Carney's Davos Speech

Public Opinion Research
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Field Dates: Jan 22 to Feb 02, 2026

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Study Overview



Building on findings from previous waves, this preliminary report tracks January data about reactions to Prime Minister Mark Carney's speech at the World Economic Forum in Davos.

Key Findings

- 1 Satisfaction with the Federal government has strengthened.** Net post-Davos satisfaction score has increased from +5 pre-Davos to +16 post-Davos. A majority continue to be satisfied (55%) with net satisfaction rising 10 points. Over 2-in-5 approve of the government's handling of Trump (43%), with a net approval of +22, an 8-point increase from previous wave.
- 2 Federal visibility and favourability are high.** Nearly 3-in-5 Canadians (59%) report that they have recently read, seen, or heard something about the Prime Minister and federal government. Among those exposed, 60% say this made them feel more favourable, an all-time peak in positive impact and a strengthening in Mark Carney's favourability ratings, a 19-point net increase since pre-Davos.
- 3 Familiarity with Carney's speech is widespread, leading to a strong positive impression.** 70% of Canadians say they are at least somewhat familiar with the speech. A majority of those familiar with it, have directly read or heard parts of the speech. Impressions are strongly positive, with 65% holding a favourable view of the speech (including 40% very favourable), resulting in a net favourability of +50. Carney's speech was the most recalled RSH with a positive impact on favourability of +65 points.
- 4 Canadians clearly prioritize speaking out over avoiding risk.** Over 2-in-3 (70%) say it is important for Canada to speak honestly about the impact of Trump and act with other countries, even if it risks harm to Canada. Far fewer (16%) say it is a mistake to risk angering Trump due to the possibility of retaliation.
- 5 Mark Carney's profile aligns more closely with what Canadians say they want in both leadership and debate style.** Mark Carney is more strongly associated with stability (net +13) and respectful debate (net +13), while Pierre Poilievre is linked to disruption (net -8) and advocacy over respect (net -28), with notably higher 'don't know' responses on leadership style (38%). Aliment concentrates core support while mismatch and uncertainty correspond with softer or negative views.



Federal Combined Vote Tracking: Liberal combined vote (36%) holds a marginal lead over the Conservatives (34%) this wave




Federal Decided Vote Tracking: Liberal decided vote (40%) maintains a 2-point marginal lead over the Conservatives (38%) this wave ⁷


Federal Government Approval




Federal Govt Approval: 43% of Canadians approve of the federal government's Trump response; net approval rises 11-points to +22


Fed. Gov't Response to Trump - Approve: More (+14 pts) think the gov't is standing up to Trump after Carney's speech in Davos¹¹


Fed. Gov't Response to Trump - Disapprove: Recent weeks show a decline in mentions of weakness and inconsistency related to Trump








Party Leader NET Favourables Tracking: Both Carney's and Poilievre's favourable impressions are up (+7 and +5 points respectively)



Federal Read, Seen, Heard: Most Canadians have RSH something about PM and Feds; 3-in-5 therefore hold a more favourable opinion¹⁷




Have you read, seen or heard anything about Canada's Prime Minister and the Federal government in the last few days?








Familiarity With Carney's Speech







Impressions Of Carney's Speech

Trade-offs

Trade-offs: Over 2-in-3 think it is important to speak honestly about the impact of Trump and to act with others, even at risk of harm to Canada²⁹



While Mark Carney's Davos speech did not specifically mention Donald Trump, it was widely seen as critical of him. Trump himself made note of the critical tone in Carney's speech. Given this, which view is closest to your own?



Methodology

Survey Methodology – National



These are the results of an online survey conducted between January 22, 2026, and February 2, 2026.

Method: This online survey was conducted using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Lucid, a leading provider of online samples. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample.

Sample Size: n=1,666 Canadian citizens, 18 years or older. The results are nationally weighted to n=1,000 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.

Field Dates: January 22, 2026, to February 2, 2026

Weighting: Results for Canada are weighted by age, gender, region, education, and self-reported federal past vote to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data, in order to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported in the table.

Margin of Error: This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability-based sample, a margin of error cannot be calculated. Statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates do not apply to most online panels.

Note: Graphs may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.
