Insights into Tariff and Trade Attitudes

Public Opinion Research Release Date: July 25, 2025

Key Findings

Respondent opinions about the country's direction are sharply divided along partisan lines.

A majority of Americans feel the nation is on the wrong track. Republican respondents have become more optimistic, whereas Democratic respondents remain overwhelmingly negative.

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A substantial portion of the Republican base prioritizes nationalism over traditional free-market beliefs. While free trade is seen as economically beneficial by a majority (65%), Republicans are likely to endorse protectionist measures aligned with President Trump's economic policies.


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A majority of Americans support the import of oil and electricity from Canada.

Support for importing electricity has grown by 4 points since 2024 to 56%, and support for importing oil has increased by 3 points over the past year to the same level.


Setting the stage

Right/Wrong Direction: 59% of respondents feel the US is going in the wrong direction, including 4-in-5 African Americans and 2-in-3 women



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US Economy: With a net score of -34%, 2-in-3 respondents rate the economy is only fair or poor – including 82% of Democrats and African Americans



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
Trade - Canada vs. U.S.

[asked of all respondents; United States n=2,000]






Free Trade: Over half of Americans think importing electricity and oil from Canada is a good thing for the US; both increasing from 2024

The United States currently imports electricity from Canada. Do you think importing electricity from Canada has generally been a good thing for America or a bad thing for America?

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

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




Raise tariffs on all foreign imports by 10% across the board




Federal Read, Seen, Heard: 73% of Americans closely follow the news about tariff policies; 35% have a very negative reaction to them

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
Impact of Tariffs: 72% of Canadians and 53% of Americans think Trump's trade policies will have a serious impact on their countries

Methodology

Survey Methodology – USA National

These are the results of an online survey conducted between June 17th and June 23rd, 2025.

Method: This online survey was conducted using Dynata, a leading provider of online sample with additional respondents from INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual American population according to Census data to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample.

Sample Size: n=2,053 registered voters, 18 years or older. The results are weighted to n=2,000 based on Census and Current Population Survey data for all adults, with those who report not being registered screened out.

Field Dates: June 17th to June 23rd, 2025.

Weighting: Results for all American adults are weighted by age, gender, education, race, past presidential vote, and region to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census and population survey data; in order to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample. Respondents who report not being registered to vote were screened out of the final sample. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported in the table.

Margin of Error: This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability-based sample, a margin of error cannot be calculated. Statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates do not apply to most online panels.

Note: Graphs may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.

Survey Methodology – Canada Comparison Study



These are the results of an online survey conducted between June 5th and June 16th, 2025.

Method: This online survey was conducted and sponsored by Innovative Research Group Inc. using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Lucid, a leading provider of online sample. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data.

Sample Size: n=2,012 Canadian citizens, 18 years or older. The results are nationally weighted to n=1,500 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.

Field Dates: June 5th to June 16th, 2025.

Weighting: Results for Canada are weighted by age, gender, region, education, and self-reported federal past vote to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported in the table.

Margin of Error: This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability-based sample, a margin of error cannot be calculated. Statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates do not apply to most online panels.
