Online survey using online sample from INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Lucid, a leading provider of online sample.




Key Findings

- 1. Liberals have grown over the campaign and are well positioned to gain seats in Toronto and, to a lesser degree, in the GTA. Their gains have come from the Core Left, Left Liberals and Deferential Conservatives.
- 2. While Ford and the PCs continue to do well with people who identify with the PC party and with people who hold Populist Conservatives values, they have lost ground with Deferential Conservatives and Left Liberals.
- 3. The Liberals have done particularly well in the fight for the Doug Ford personal vote. Among the roughly one-in-five Ontario voters who like Doug Ford and don't identify as PCs, the PCs have dropped from 49% to 37% while the Liberals are up from 22% to 33%.
- 4. The NDP have not been able to get the attention of more than 20% of Ontario's voters and have lost 15% of NDP identifiers to the Liberal party.
- 5. While only 35% of respondents have read, seen or heard anything about the recent election debates, of those who have, nearly half (47%) felt Ford performed as well as expected while Stiles had the highest net exceeded expectation score of +5%.



If a provincial election were held today, which party would you vote for? In that case, which party do you lean toward slightly? [Vote + Lean] [asked of all respondents; n=800]






Provincial Vote Tracking: Progressive Conservatives maintain the lead though Liberals have narrowed the gap




If a provincial election were held today, which party would you vote for? In that case, which party do you lean toward slightly? [DECIDED] [decided voters only; n=708]






Provincial Vote: Who Moved?


Combined Vote by Region Comparison: Since the beginning of February, PCs have lost support across all region while Liberals gained




Combined Vote by Value Cluster Comparison: Since W1, Liberals gained ground among Deferential Conservatives, Left Liberals and Core Left

Combined Vote by Ford Segment Comparison: Among Non-PC Ford supporters, PCs lost ground while Liberals gained








Ontario Party Leader NET Favourables Tracking: Stiles continues to lead on net favourability at +7% with Ford following close behind at +5%




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Best Premier Tracking: Ford maintains his lead on 'best Premier' at 39% though Crombie have made recent gains and follows at 23%



Which of the following leaders would make the best Premier of [PROV]? [asked of all respondents; n=800]













Impact by RSH

































When governments make major decisions concerning spending on programs and services, do you think they should be basing their decisions mainly on...?




Value Clusters: Pay-as-you-go Moderates each make up of around 20% of Ontarians






Economic Gap Segmentation: A third of Ontarians are strugglers while 27% are Alienated






