Learning Targets



Building from findings off previous waves, this report tracks key voter segments, federal vote intentions, and federal leadership. It also further expands on:

- Party leaders who would make the best Prime Minister of Canada
- Canada-U.S. relations
- Reactions to Trump
- Responding to tariffs




Summary

- Mark Carney had a good week between winning the leadership and being sworn in as Prime Minister. Canadians tuned in to politics in unusually high numbers, they liked what they heard about the federal government, and Carney's image bounced back to a net positive score of +11.
- The leadership contest has fundamentally changed. In January Poilievre had a 30 point lead over Trudeau as best to be PM. Today Poilievre and Carney are in a virtual tie. Carney equals Poilievre in rallying his own partisans and beats Poilievre among other partisan segments. Carney has a 20-point lead among Time for A Change Liberals, a critical group of swing voters. The two leaders are tied in Ontario and BC, key regional battlegrounds.
- The CPC lead over the Liberals has narrowed again. The Conservatives continue to maintain a lead (now at 39% CPC, Liberals 33%), but the lead has closed by 4-points compared to last week. Conservatives maintain a small 3-point lead in Ontario but a larger 13-point lead in BC. The Liberals and Bloc are neck-and-neck in Quebec.
- Federal approval continues to follow the pattern of surging at crisis points and then ebbing. Even so, federal approval remains high at 31% while Poilievre and CPC trail at just +6. Carney now enjoys a 5-point lead over Poilievre on best equipped to handle Canada-US relations.
 - While most other trade attitudes are generally stable, there is a consistent marginal decline in support for more 'aggressive' responses the US. We will check next week to see if this may be a result of reaction to the electricity surcharge experience.


Federal Party ID (Quebec vs. ROC)


Value Clusters:



Do you agree or disagree with the following statements? - It is time for a change in government here in Canada [asked of all respondents; n=1000]






Liberals Best Party Tracking:

Do you agree or disagree with the following statements? - The Liberals may have their problems but they are still the best party to form government [asked of all respondents; n=1000]






Time for Change Segmentation:






Federal Combined Vote:

If a federal election were held today, which party would you vote for? In that case, which party do you lean toward slightly? [Vote + Lean] [asked of all respondents; n=1000]




Leader Favourables:





Which of the following party leaders would make the best Prime Minister of Canada? [asked of all respondents; n=1000]






Awareness remains high and impact strongly positive



Have you read, seen or heard anything about Canada's Prime Minister and the Federal government in the last few days?








Have you read, seen or heard anything about Canada's Prime Minister and the Federal government in the last few days? [asked of all respondents; n=1000]










Federal Read, Seen, Heard, Impact Tracking:








Net approval of the Federal government retreats but still strongly positive at +31






Canadians' concern about tariffs:


How concerned are you about the possibility of Donald Trump imposing a 25% tariff on Canadian imports to the US?


How Canada can respond to tariff threats (more cautious statements):





Methodology

Survey Methodology



These are the results of an online survey conducted between March 11th and March 13th, 2025.

Method: This online survey was conducted using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Lucid, a leading provider of online sample. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample.

Sample Size: n=1,558 Canadian citizens, 18 years or older. The results are nationally weighted to n=1,000 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.

Field Dates: March 11th and March 13th, 2025.

Weighting: Results for Canada are weighted by age, gender, region, education, and self-reported federal past vote to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data, in order to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported in the table.

Margin of Error: This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability-based sample, a margin of error cannot be calculated. Statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates do not apply to most online panels.

Note: Graphs may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.
