Study Overview



Building on Wednesday's topline comparative report of three surveys, these are additional findings of the latest post-debate wave on:

- Federal vote intentions
- Federal leadership
- Reaction to Trump
- Campaign momentum
- Federal Leaders' Debate



Key Findings

The horserace numbers are now virtually tied. In the aftermath of the leadership debates, Conservatives and Liberals are tied at 38% on the decided vote. While most voters say they have made up their minds, 35% of NDP voters are still open to seeking more information. Liberals are now marginally tied with the Conservatives in Ontario and BC.

Carney's image has slipped while Poilievre's favourables are improving. The net favourability gap between Carney and Poilievre is now 11 points down since the beginning of April. Even though 42% of Canadians see Carney as best suited to be Prime Minister of Canada, Poilievre is only 3 points behind. Carney is holding his ground among progressive value clusters and is also winning Deferential Conservatives. Pay-as-you-go Moderates remain a battleground, but leaning more Conservative

There were no clear winners of the Federal leaders' debate. The results are marginally tied between Liberal and Conservative leaders (Carney at 28% and Poilievre at 30%). Poilievre (+8) received the best score in terms of beating expectation. Carney (+3), and Blanchet (+2) just barely exceeded expectations but Carney did better outside his party identifiers than Poilievre. Singh performed less well than expected (-11).

Carney continues to be perceived as the best equipped to handle Canada—US relations, with an 11-point lead over Poilievre. Poilievre's approach to dealing with issues resulting from Trump's presidency gets a net 6-point approval, increasing since mid-March.


The impact of RSH on Carney's favourability has remained more positive than negative since mid—March (with the exception of one large dip at the end of March). On the other hand, although Poilievre and the CPC's campaign impact has improved by 9 points over the same period, they still trail the Liberals by 14 points.




Value Clusters:

When governments make major decisions concerning spending on programs and services, do you think they should be basing their decisions mainly on...?


















Federal Vote Tracking:

If a federal election were held today, which party would you vote for? In that case, which party do you lean toward slightly? [Vote + Lean] [asked of all respondents; n=1,200]
















































In your opinion, which leader did the best in that debate? [asked of those who RSH; n=508]























Survey Methodology



These are the results of an online survey conducted between April 21st and April 23rd, 2025.

Method: This online survey was conducted and sponsored by Innovative Research Group Inc. using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Lucid, a leading provider of online sample. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data.

Sample Size: n=1,584 Canadian citizens, 18 years or older. The results are nationally weighted to n=1,200 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.

Field Dates: April 21st to April 23rd, 2025.

Weighting: Results for Canada are weighted by age, gender, region, education, and self-reported federal past vote to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported in the table.

Margin of Error: This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability-based sample, a margin of error cannot be calculated. Statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates do not apply to most online panels.

Note: Graphs may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.

Debate



These are the results of an online survey conducted between April 17th and April 21th, 2025.

Method: This online survey was conducted and sponsored by Innovative Research Group Inc. using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Lucid, a leading provider of online sample. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data.

Sample Size: n=1,305 Canadian citizens, 18 years or older. The results are nationally weighted to n=1,000 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.

Field Dates: April 17th to April 21th, 2025.

Weighting: Results for Canada are weighted by age, gender, region, education, and self-reported federal past vote to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported in the table.

Survey Methodology



These are the results of an online survey conducted between April 15th and April 20th, 2025.

Method: This online survey was conducted and sponsored by Innovative Research Group Inc. using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Lucid, a leading provider of online sample. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data.

Sample Size: n=2,311 Canadian citizens, 18 years or older. The results are nationally weighted to n=2,000 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.

Field Dates: April 15th to April 20th, 2025.

Weighting: Results for Canada are weighted by age, gender, region, education, and self-reported federal past vote to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported in the table.
