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Study Overview



Building on previous waves of British Columbia tracking, this report provides a September 2026 snapshot of the provincial political environment. It examines:

- **Awareness of recent news involving Premier David Eby and its impact on government image**
- **Assessments of the BC government's response to issues arising from Donald Trump's presidency**
- **Favourability of BC's provincial party leaders**
- **Provincial vote intentions and underlying political trends**
- **Openness to vote for the "Third party"**

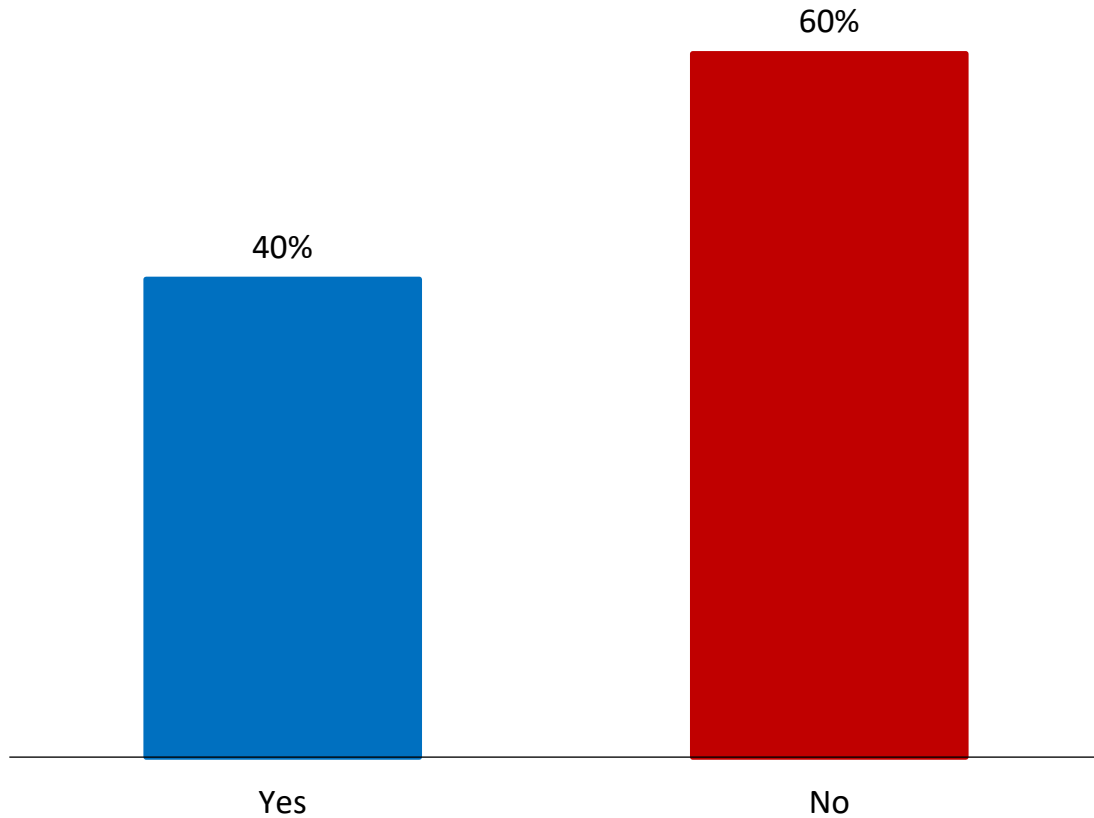
Key Findings

- 1** **Despite the dramatic fall of the former Conservative leader, the BC NDP only hold a narrow four-point advantage over the BC Conservatives, 43% to 39%.** Since August, NDP support has moved up marginally while Conservative support has fallen four points. Government satisfaction has improved since August, with British Columbians now evenly divided, 47% satisfied and 47% dissatisfied. Nevertheless, 57% agree it is time for a change.
- 2** **The NDP benefit from public focus shifting to Trump.** British Columbians have focused more and more on the provincial government's response to Trump, and they like what they see. Among those aware, favourable impact outweighs unfavourable impact by 40% to 19%, a remarkably positive result given most news tends to be bad news. Just over half (52%) approve of the government's response. As a result, overall government approval is up to 47% although Time for a Change is at 57% with intensity edging up.
- 3** **Eby has the strongest leader rating at 40% favourable and +6 net favourables.** While this is up from the summer, it remains significantly lower than when he first took office. Kerry Lynne Findlay declined almost 40 points in net favourables, ending up at -32. While far fewer have a view of Green leader Emily Lowan, those that do are a little more positive than negative (+3).
- 4** **There does not appear to be a big appetite for a centrist party.** Just thirty-one per cent reject both major parties. Only 17% say they are definitely or very likely to vote for a new, pragmatic centrist party. A new party is more likely to gain support from the BC Conservatives or third parties. It seems too late for a new centrist party to have a chance to win this election. They are more likely to help the NDP gain re-election.

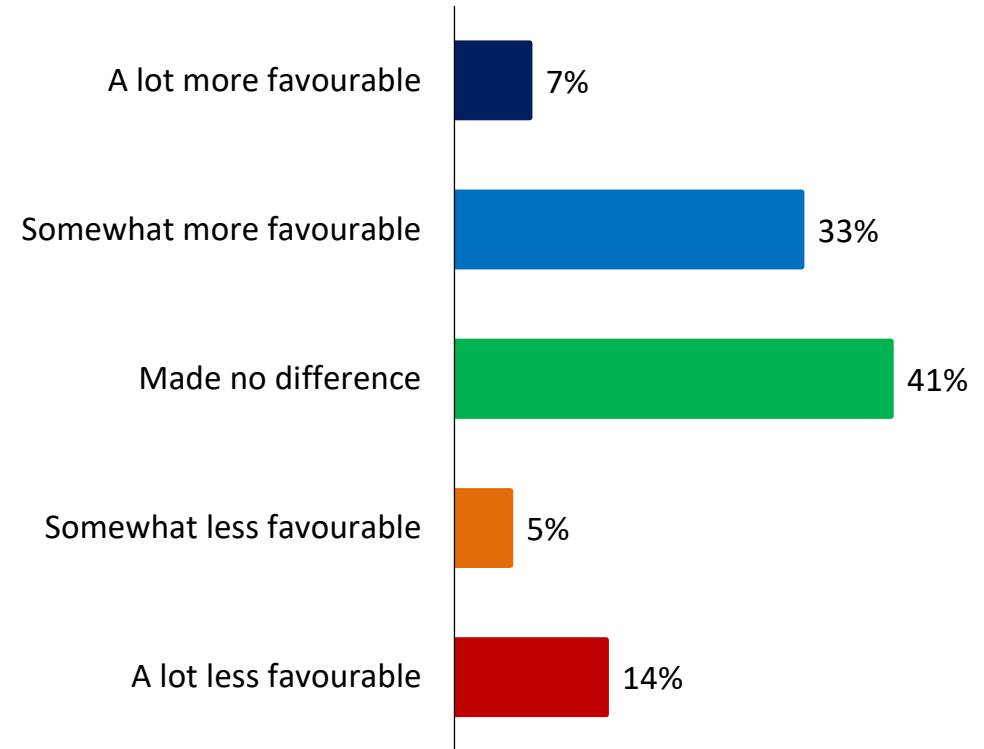

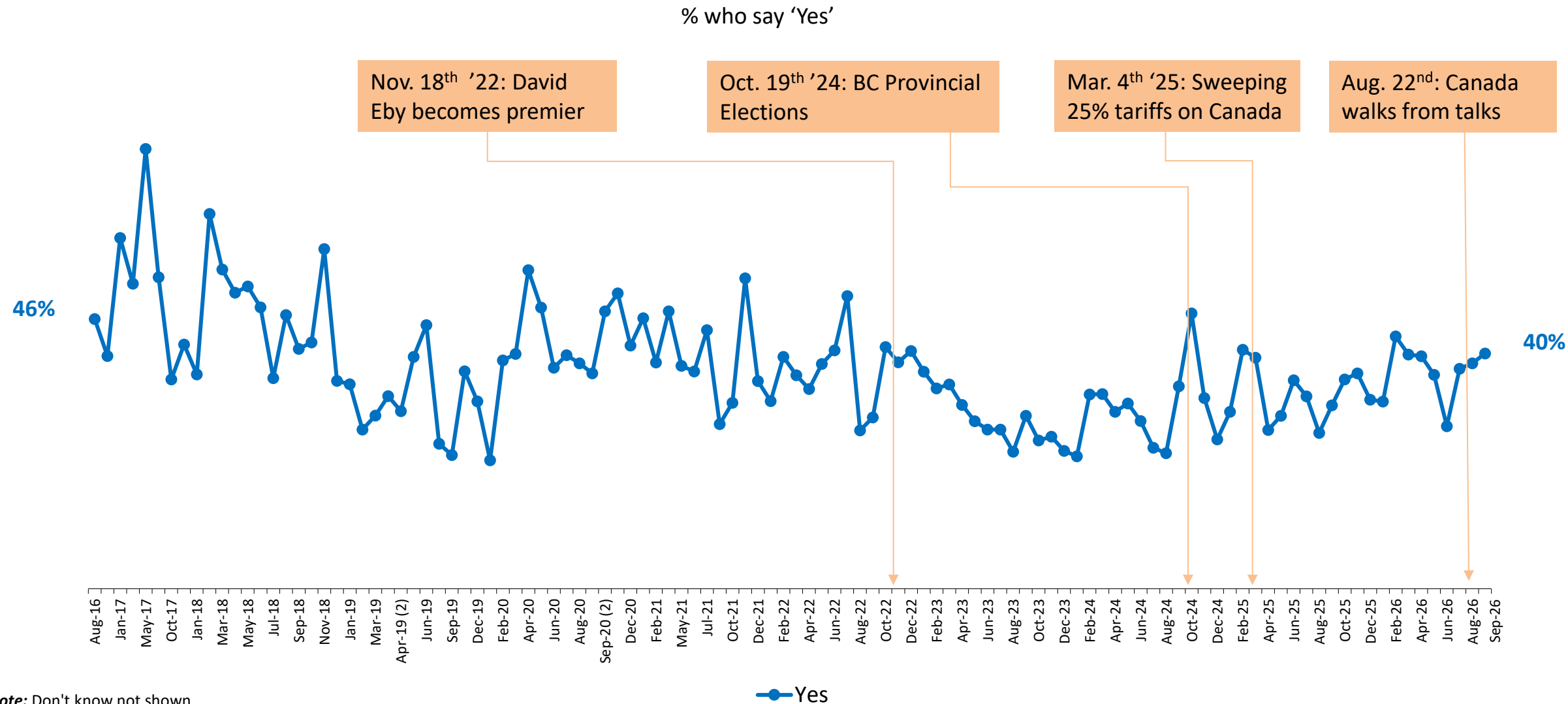

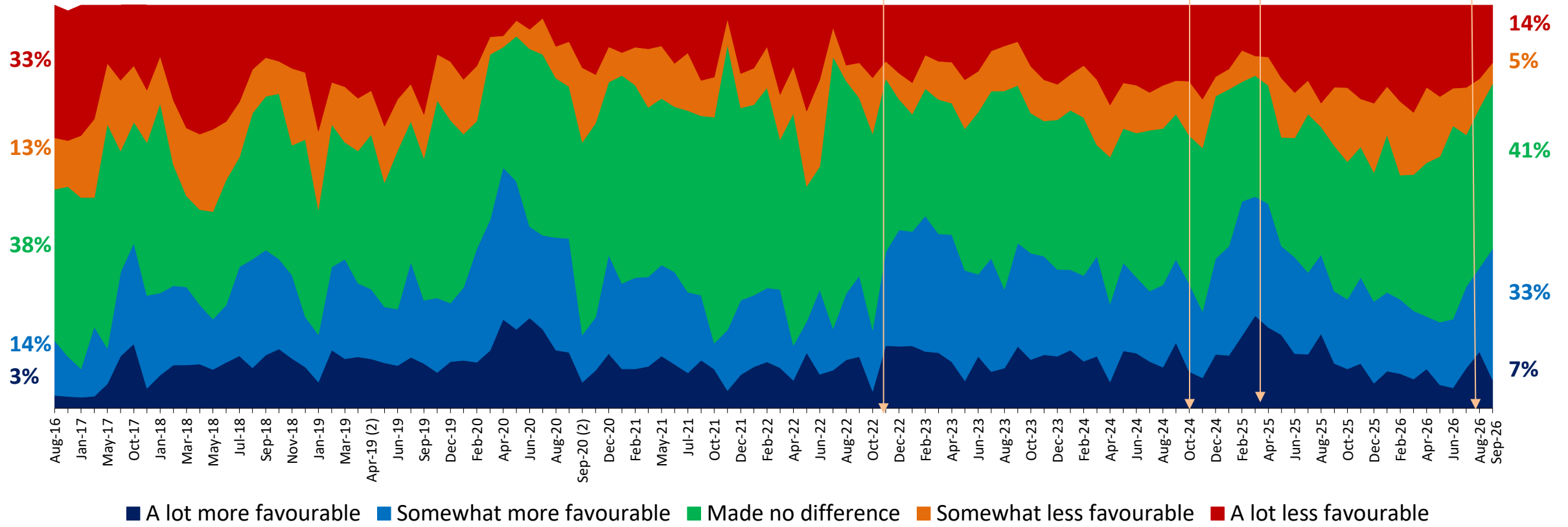

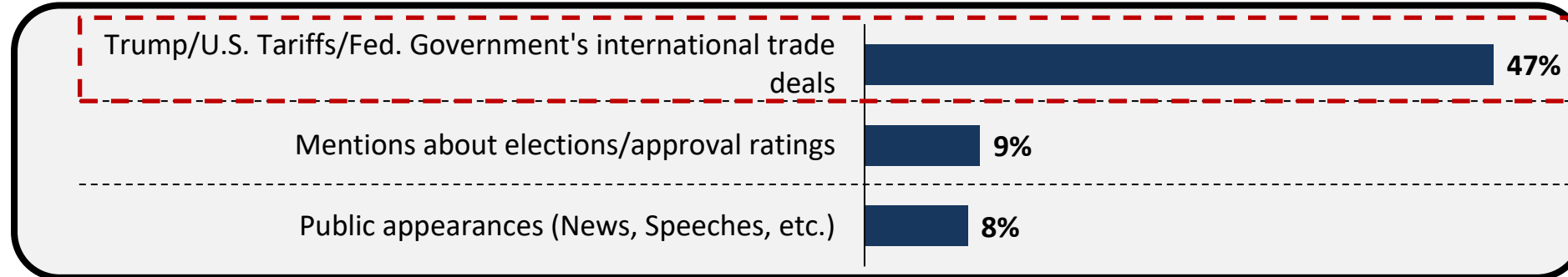

September'26: Impact of RSH on Premier/BC Gov't: Nearly half mention U.S. tariffs and international trade, with this R/S/H having a strong positive impact



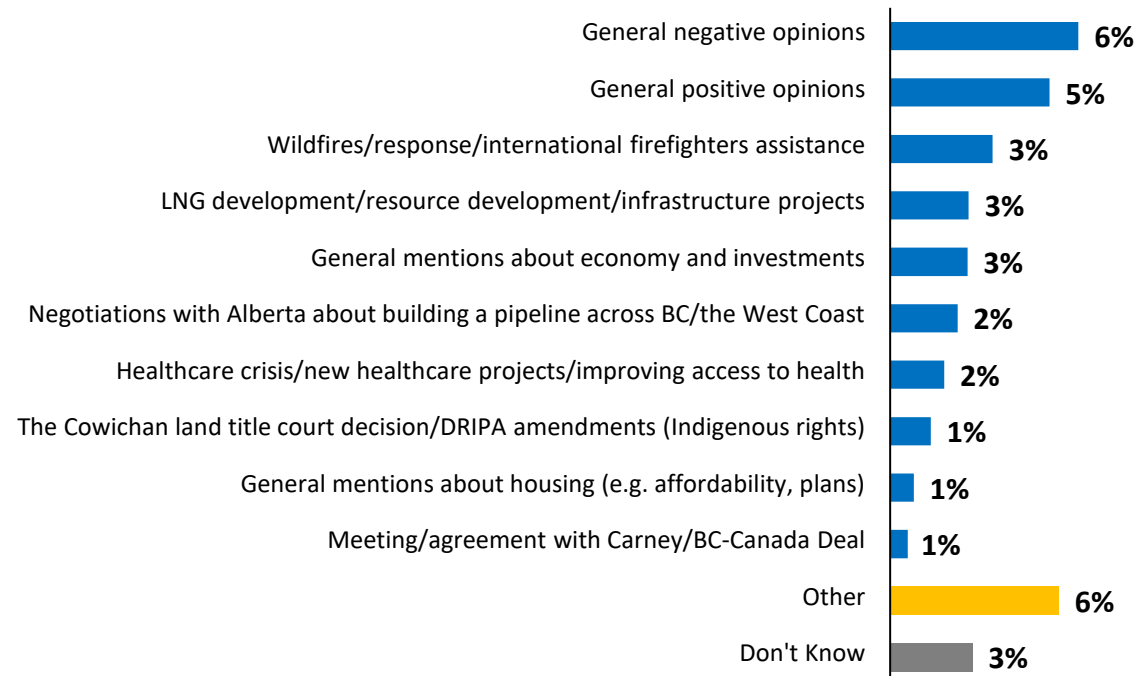

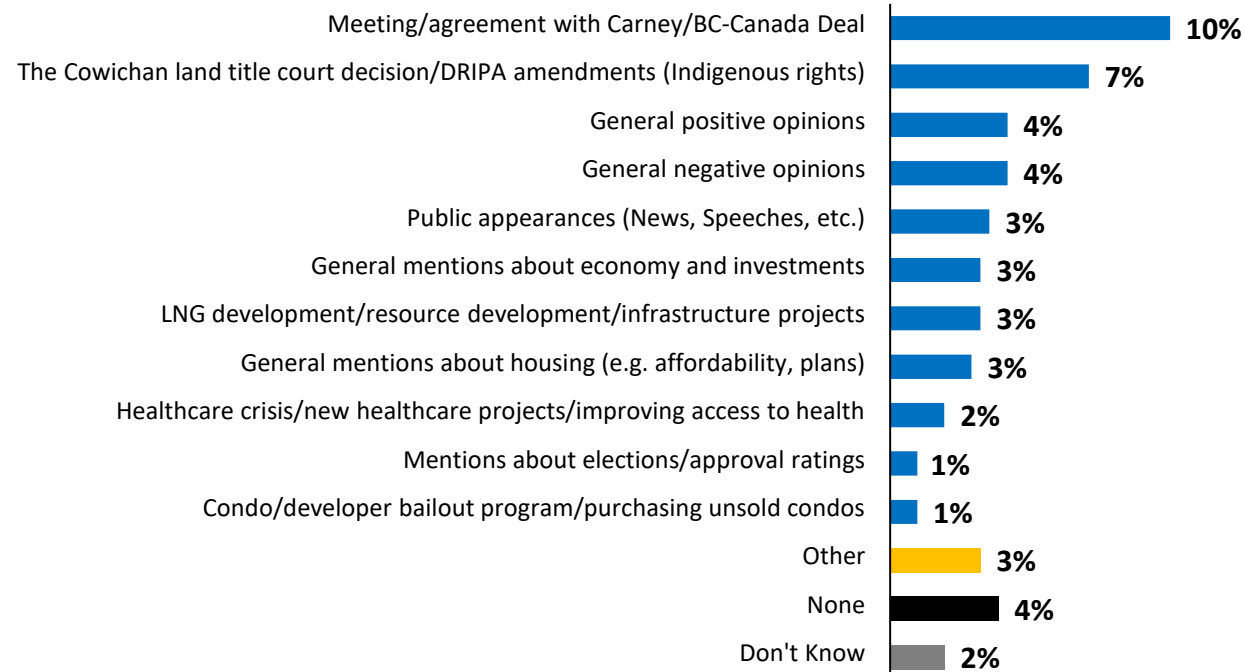

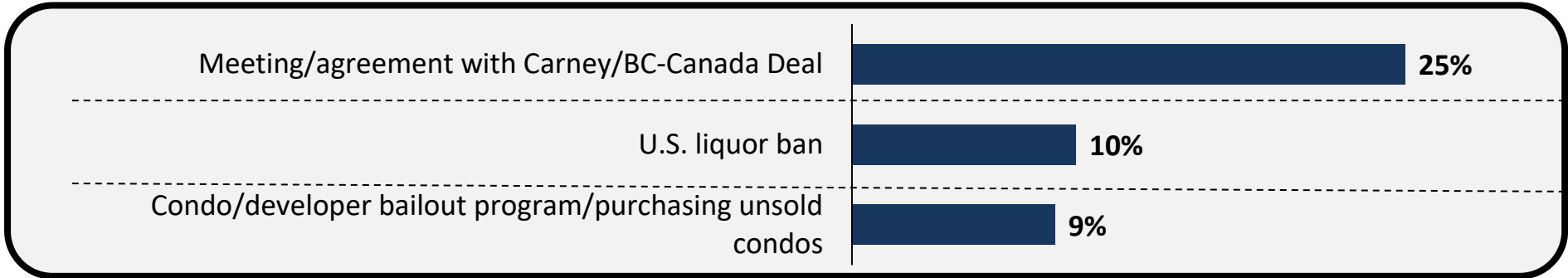

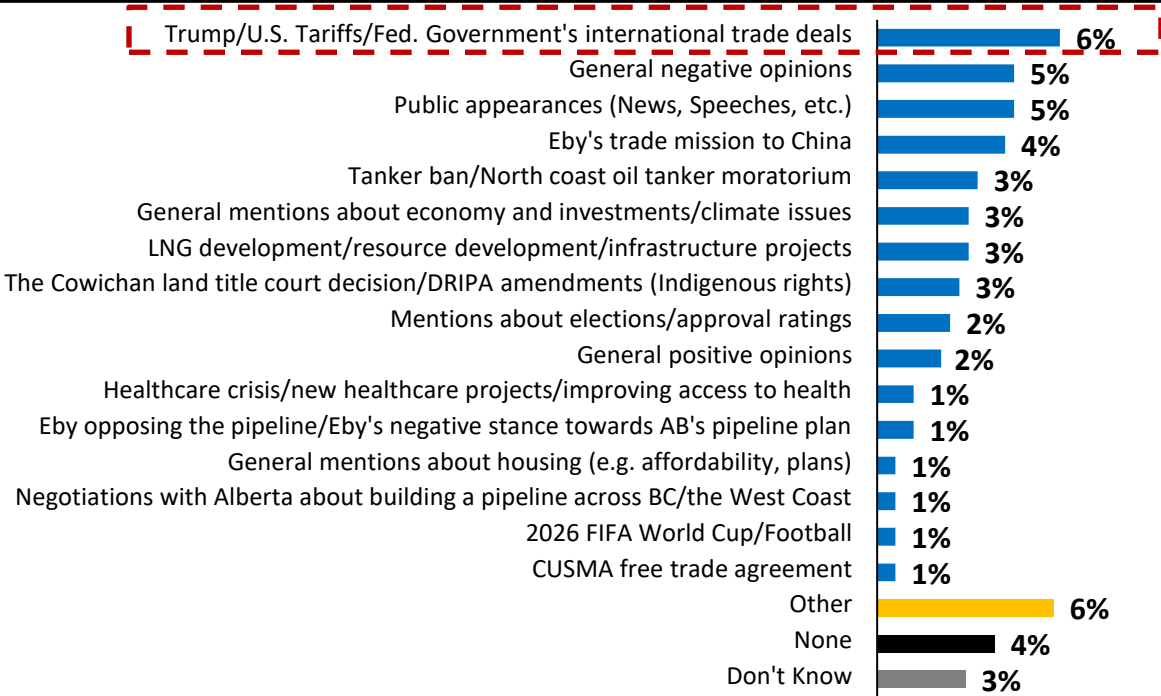

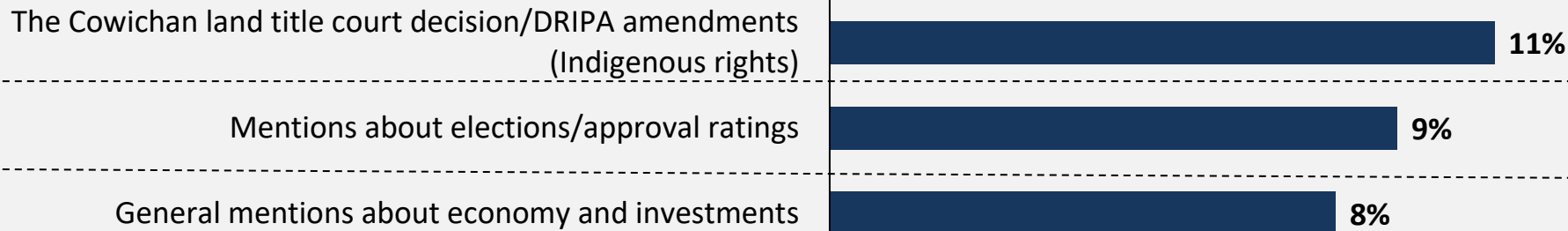

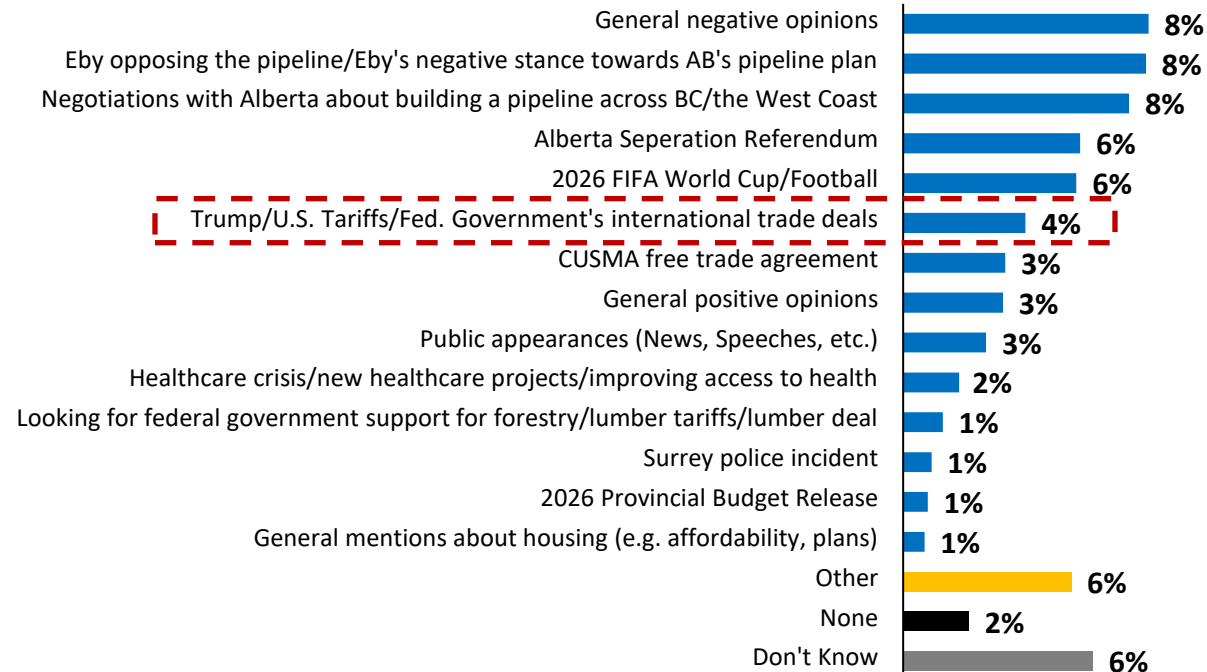

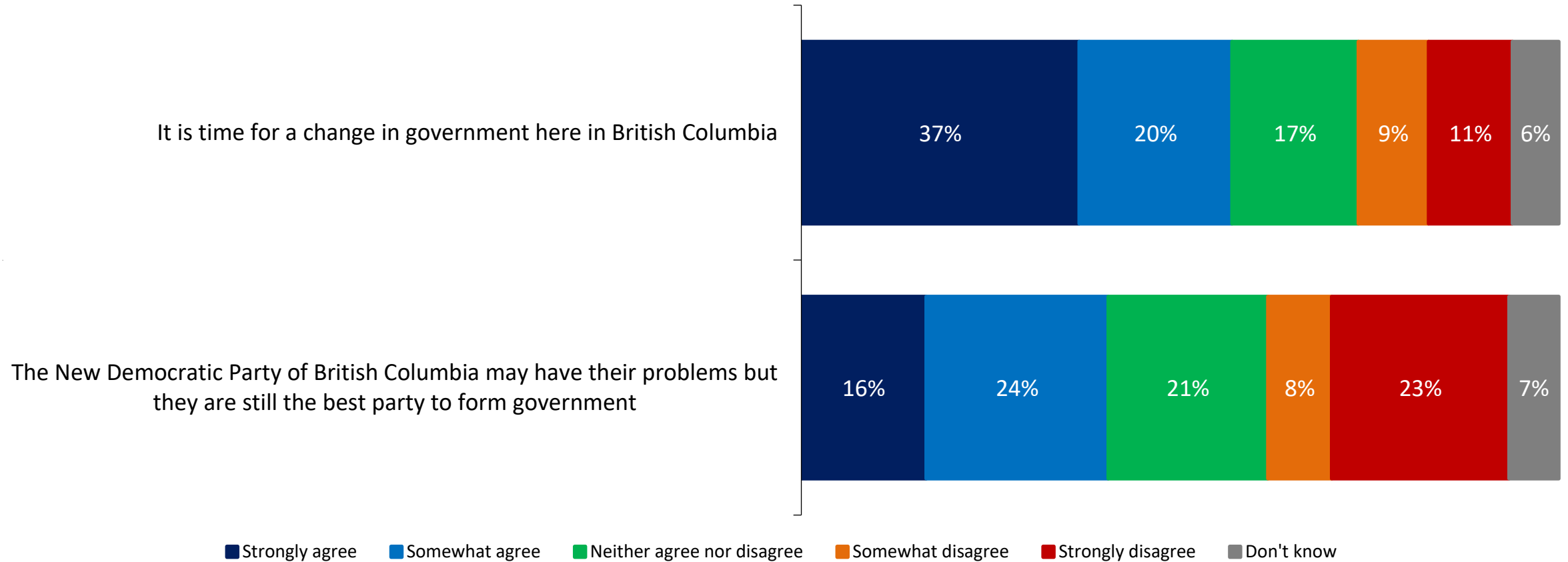
Time for Change

Do you agree or disagree with the following statements? -

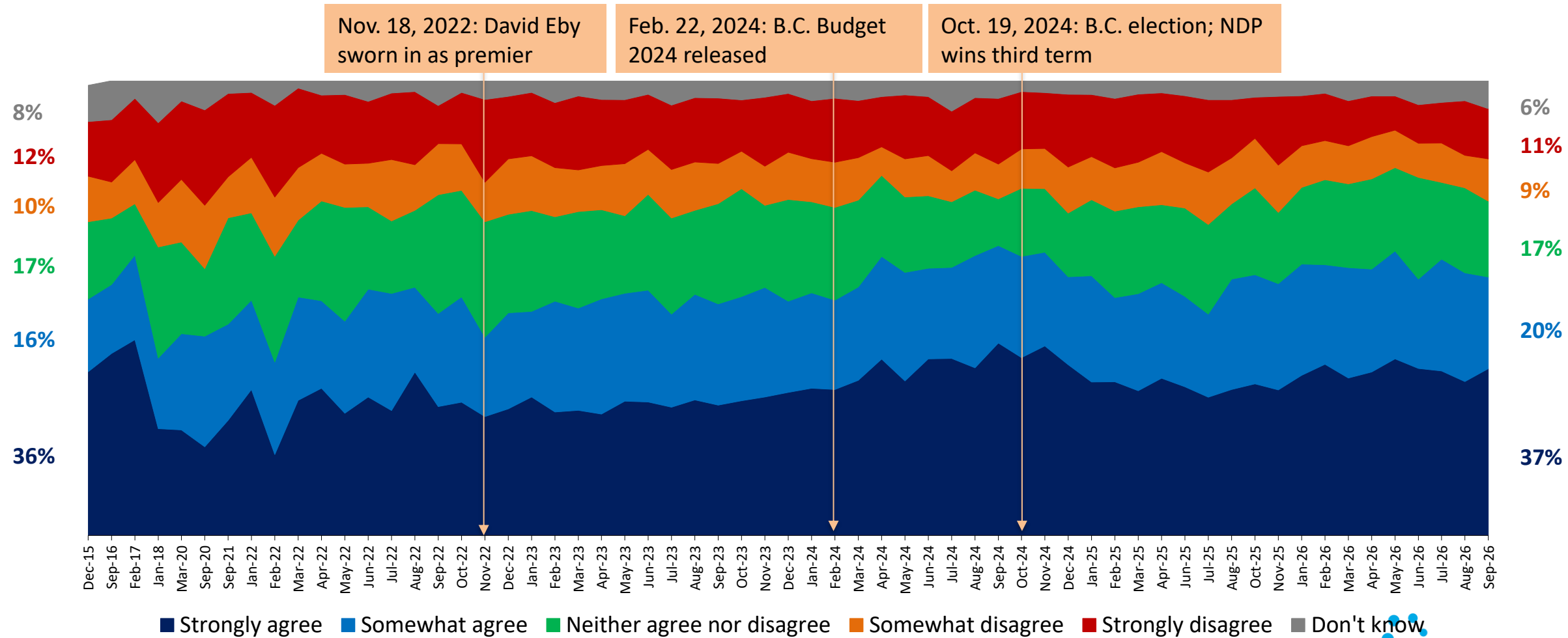

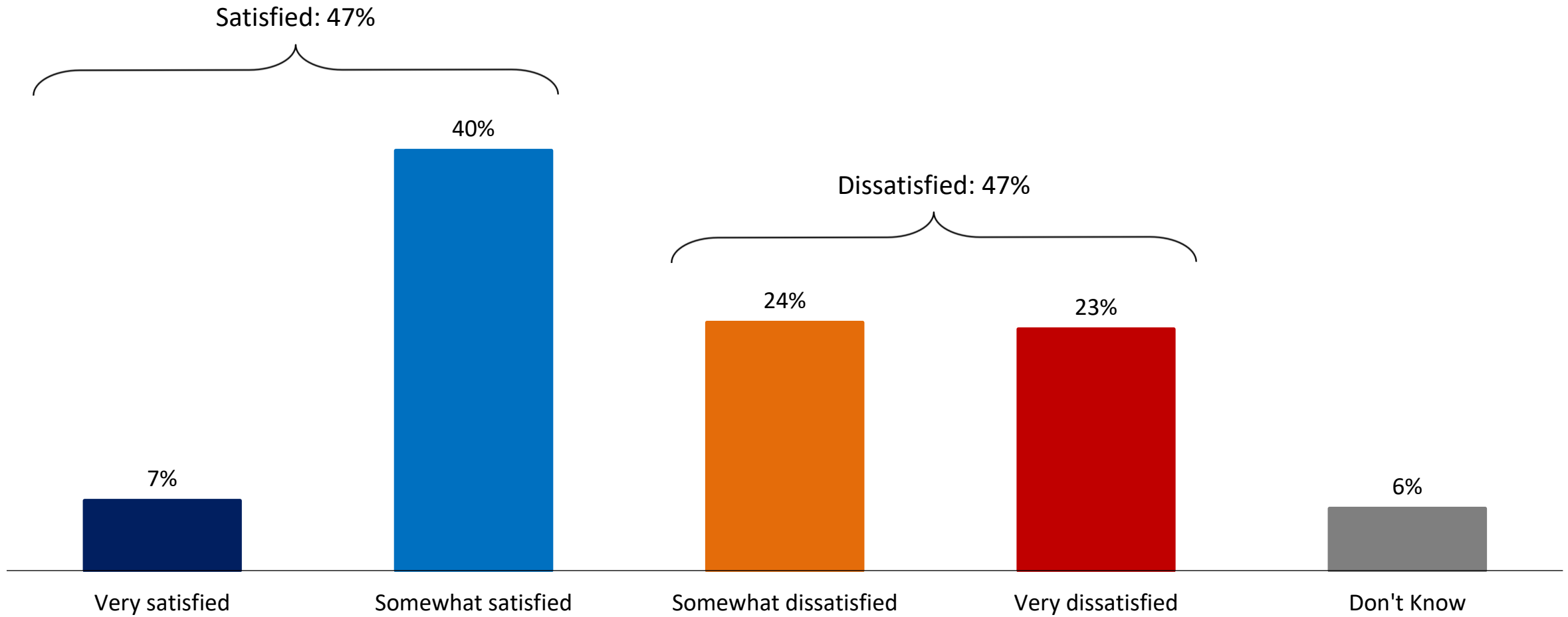


Satisfaction With the BC Government

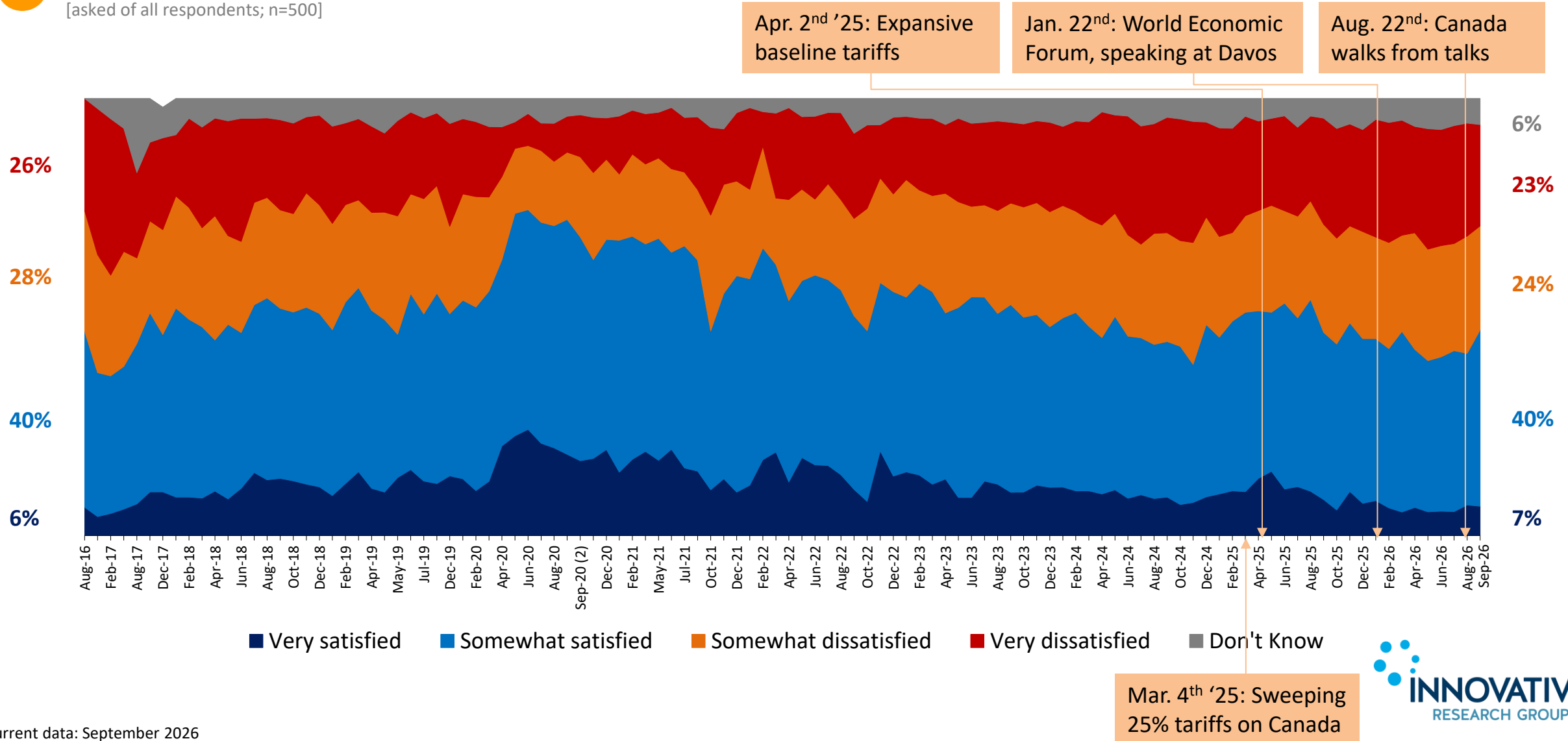


Satisfaction With BC Government Tracking: Satisfaction increased (42% to 47%) compared to August, dissatisfaction decreased (53% to 47%)

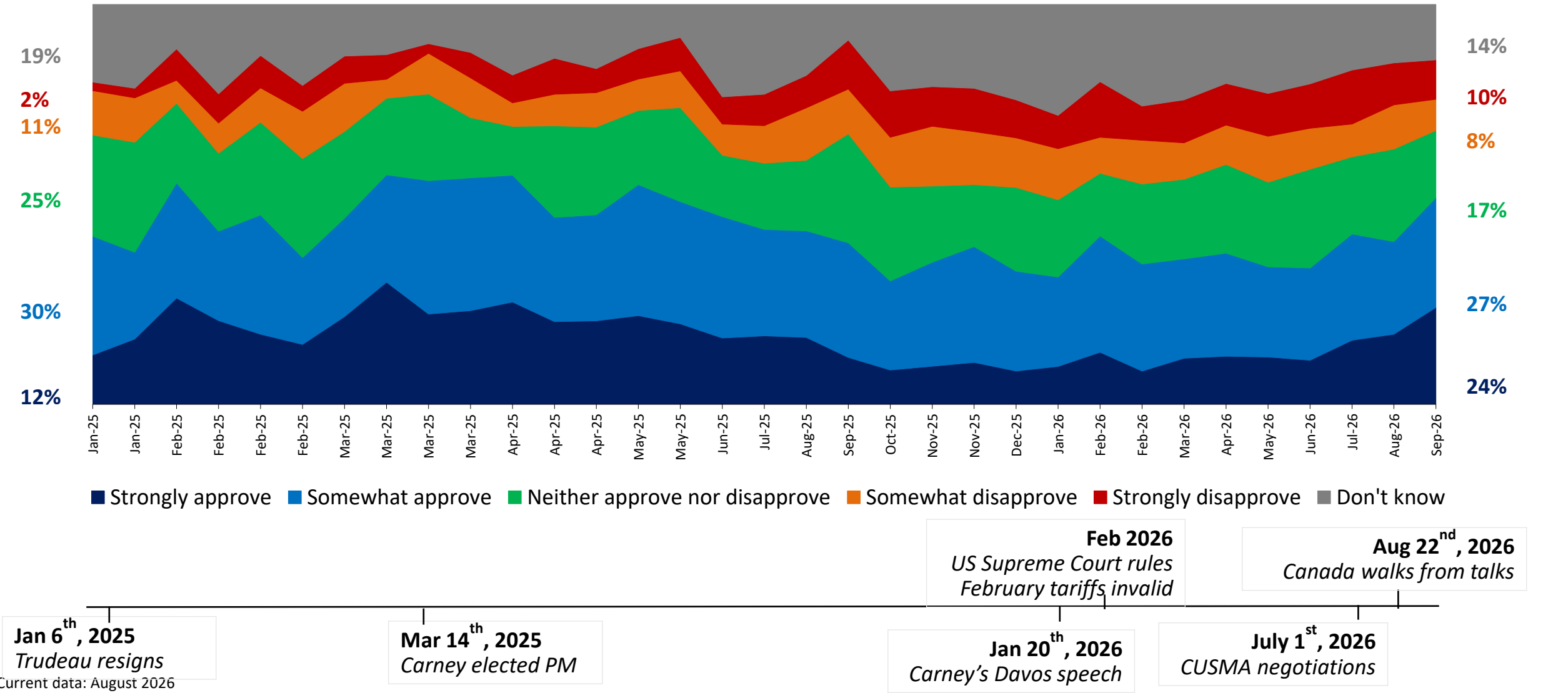


Reaction to Trump

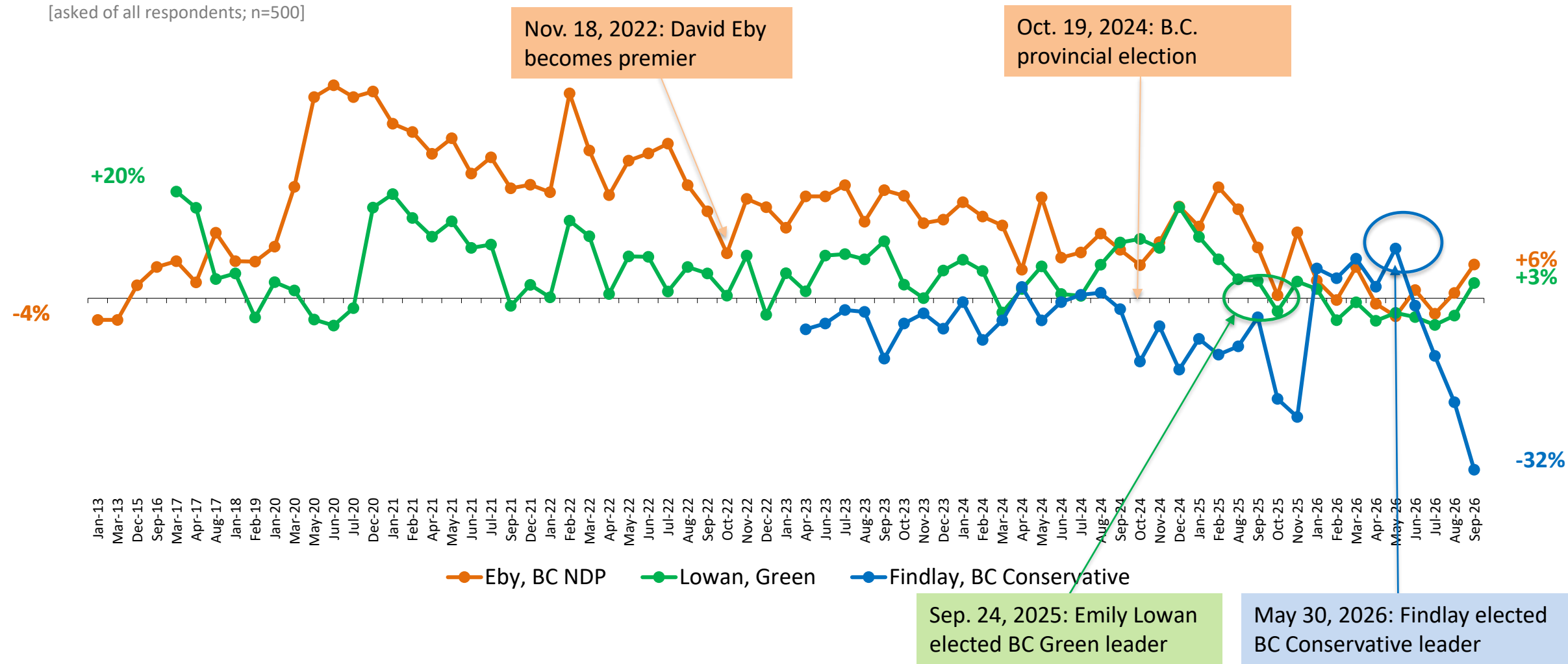


Leadership

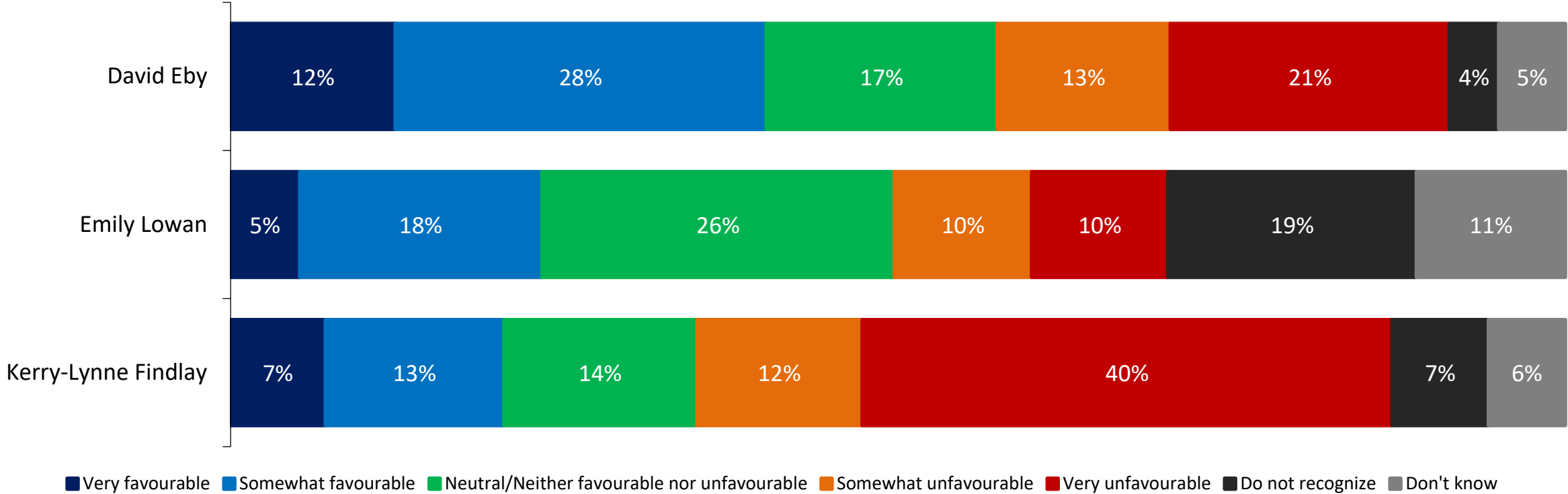


Leader Favourables: Eby has the strongest favourability at 40%, while 52% view Findlay unfavourably

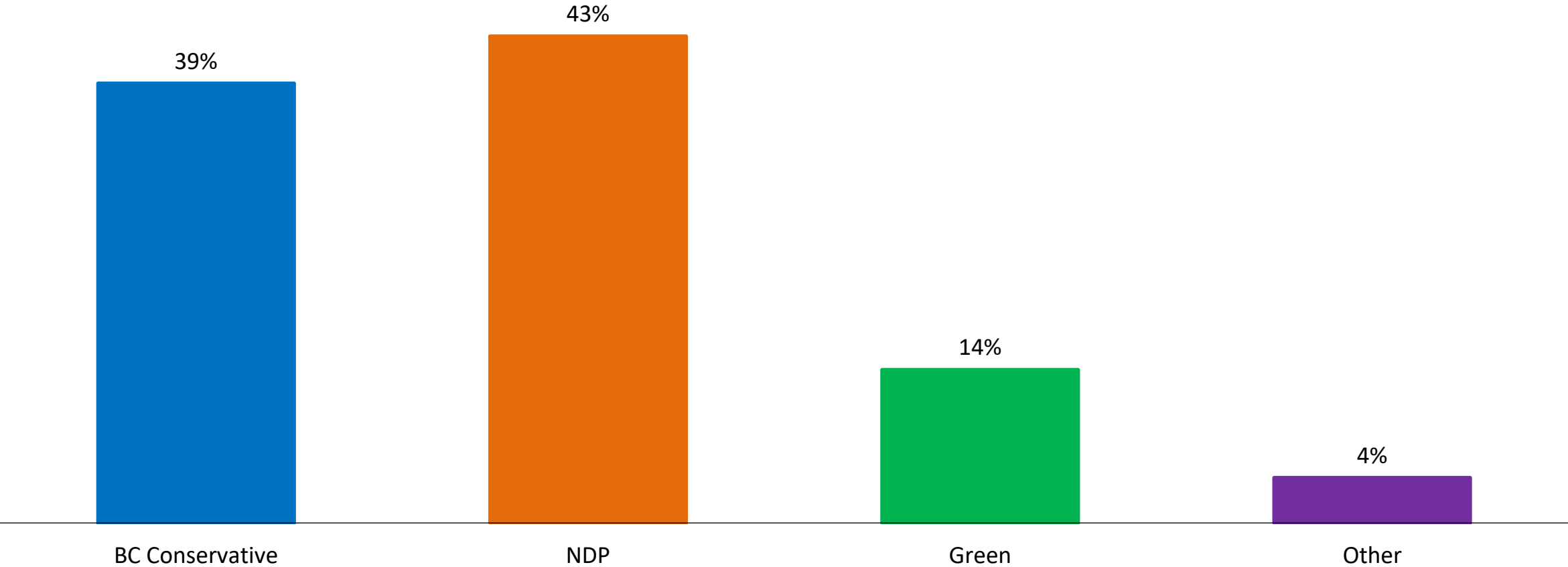


Provincial Vote

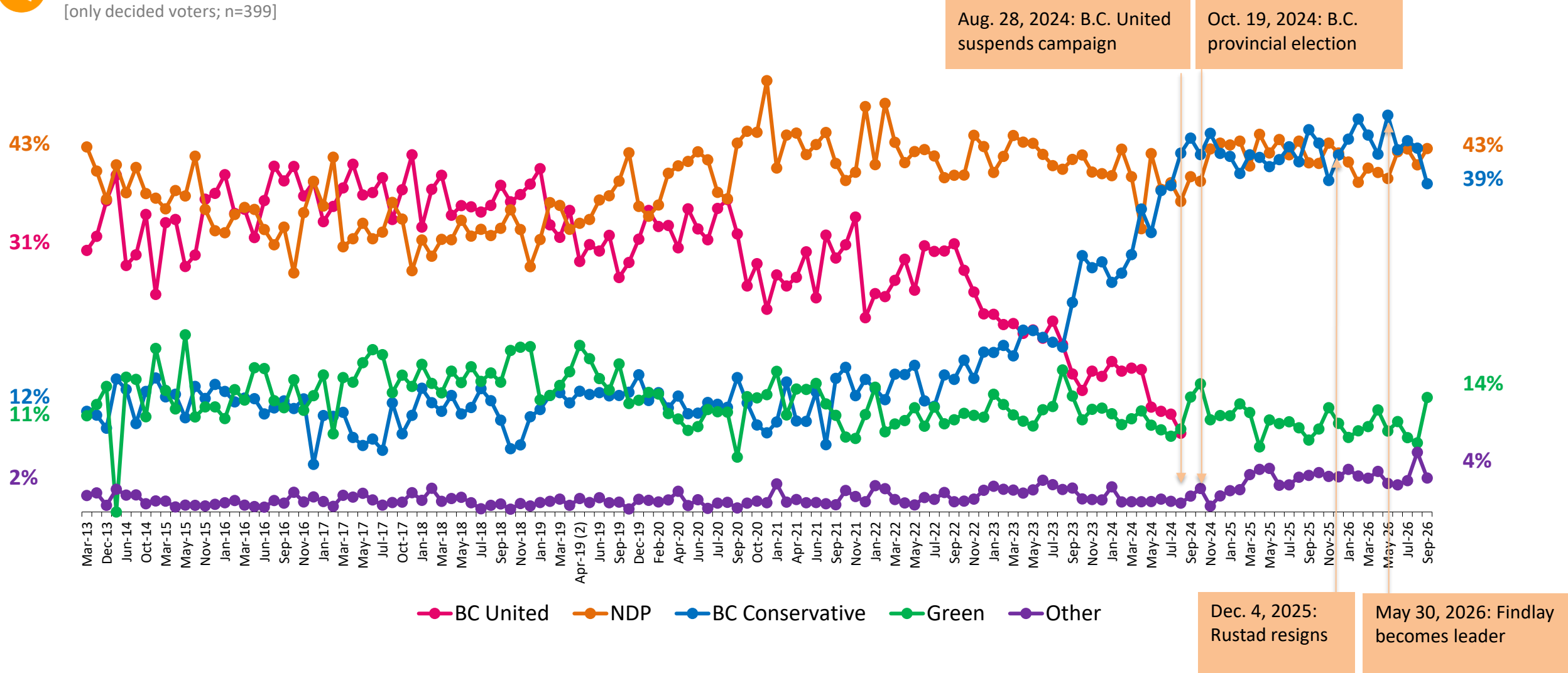


Provincial Decided Vote Tracking: NDP support marginally unchanged compared to August (41% - 43%), while Conservative declined (43% - 39%)

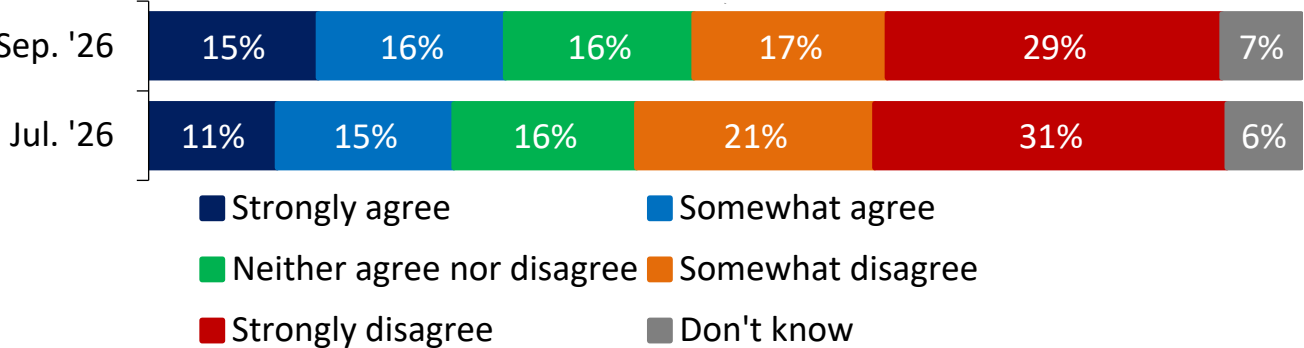
Voting for a Third Party

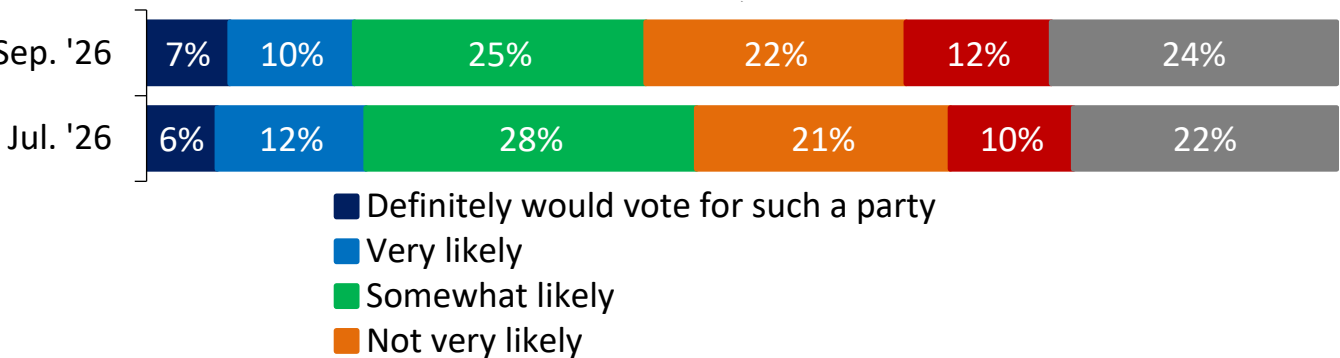

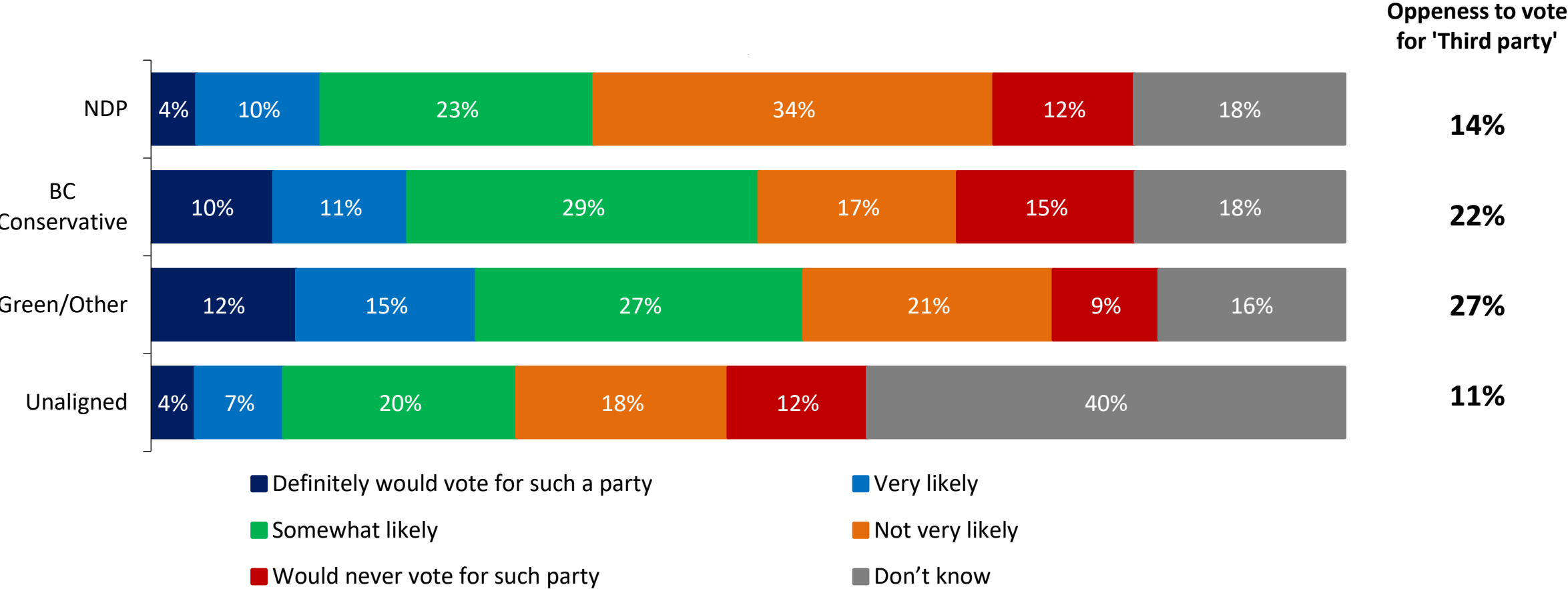

Methodology

Survey Methodology



These are the results of an online survey conducted between September 4, 2026, and September 18, 2026.

Method: This online survey was conducted using INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Lucid, a leading provider of online samples. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample.

Sample Size: n=2,818 Canadian citizens, 18 years or older. The results are BC weighted to n=500 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.

Field Dates: September 4, 2026 to September 15, 2026

Weighting: Results for Canada are weighted by age, gender, region, education, and self-reported federal past vote to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data, in order to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported in the table.

Margin of Error: This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability-based sample, a margin of error cannot be calculated. Statements about margins of sampling error or population estimates do not apply to most online panels.

Note: Graphs may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.
