Key Findings


1 Most Canadians (56%) think Indigenous women are more at risk of violence than women in general.

However, only 4-in-10 think governments should spend more on protecting Indigenous women from violence, a view more prevalent among those on the political Left.

Violence against Indigenous women is perceived as a low-priority issue. 1% mention it as the most important Indigenous issue. Only 18% are familiar enough with it to know the meaning of Red Dress Day, which honors the lives of missing and murdered Indigenous women.






When governments make major decisions concerning spending on programs and services, do you think they should be basing their decisions mainly on...?








Is the main role of government to...?






Value Clusters



Do you have any First Nations, Inuit or Métis ancestry? [asked of all respondents, n=1,250]





Violence against Indigenous women is a low-priority issue (1%) relative to other Indigenous issues




Familiarity with Red Dress Day


Only 18% of respondents are familiar with Red Dress Day; highest in the Prairies and among NDP partisans (28%)



Perceived Risk of Violence for Indigenous Women


56% believe Indigenous women are more at risk of violence than women in general; highest among NDP partisans






Government Spending on Indigenous Women Protection

Methodology

Survey Methodology



These are the results of an online survey conducted between May 23rd to June 1st, 2025.

Method: This online survey was conducted using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Lucid, a leading provider of online samples. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample.

Sample Size: n=1927 Canadian citizens, 18 years or older. The results are nationally weighted to n=1,250 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.

Field Dates: May 23rd to June 1st, 2025.

Weighting: Results for Canada are weighted by age, gender, region, education, and self-reported federal past vote to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported in the table.

Margin of Error: This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability-based sample, a margin of error cannot be calculated. Statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates do not apply to most online panels.

Note: Graphs may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.
