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# Survey Methodology

The findings in this survey report are based on an online survey conducted by INNOVATIVE.

## WHO?



Adults (18+) in Ontario

## HOW MANY?



A survey of 917 adults. The final sample is weighted to n=800 among all adults.

## HOW?



Online survey using online sample from INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Lucid, a leading provider of online sample.

# Key Findings

1. Liberals have grown over the campaign and are well positioned to gain seats in Toronto and, to a lesser degree, in the GTA. Their gains have come from the Core Left, Left Liberals and Deferential Conservatives.
2. While Ford and the PCs continue to do well with people who identify with the PC party and with people who hold Populist Conservatives values, they have lost ground with Deferential Conservatives and Left Liberals.
3. The Liberals have done particularly well in the fight for the Doug Ford personal vote. Among the roughly one-in-five Ontario voters who like Doug Ford and don't identify as PCs, the PCs have dropped from 49% to 37% while the Liberals are up from 22% to 33%.
4. The NDP have not been able to get the attention of more than 20% of Ontario's voters and have lost 15% of NDP identifiers to the Liberal party.
5. While only 35% of respondents have read, seen or heard anything about the recent election debates, of those who have, nearly half (47%) felt Ford performed as well as expected while Stiles had the highest net exceeded expectation score of +5%.

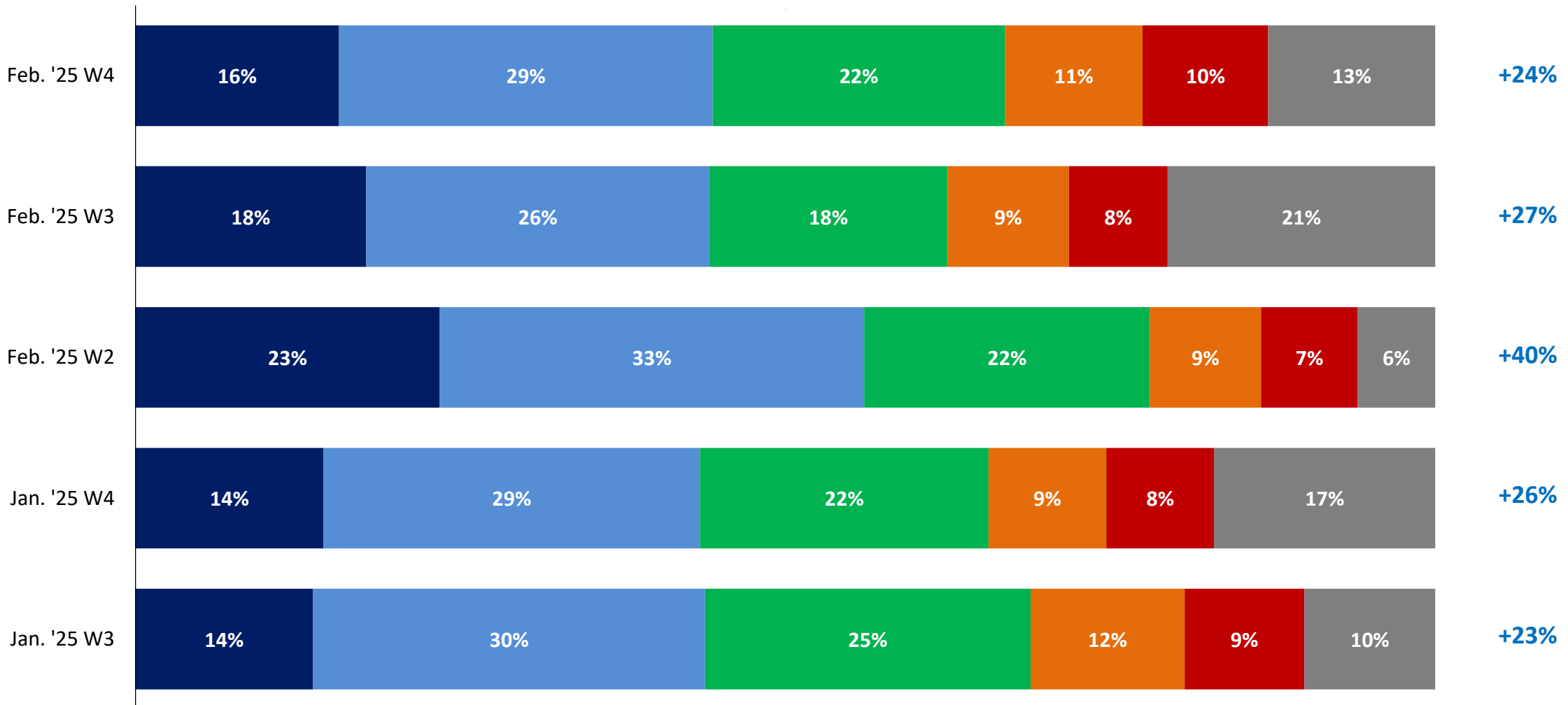
# Provincial Leadership Approval: Approval of the Progressive Conservative's response to Trump's presidency is stable this week

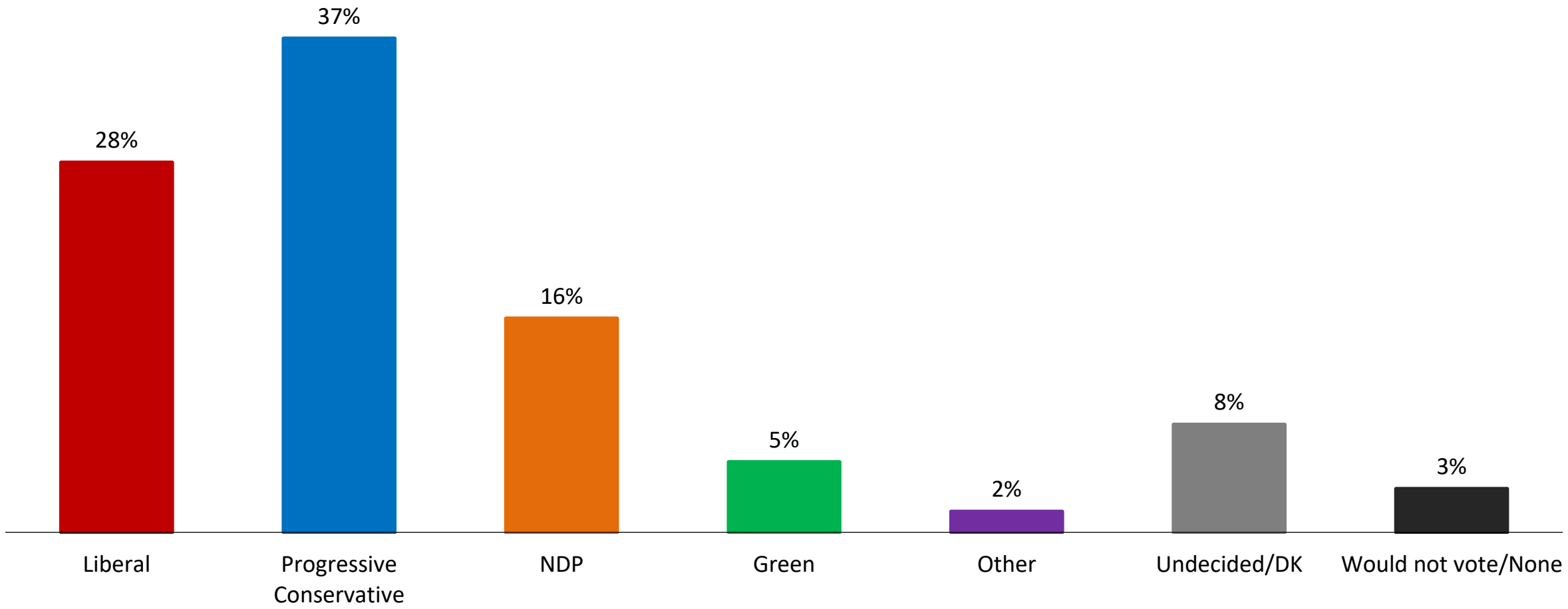

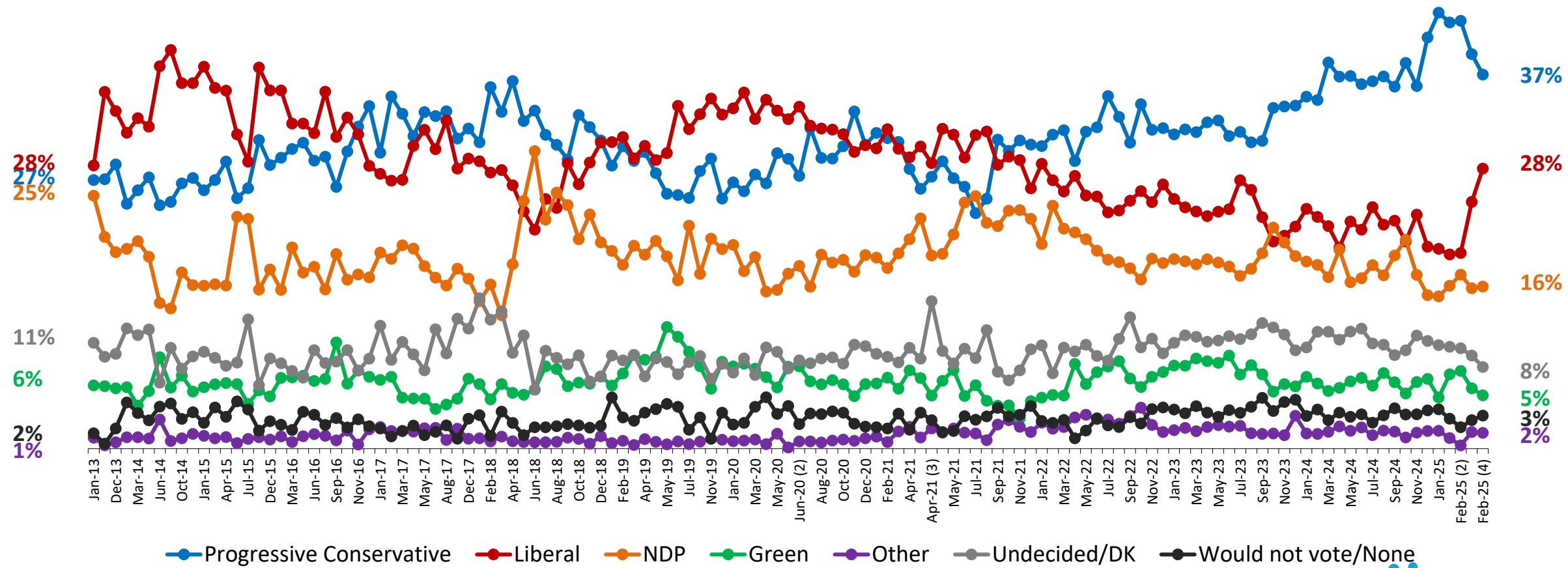

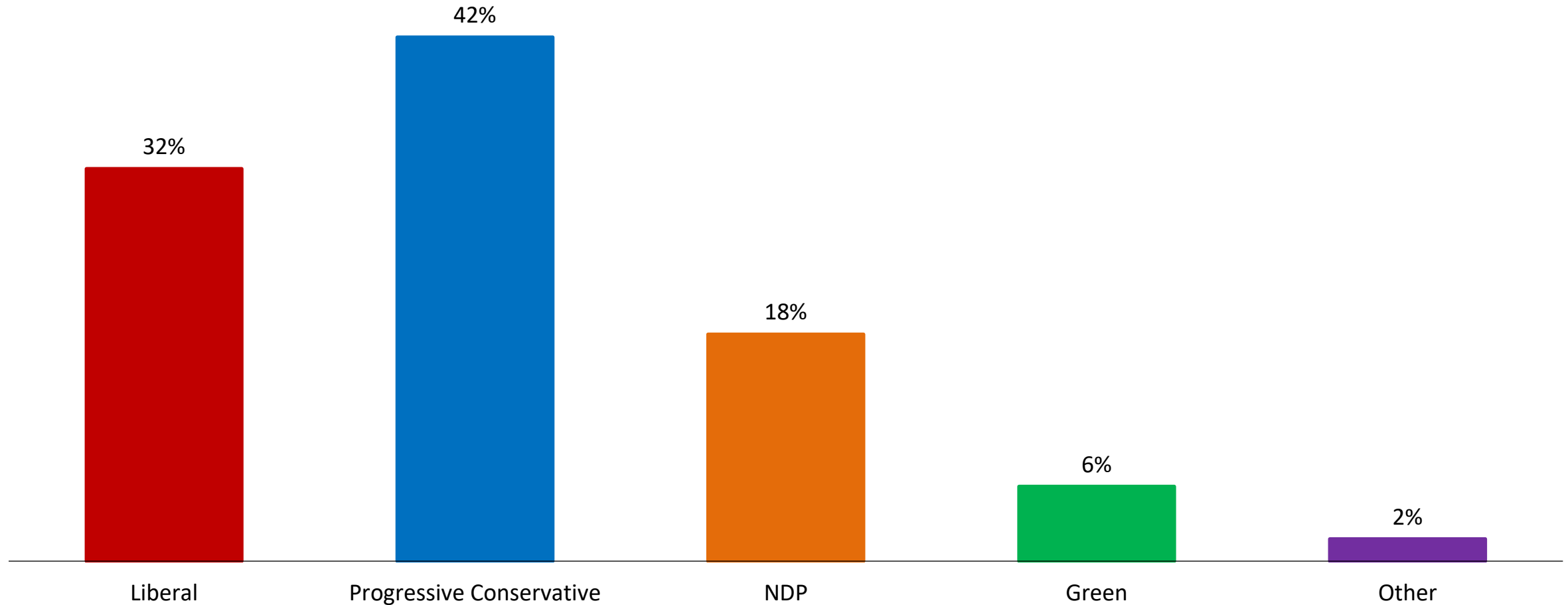


# Provincial Decided Vote: Progressive Conservatives have a 10-pt lead over Liberals with 42% of the decided vote

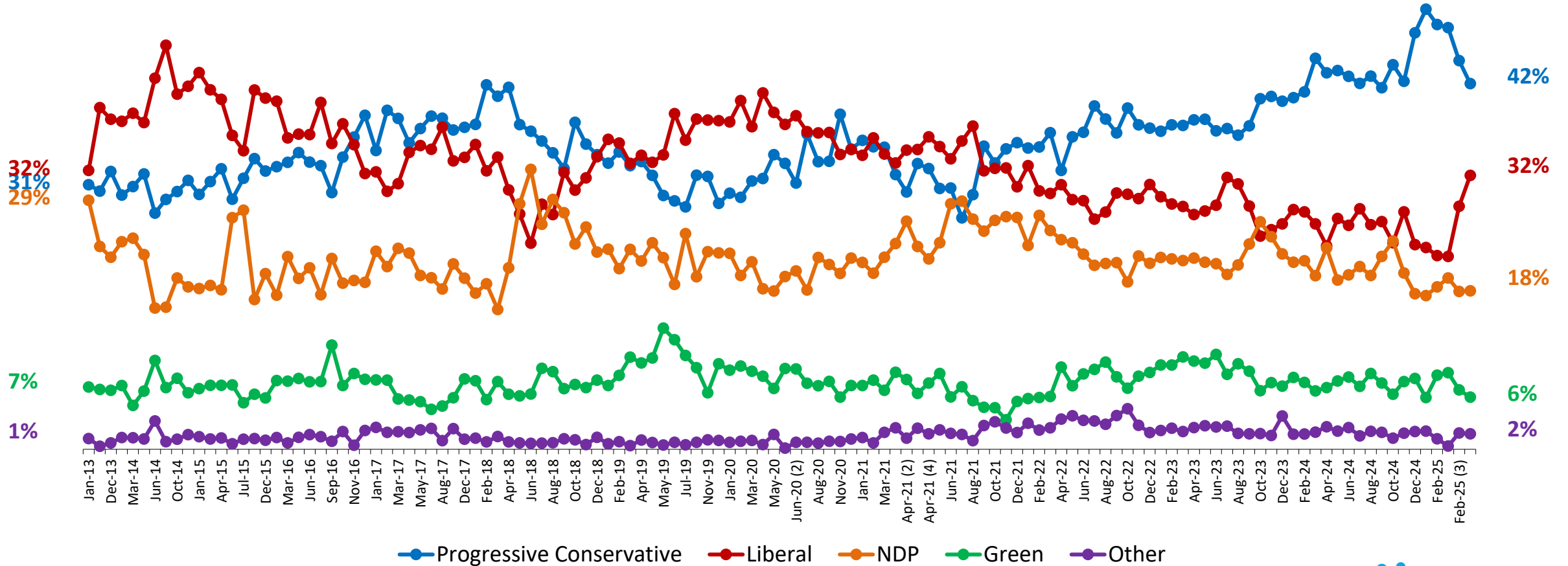


# Provincial Decided Vote Tracking: Progressive Conservative the lead on decided vote but Liberals have narrowed the gap

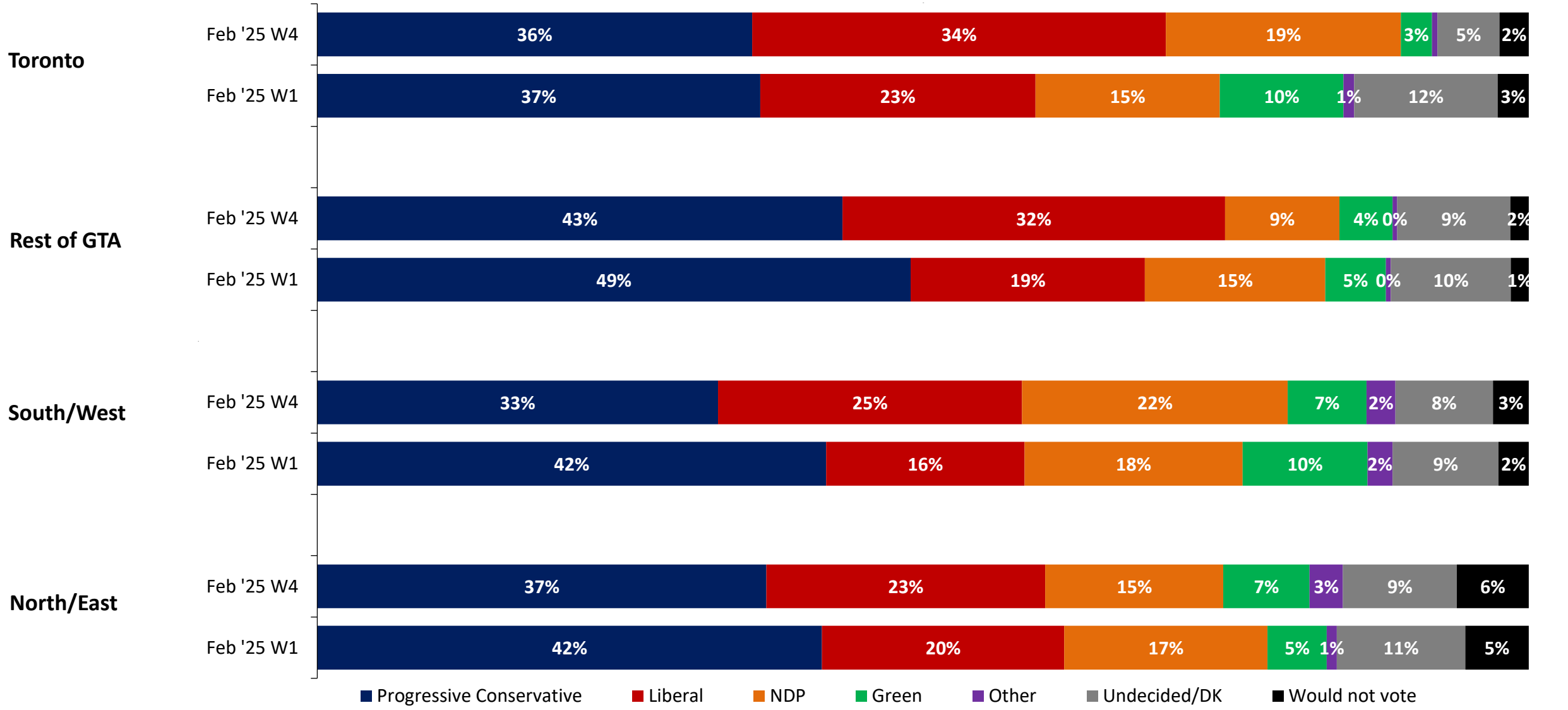

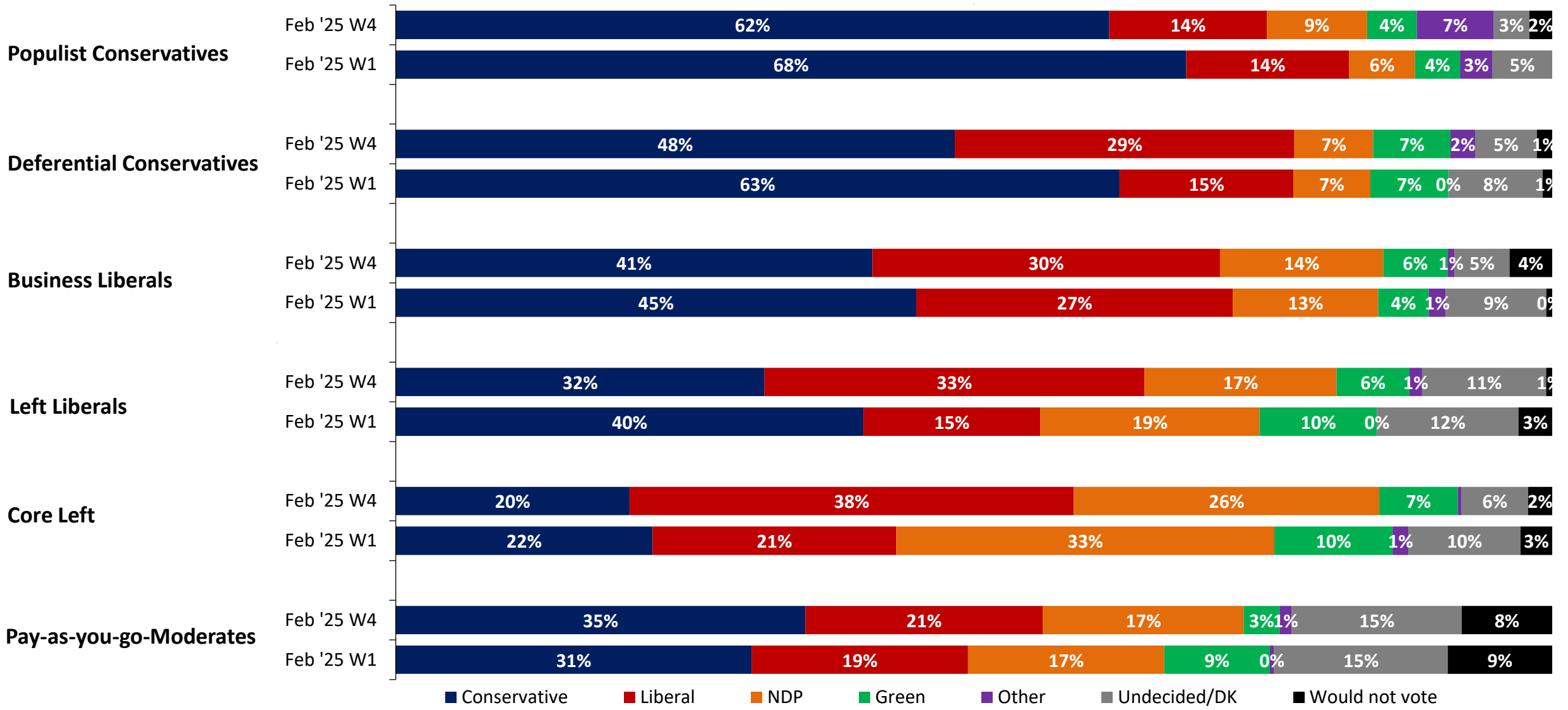

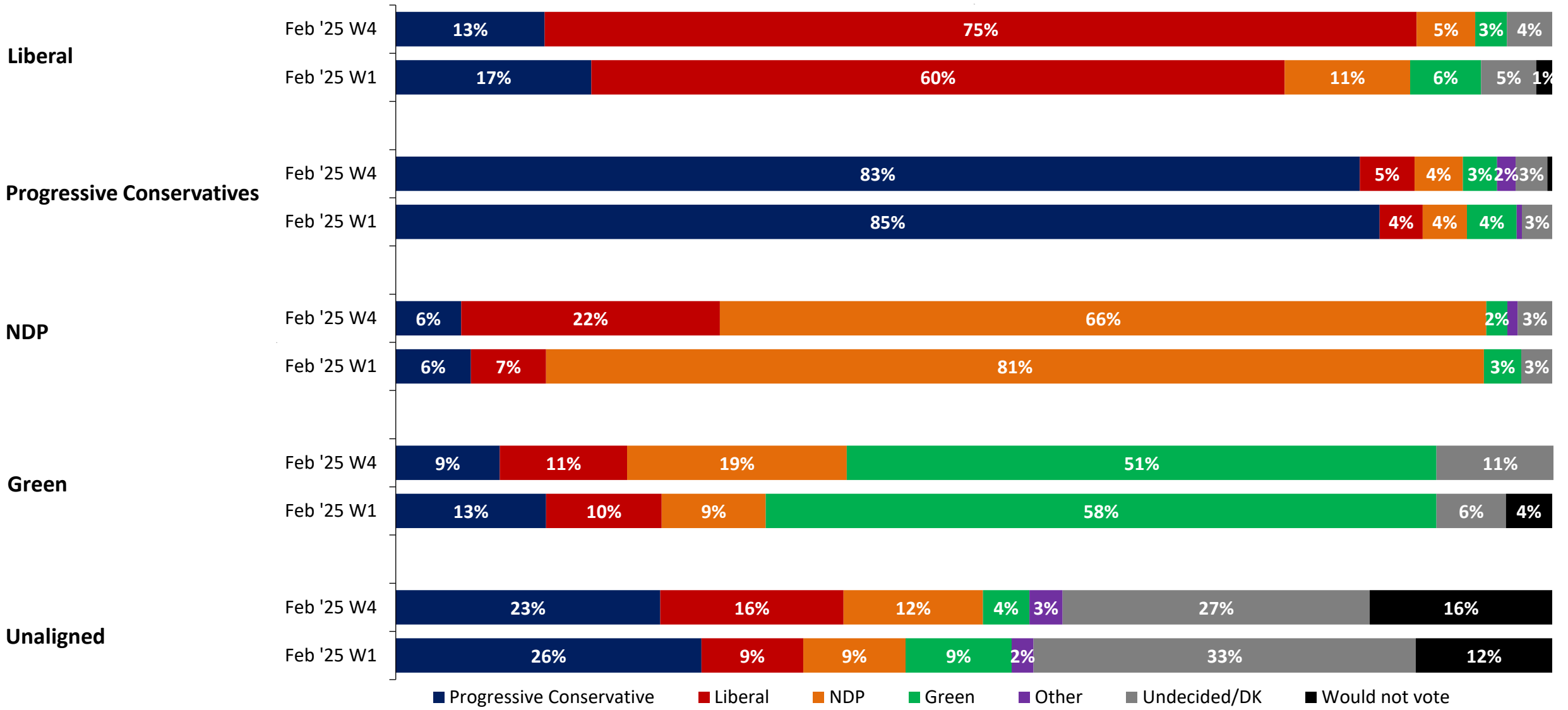
# Combined Vote by Region Comparison: Since the beginning of February, PCs have lost support across all region while Liberals gained



# Combined Vote by Value Cluster Comparison: Since W1, Liberals gained ground among Differential Conservatives, Left Liberals and Core Left

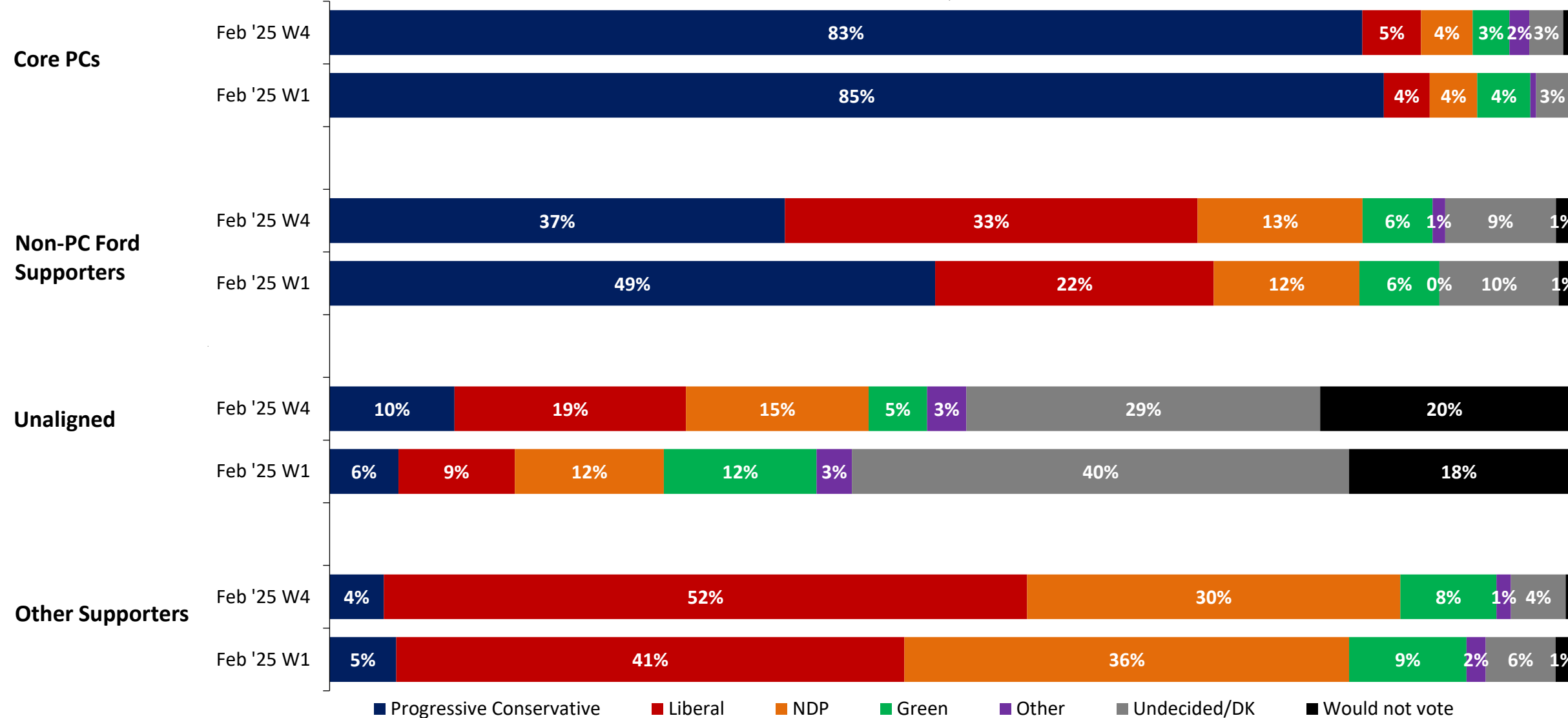


# Combined Vote by Party ID Comparison: Liberals have made gains among their own base as well as among the NDP

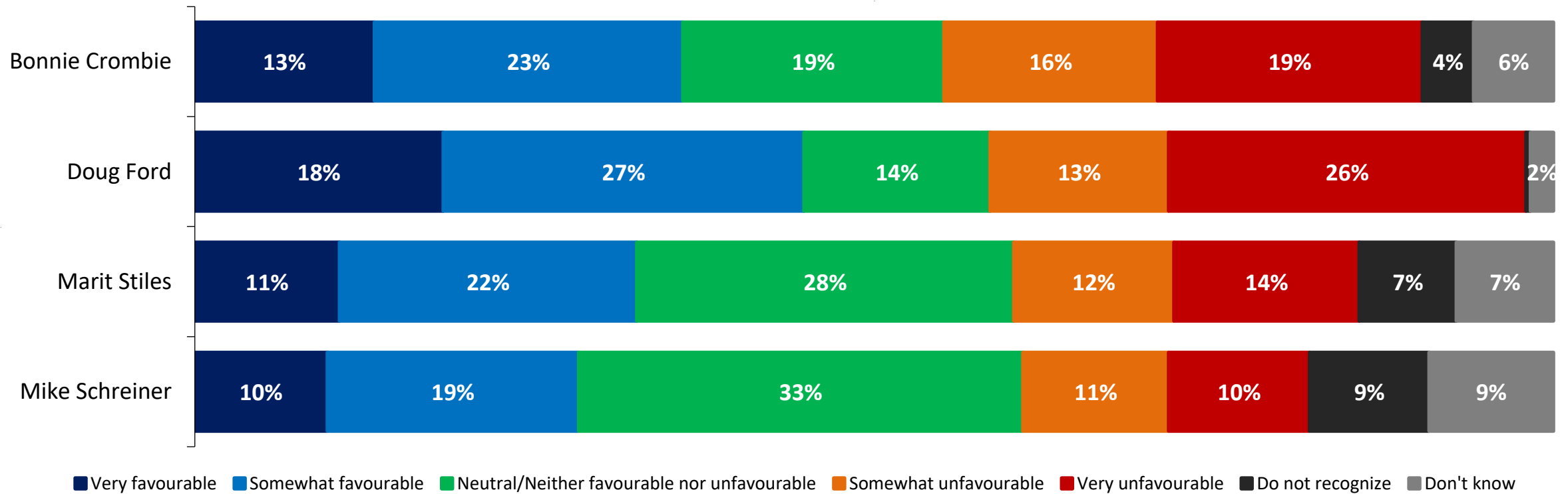

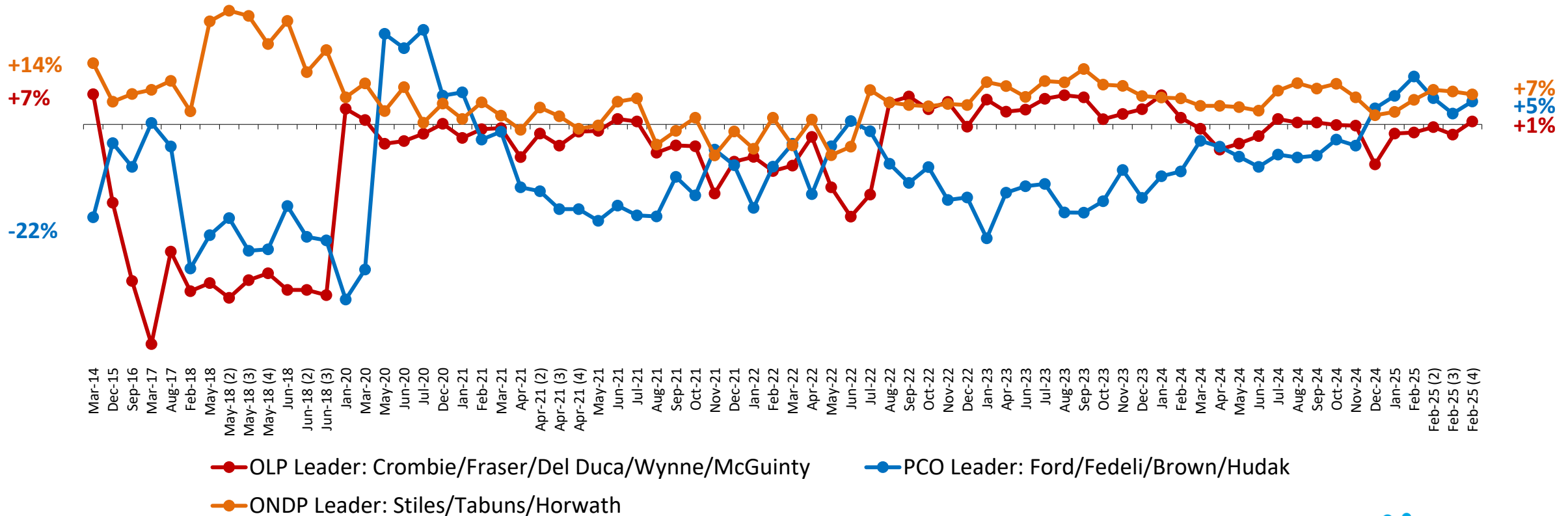


# Ontario Party Leader NET Favourables Tracking: Stiles continues to lead on net favourability at +7% with Ford following close behind at +5%



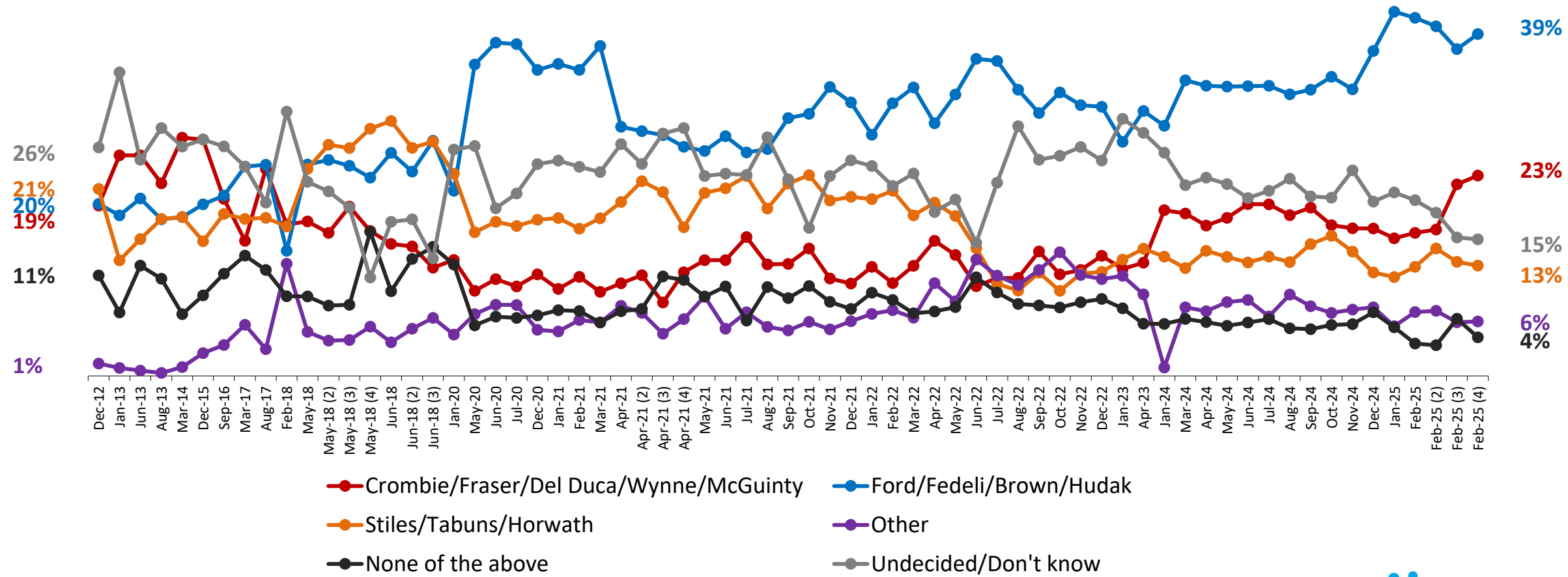

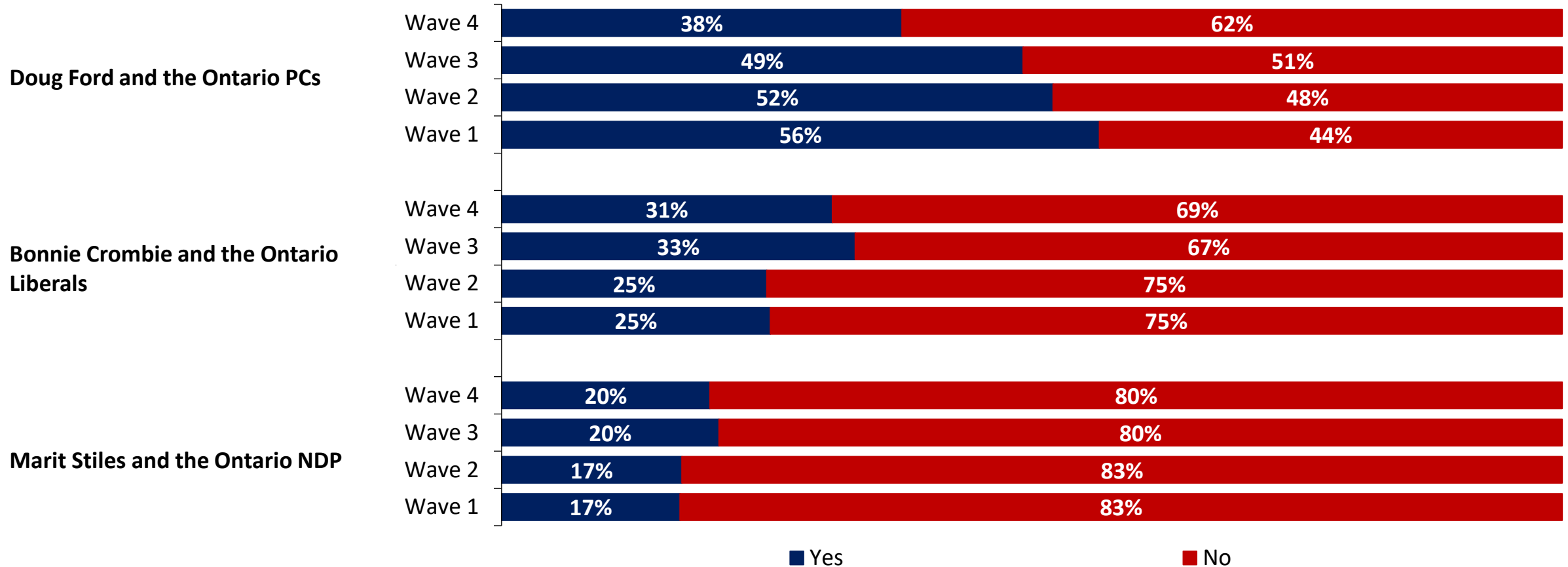

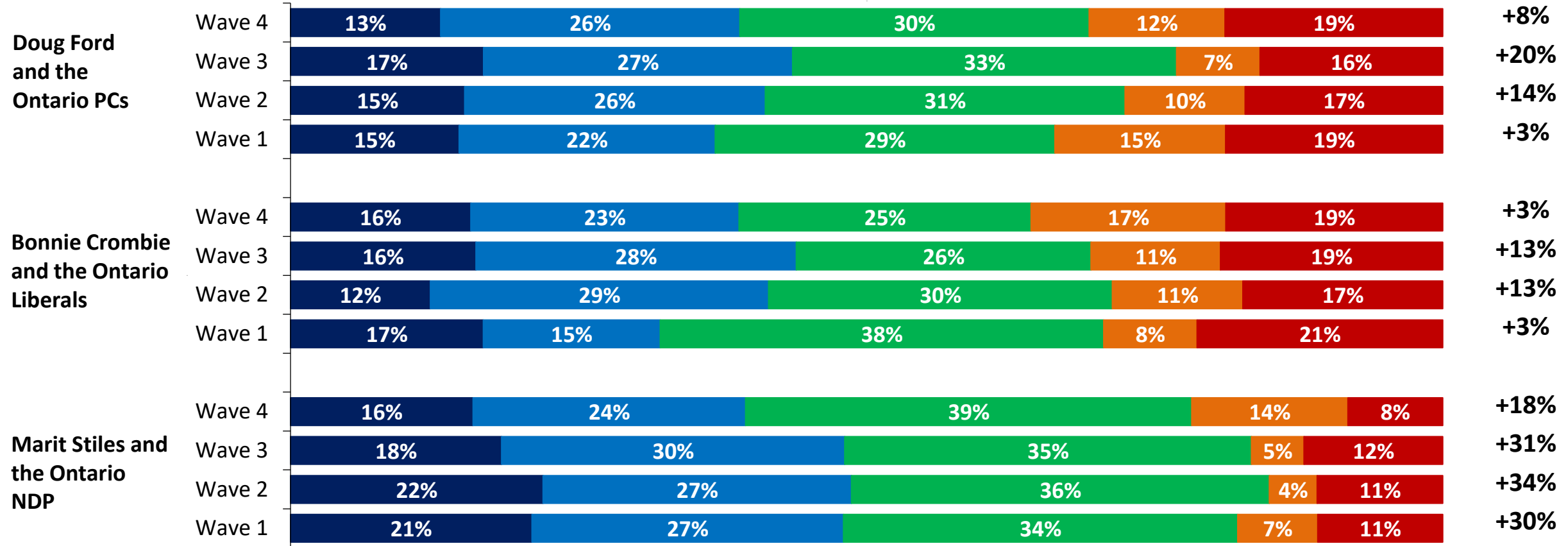

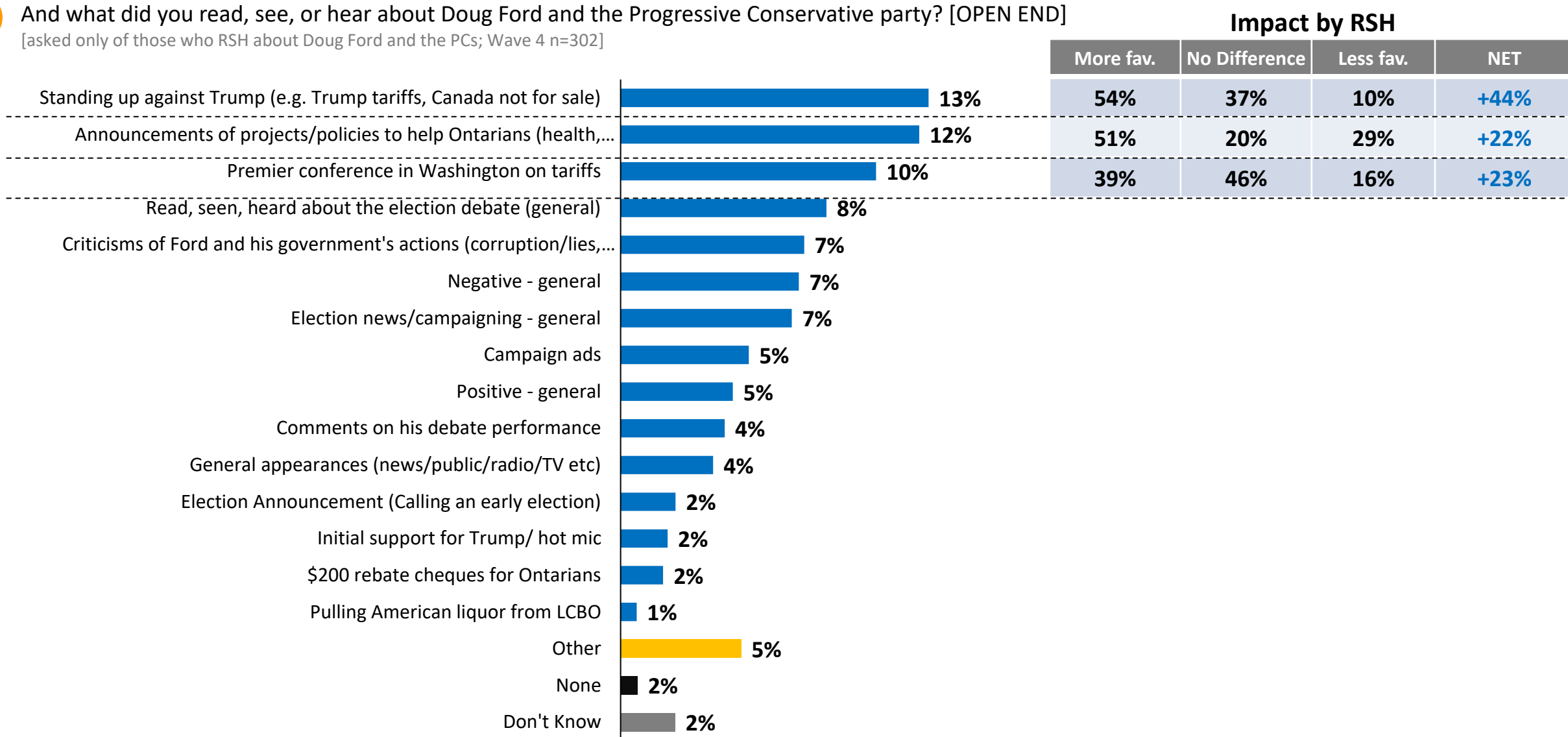

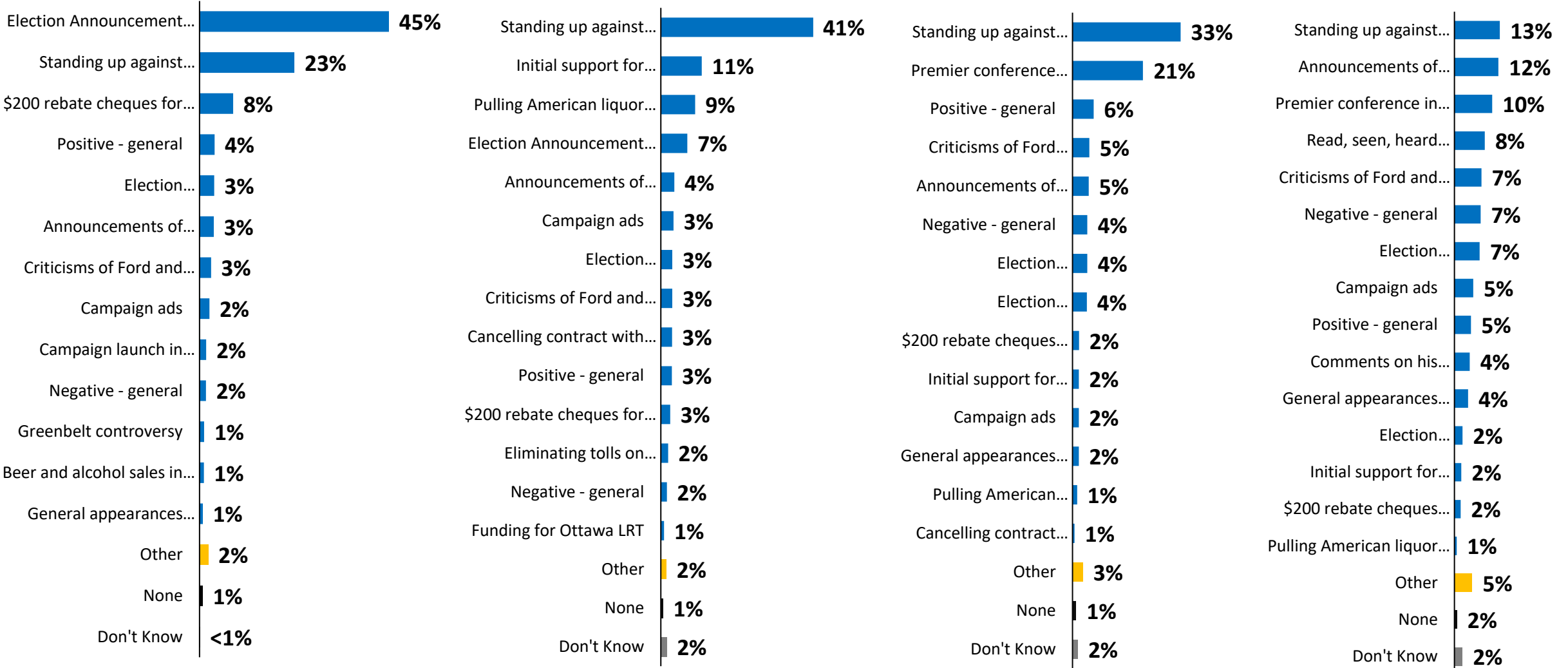

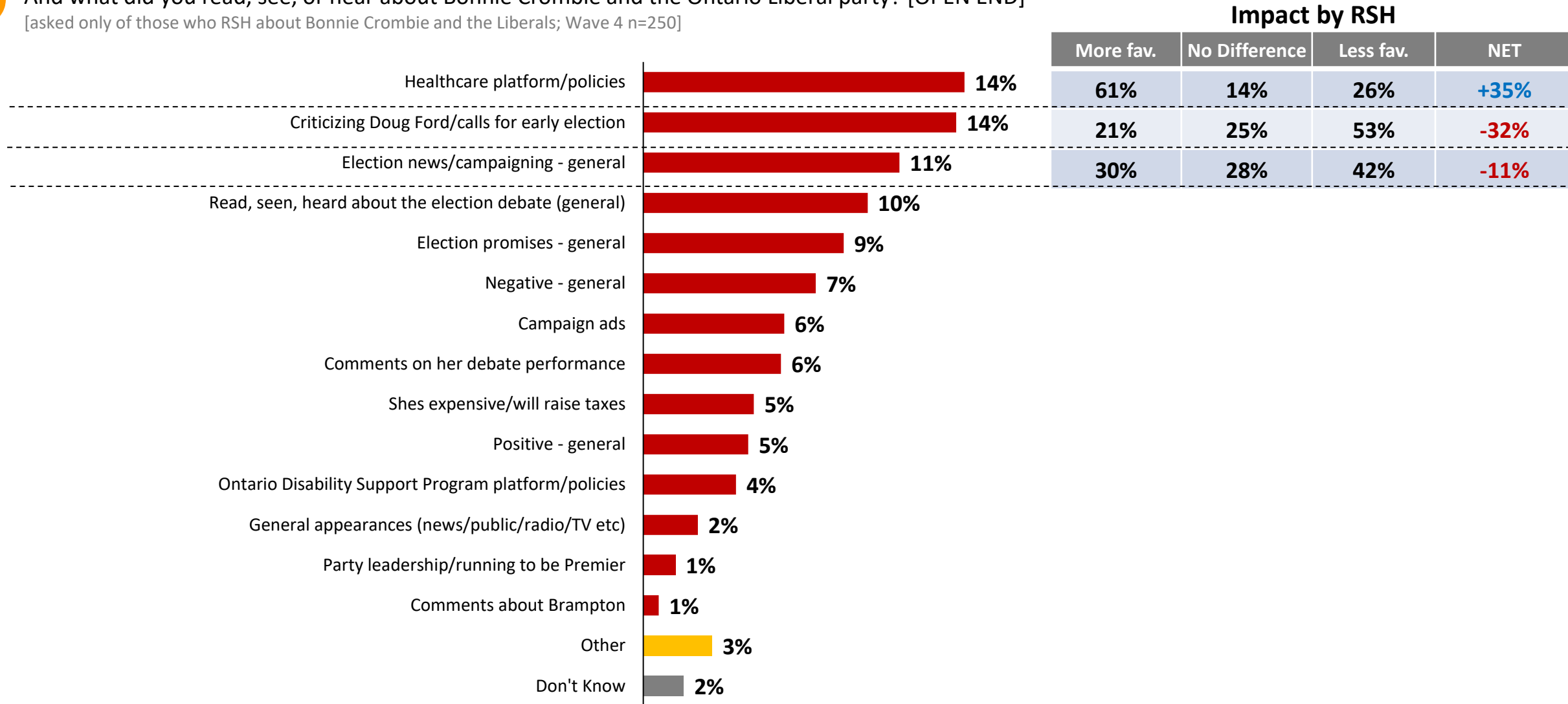

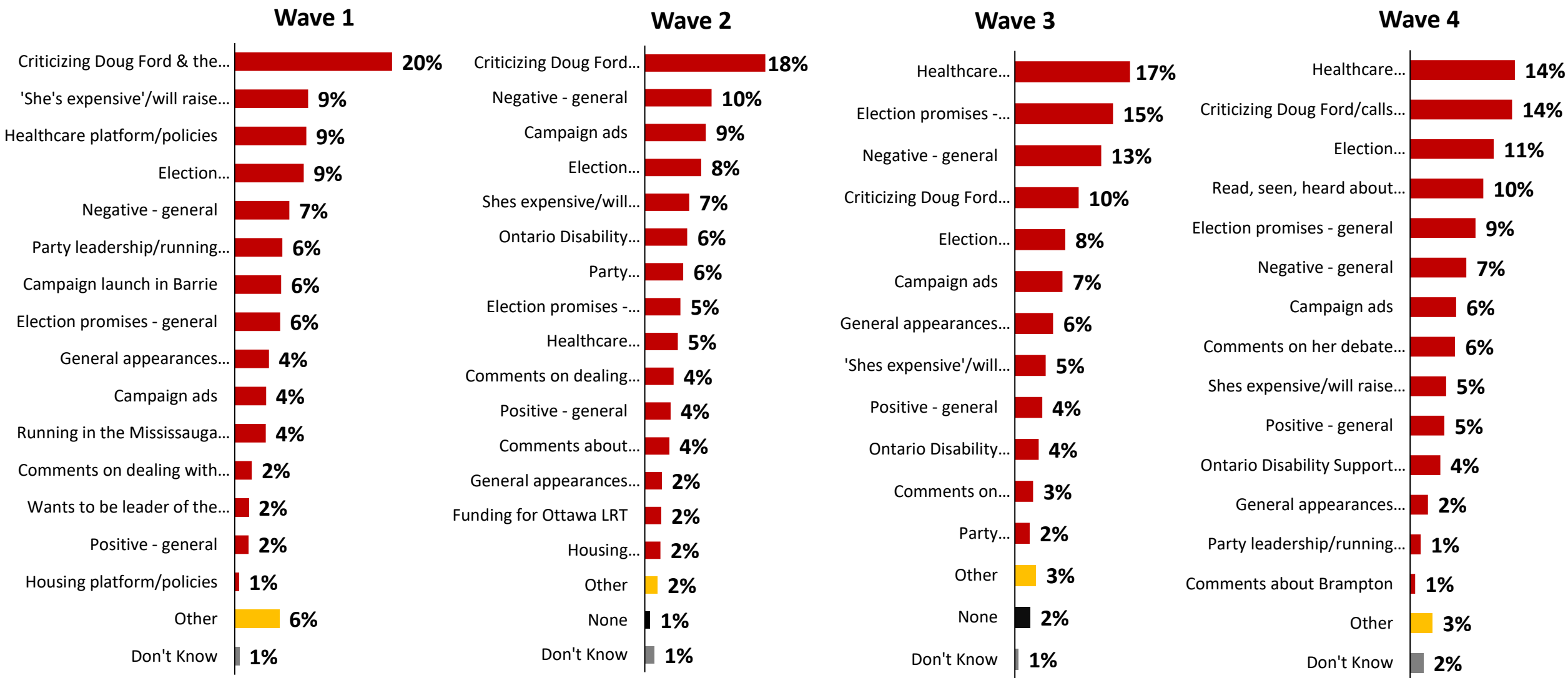

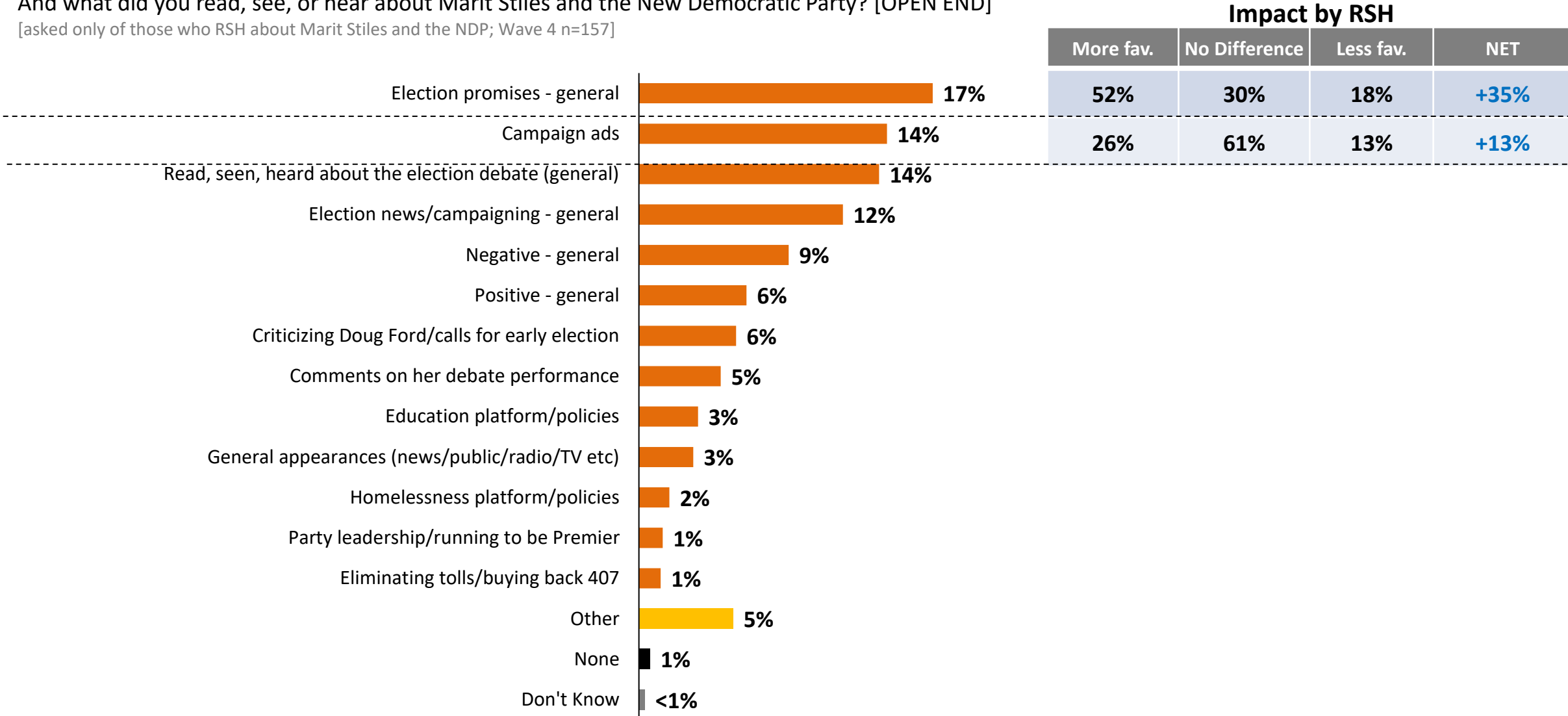

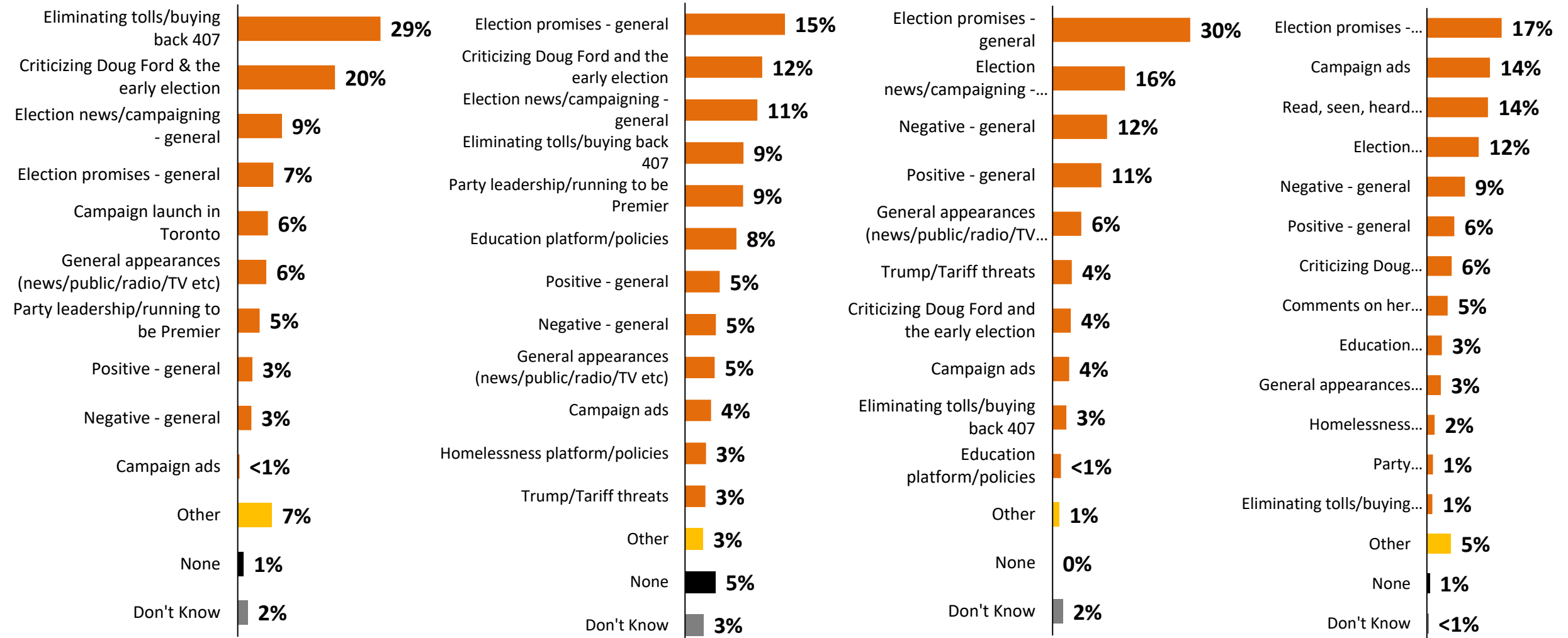

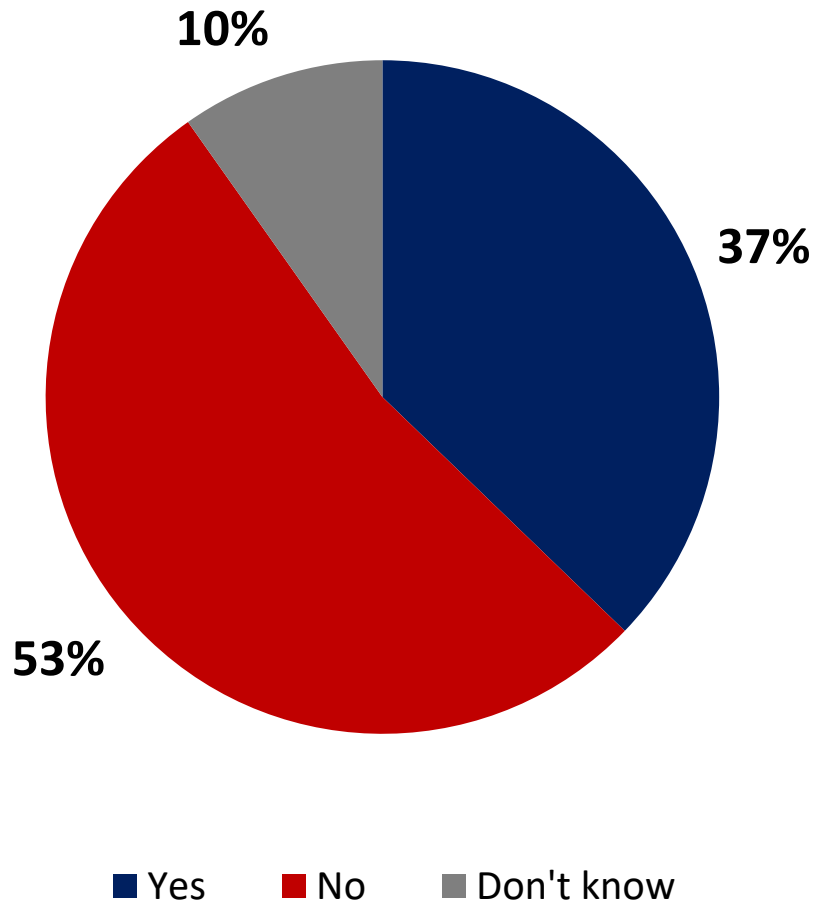

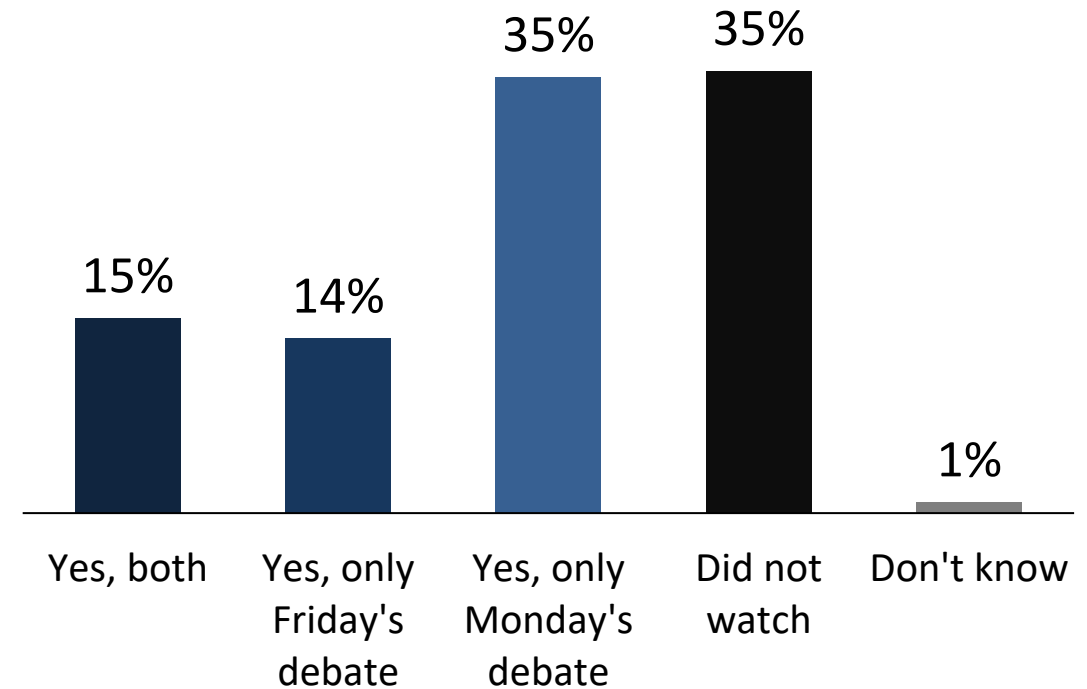

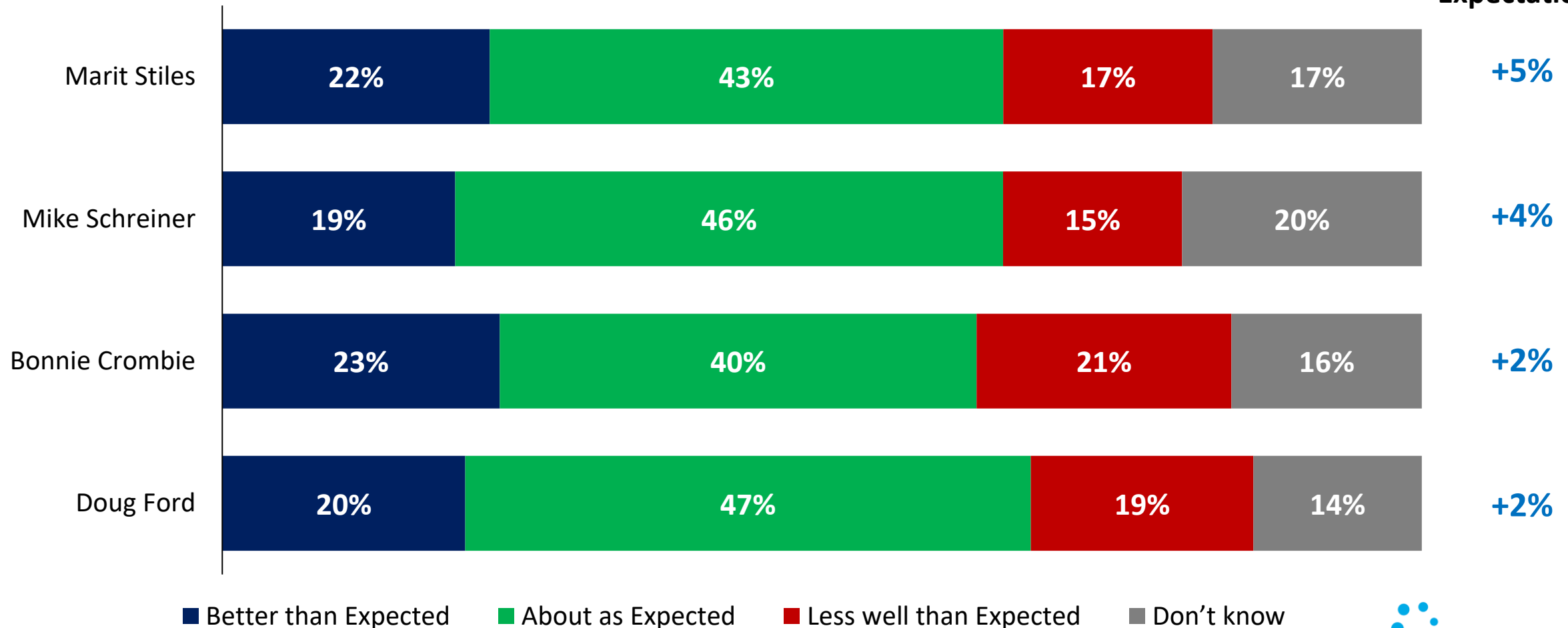

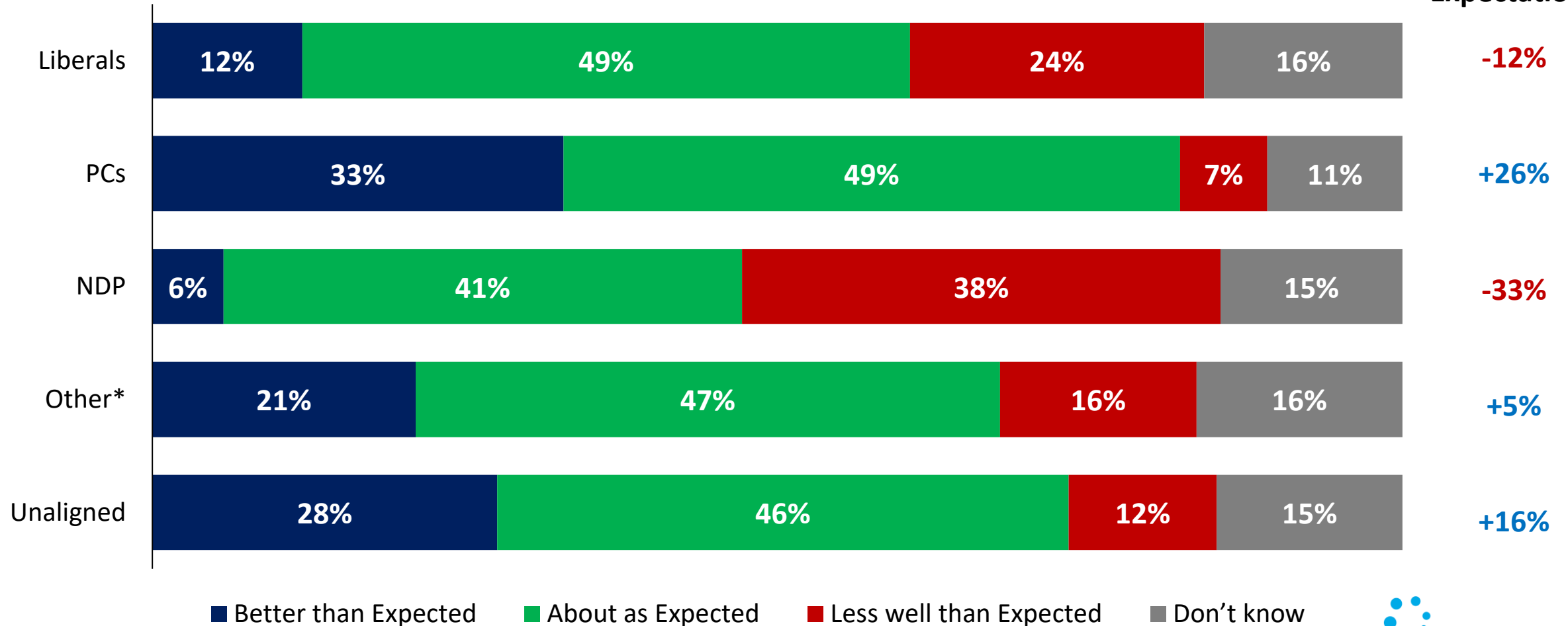

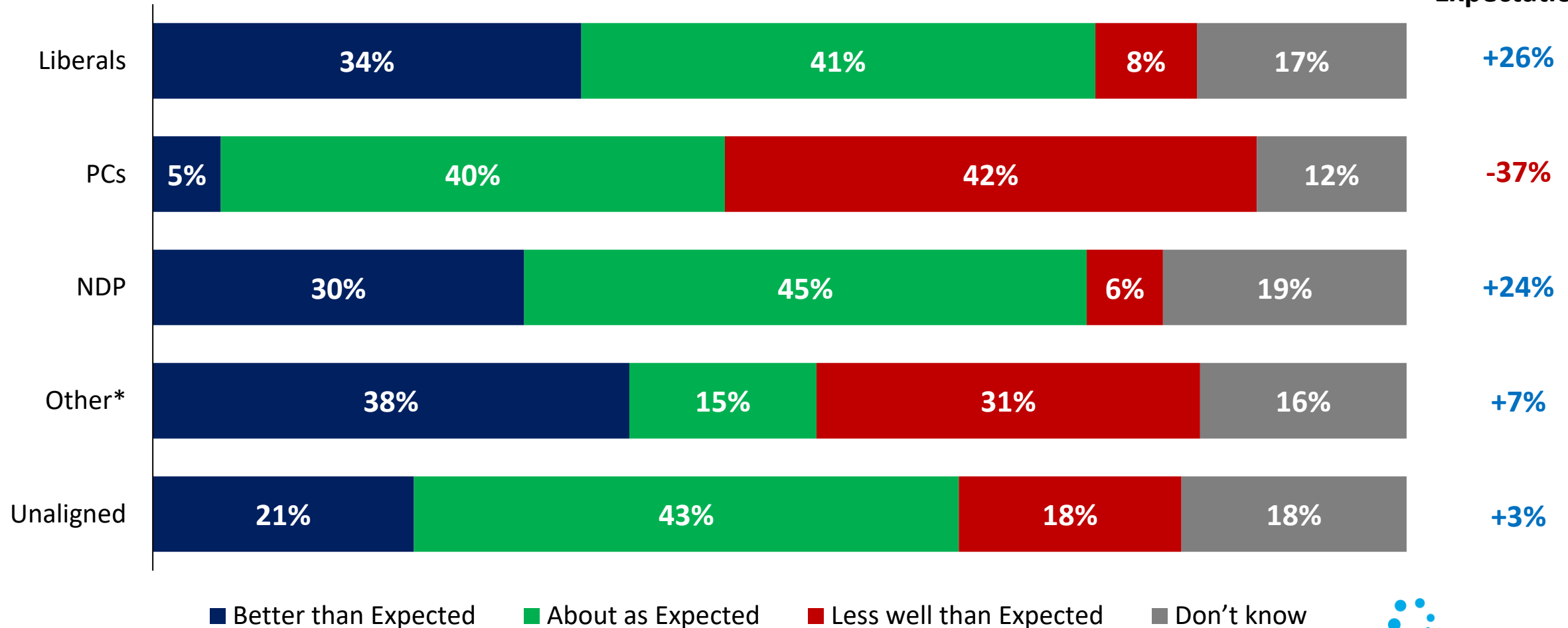

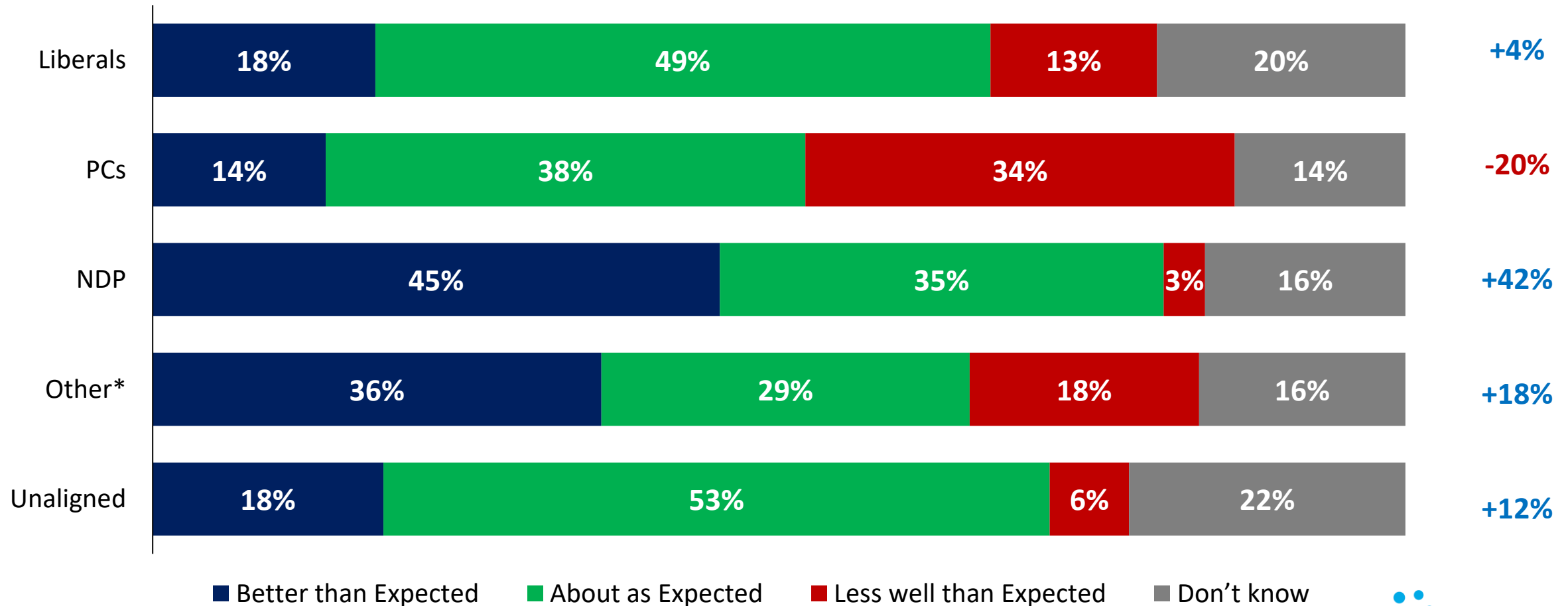

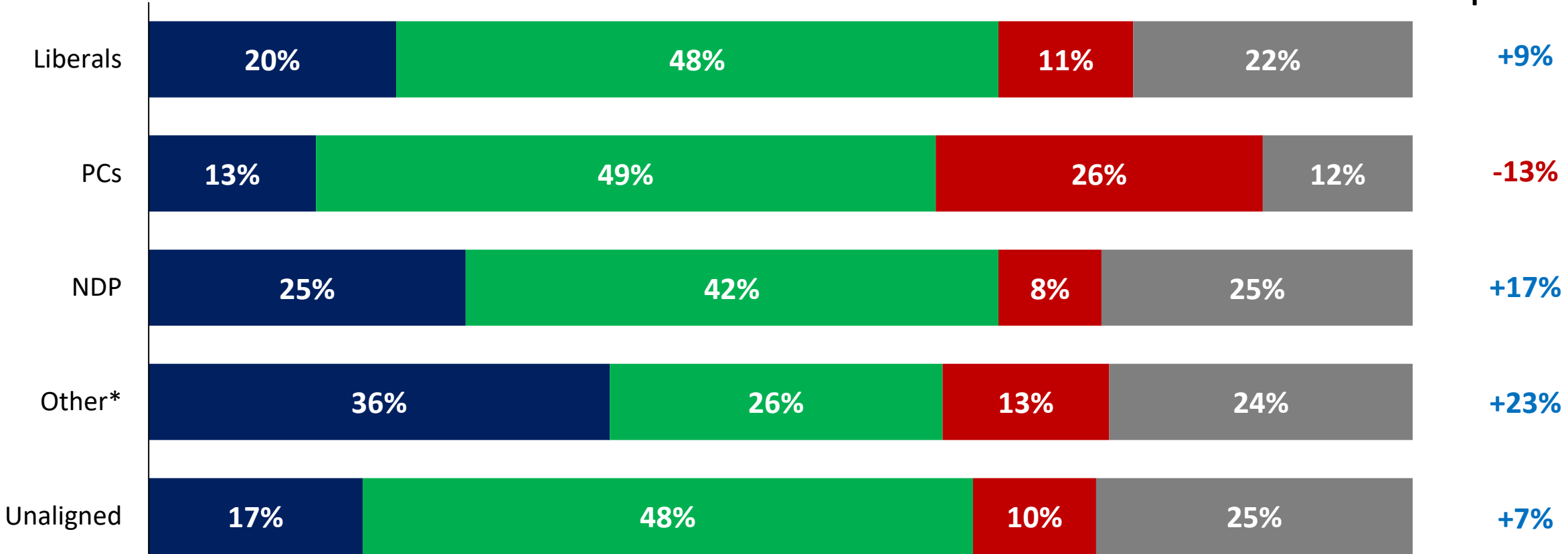

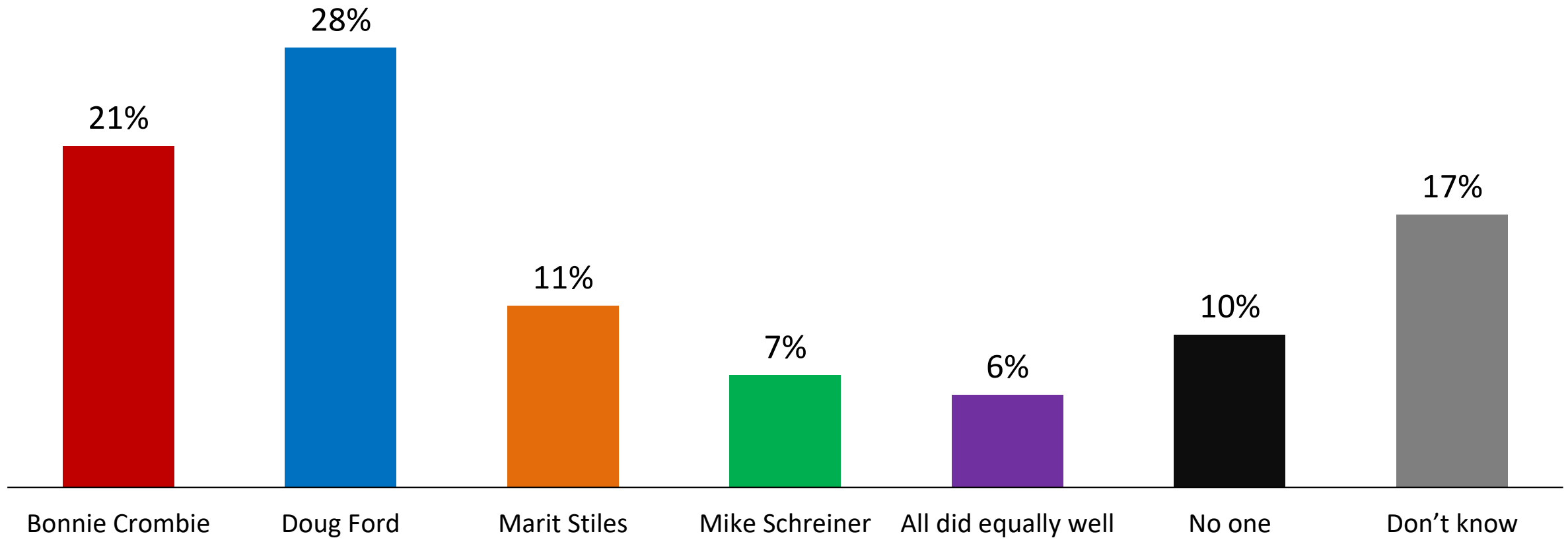

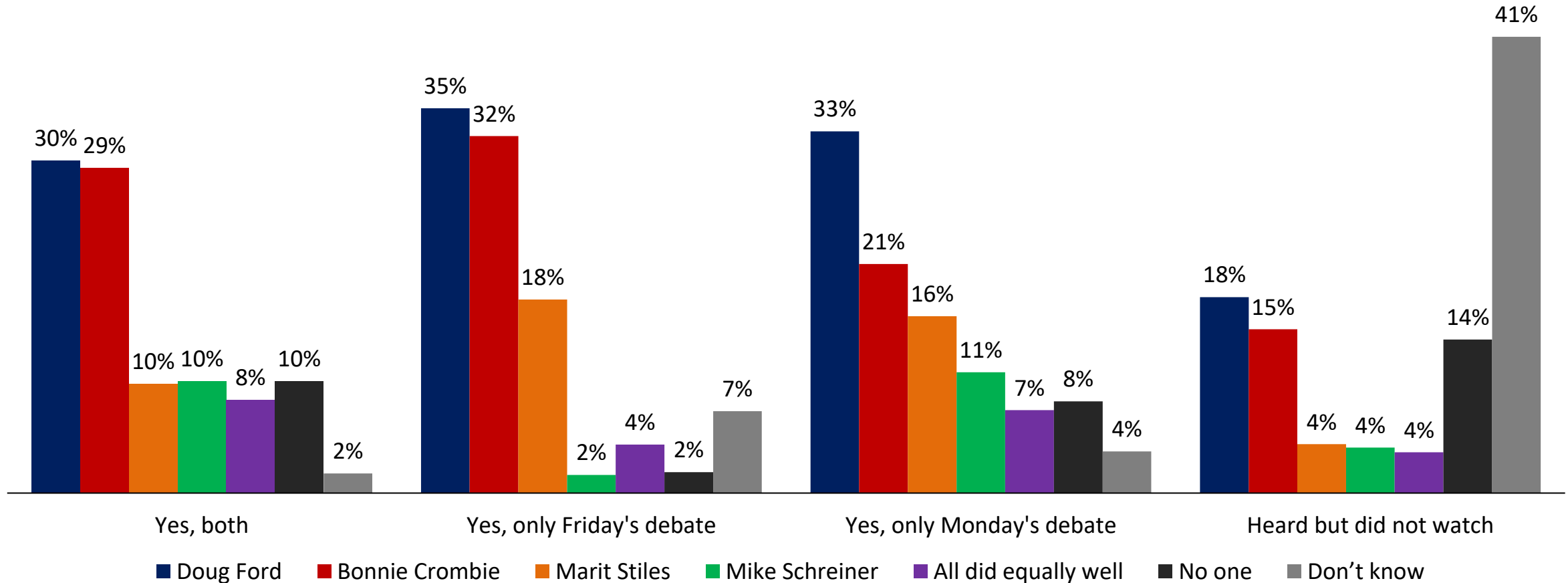


In your opinion, which leader did the best in that debate?

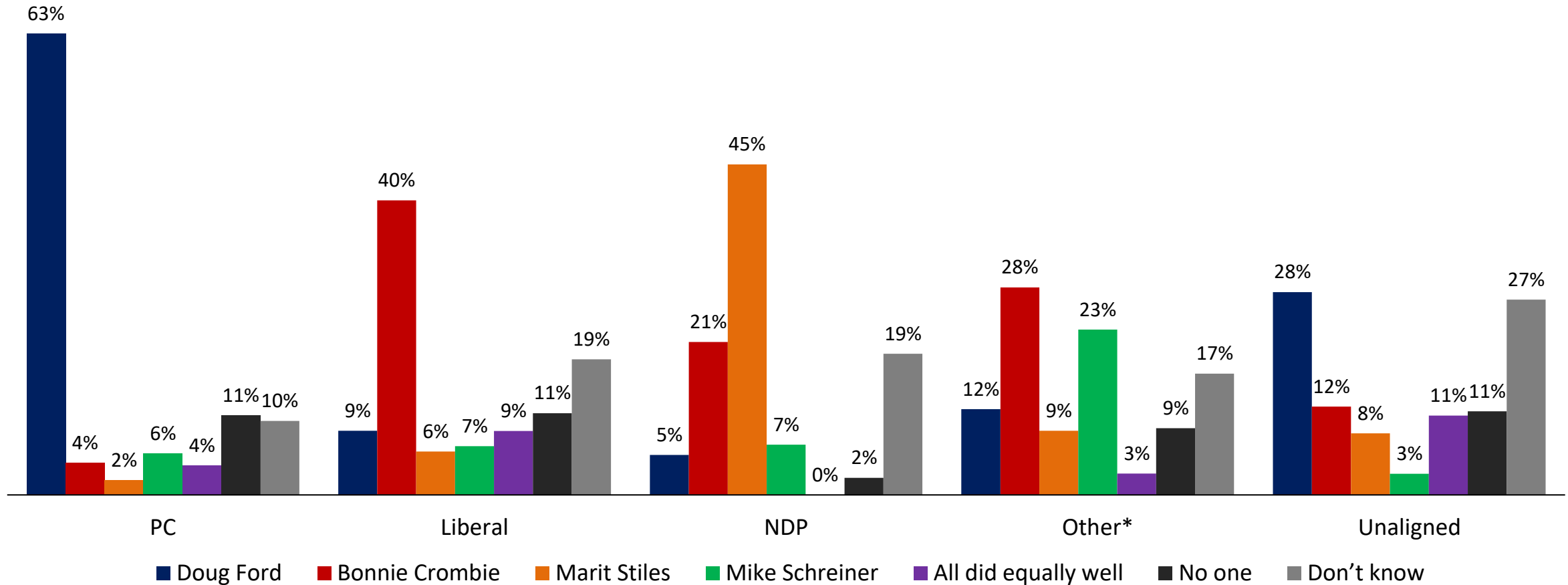

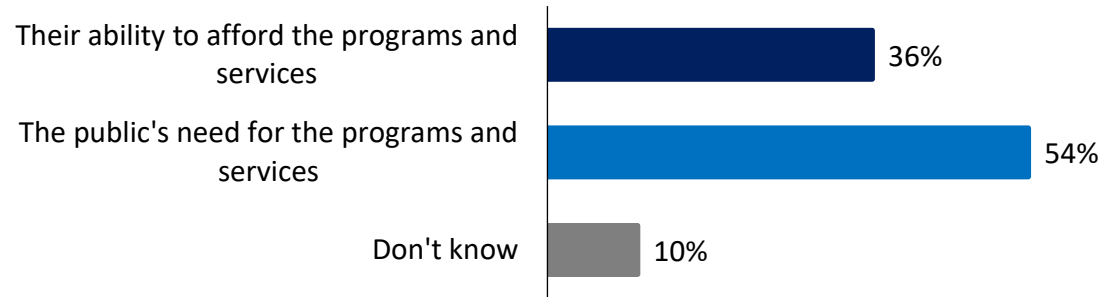
Q In your opinion, which leader did the best in that debate? **By Partisanship**



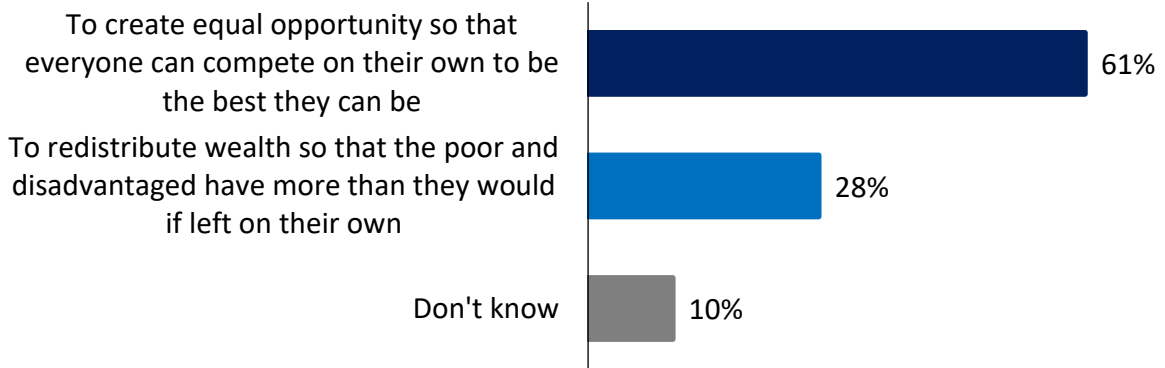

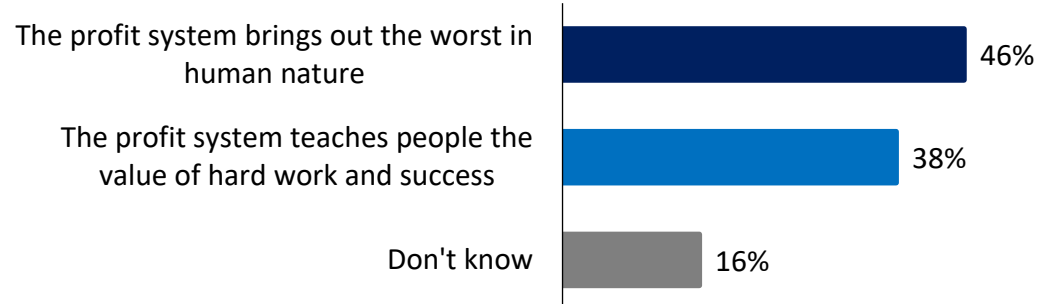

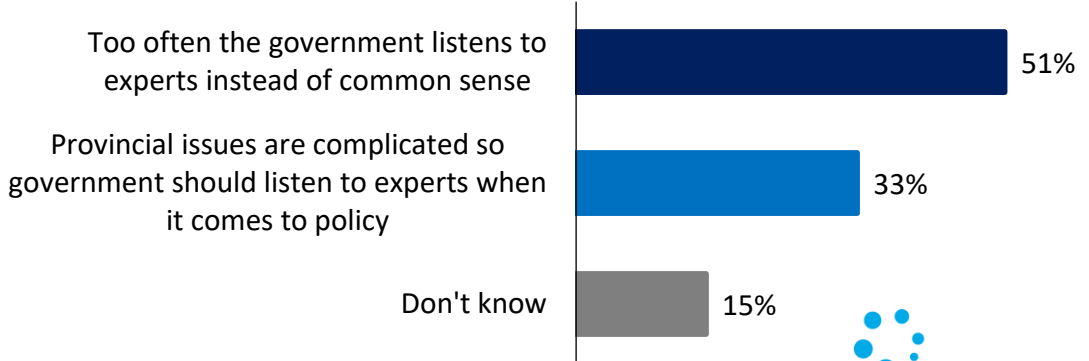

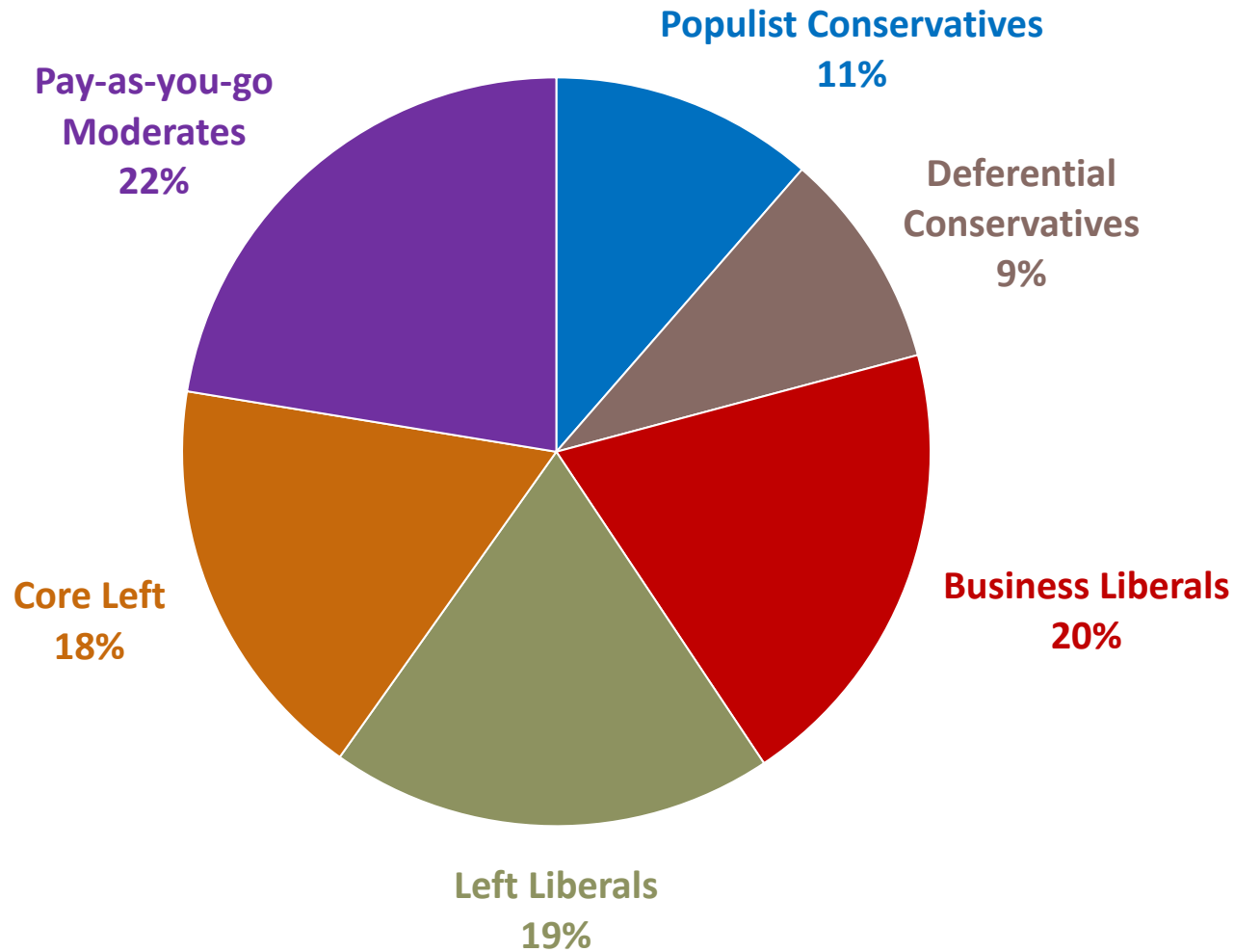


# Value Clusters: Pay-as-you-go Moderates each make up of around 20% of Ontarians

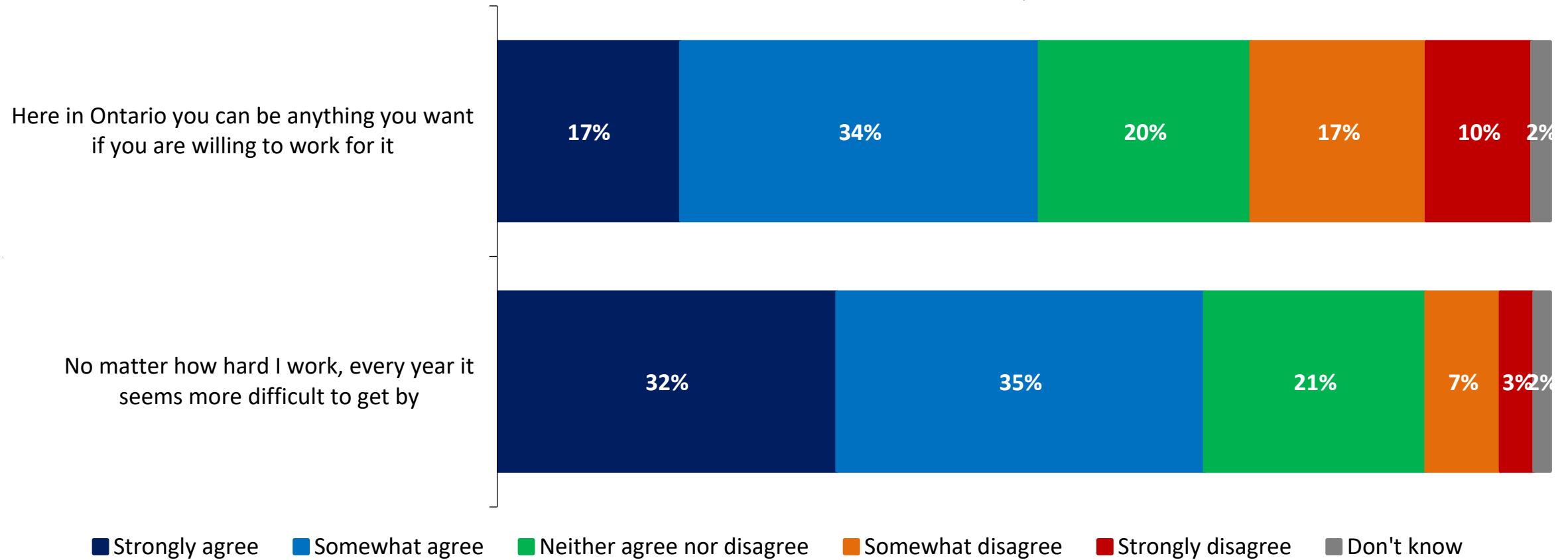

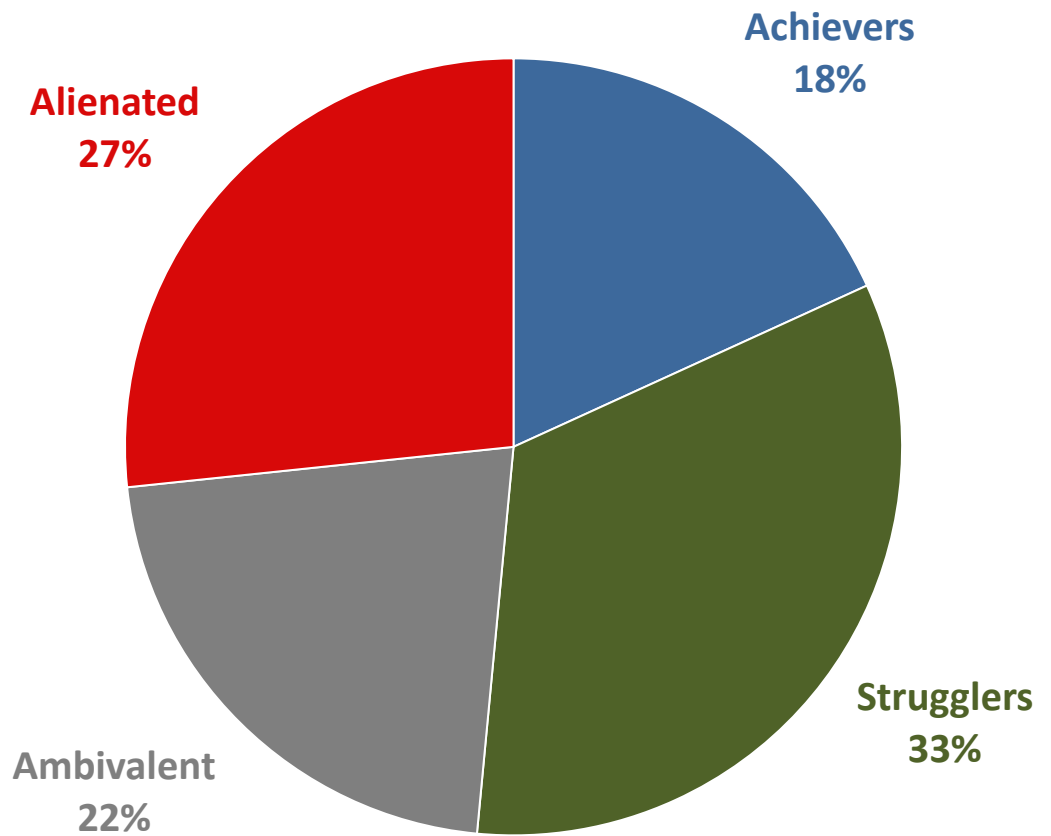


# Economic Gap Segmentation: A third of Ontarians are strugglers while 27% are Alienated

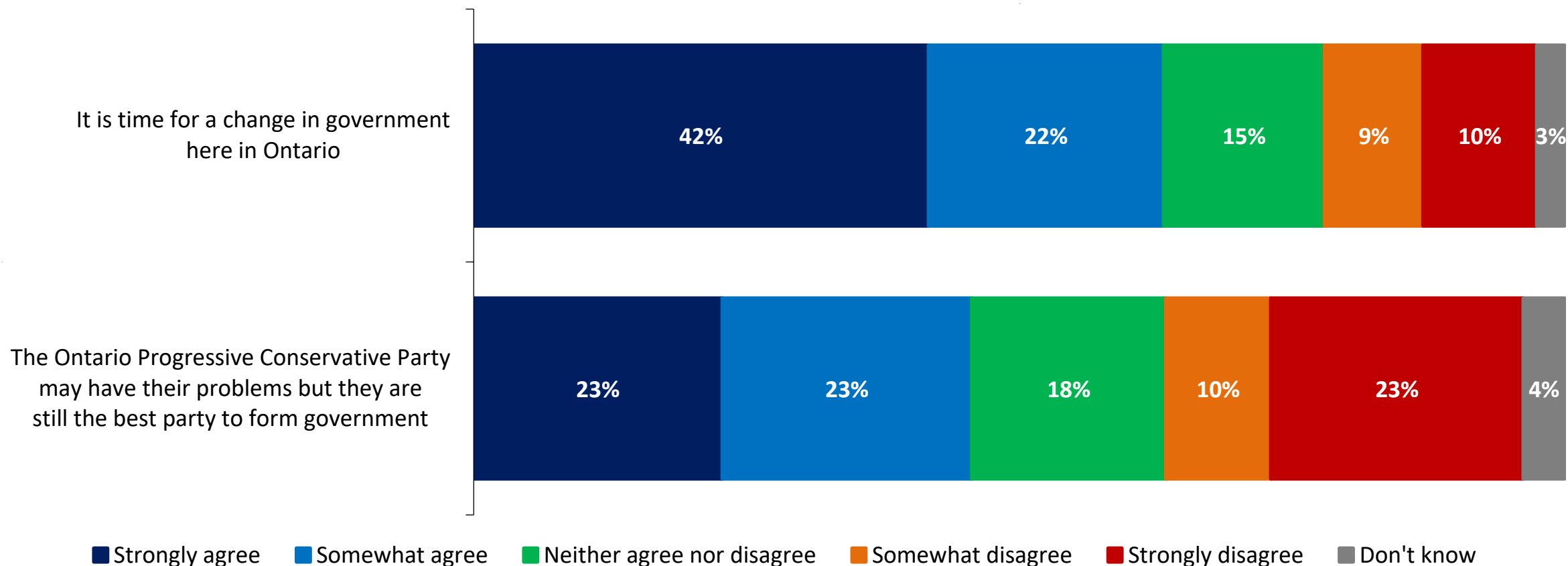

Do you agree or disagree with the following statements?

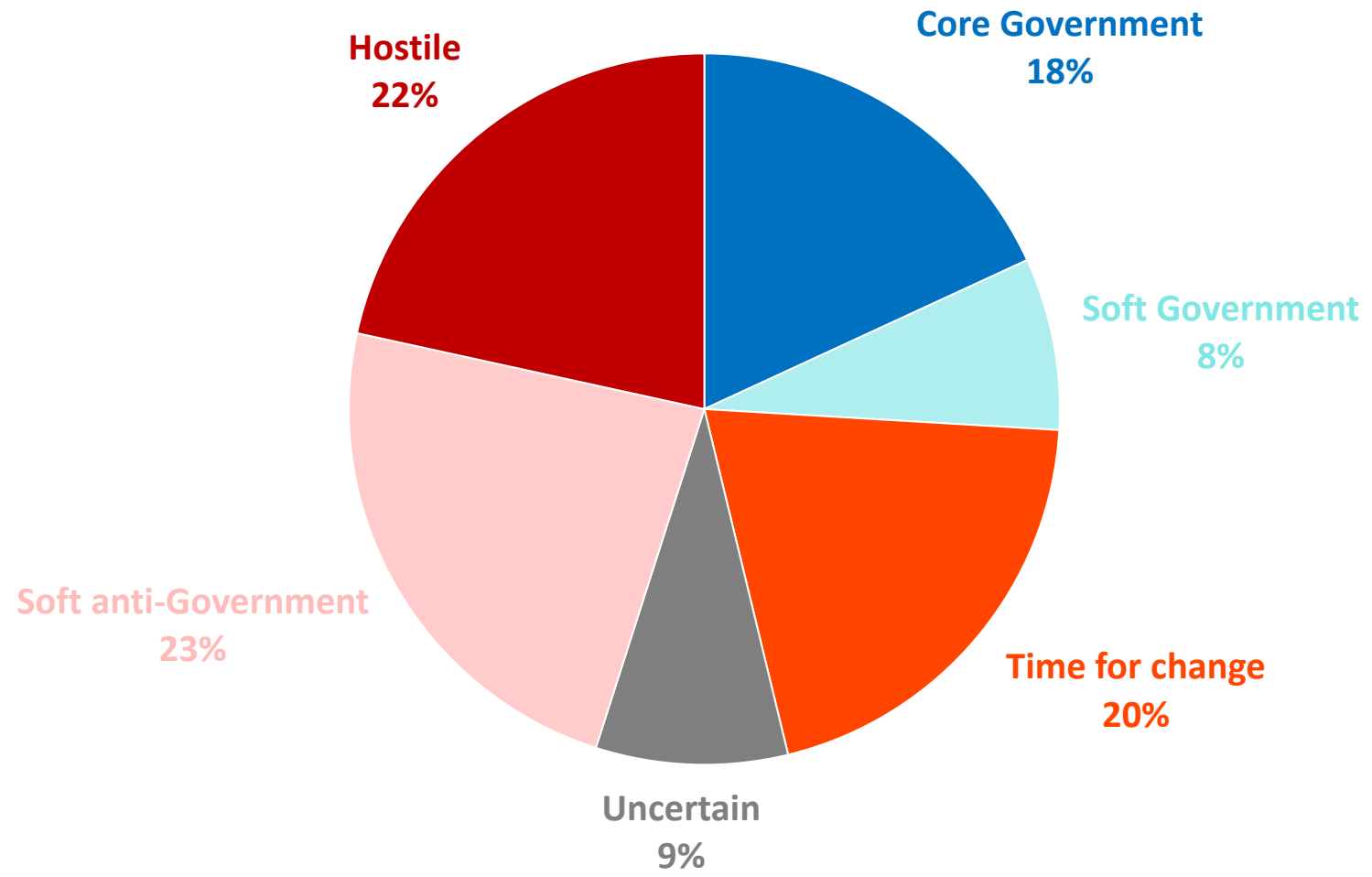

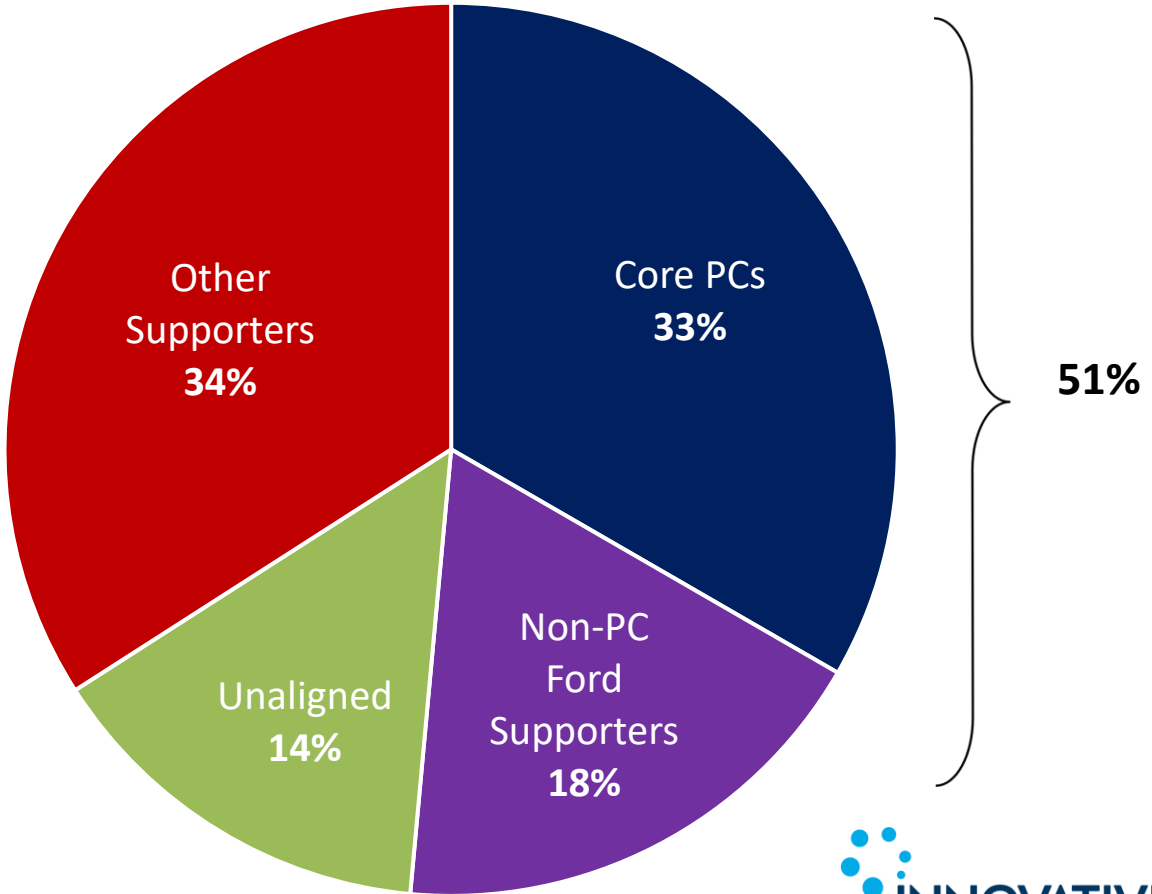
