
#### **Summary**

- Leading into the debates, the Liberals maintained their five-point lead, with 40% of decided voters choosing them. In contrast to the majority of NDP voters who still need to hear more to make up their minds, Conservative and Liberal voters are starting to lock in their support.
- Carney's momentum is maintained, with the net favorability gap between him and Poilievre at 21 points. 44% of Canadians see Carney as best suited to be Prime Minister of Canada, with Poilievre is 6 points behind. Liberals hold their ground among progressive value clusters but are also winning Deferential Conservatives. Pay-as-you-go Moderates remain a battleground.
- Carney continues to be perceived as the best equipped to handle Canada—US relations, with a 15-point lead over Poilievre. Poilievre's approach to dealing with issues resulting from Trump's presidency gets a net 4-point approval, which has not moved since February.
  - While British Columbia (+30), Ontario (+46), and Atlantic provinces (+35) get the highest net approval of their handling of issues resulting from Trump's presidency, Prairies (+19), Alberta (+7), and Quebec (+12) get the lowest. Contrary to Alberta's and Quebec's low approval of provincial governments, the federal government's approval in those provinces is still high and at 42% for AB and 52% for QC.
    - Canadians are mostly paying attention to the Liberal and Conservative campaigns, with RSH Impact steady since the last wave except for Blanchet's net impact, which is up 4 points. Trump and tariff dominate Carney mentions at 25% with a strongly positive net impact of +51. His assets/blind trust/conflict of interest get a 10% of mentions, but they continue to be a drag on his image with -79 point net negative impact score.


#### **Value Clusters:**











Total agreement on 'Time for a change' remains at 64%












## Federal 2nd Choice Party:

































# **Survey Methodology**



These are the results of an online survey conducted between April 10<sup>th</sup> and April 14<sup>th</sup>, 2025.

**Method:** This online survey was conducted and sponsored by Innovative Research Group Inc. using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Lucid, a leading provider of online sample. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data.

**Sample Size:** n=1,455 Canadian citizens, 18 years or older. The results are nationally weighted to n=1,000 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.

Field Dates: April 10<sup>th</sup> to April 14<sup>th</sup>, 2025.

**Weighting:** Results for Canada are weighted by age, gender, region, education, and self-reported federal past vote to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported in the table.

**Margin of Error:** This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability-based sample, a margin of error cannot be calculated. Statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates do not apply to most online panels.

**Note**: Graphs may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.
