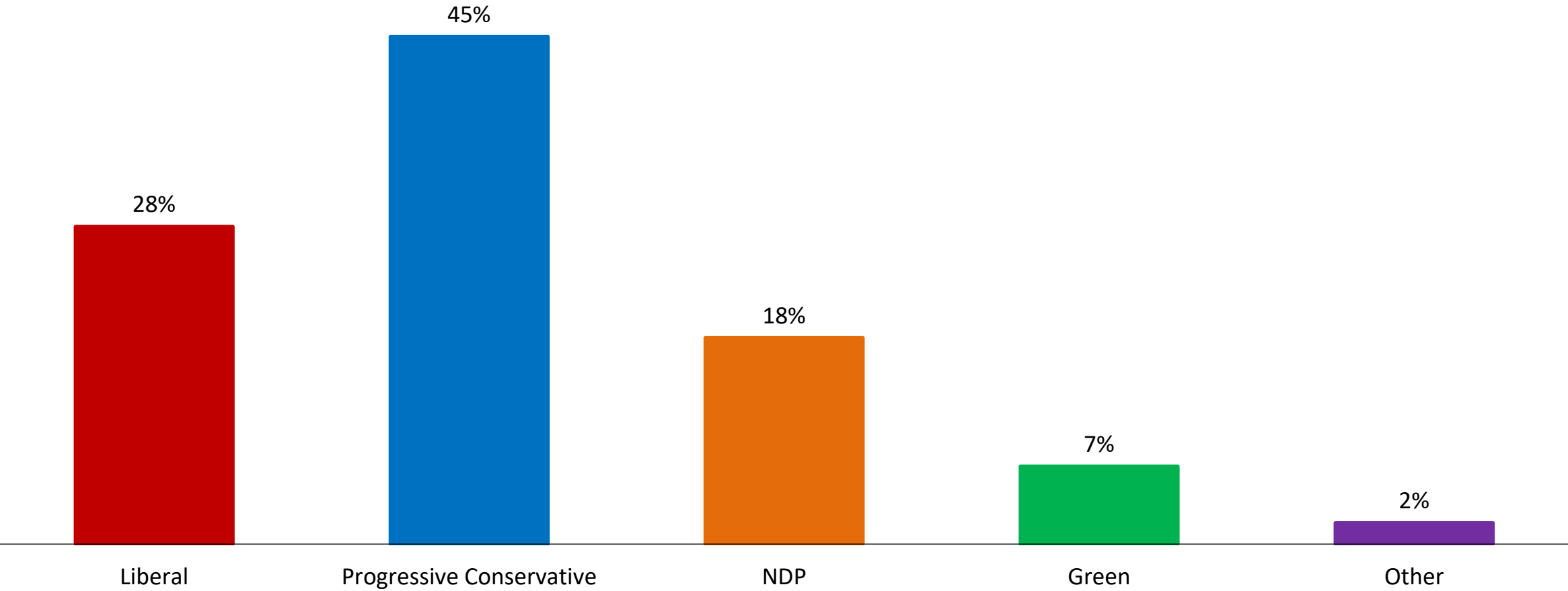

# Provincial Decided Vote: Over 2-in-5 (45%) are decided on voting for the Progressive Conservatives, Liberals at 28% and NDP at 18%



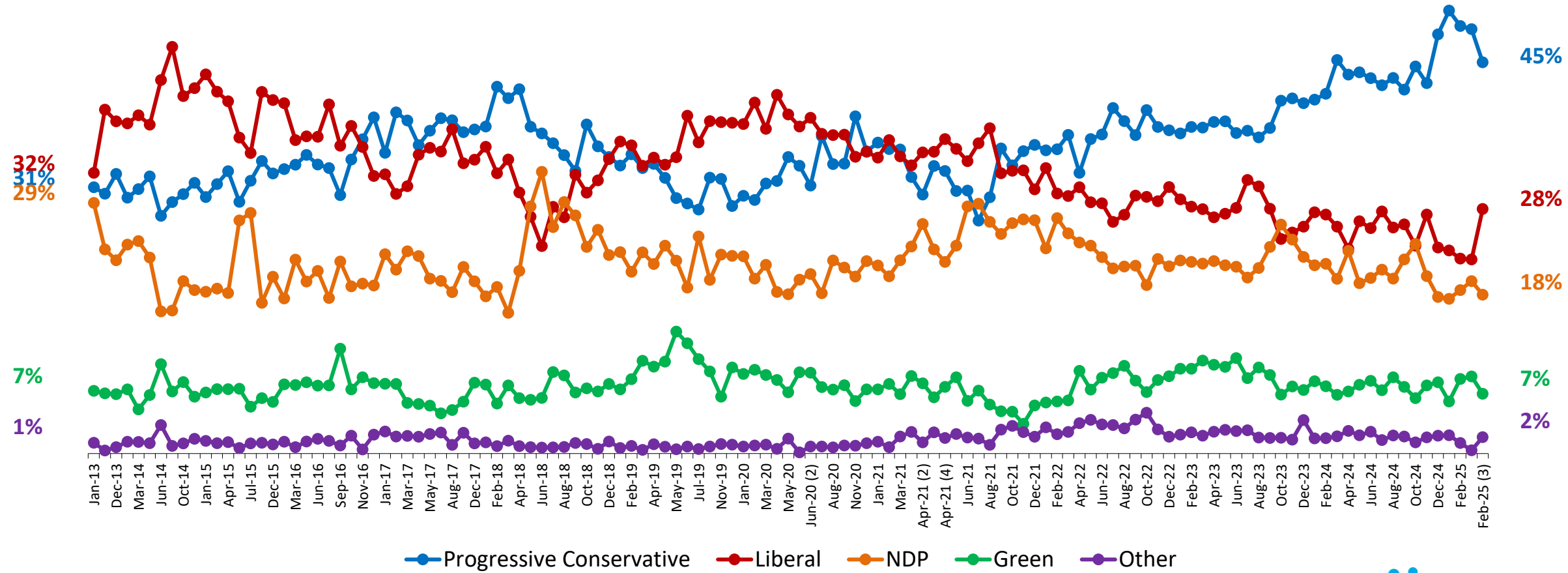
If a provincial election were held today, which party would you vote for? In that case, which party do you lean toward slightly? **[DECIDED]**

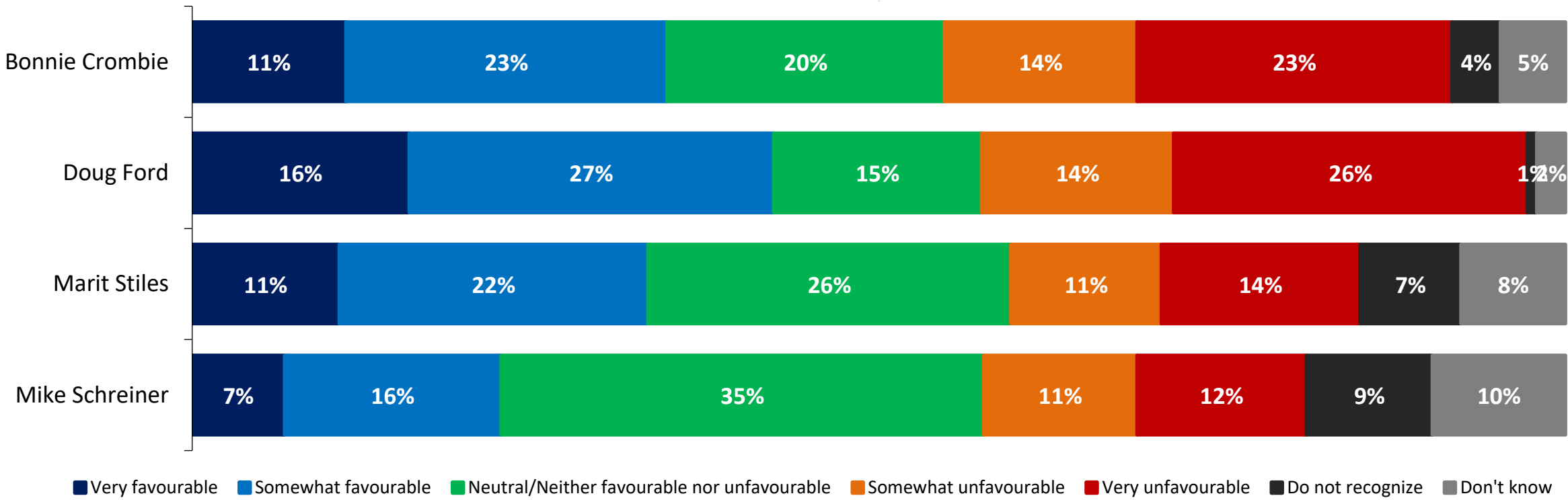


# Leader Favourables: Ford leads with favourables at 42%; favourability of Crombie and Stiles are nearly split, 35% and 33%, respectively

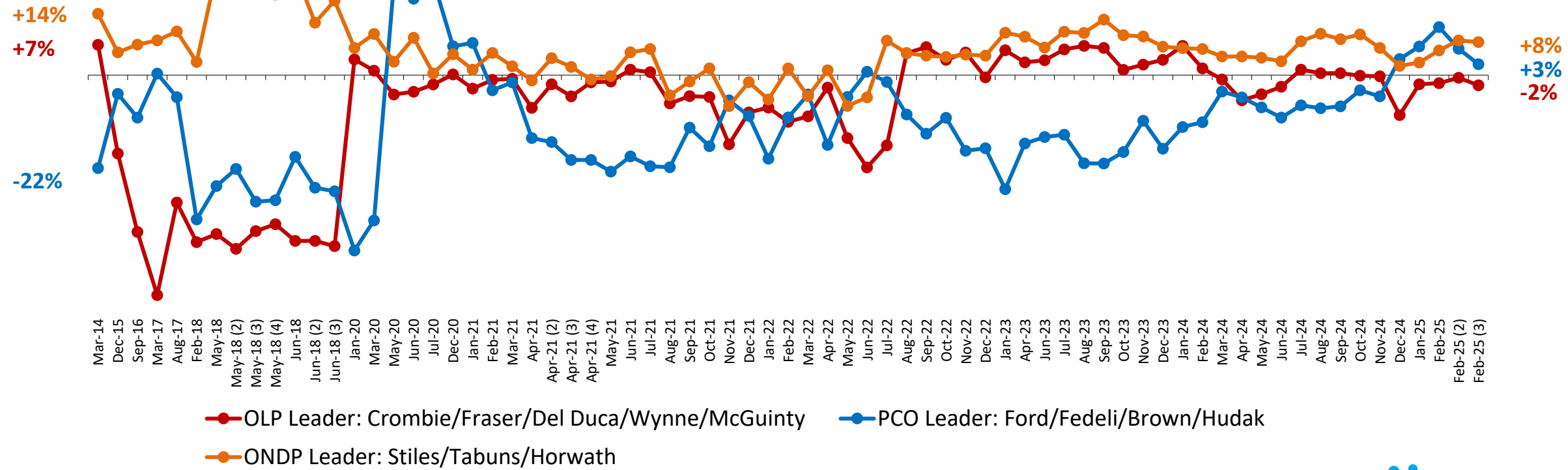


# Ontario Party Leader NET Favourables Tracking: Net favourables of Ford is below Stiles after hitting a recent peak

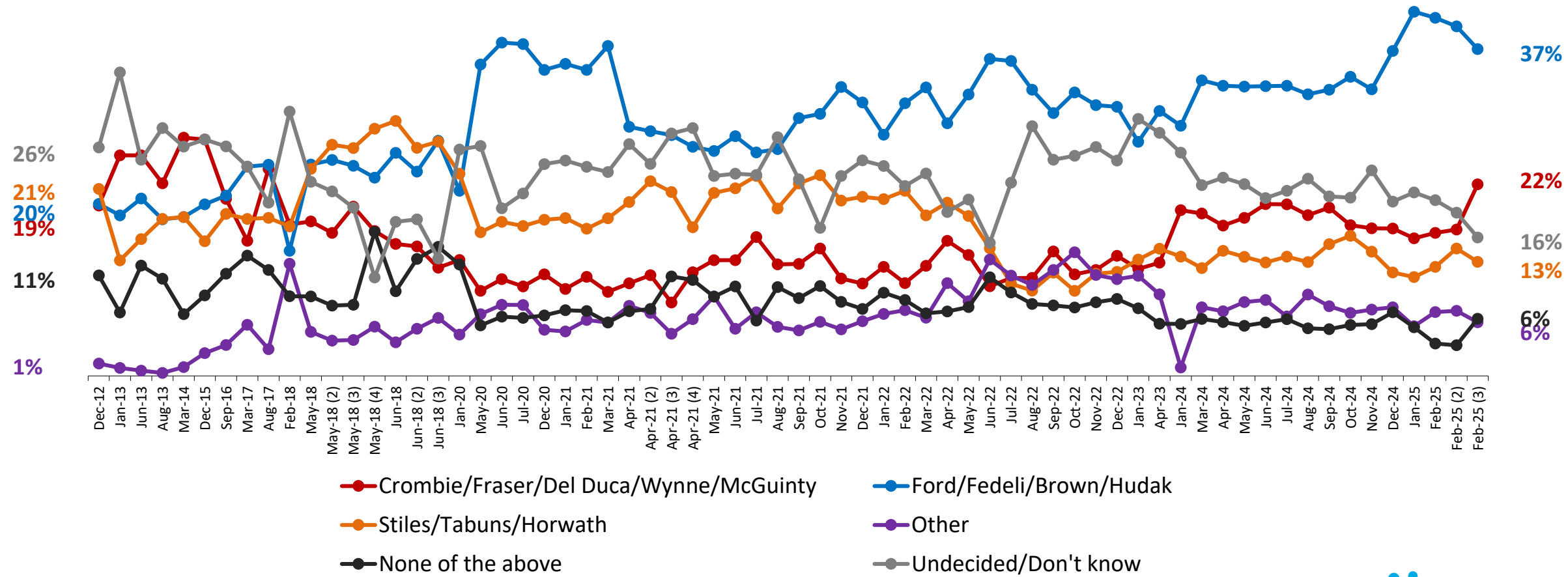

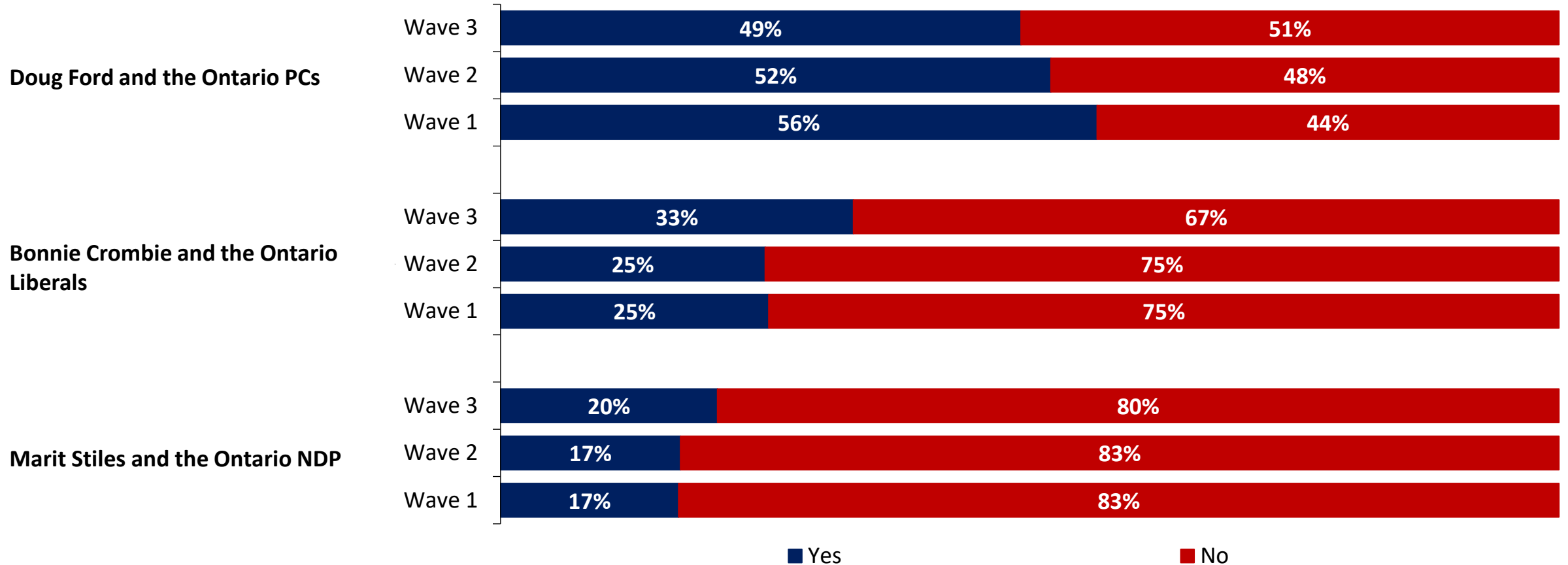

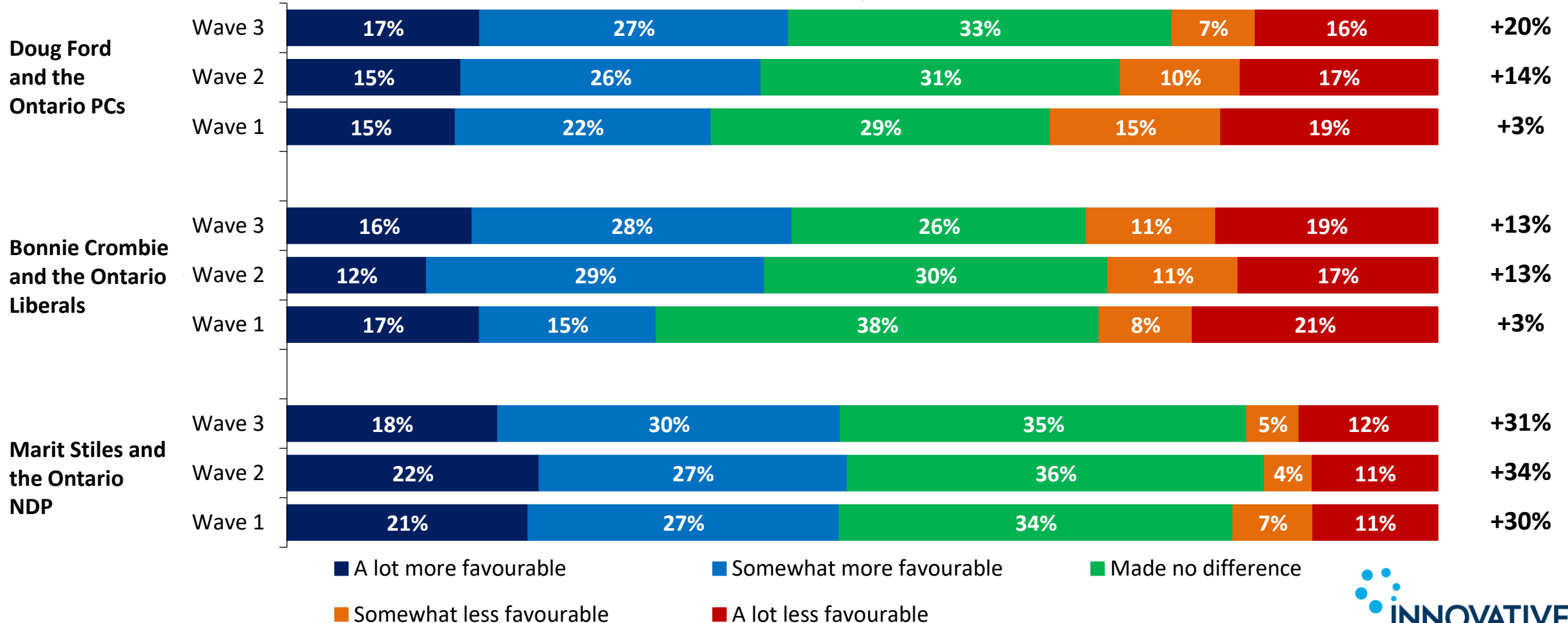


# RSH Impact: Those who RSH about Ford were left with more favourable impressions compared to previous waves

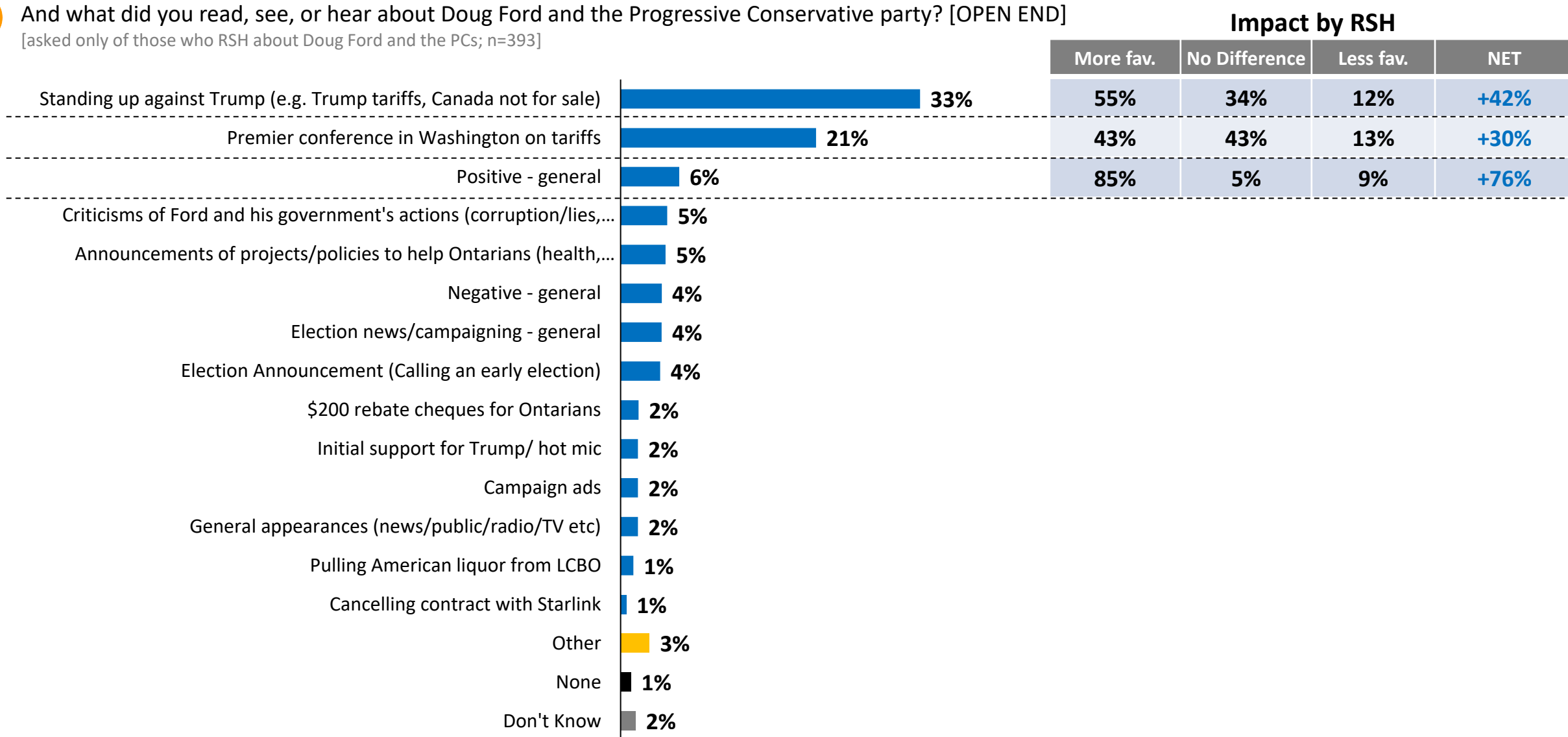


# RSH PCs: Top mention is Ford standing up against Trump, followed by the recent premier conference in Washington to discuss tariffs

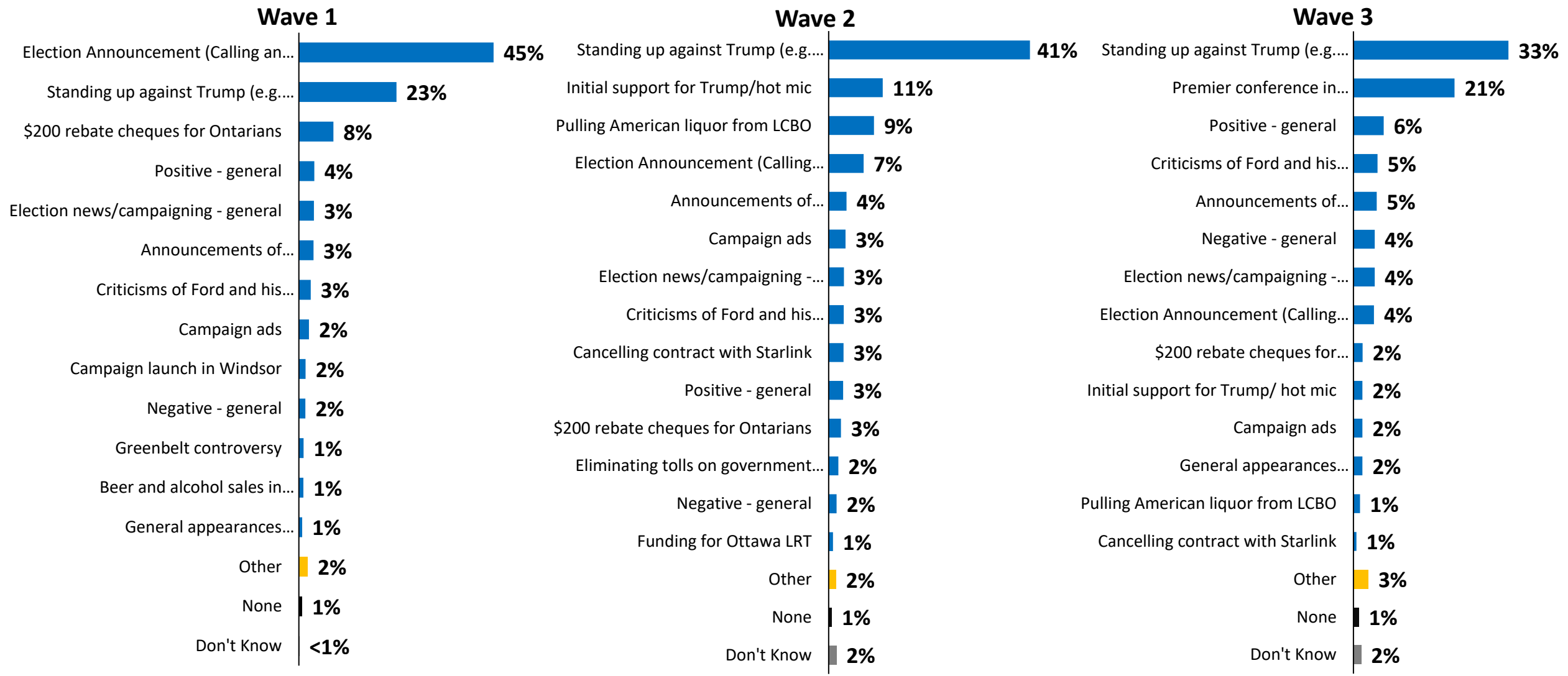

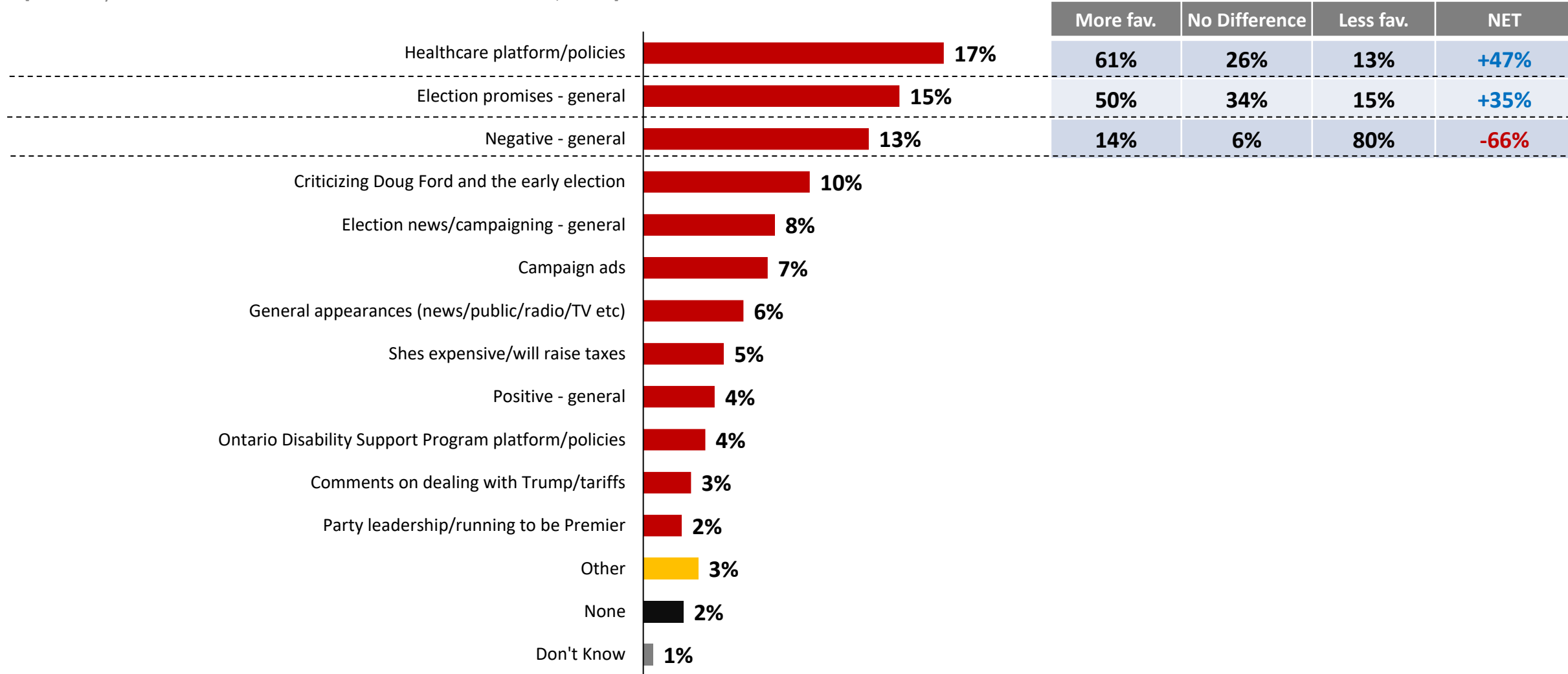

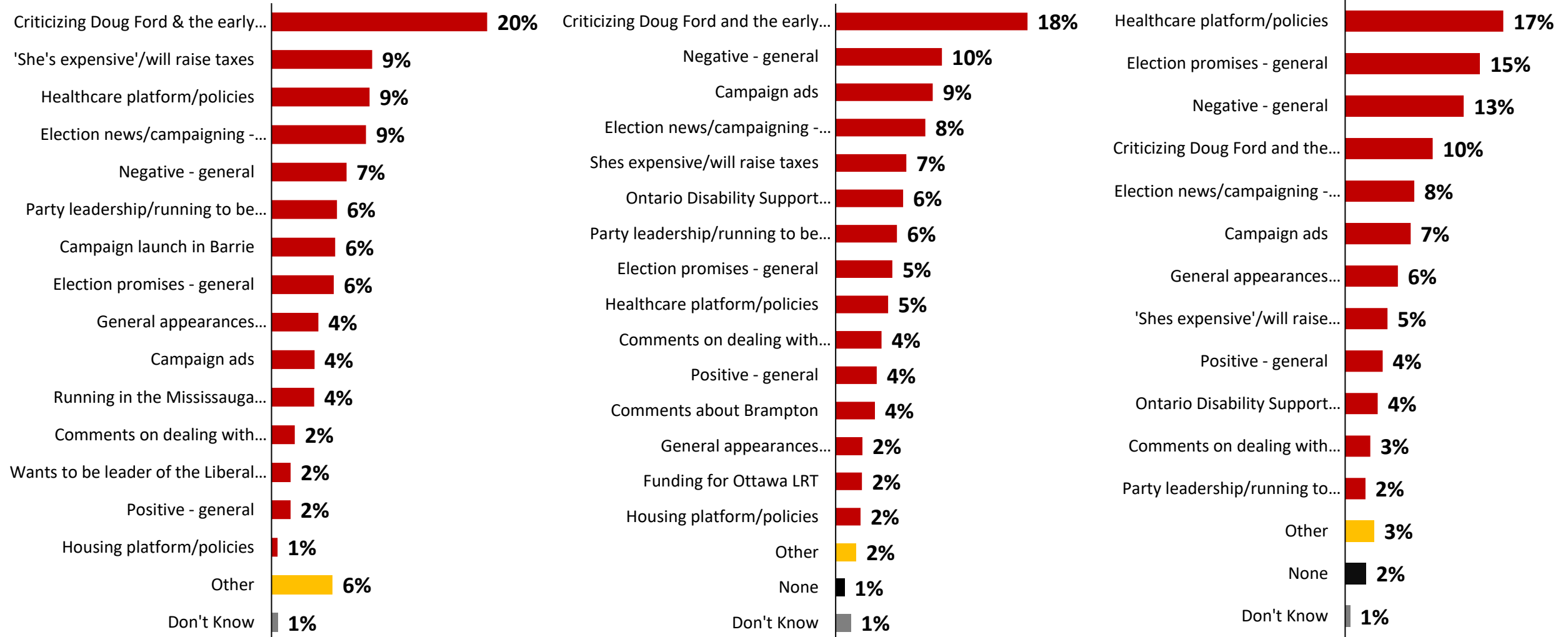

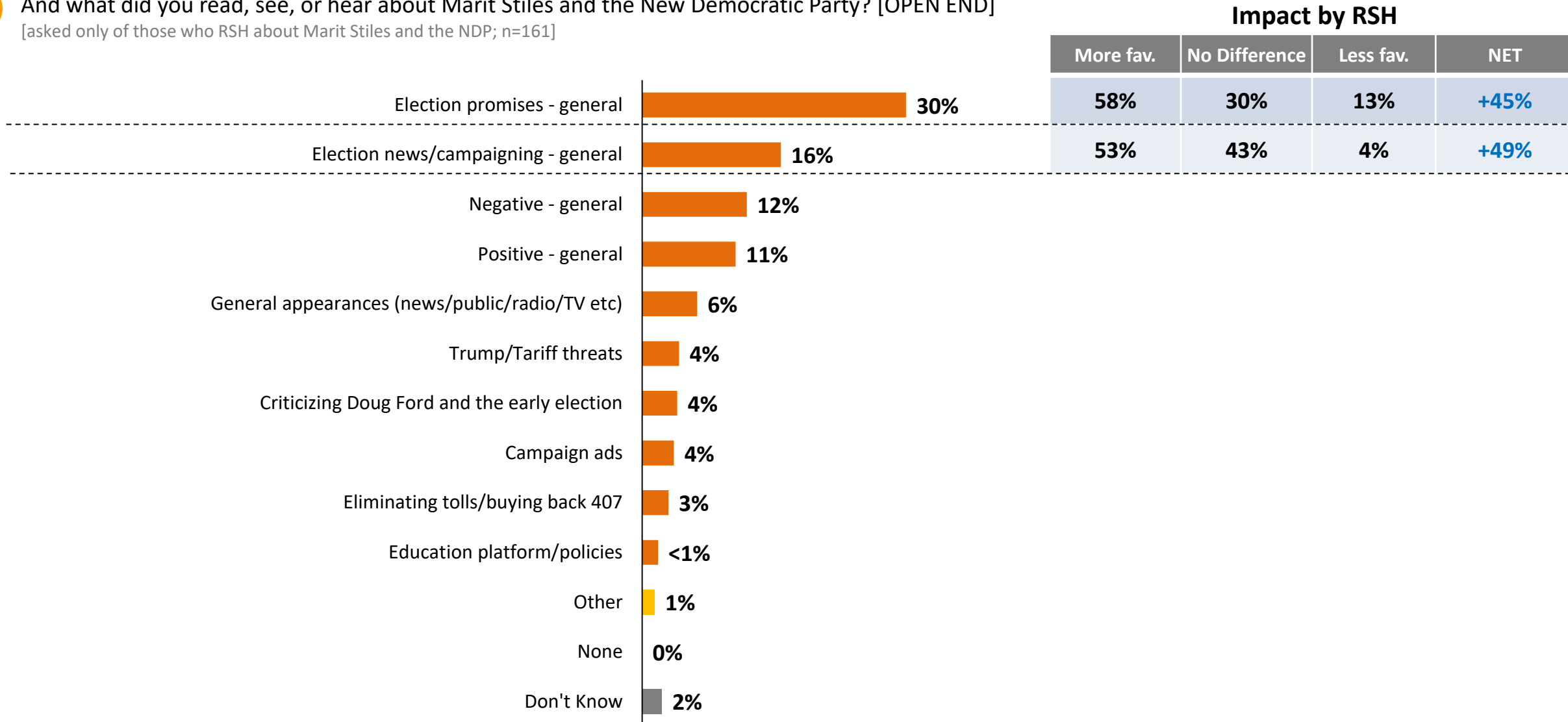


# RSH New Democrats: Top two mentions for Stiles election promises and news on the election and campaigning from the NDP

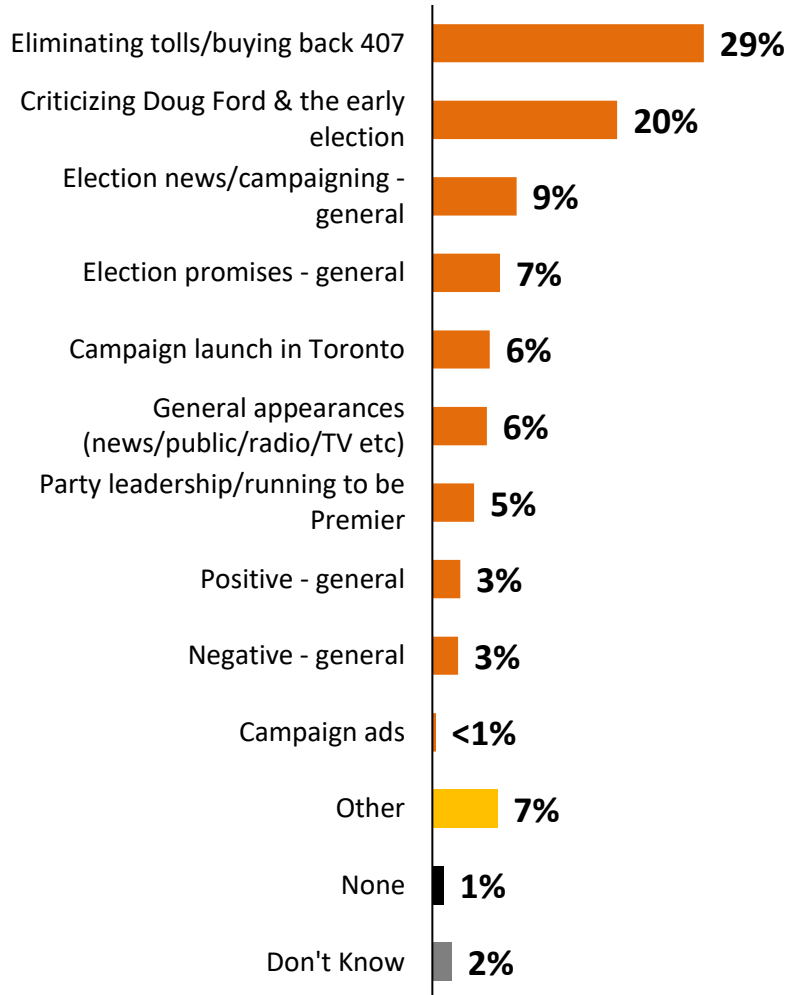

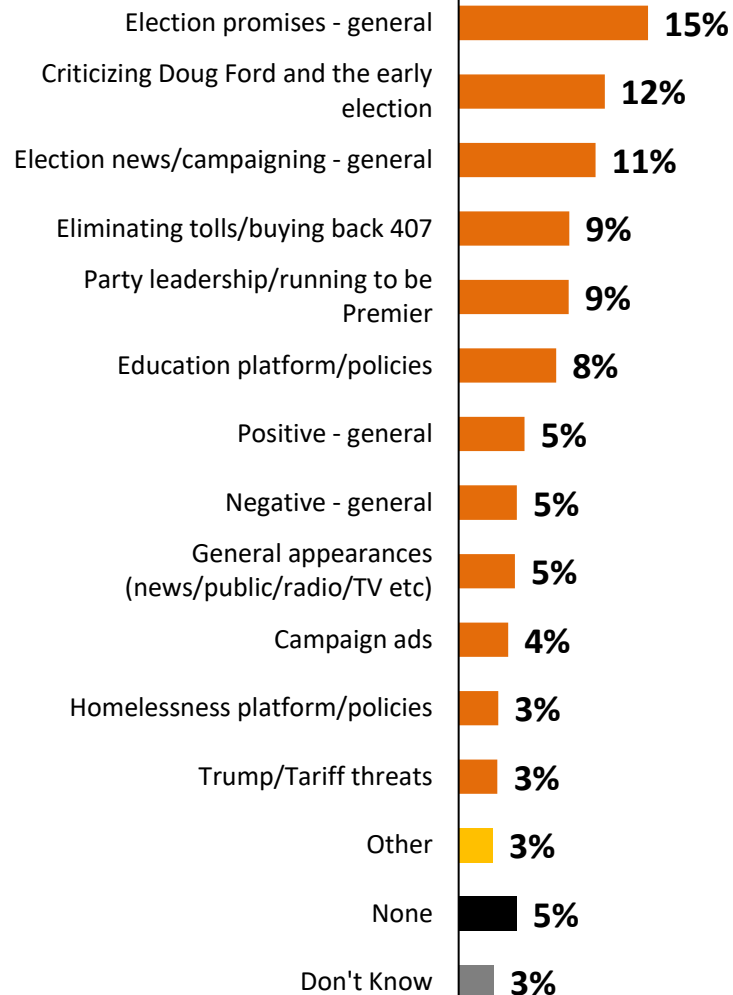

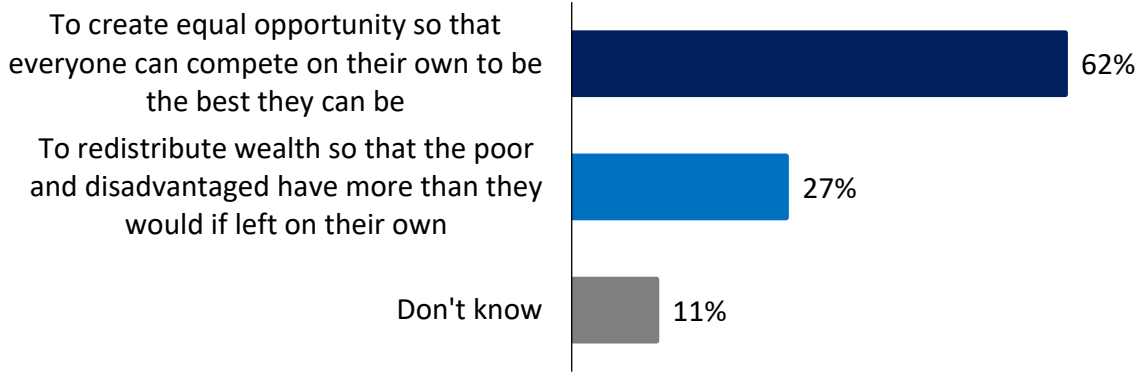

# Core Political Values: Over half (53%) think govt listens to experts too often; 62% say gov'ts should create equal opportunity

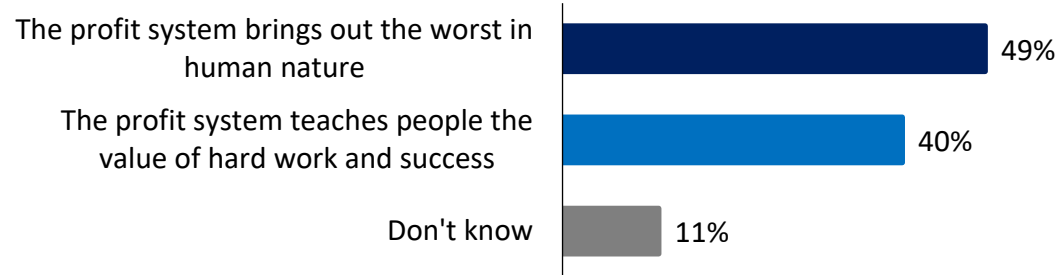
**Q** When governments make major decisions concerning spending on programs and services, do you think they should be basing their decisions mainly on...?

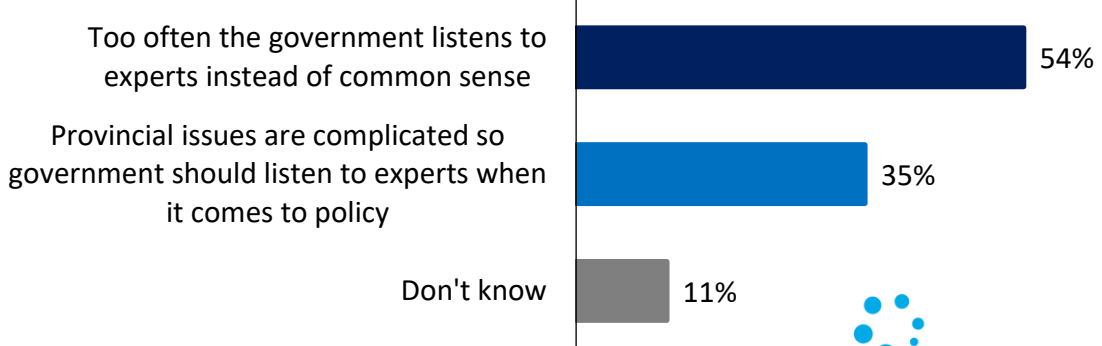
**Q** Is the main role of government to...?

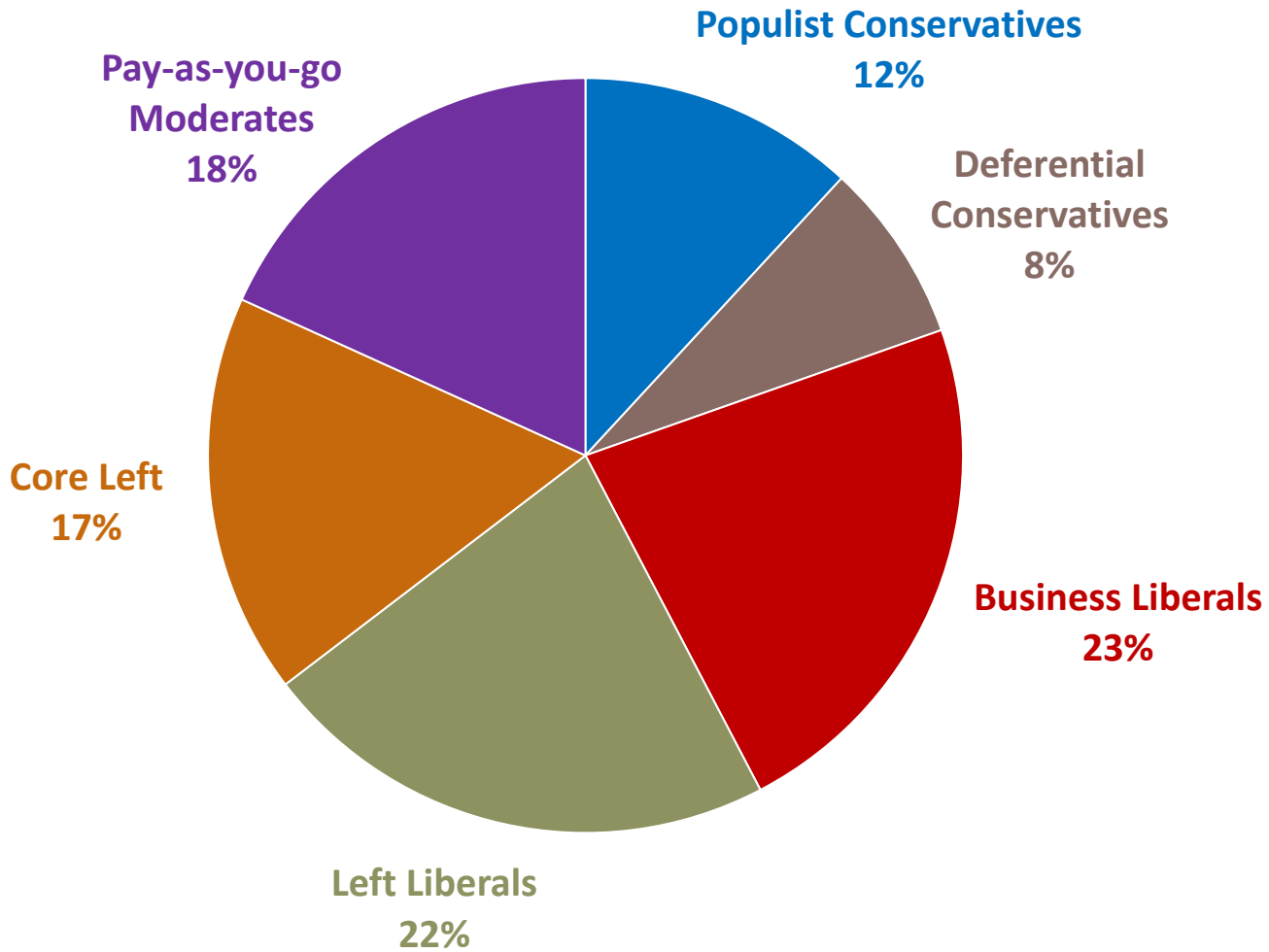


# Value Clusters: 23% of Ontarians are Business Liberals, 22% are Left Liberals and 18% are Pay-as-you-go Moderates



Clusters are based on 4 basic values: equal opportunity versus redistribution; trust in the profit system; whether spending should be based on ability to afford or public need; and whether government should listen to experts or common sense.

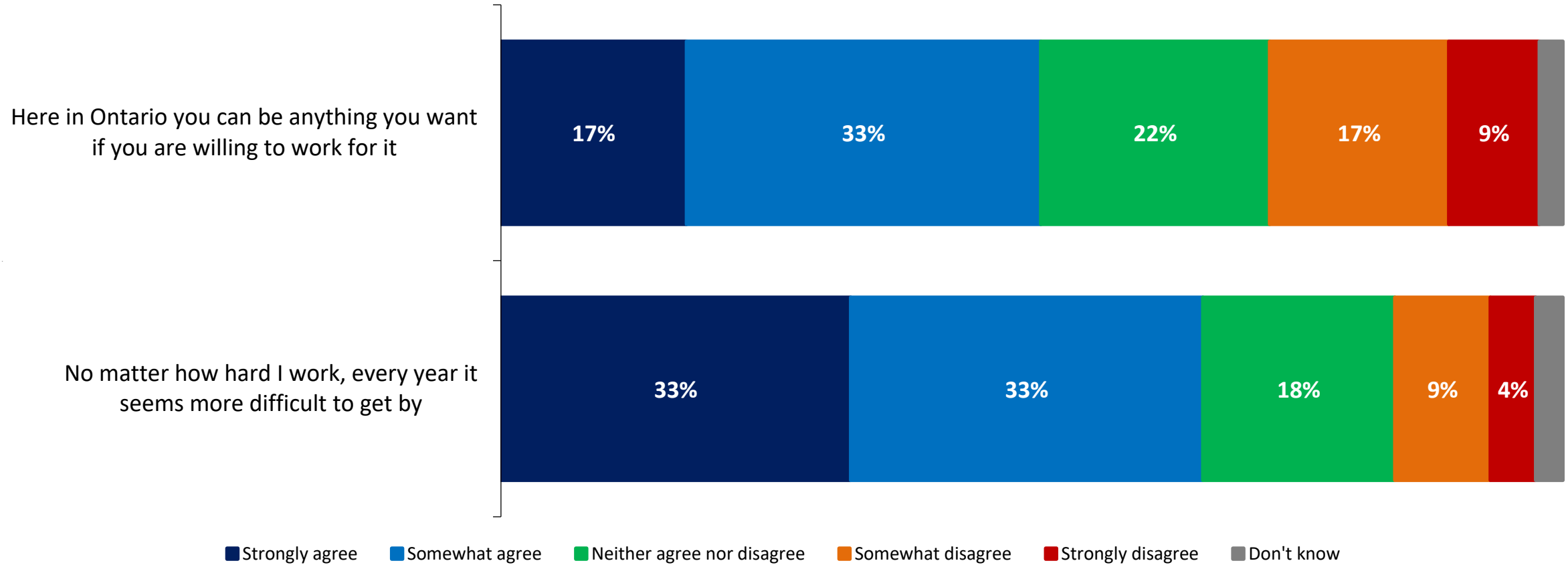

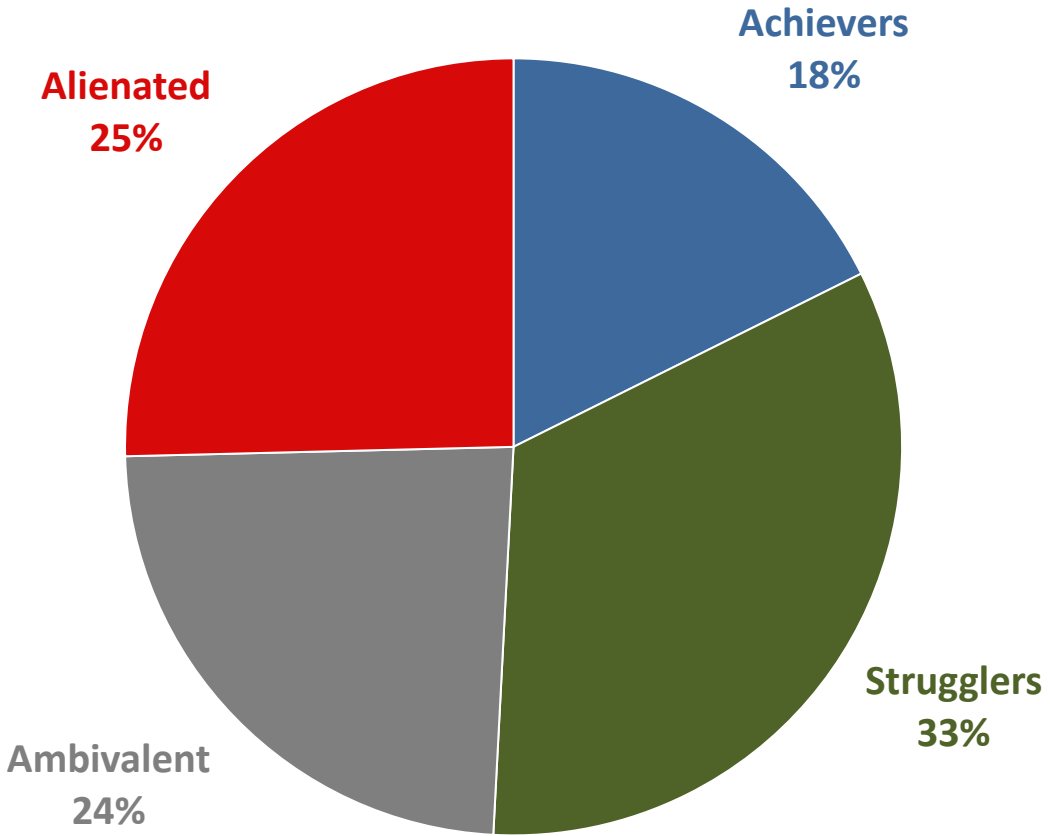


# Economic Gap Segmentation: About 1-in-3 (32%) Ontarians are Strugglers while 25% are alienated

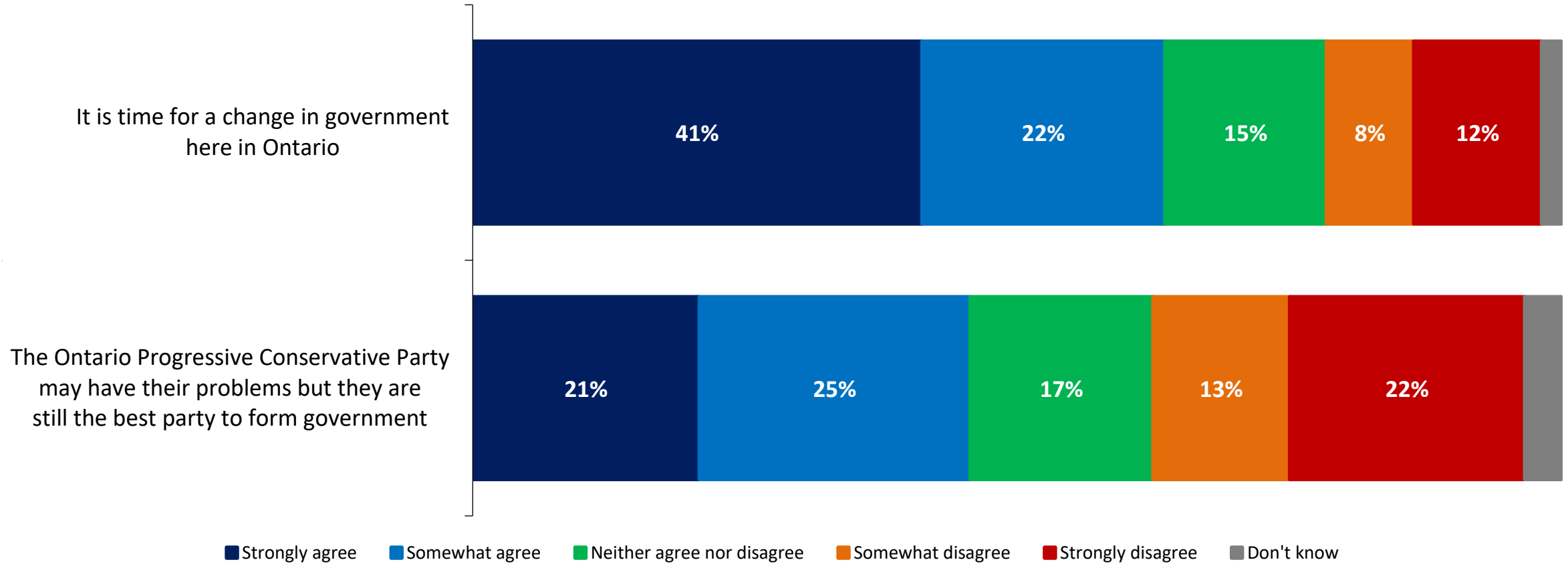


# Time for Change Attitudes: 3-in-5 (64%) think it is time for a change in govt, while 46% think the PCs are still the best party to form govt

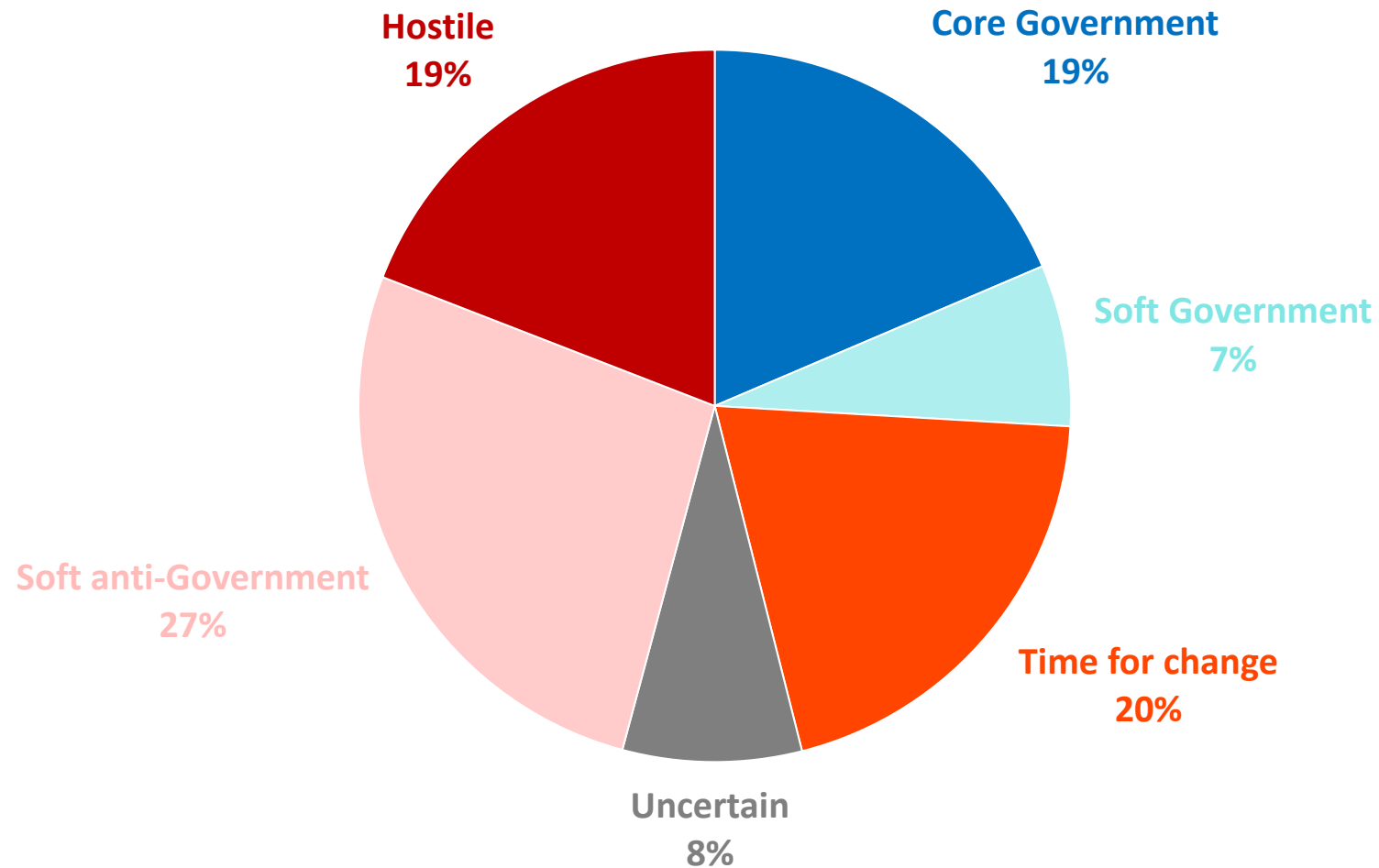


# Time for Change Segmentation: 'Time for a change' make up 20% while those 'Hostile' make up another 19%

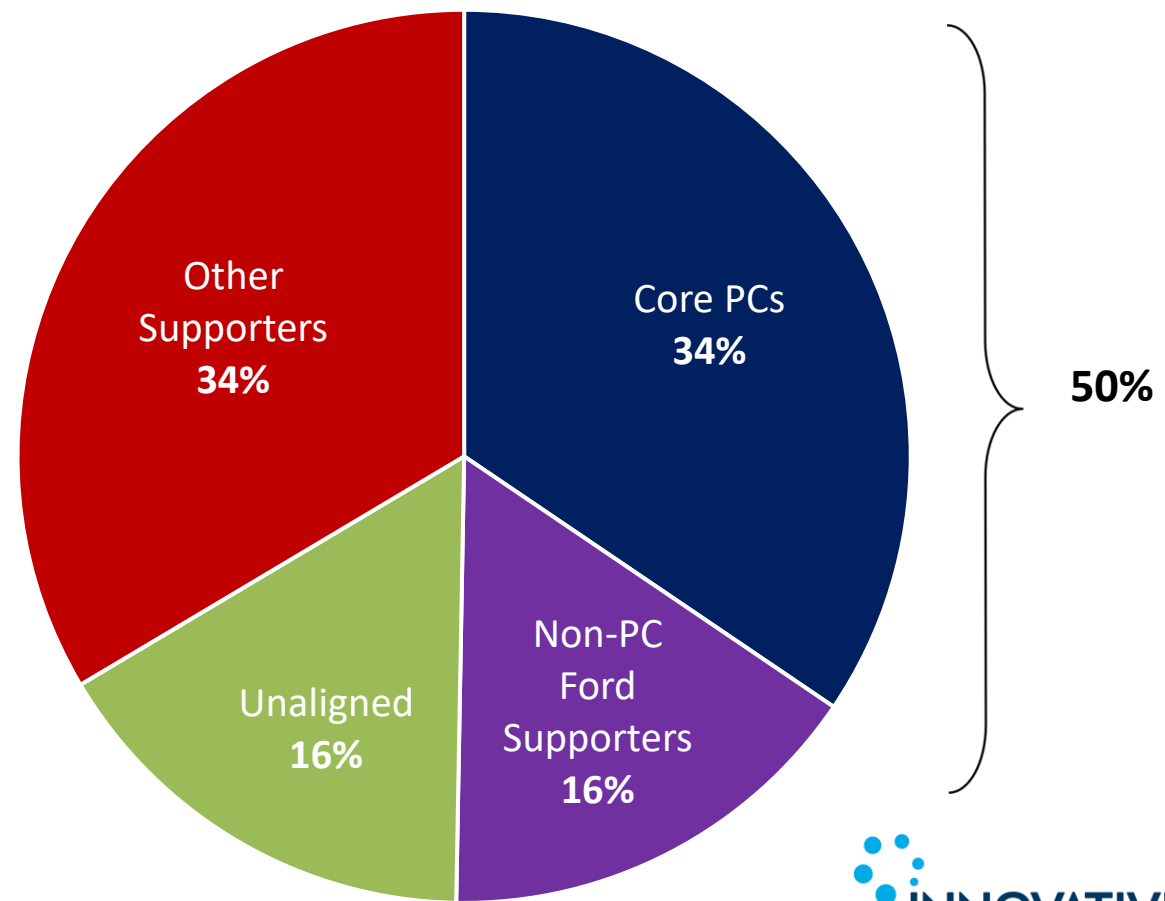
# Ford Personal Vote: Half are Ford supporters, including 16% who have a positive impression of Ford, but are not PC identifiers
