Methodology



Methodology | General Population Telephone Survey

- This study was conducted by Innovative Research Group through random digit dialing telephone interviews among a representative sample of 602 English speaking Ontarians, 18 years of age or older.
- The interviews were conducted between March 17th and March 23rd, 2006. Up to eight call-backs were made in the case of non-response.
- Using data from Statistics Canada, the results were weighted according to region, age and gender to ensure a sample representative of the entire Ontario adult population. In the end, the maximum margin of error obtained for a sample of 602 respondents is ± 4.0%, 19 times out of 20.

Nutrition and lifestyle counseling most popular areas of naturopathic medicine

Q

I'm now going to read a list of health care treatments? Can you tell me how likely you are to use these services in the future and is that very likely, somewhat likely, somewhat unlikely or very unlikely?

Physical Medicine: that is, therapeutic massage, manipulation of muscle, bone or the spine, and exercise therapy to treat pain and stimulate circulation and healing.

Clinical Nutrition: that is, the use of dietary recommendations and specific nutritional substances to prevent and treat disease, and to address nutritional imbalances

Prevention and Lifestyle Counselling: that is, counsel on diet, lifestyle, exercise and occupational or environmental issues that affect health

Botanical Medicine: that is, the use of herbs/plants and substances derived from them to prevent and treat illness

Homeopathic Medicine: that is, medicines prepared from specific dilutions of plant, animal and mineral substances that are used to stimulate the body's natural ability to heal itself

Traditional Chinese Medicine / Acupuncture: that is, the use of Asian herbs and acupuncture to assist the body in achieving physical and mental balance

Naturopathic doctors must pass rigorous regulatory board examinations that are standardized across North America

Naturopathic doctors have undergraduate university degrees in addition to 4 years of full-time education from an accredited naturopathic medical school including 1400 hours of clinical internship

Naturopathic doctors are licensed in Ontario and have a regulatory board to set practice standards, respond to patient complaints and investigate professional misconduct.

Importance of title protection for public safety

In Ontario, there is currently no clear regulation to prevent an unlicensed and untrained practitioner from claiming to be a naturopathic doctor or a naturopath. How important is it to public safety to allow <u>only</u> regulated or licensed naturopathic doctors who have graduated from an accredited institution, who have passed licensing exams and who remain in good standing with the regulatory board to legally call themselves a "naturopathic doctor"?

Key Findings: General Population Telephone Survey

Public isn't exactly sure what naturopathic medicine is ...

- Only 24% of Ontarians can explain naturopathic medicine in detail
- However, 41% have heard of the practice before
- 35% are not at all familiar with the practice of Naturopathic Medicine

Nutrition and lifestyle counseling most popular areas of naturopathic medicine

- 72% say they are likely to use physical medicine services in the future
- 59% say they would use clinical nutrition in the future
- 53% would use prevention and lifestyle counseling in the future
- 50% would use botanical medicine in the future
- However, less than half (47%) say they would use homeopathic medicine in the future and only 35% say they would use traditional Chinese medicine / acupuncture in the future



Key Findings: General Population Telephone Survey

Public does not know enough to say whether there is adequate consumer protection for those that use NDs

- 71% of Ontarians do not know whether there is adequate consumer protection for patients who choose to see naturopathic doctors. 15% agree while 13% disagree that there is adequate consumer protection for patients who choose to see naturopathic doctors
- However, 80% of Ontarians feel it is <u>very important</u> to public safety to allow <u>only</u> regulated or licensed naturopathic doctors who have graduated from an accredited institution, who have passed licensing exams and who remain in good standing with the regulatory board to legally call themselves a "naturopathic doctor".

Usage of naturopathic medicine in Ontario

• 18% of Ontarians have seen a naturopathic doctor for treatment, while 40% of Ontarians are likely to use a naturopathic doctor in the next few years

Naturopathic medicine seen as a legitimate medical option

• 71% of Ontarians agree that "Naturopathic medicine is a legitimate option within the range of available medical options for the people of Ontario."
