Study Overview



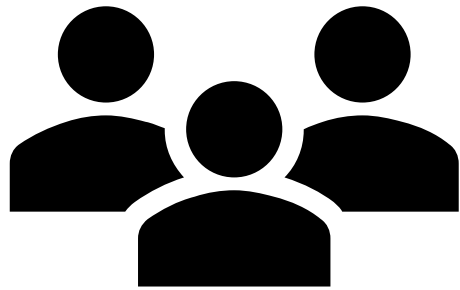
Building from findings off previous waves, this report tracks:

The findings in this survey report are based on an online survey sponsored and conducted by Innovative Research Group Inc.

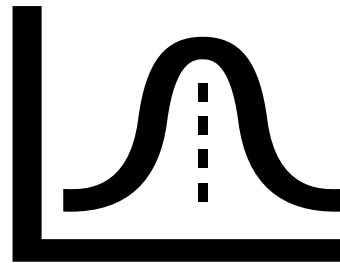

Survey conducted in both French and English.

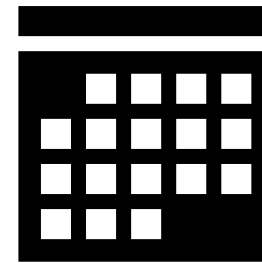
SAMPLE



Unweighted sample of 1,548 respondents. Weighted nationally to 1,000 respondents based on 2021 Census data from Statistics Canada.

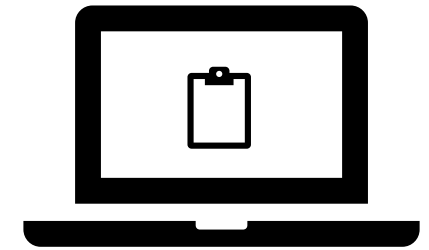
Sample weighted by age, gender, region, education, and self-reported federal past vote.

METHOD



Online survey from representative online panels.

Survey conducted in both French and English.

Summary

1

Mark Carney and the Liberals have maintained their momentum. More than 6-in10 Canadians are paying attention. They are almost twice as likely to more favourable than less favourable as a result of what they hear. As a result, Carney's net favourability reached a new high of +12 and he leads as best PM at 34%, a 7-point lead over Poilievre.

2

Poilievre continues to struggle. Poilievre and the CPC only reached 45% of Canadians this week. They lost ground with those people as 40% felt less favourable and only 32% more favourable. Poilievre's net net favourability fell to -9 points.

3

The Liberals now hold a narrow 2-point lead over the CPC. Liberals support comes from across the spectrum. They have not only lead the 3 centre left clusters, they lead the CPC among Deferential Conservatives and are within 4-points of the CPC among Pay-as-you-go Moderates. The CPC are only dominant among Populist Conservatives.

4

The Liberals are now building significant regional strength in Eastern Canada (Ontario, Quebec, and Atlantic Canada). In Quebec, Liberals lead the Bloc by 3 points. Outside of Quebec, Conservatives hold a narrow 3-point lead.

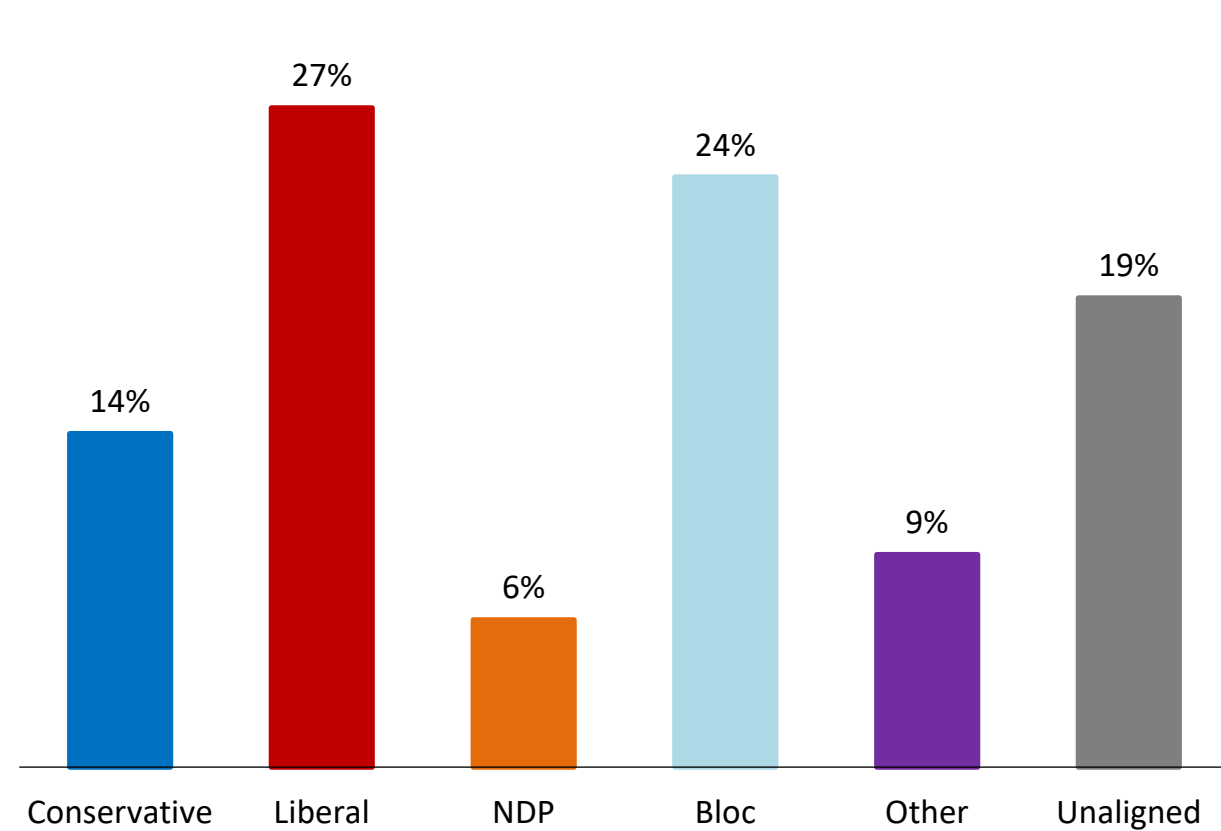
While the Bloc remains strongly in contention in Quebec, the NDP are in serious difficulty with only 13% of the vote. The NDP have only 19% of the vote among the Core Left.

Key Voter Segments

Federal Party ID (Quebec vs. ROC): Liberals lead in Quebec over Bloc by 3 points; Conservatives hold a 3-point lead over Liberals in the rest of Canada

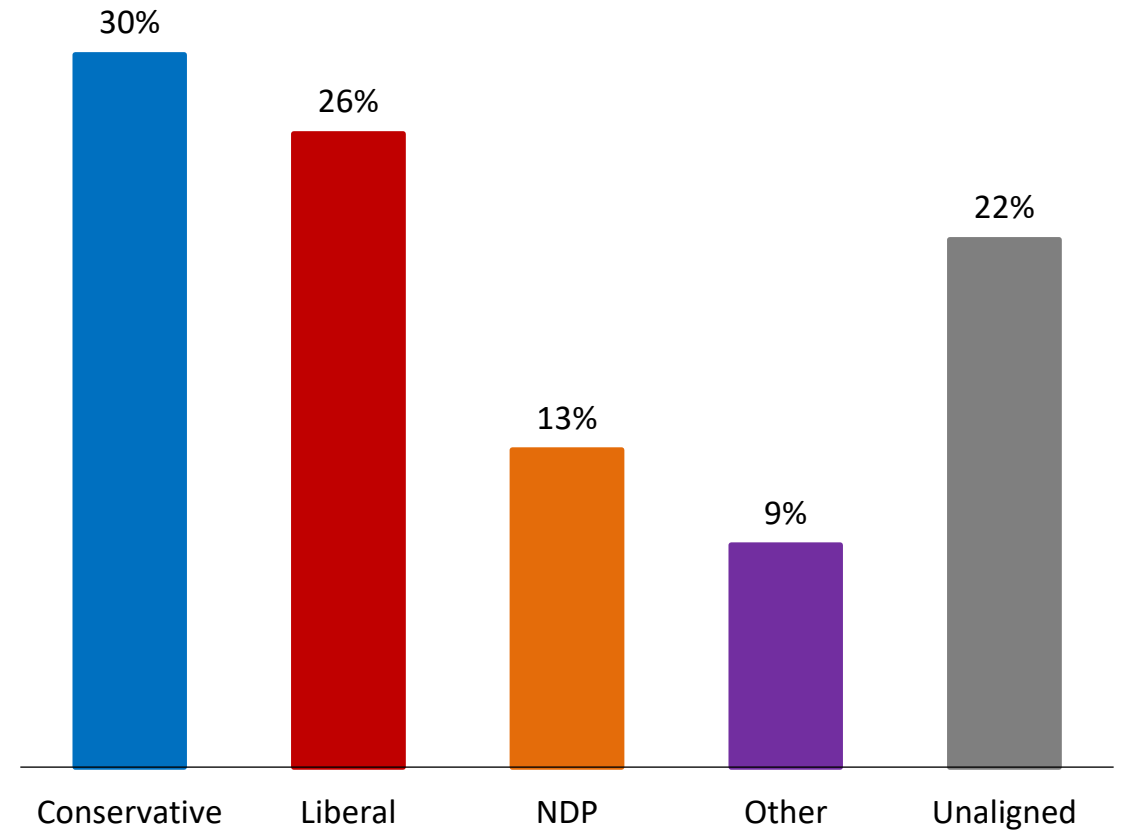
Party ID: Quebec

[Respondents in the rest of Canada; n=770]



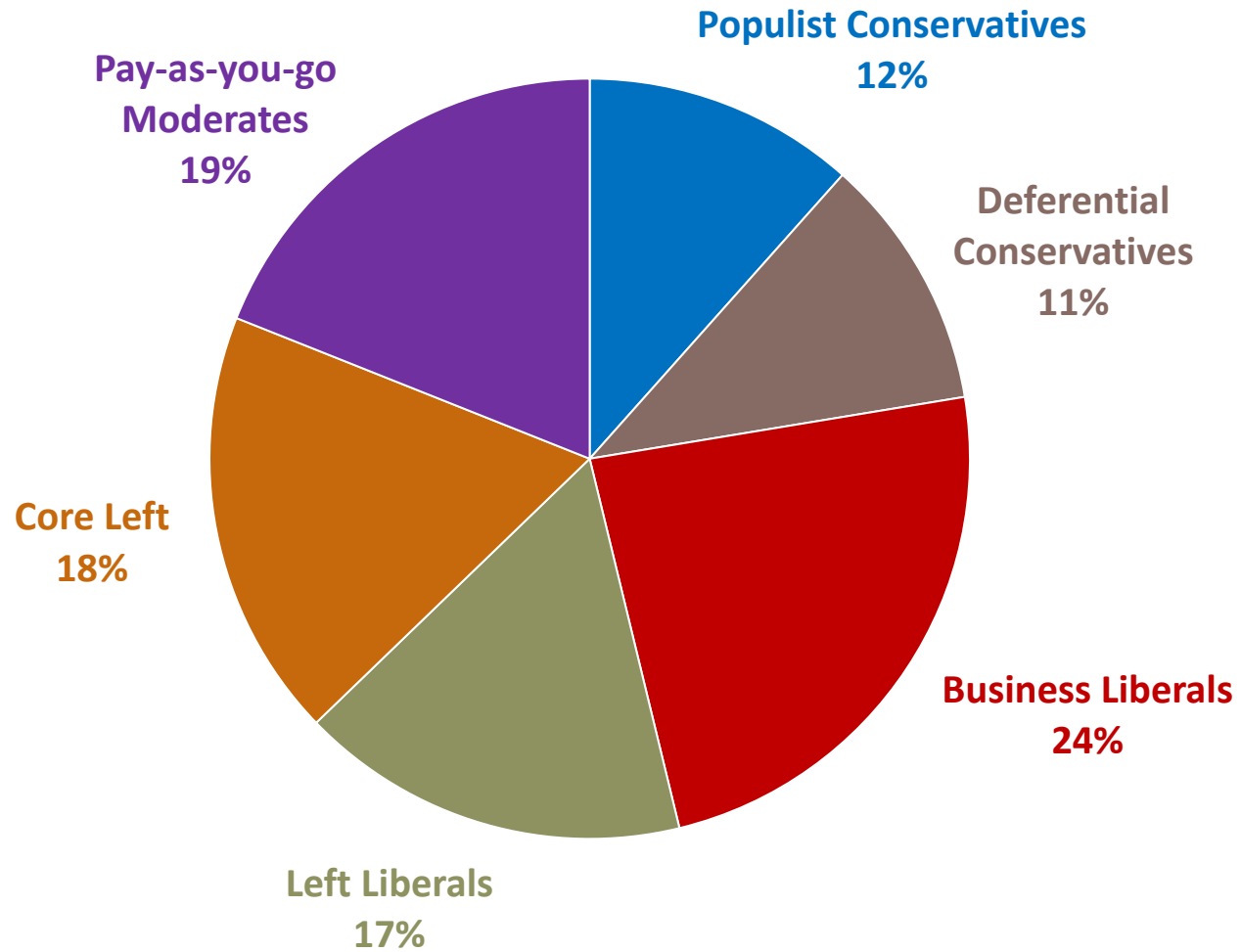
Value Clusters:

Business Liberals representation (24%) about the same as both Conservative segments combined



Clusters are based on 4 basic values: equal opportunity versus redistribution; trust in the profit system; whether spending should be based on ability to afford or public need; and whether government should listen to experts or common sense.

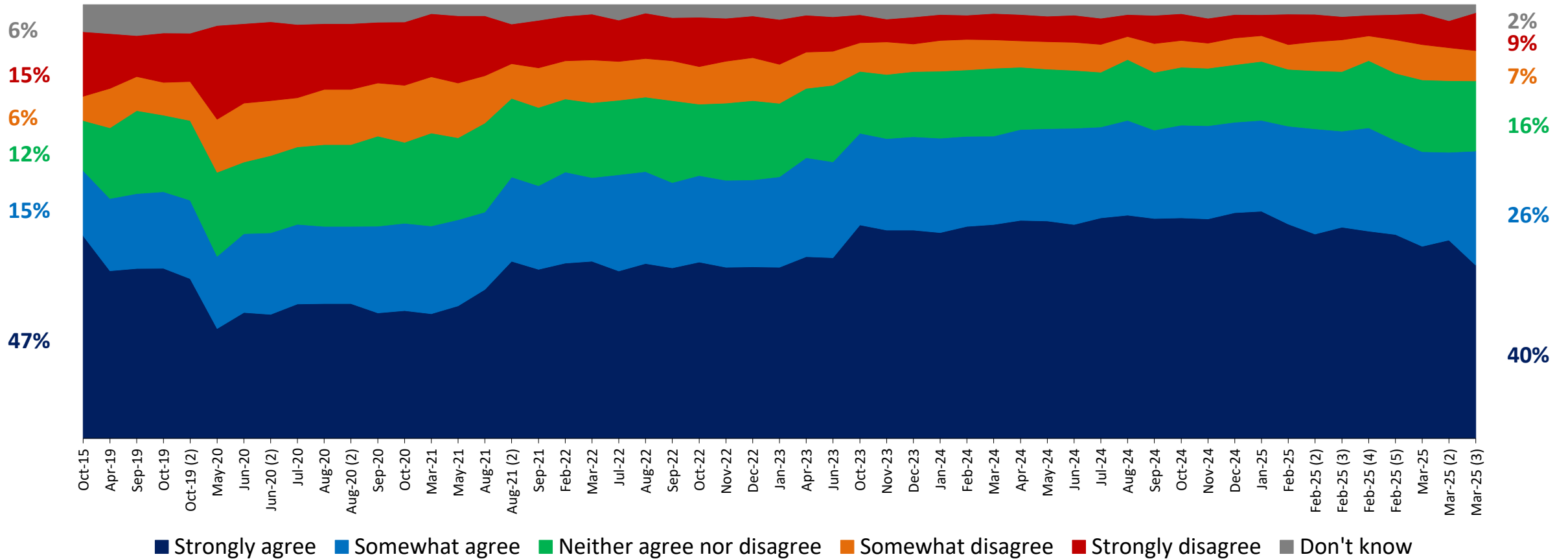


Time for Change

Time for Change Tracking: Agreement on 'Time for a change' has remained stable since the beginning of March; as of W3, 66% of Canadians are in agreement



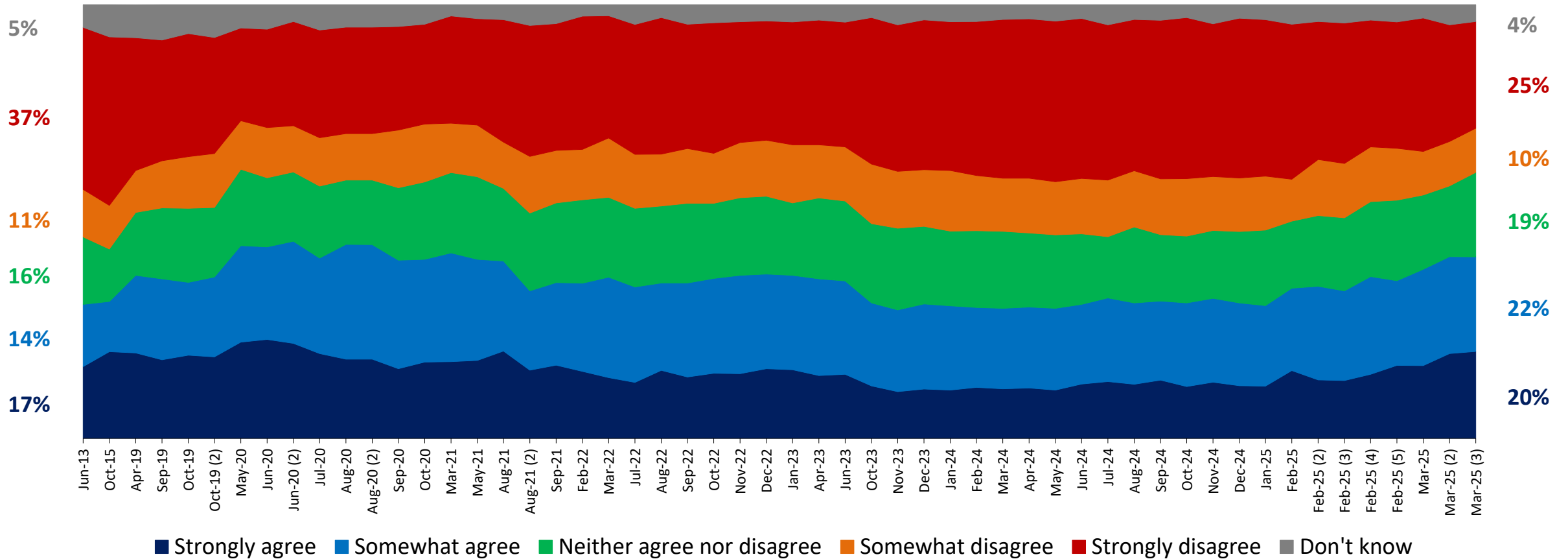
Do you agree or disagree with the following statements? - It is time for a change in government here in Canada

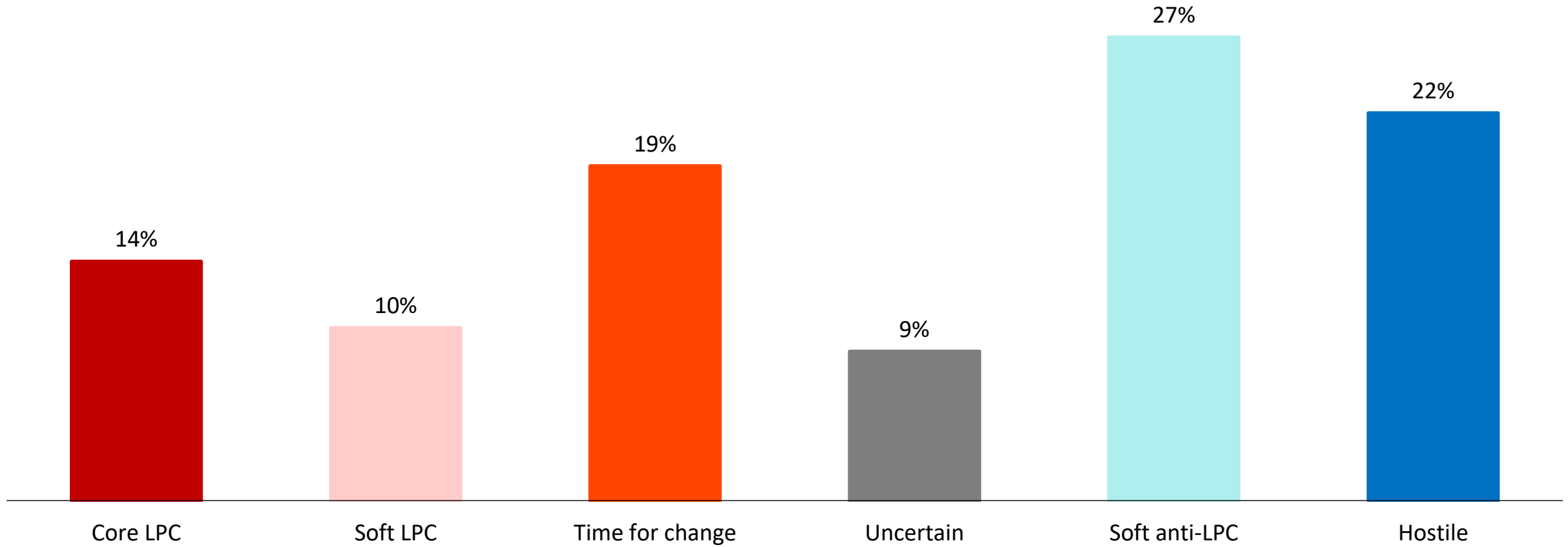
Time for Change Segmentation:

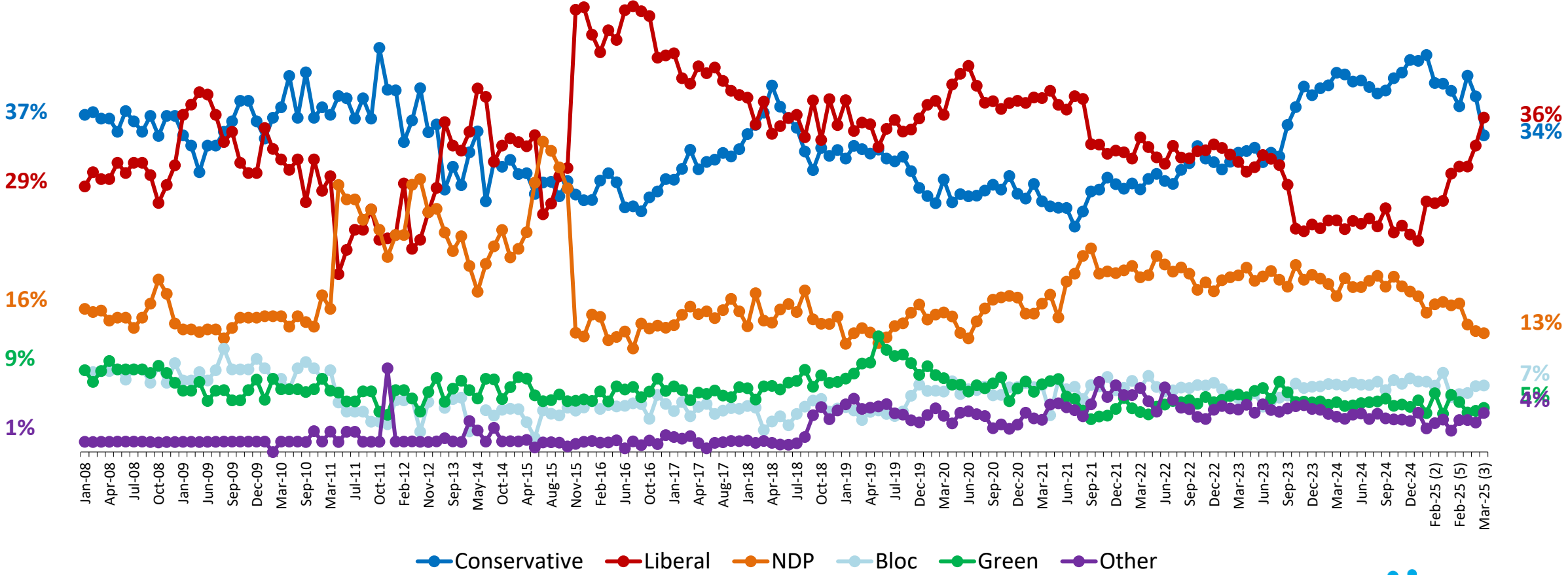


Federal Vote

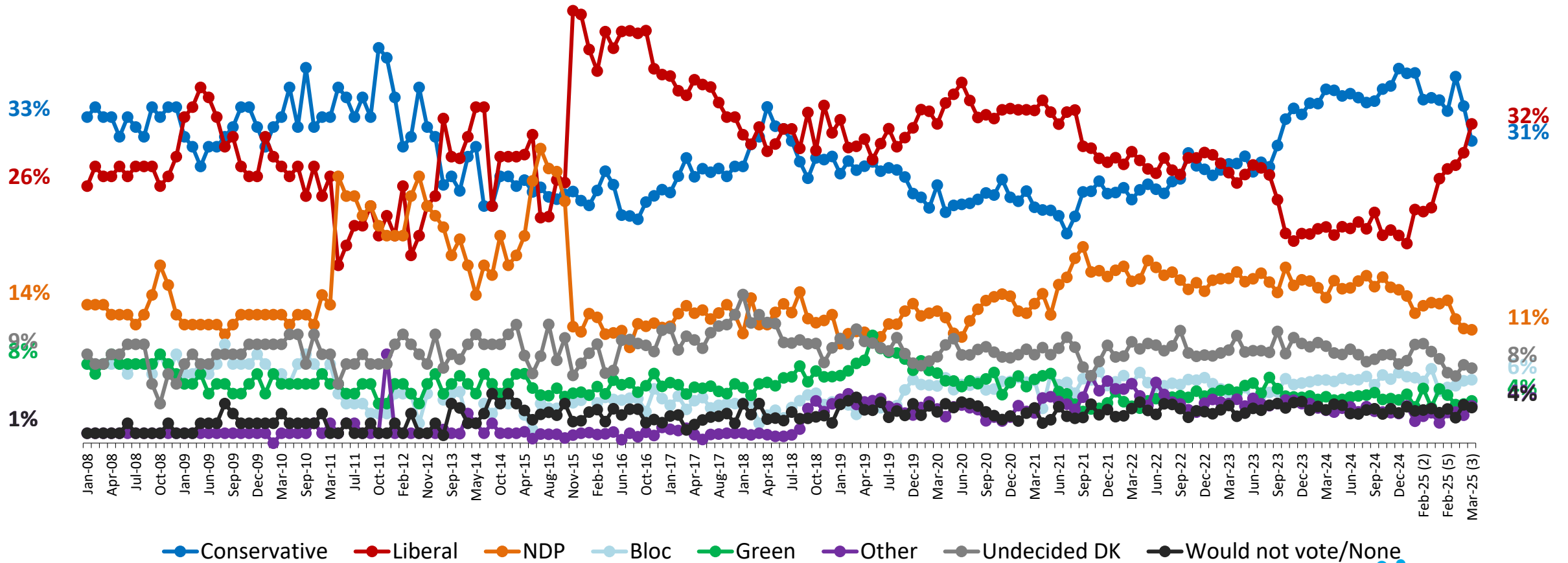

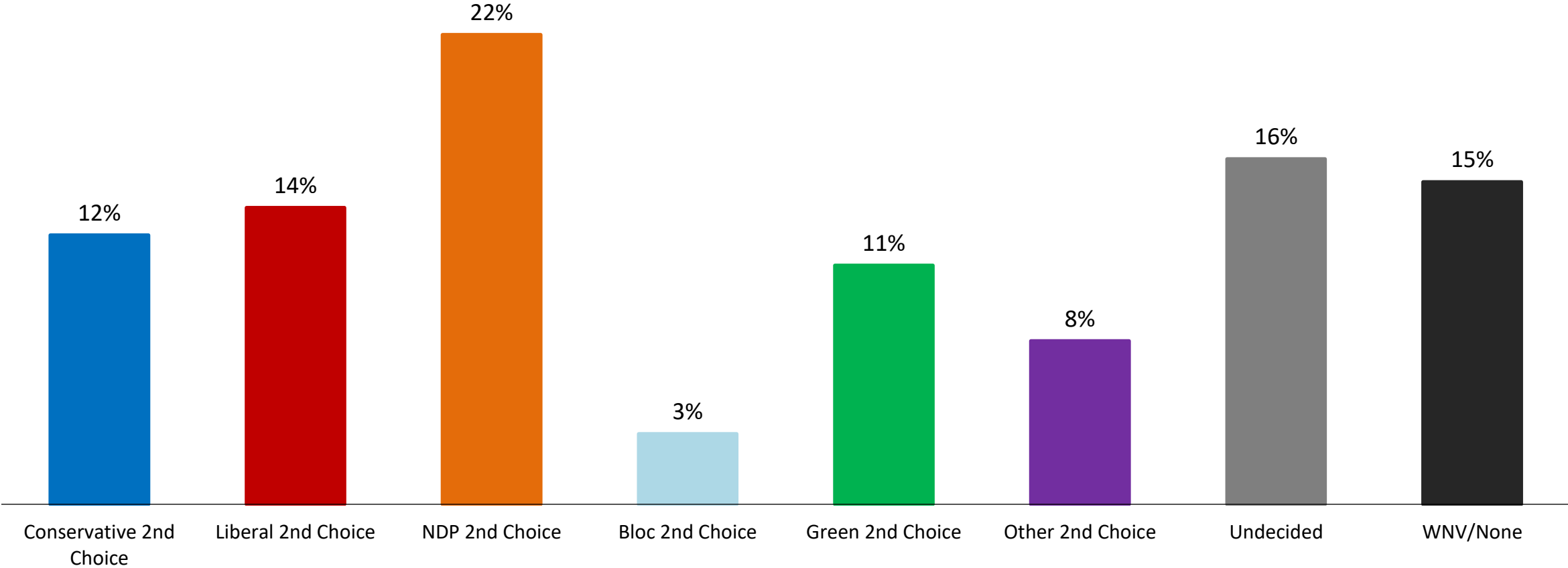


Federal 2nd Choice: NDP takes the lead as the second vote choice at 22%

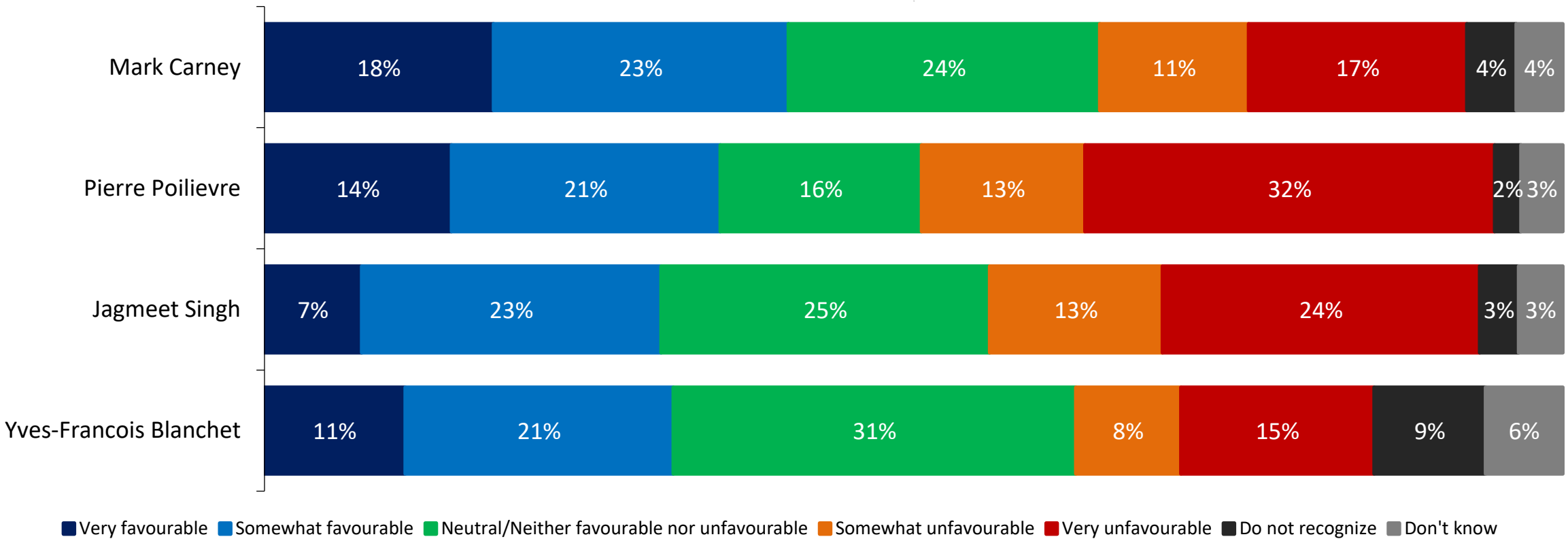


Leader Favourables: Carney surpasses Poilievre by 5 points in favourability; Poilievre has the highest unfavourable ratings at 44%

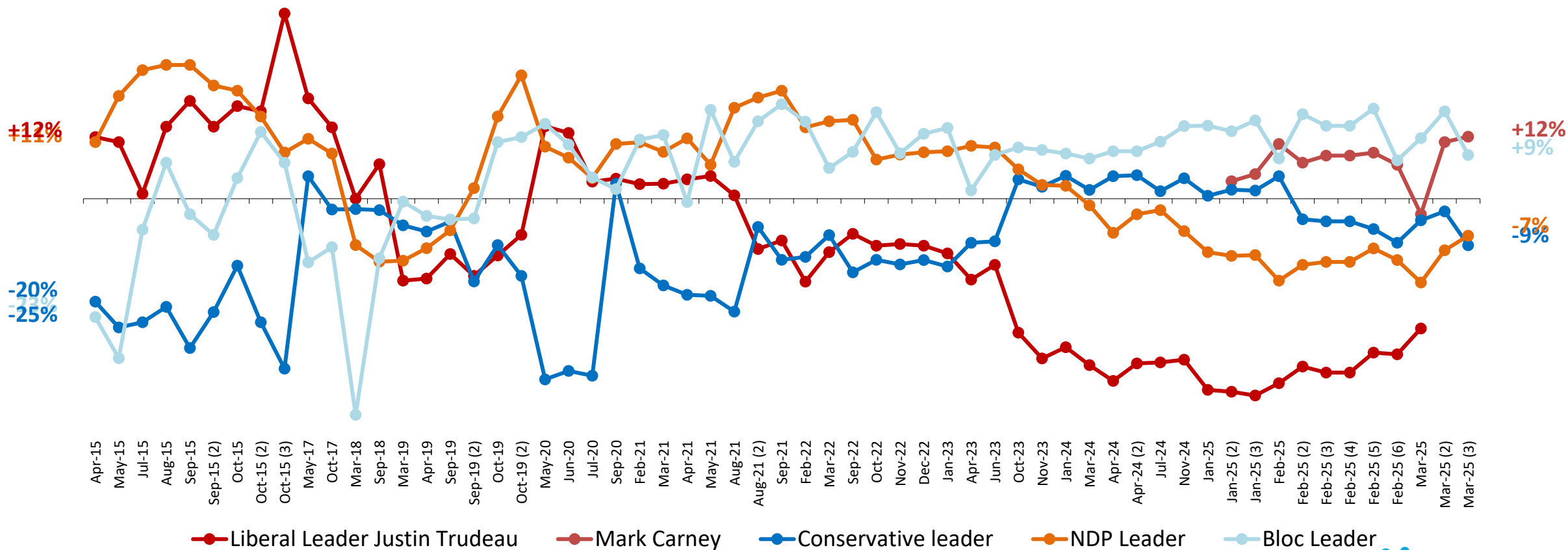


Party Leader NET Favourables Tracking: Poilievre drops to -9 in net favourability; Carney reaches 12%, highest since tracking began

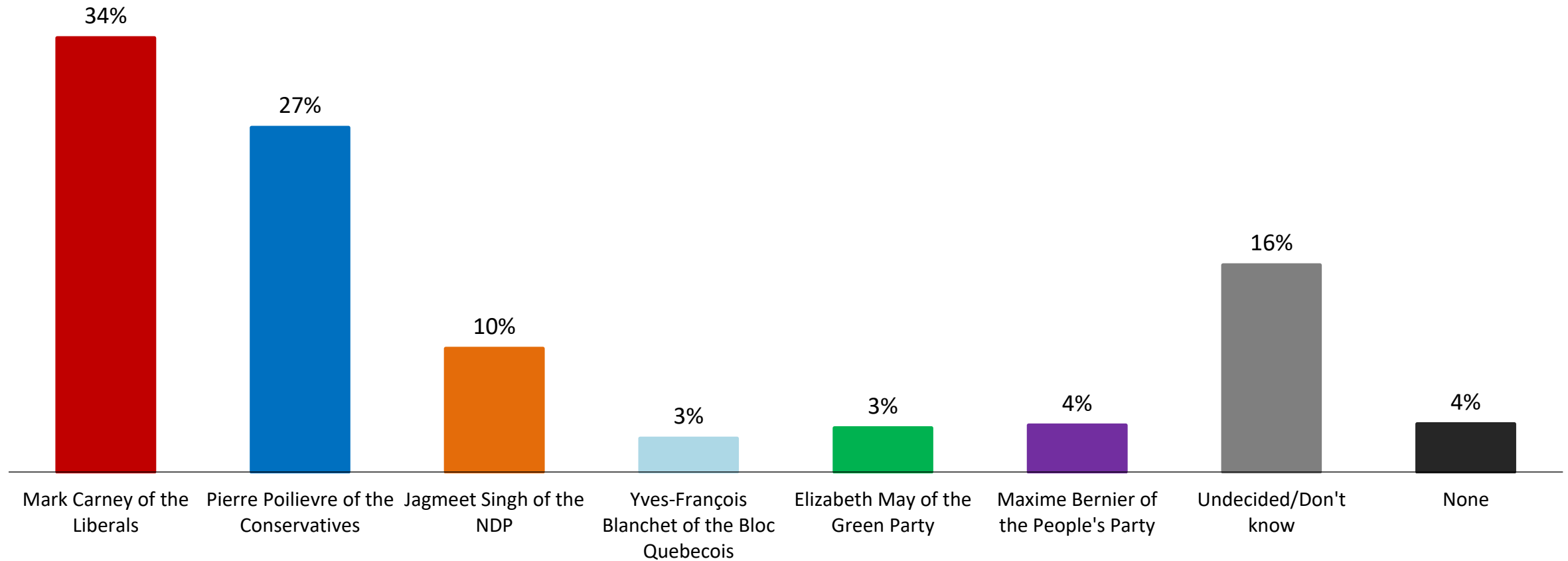


Best Prime Minister: Carney leads as best Prime Minister at 34%, surpassing Poilievre by 7 points

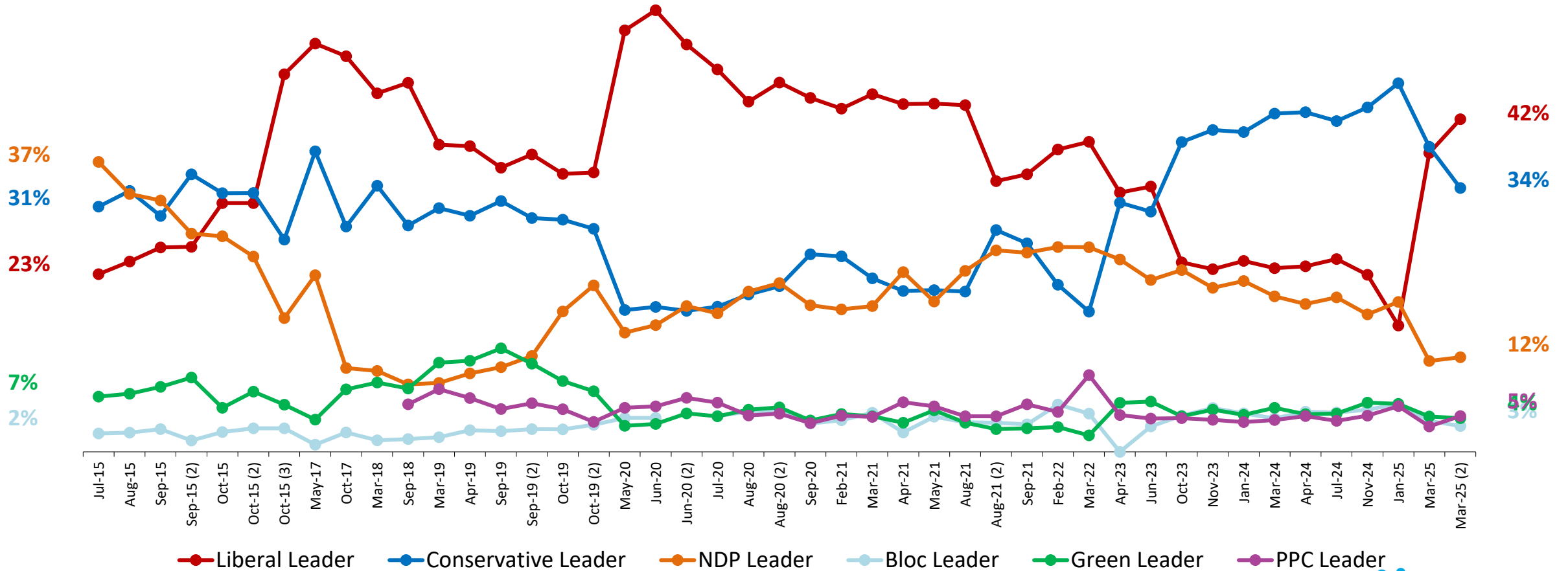


Best Prime Minister Tracking (Decided): Over 2-in-5 of decided voters say a Liberal leader would make the best Prime Minister; 34% say Conservatives

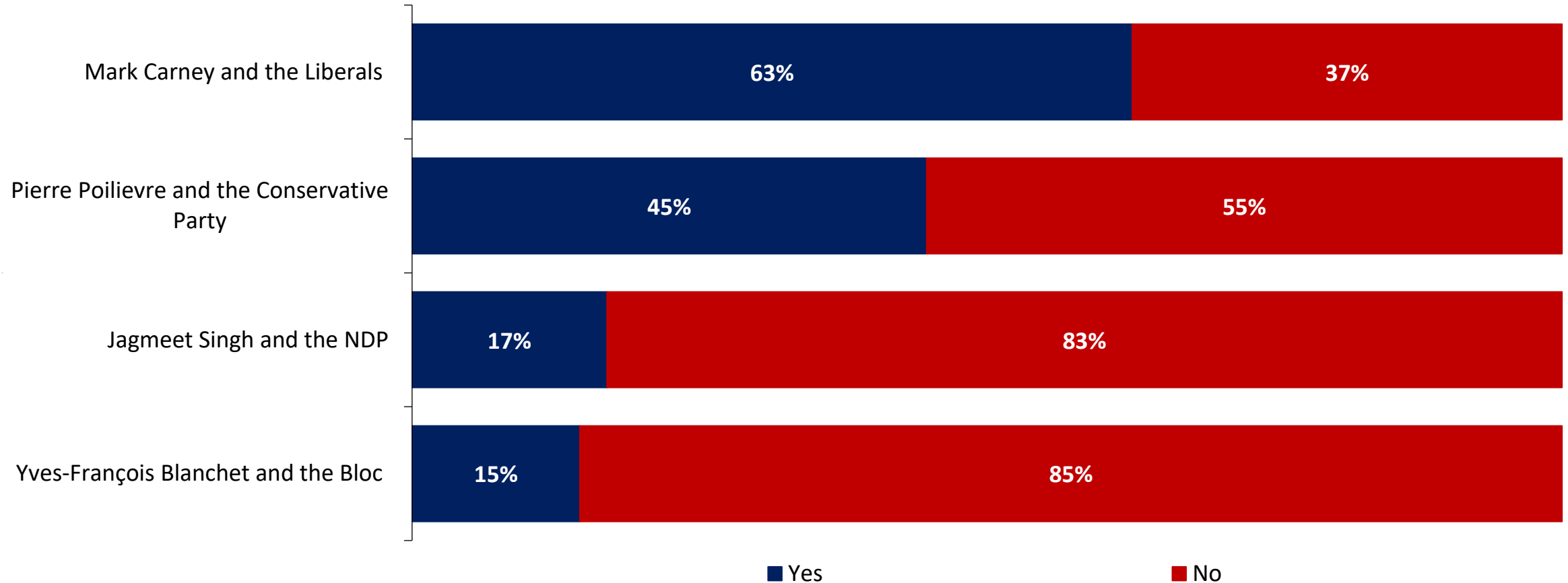
Campaign Attention:

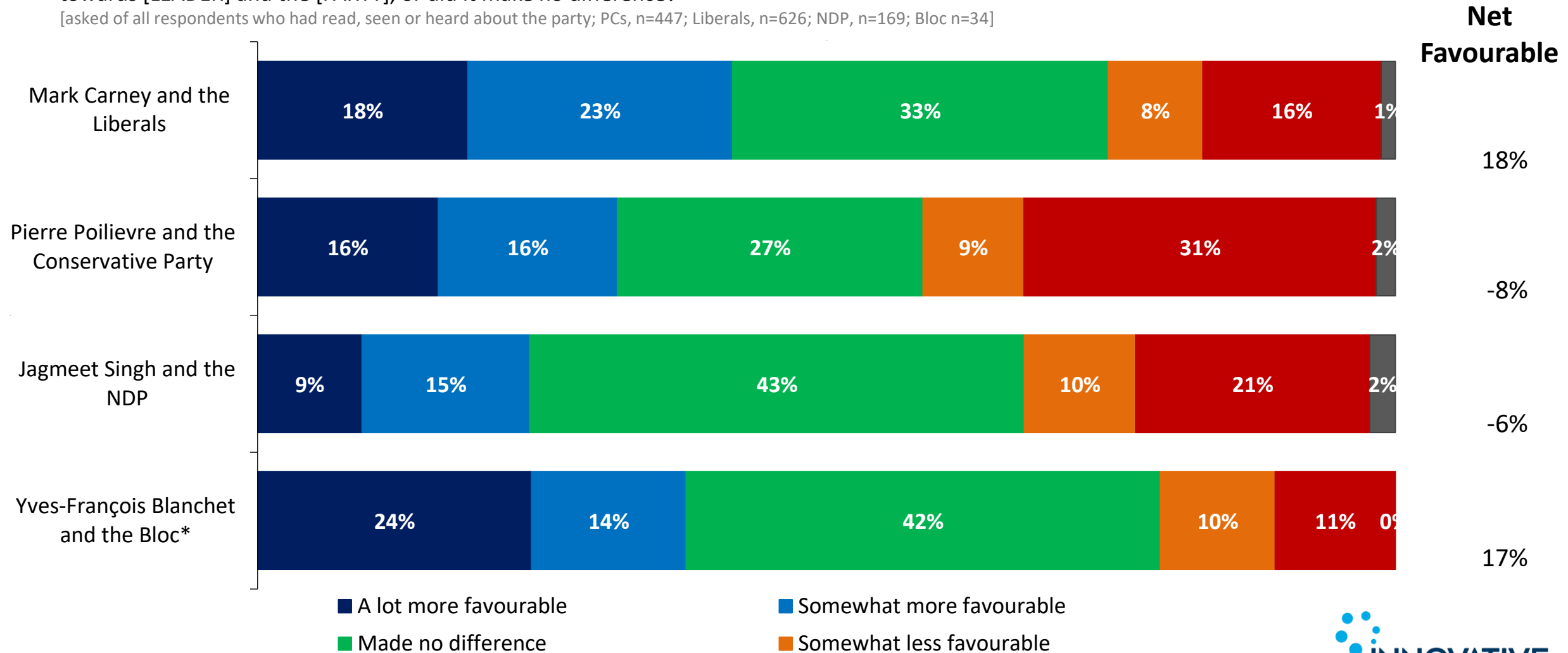
RSH Impact:
