## Canada This Month Canadians and Trump

Public Opinion Research Release Date: February 20, 2025 Field Dates: Feb 12, 2025 to Feb 17, 2025



The Federal Conservative party maintains a wide lead on decided vote at 40% though Liberals see a small jump of 5-points since January from 22% to 27%.

2 Excitement for Trump's renewed presidency continues to drop with nearly half (46%) of Canadians saying they are mostly afraid.



After hitting a peak in approval in their response to Trump, approval of the federal government dropped by 10points this wave. Similarly, net approval of Poilievre has also declined from +9% in late January to +1% mid-February.




Overall, Canadians are split on Carney and Poilievre being best equipped in handling Trump's renewed presidency. Although those who are more afraid than excited continue to see Carney as being more effective than Poilievre. Between Freeland and Poilievre, Canadians generally feel Poilievre is better equipped.

If a federal election were held today, which party would you vote for? In that case, which party do you lean toward slightly? [DECIDED] [decided voters only; n=872]









#### Carney's favourability has been trending upwards since mid-January



















## Pierre Poilievre and the Conservatives' Approach:

#### Poilievre and the Conservative's approach drops to a 1% net approval rate for respondents, down over past weeks









Since US tariffs on Canadian goods will raise the cost of living in the US, Canada should be patient and wait for US consumers and businesses to put pressure on Trump to remove those tariffs.

The only way to make a bully like Trump back down is to match his tariffs on Canadian products with our own tariffs on American products, even if that raises prices for Canadian consumers.

Donald Trump's tariff threat has highlighted the need for Canada to increase the amount we export overseas and to reduce our economic dependence on the US.

Given the jobs and long-term economic benefits created by Canada's oil and gas exports, we should be careful not to take actions in the short run that could hurt our long-term relationship.



# Methodology

## **Survey Methodology**



## These are the results of an online survey conducted between February 12<sup>th</sup> and February 17<sup>th</sup>, 2025.

**Method:** This online survey was conducted using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Lucid, a leading provider of online samples. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample.

**Sample Size:** n=2,015 Canadian citizens, 18 years or older. The results are nationally weighted to n=1,000 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.

Field Dates: February 12<sup>th</sup> and February 17<sup>th</sup>, 2025.

**Weighting:** Results for Canada are weighted by age, gender, region, education, and self-reported federal past vote to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data, in order to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported in the table.

**Margin of Error:** This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability-based sample, a margin of error cannot be calculated. Statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates do not apply to most online panels.

**Note**: Graphs may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.
