


Summary



In the aftermath of the April 2nd tariff news, the Liberals had a 6-point lead, with 41% of decided voters choosing them. The last time they were this high was in 2020. QC, ON, and Atlantic regions show the highest Liberal support; Alberta/Prairies are more likely to support Conservatives. BC, with a statistical tie, remains a battleground.



While British Columbia (+44), Ontario (+45), Prairies (+42), and Atlantic provinces (+48) get the highest net approval of their responses to issues resulting from Trump's presidency, Alberta (+9) and Quebec (+17) get the lowest. Contrary to Alberta's and Quebec's low approval of provincial governments, the approval of the federal government is at 36% for AB and 48% for QC.






Canadians are paying less attention to Campaigns; the Liberal campaign sees a further 9-point decrease in attention and the Conservatives 12-points from the previous wave. While nearly three-quarters of Conservatives have heard all that they need to make up their minds, LPCs (39%), NDP (46%), and Bloc (46%) voters are open to hearing more. Voters are more certain now than they were just before the 2021 election.






Federal Party ID (Quebec vs. ROC):

Liberals lead in Quebec over Bloc by 6 points; Conservatives hold a 7-point lead over Liberals in the ROC




Value Clusters:






Core Political Values:

Over half believe the government should create equal opportunity and spend based on the public's need


When governments make major decisions concerning spending on programs and services, do you think they should be basing their decisions mainly on...? [asked of all respondents; n=1000]









Do you agree or disagree with the following statements? - It is time for a change in government here in Canada [asked of all respondents; n=1000]





Do you agree or disagree with the following statements? - The Liberals may have their problems but they are still the best party to form government [asked of all respondents; n=1000]





















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



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



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

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

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

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











Best Prime Minister Tracking (Decided):

















































Survey Methodology



These are the results of an online survey conducted between April 3rd and April 7th, 2025.

Method: This online survey was conducted and sponsored by Innovative Research Group Inc. using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Lucid, a leading provider of online sample. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data.

Sample Size: n=1,341 Canadian citizens, 18 years or older. The results are nationally weighted to n=1,000 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.

Field Dates: April 3rd to April 7th, 2025.

Weighting: Results for Canada are weighted by age, gender, region, education, and self-reported federal past vote to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported in the table.

Margin of Error: This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability-based sample, a margin of error cannot be calculated. Statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates do not apply to most online panels.

Note: Graphs may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.
